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AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of a Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, May 19, 1903, at 12 o'clock Noon.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis and the Chief Engineer.

Pursuant to the following notice, published for fifteen consecutive days in the "City Record," commencing with May 2, 1903:

Bids or Proposals.

Sealed bids or proposals will be received by the Aqueduct Commissioners at the above office until 12 o'clock noon on Tuesday, May 19, 1903, for cutting timber and clearing grounds on the Croton River Division of the New Croton Reservoir.

The security required will be four thousand dollars.

The entire work must be completed on or before October 1, 1904.

The work is authorized by chapter 490, Laws of 1883, State of New York, and the amendments thereto.

The person or persons making a bid or proposal shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title, "Cutting Timber and Clearing Grounds on the Croton River Division of the New Croton Reservoir," for which the bid or proposal is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation, to the Aqueduct Commissioners, at the said office, on or before the date and hour above named, at which time and place the bids or proposals received will be publicly opened by the said Commissioners and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

The Commissioners reserve the right to reject any and all bids if they deem it for the interest of the City so to do.

Each bid or proposal shall contain the name and place and residence of each of the persons making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and the statement that no officer of The City of New York is directly or indirectly interested therein, as provided in the blank form of bid or proposal mentioned below and furnished by the Commissioners.

The bid or proposal must be verified.

Each bid or proposal shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as a surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank form of bid or proposal mentioned below.

No bid or proposal will be received or deposited unless accompanied by a certified check upon a national or State bank of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, or money to the amount of one thousand dollars. The check must not be inclosed in the envelope with the bid or proposal.

The limits of the grounds to be cleared in the Croton River Division extend from Pine's Bridge to the Putnam County line, at Croton Falls, containing about 2,000 acres.

For particulars as to the approximate quantity and quality of the supplies or the nature and extent of the work required or of the materials to be furnished, bidders are referred to the printed specifications and the plans.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or proposals upon the blank form prepared by the Commissioners, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor to the Secretary, at the above office of the Aqueduct Commissioners, where the plans and drawings, which are made parts of the specifications, can be seen.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, May 19, 1903, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis and the Chief Engineer.

The minutes of meetings of May 12 and 15, 1903, were read and approved. The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 15,168 to 15,195 inclusive, amounting to \$1,834.48.

Which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Chief Engineer presented progress report for the week ending May 15, 1903, which was considered and discussed and ordered referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

The Chief Engineer also presented the following report:

Report No. 577.

NEW YORK, May 19, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I transmit herewith a letter received by me from Contractors Williams & Gerstle, dated May 11, 1903, asking for an extra allowance on rock removal for masonry foundations for the Muscote Dam.

Clause 40 of the specifications for the Muscote Dam states:

"All rock surface intended for masonry foundation must be freed from all loose pieces, and be firm and solid, and be prepared as directed by the Engineer."

The contractors are required to do no more than is covered by the clause above quoted. I therefore recommend that their request be not complied with.

The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 578, dated May 19, 1903, transmitting for the information of the Commissioners copy of a letter from the Pneumatic Engineering Company, dated May 12, 1903, in answer to a letter of the Chief Engineer of May 11, 1903, in which said company states that the suspension of work in connection with its contract for the installation of a pump at Shaft No. 25 is due to local labor troubles.

NEW YORK, May 19, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—At your meeting of May 12 I was directed to inquire of the contractors for the New Croton and Muscote Dams as to why they had not increased the force on their respective contracts. In regard thereto I would state that in answer to my inquiries the contractors claim that the labor strikes occurring in the City and its neighborhood have rendered it almost impossible for them to obtain men, many of their employees leaving them in sympathy with strikers elsewhere.

NEW YORK, May 19, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—My estimate of the cost of the work of cutting timber and clearing grounds on the Croton River Division, for which you are going to receive bids today, is \$19,400.

This estimate is necessarily approximate on account of the difficulty of judging of the value to the contractor of the timber, grass, etc., which is to become part of the compensation for doing the work.

The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 581, dated May 19, 1903, returning letter of H. T. Dykman, dated May 14, 1903, in relation to the new highway system in the Towns of Lewisboro and Cortlandt, etc., stating that the letter of Mr. Dykman was too indefinite and suggesting that he be asked to send a letter giving in detail the information required.

The Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of said report and of the letter therein referred to Mr. Dykman with a request that he furnish more definite information.

A communication was received from the Mayor, dated May 18, 1903, acknowledging receipt of report of work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending May 8, 1903, which was ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Comptroller, dated May 15, 1903, transmitting copy of Claim No. 17221 1-2, filed in the Department of Finance by the estate of William B. Ogden, for the sum of \$3,850, and requesting certain information relative thereto: which was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

A communication was also received from the Comptroller, dated May 15, 1903, requesting to be advised as to whether there are any claims for rent against certain parcels of land mentioned in said letter; which was referred to the President to furnish the information desired.

A notice of the final award to Nelson Brothers, former owners and occupants of parcel of land known as No. 185, for damages in the taking of their land for the City, having been received from the Comptroller, the President was requested to communicate with the Comptroller, the Corporation Counsel and Special Counsel Dykman with the view of securing the payment of the amount due the City before the payment of the award for said property.

A communication was also received from the Comptroller, dated May 16, 1903, stating that on May 15, 1903, the sum of \$521,495 had been deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the "Additional Water Fund," being bonds \$500,000 and premium \$21,495.

Which was ordered entered upon the books of the Commissioners and filed.

A communication was also received from the Comptroller, dated May 18, 1903, in relation to the expense incurred in furnishing press clippings to the different City departments.

Which was read and ordered filed.

A communication was also received from the Comptroller, dated May 18, 1903, transmitting copy of a claim filed in the Department of Finance by Kelly & Kelley for the sum of \$35,000 alleged to be due to them in connection with their contract with this Commission for the construction of overflow and blow-off sewers, etc., in connection with the Jerome Park Reservoir, and requesting certain information relative thereto.

Which was referred to the Secretary for the information desired.

A communication was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated May 16, 1903, stating that the transfer of John Kenny, Inspector of Masonry, to the Board of Education had been approved, and a certificate issued therefor in accordance with the provisions of Rule 40.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer for his information and ordered filed.

A communication was also received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated May 18, 1903, authorizing the change of title of Abraham Clerke from Laborer to Stoker, and requesting to be notified of the date on which the change goes into effect.

Which was referred to the Secretary to transmit the information desired.

A communication was received from Helen de Veer, dated May 18, 1903, in relation to the removal of a rock obstructing a pathway in the vicinity of One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, near the Speedway.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

CITY OF NEW YORK, May 18, 1903.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President Aqueduct Commission, No. 280 Broadway, New York:

DEAR SIR—In reply to your communication of April 11, 1903, inclosing copy of a communication to your Board dated March 31, 1903, from the New York Telephone Company in relation to certain pole-line privileges in the vicinity of Pines Bridge, in the towns of Yorktown and New Castle, Westchester County, I hereby disapprove the application on the ground that the compensation offered is inadequate. The New York Telephone Company offers the Department local service only at the various stations mentioned, and under the company's offer the City would be liable for toll charges. The company also seeks the confirmation of its right to maintain such poles and wires as the New York Telephone Company and the American Telephone and Telegraph Company now have on highways and across property used for water supply purposes in Westchester and Putnam counties. This confirmation, in my opinion, should not be granted.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, dated May 16, 1903, returning printer's proof of proposed contract, specifications, proposal and bond for 26 three feet by six feet sluice gates, with the necessary lifting machinery required at the new Gatehouse at the Old Croton Dam, approved.

A communication was received from MacArthur Brothers Company, dated May 18, 1903, stating that they propose to bid for the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company upon the raising and changing of railroad tracks within the limits of the New Croton Reservoir, and would like to know what arrangements could be made with this Commission for taking material from the ground within the radius of the reservoir.

A communication was received from J. E. Hatch, dated West Eaton, N. Y., May 14, 1903, in reference to the foundation for the New Croton Dam.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer.

A communication was received from Meyer H. Lewis, Transitman, dated Katonah, N. Y., May 18, 1903, requesting permission to enter an examination for promotion to the position of Assistant Engineer, which is to be held by the Civil Service Commission May 19, 1903.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer.

The Chief Engineer presented Report No. 583, dated May 19, 1903, returning letter of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated May 5, 1903, certifying to a list of Laborers, and recommending the appointment of George M. Forshay, Pleasantville, N. Y., and Alexander M. Gordon, Kitchawan, N. Y., as Laborers at a salary of two dollars per day.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE Erie Railroad Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a railroad in and upon Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way lying between Thirteenth avenue and the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Erie Railroad Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railroad, with a single switch connecting the two tracks, to be operated by steam locomotives or other motive power which may be lawfully employed, except horses or the overhead system of electricity, across Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way extending from the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City, County and State of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions as to the marginal wharf which extends from the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river shall not be operative and no rights thereunder shall vest in the grantee, its successors or assigns until the Commissioner of Dock, under the provisions of section 819 of the Charter of The City of New York, shall approve by resolution, license or otherwise, the use of such marginal wharf by the grantee in the manner herein provided, or in such other manner as he may prescribe, not inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate such railroad shall be held and enjoyed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided, with the privilege of renewal of the grant for a further period of twenty-five years, upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and is not to include an valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Provided, however, and this grant is upon the express condition that the right, privilege and franchise conferred by this ordinance may be cancelled and annulled upon one year's notice in writing to the grantee, its successors and assigns, by the joint act of the Commissioner of Docks of The City of New York and of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or their respective successors in authority, and thereupon all the rights of the grantee, its successors or assigns in and upon the street and marginal wharf or way aforesaid shall cease, and the railroad and its structures thereon shall be forthwith removed and the pavement of the street or wharf restored under the same conditions and covenants as are contained in the following paragraph of this section, designated third:

Third—Upon the termination of such franchise, right or privilege, whether original or by way of renewal, the plant and property, with its appurtenances, of the Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, in the street and upon the marginal wharf or way aforesaid, shall be forthwith removed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, and the surface of the said street or marginal wharf or way upon which such railroad was laid shall be restored to a condition equal to that of the surrounding surface and pavement of such street and wharf. In default of the performance of this condition by

Such sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year.

Fifth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—The said railroad may be operated by locomotive steam power or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law, excepting overhead electrical power and horse power, provided, however, that the locomotive steam engines used shall be housed or boxed so as to conform to the type commonly known as the dummy engine.

The number of cars to be included in any train operated upon the railroad shall be limited to ten, and the speed of the engines and cars shall never exceed six miles per hour. No car or engine shall be permitted to remain stationary within the limits of Thirteenth avenue, or upon a marginal wharf or street at any time.

Seventh—The railroad constructed under this ordinance shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise and for no other purpose, and especially for no purpose in connection with the passenger traffic as commonly understood.

Eighth—Such railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and solely upon the terms and according to the lines and surveys and of the character of the rails and other parts of the construction approved by the Commissioner of Docks of The City of New York and the President of the Borough of Manhattan. Such railroad of the grantee, its successors or assigns shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Ninth—Said railroad shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York, and especially shall in all respects be subject to the power and authority of the Commissioner of Docks to regulate and control the uses of the marginal wharf or way above described, and the transportation of property thereon.

Tenth—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall at all times keep the street between the tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow.

Eleventh—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall keep in permanent repair the portion of the surface of the street and of the marginal wharf or way between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the street and marginal wharf or way, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twelfth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited and annulled by The City of New York by an action brought by the Corporation Counsel on ten days' notice to the grantee, its successors or assigns.

Sec. 3. This grant is upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Sec. 4. The grantee, its successors or assigns shall commence the construction of the railroad under this franchise and complete the same within six months from the date when it has obtained the necessary permits and resolutions of the City officials and Departments, and on or before January 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceedings either at law or otherwise for that purpose, provided, however, that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for a period not exceeding six months.

Sec. 5. This grant is upon the express condition that the grantee, within thirty days after it has been duly authorized to construct or operate its railroad hereunder, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of \$1,500, either in money or in securities, to be approved by him, which shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railroad. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
