premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable, in its present condition, be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom.

That the defective wooden flooring of the milk house be removed and replaced by a cement flooring, properly graded so as to discharge all liquid matter into an earthenware or iron drain, said drain to discharge into cesspool on premises; that the defective wooden flooring of the stable be removed, all offensive earth be removed, its site cleaned and disinfected and filled with fresh earth, and a cement floor be provided with properly constructed valley drains, so graded as to discharge into earthen drain, properly protected by strainer, said earthenware drain to discharge into the cesspool thereat; that the old wooden conduits from stable to cesspool and from stable to under milk house be removed and the sites be cleaned, disinfected and filled with fresh earth; that a properly inclosed runway be provided, and each cow be exercised at least once in each day; that the udders of the cows and the hands of the milkmen be thoroughly cleaned before each milking; that at least 600 cubic feet of air space be provided for each cow.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Erie Railroad Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railroad, with a single switch connecting the two tracks, to be operated by steam locomotives or other motive power which may be lawfully employed, except horses or the overhead system of electricity, across Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way extending from the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City, County and State of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—This ordinance as to the marginal wharf which extends from the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson rivershall not be operative and no rights thereundershall vest in the grantee, its successors or assigns until the Commissioner of Dock, under the provisions of section 819 of the Charter of The City of New York, shall approve by resolution, licenser than the control of the marginal wharf in such other manner as he may prescribe, not inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance.

Second—The said richt, privilege and franchise to construct and operate such railroad shall be held and enjoyed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for the term of the weak of the end of the grant for a further period of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided, with the privilege of renewal of the grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and rang further renewal. Such railroad of the grantee, its successors or assigns shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.
