Report for Quarter ending June 30, 1904.

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York,
Foot of East Twenty-sixth Street,
November 29, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, City of New York:

Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith, pursuant to the provisions of section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the report of the Department of Public Charities of The City of New York for the quarter ending June 30, 1904, together with the reports of heads of institutions for the same period.

In addition thereto, the following matters may be noted:

On April 4—Bids were opened for the addition of an east wing to the New York City Training School for Nurses on Blackwell's Island, and award made to the lowest bidder, at \$34,750.

Same day bids were opened for the erection and completion of new Reception Building at the City Hospital, and award made to the lowest bidder at \$20,900.

On April 6—Bids were opened for repairs to steamer "Thomas S. Brennan." Lowest bidder, Greenlie, Wyatt & Co., \$10,600.

On April 15—The Coney Island Reception Hospital was opened for the reception of patients. This was one month earlier than usual, the reason being the presence at Coney Island of such a large number of workmen employed on the new buildings being erected to replace those destroyed by fire after the close of the summer season of 1903. There is need of a permanent hospital located on some central, accessible place on Coney Island.

April 18—Bids were opened for repairs and painting roofs, leaders and gutters of the building at the Home for the Aged and Infirm, Blackwell's Island. Lowest bidder, Rubin Solomon, \$1,118.

April 27—Bids for delivering hardware, metals, crockery, glassware, woodenware and for other miscellaneous supplies.

May 12—Bids were opened for all the labor and material required to paint the entire exterior of the building on the pier foot of East Twenty-sixth street, together with the entire wainscoting of the shed portion. Lowest bidder, T. E. Quinn, \$1,400.

May 13—Auction sale of grease, barrels, bones, rags, metal and miscellaneous articles for boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, held at the Home for the Aged and Infirm, Flatbush.

May 16—Bids were opened for
No. 1. Furnishing and installing laundry machinery in the laundry, Randall's Island.

No. 2. Furnishing all the labor and materials required to make certain alterations to laundry building extension, Randall's Island.

No. 3. Furnishing all the labor and material required to repair the walls and put new roof on the gas house, Randall's Island. Lowest bidder, Job No. 1, American Laundry Machinery Company, \$1,880.

Jobs Nos. 2 and 3, readvertised.

June 3—For furnishing and delivering uniforms and uniform goods. Lowest bidder, William Shapiro, \$5,081.78.

June 3—1. For furnishing all the labor and material required to make certain alterations to laundry building extension, Randall's Island.

2. For furnishing all the labor and material required to repair the walls and put new roof on gas house, Randall's Island.

June 6—In compliance with a resolution adopted May 6 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, a site for a municipal lodging house was submitted for their consideration. The proposed site is a plot of ground on the south side of Twenty-fifth street, 400 feet east of First avenue, 100 feet on Twenty-fifth street and 98 feet 9 inches deep, adjoining property now owned by the City as a pipe yard, and not likely to be built upon for years.

On June 10 bids were opened (1) for furnishing all the labor and material required to install certain plumbing in various buildings at The New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island; (2) for furnishing all the labor and material required to erect a water storage tank and connect the same with the present water main supplying the various buildings at The New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island. Lowest bidder, Job 1, Michael O'Brien, \$3,200. Lowest bidder, Job 2, Michael O'Brien, \$3,270.

On June 15 bids were opened for furnishing all the labor and material required to make alterations to office building on the east end of the pier at foot of East Twenty-sixth street. Lowest bidder, Albert Winternitz, \$4,223.

REPORT ON THE "GENERAL SLOCUM DISASTER."

New York, June 21, 1904.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner:

My Dear Commissioner—At last the tension under which we have been all laboring since the dreadful calamity of Wednesday last (June 15, 1904), the burning of the "General Slocum," is somewhat lessened, and I will proceed to chronicle the history of the share our Department has had in the sad work of securing and disposing of the dead

and of affording consolation to their friends. Let me say first: That consistent with your views and my own, we let all who would, co-operate in the work, and avoided all friction which in some cases would have been inevitable had we asserted our prerogatives. We sought no notoriety or glory, being well pleased to be able to mitigate somewhat the sorrows of the afflicted multitudes by every means in our power. When the news of the disaster was first conveyed to us at about 10.30 A. M., on Wednesday, June 15, according to your expressed wish, we cut loose all our ferry service and sent our boats, the "Fidelity," the "Wickham," the "Companion" and "Gilroy" to North Brother Island, where the burning steamer "General Slocum" had been beached, and conveyed to the scene Doctors and Nurses from the City Hospital, the Metropolitan Hospital, the Alms-house Hospital and the Infants' Hospital on Randall's Island, the Catholic Chaplain, Father Broderick, from the latter place, accompanying, and ministering unto the dying. As soon as news reached the Central Office of the magnitude of the disaster, we at once realized how inadequate were our means to care for so many dead, so I at once ordered from Stolls, the wholesale undertaker on the Bowery, 200 coffins to be sent to North Brother Island, and 50 additional for foot of Twenty-sixth street. These 50, added to our own supply, enabled us to coffin all that came down the first day, after which the supply of coffins was kept equal to the demand, and all the bodies thenceforth came down coffined. We next realized that the Morgue proper would be too small for its purpose, and improvised on the dock at foot of Twenty-sixth street a temporary morgue, the bodies, as they came down, being laid in rows on the dock, and the anxious and distracted multitudes seeking their missing ones filed past in procession, the Police, who did their share of the work nobly, keeping them in order and moving on, except where identifications of the dead—which were frequent—occurred. We threw open our offices on the pier to the Coroners and their assistants, and afforded every facility to them and the Press to aid the work. Our telephone service was placed at their disposal. When the "Fidelity" brought down the first load of dead to the Morgue (29 in number), Messrs. Lee and Flanagan, of our Central Office, were detailed to examine, to envelope and record the property found on them, to serve later on, if needs be, as a means of identification. These bodies were picked up by the "Fidelity" and brought direct to the Morgue, and no examination of them was made by the Coroner until they reached there; hence was it possible to secure their effects. After this, all the bodies were examined before reaching us, and their effects taken, and we have no control over the property found on them, and of course are not responsible for it. What we had to deal with henceforth was the care and disposition of the bodies themselves, and truly this was a harrowing and laborious occupation. Superintendent Rickard, of Bellevue, jumped into the breach, and lent loyal assistance in supervising and managing the work, and bringing a number of his employees to aid the work. Superintendent Fane, of the Morgue, proved himself eminently fitted for his work, all the bodies being tagged under his direction, and delivered, when identified, to their friends or their undertakers. Superintendent Meeks, of the Bureau of Dependent Adults, also was tireless in his efforts, and when we recall that the stream of people flocking to identify their lost ones was continuous, night and day, and that we have no night corps, except a few men at the Morgue, some idea of the strain upon all in charge may be had. Mr. Yorke, of the Lodging House, was also conspicuous, and his lodgers lent yeoman aid when the regulars were tired out. In order to save the bodies as long as possible for identification tons of ice were procured, broken up and placed upon the bodies. On Saturday, the 18th inst., we held the first funeral of the unidentified and charred bodies—29 in number, besides one claimed and brought back. We procured black cloth-covered coffins, with plated handles, for the 18 adults, and 11 white coffins for the children, placing the bodies in 14 hearses, and heading the procession with two coaches, containing your Deputy Commissioner, Private Secretary Hogan and Messrs. Lee, Flanagan, Doyle, Lamb, Hughes and Wisbauer, of the Central Office, via Twenty-sixth street to Second avenue, to Sixth street, to Avenue A, passing St. Mark's Lutheran Church en route to Delancey street, to the New Brooklyn Bridge, and thence to the Lutheran Cemetery, where the authorities had opened graves in a plot of 40 by 20 feet, which they had donated for the purpose of interring the unidentified dead. The coffins were reverently, and in order, placed in the graves, Mr. Flanagan keeping a perfect record of their numbers and location, with a view to preparing a plan and sectional drawing to enable any coffin—if later on its remains should be identified by means of the property found on it—to be disinterred. The minister, Dr. Peterson, delivered a touching and feeling sermon on the remains, and the Department representatives returned to New York with the first feeling of relief from the continual tension, and the knowledge that the work of the Department had been perfectly done, and the consciousness that the friends of the lost ones who had thronged our dock in such vast numbers realized that all had aided to mitigate their sorrow and lessen by the human sympathy which showed itself in the work done, the effect of the awful blow which had fallen on them. From now on the work will be continued on the same lines and the unidentified will be buried, as were the first, in the Lutheran Cemetery.

On the 23d of June we had the second funeral of the unidentified, a sad procession of 50 bodies (32 adults and 18 children) in 13 closed undertakers' wagons and one

hearse, a coach containing the Deputy Commissioner, Mr. Flanagan, the architect, and Mr. Fitzpatrick, the undertaker, accompanying the cortege to the Lutheran Cemetery (via the Williamsburg Bridge).

On Saturday, the 25th of June, the third funeral took place, consisting of 12 bodies (2 adults and 10 children) in undertakers' wagons, Messrs. Flanagan, Lee and Fitzpatrick accompanying in a coach.

The last funeral of the unidentified took place on June 30, 6 coffins (two adults three children and one box containing parts of bodies), in undertakers' wagons, winding up our sad and mournful part in the burial of the "Slocum" victims, making a total of 96 burials (53 adults and 42 children, besides one box of portions of bodies).

A feature of the burials which has only been alluded to but was an important part of our work was the arrangements we made for the identification of those whom we buried.

Our Architect, Mr. Flanagan, made a complete plan, with sectional drawings, of the graves and the coffins as located in the graves, each coffin bearing a plate with its number inscribed on it. Further, we took the clothing from the bodies before putting them in their coffins, had each suit of clothes washed (a gruesome and loathsome job) and deposited in a box with a number corresponding with that on the coffin plate. We furnished the Superintendent of Lutheran Cemetery with a blue print copy of our plan and sectional drawing, the result of all of which precaution on our part was that within 60 days after the interment there were 37 identifications and orders given for the removal of said bodies by the relatives. Among the number thus identified and recovered was the body of little Gertrude Haas, the daughter of the minister of the Lutheran Church, whose congregation were the stricken ones on the ill-fated "General Slocum" on the day of the excursion.

To sum the whole matter up:

There was 913 bodies for whom burial permits were issued, of which 26 were for bodies delivered to friends at the Thirty-fifth Precinct or Alexander Avenue Police Station, the remaining 887 bodies all being brought to our dock, foot of East Twenty-sixth street. They were all brought down in coffins furnished by our Department, a number of them, toward the last, in zinc-lined cases—all the work on which was done through us—even to sending up men to put the bodies in the cases.

Of the 887 bodies there were 96, as before stated, unidentified, leaving 791 bodies taken from our dock by friends or relatives.

Of the 96 there were 37 identified and disinterred later on, making a total of bodies identified that passed through our hands..... 828
And bodies identified at Thirty-fifth Precinct station..... 26

When the news of the disaster reached us all our boats were ordered up to the scene. The "Wickham," "Fidelity," "Companion" and "Gilroy" carried the doctors, nurses and clergy to the scene. Although too late to render any assistance towards saving life they were invaluable in collecting the floating bodies, which they gathered and put on the "Fidelity," which latter boat brought to the foot of East Twenty-sixth street the first consignment of the victims. No inquest having been as yet held on them the officials of our Department searched their bodies and took their effects and arranged for their identification. From this time on the "Fidelity" was continually in service night and day, and brought down to the foot of East Twenty-sixth street fully three-fourths of the 887 bodies brought there.

Everybody connected with the Department who could lend a helping hand in this sad affair did it with a will. The fact that never a word of criticism upon this Department in connection with this sad affair has been heard, speaks volumes for the thorough and efficient although quiet manner in which the work was done.

I trust that we may never see such another horror as was this "General Slocum" disaster.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENTAL DIETITIAN.

June 30, 1904.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—Herewith is submitted my report for the second quarter of the current year.

The only change in dietary during this quarter was made in a revision of the dietary for employees at the Metropolitan Hospital in April. The improvement has increased the cost of the dietary $2\frac{1}{2}$ cents per capita per diem. As revised, the dietary stands as follows:

Sunday—

Breakfast—Hominy, sugar and milk, steak, onions, bread, butter, coffee, sugar and milk.
Dinner—Roast beef, gravy, mashed potato, vegetable, tapioca pudding, bread, butter, tea, sugar and milk.
Supper—Cold meat, potato, salad, prunes, bread, butter, tea, sugar, milk.

Monday—

Breakfast—Oatmeal, sugar, milk, steak or eggs, potatoes, bread, butter, coffee, milk and sugar.
Dinner—Soup, corned beef, potatoes, cabbage, bread, butter, tea, sugar and milk.
Supper—Baked beans, apple sauce, bread, butter, tea, sugar, milk.

Tuesday—

Breakfast—Hominy, sugar, milk, corned beef hash, bread, butter, coffee, sugar and milk.
Dinner—Mutton stew with vegetables, bread, butter, tea, sugar, milk, rice pudding.
Supper—Cold meat, hot potatoes, bread, butter, tea, sugar, milk.

Wednesday—

Breakfast—Wheaten grits, sugar, milk, chops, bread, butter, coffee, sugar, milk.

Dinner—Beef stew, bread, butter, tea, sugar, milk.
Supper—Hash, pickled beets, bread, butter, tea, sugar and milk.

A request for the continued analyses of milk received in the Department was granted, with a result that the quality of milk could be more adequately judged from day to day. It was found that the report to the contractor in regard to the quality of the milk resulted in an improvement in the deliveries.

Estimates for small cooking utensils required in the various institutions of the Department were obtained for this year, at the request of the General Storekeeper, in order that all such goods might be purchased upon contract, and make it unnecessary to purchase small articles from the emergency fund.

Arrangements were completed for securing Pupil Dietitians to substitute in summer months for the resident Dietitians, while the latter should be on vacations.

An order to regulate the dietary throughout the Department according to the season is planned, to reduce the per capita allowance of meats 10 per cent. through the months of July and August. This plan was followed successfully last year, with no inconvenience to any one, and with a distinct saving in the meat account.

Upon an inspection of the dining-room of the new dormitory for male employees at the City Hospital it was found that the serving room would be inadequate in point of size for the accommodation of the steam table which had been provided for it. The difficulty was adjusted by converting a room adjoining the serving room into an auxiliary to the latter, for the accommodation of the steam table. The dining-room now promises to be most complete and satisfactory.

The problem of the best service of food to the inmates of the various institutions has been studied for more than a year, and it is now believed that very little more in the way of improvement can be effected without additional equipment in the way of small steam tables and plate warmers in the ward serving rooms, for the purpose of keeping food hot until served and for warming dishes; and food cars, simple in construction, but facilitating a direct and speedy delivery of food from the kitchen to the serving rooms.

During this quarter I have conducted two classes in the Principles of Cookery; one from the New York City Training School and one from the Metropolitan Hospital Training School; also one class of Juniors in Bacteriology from the New York City Training School. These classes are for two hour periods. Miss George, Dietitian of the City Hospital, has assisted me in teaching cookery.

Regular inspections of the preparation and service of food to all inmates and employees of the island institutions have been made by me throughout this quarter, and the Dietitians advised on the improvement of methods wherever it was deemed necessary; in other cases, matters requiring attention were reported to the Superintendents of the respective institutions.

REPORT OF THE EMPLOYMENT AGENT.

July 18, 1904.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith the following report, which is a summary of work performed by me as Employment Agent from April 1, 1904, to June 30, 1904, inclusive, during which period I find a constant increase in the number of personal applications for employment, a fair percentage of whom have had previous experience in institution work.

Since forwarding my last quarterly report I would state that the placing of male helpers in various positions throughout the Department of Public Charities has been referred to me for disposition, and disposed of as per requests from the several hospitals and institutions.

At present I am having the usual difficulty which occurs during the summer months in securing desirable female help, particularly laundresses and waitresses, due to the great demand for out of town service.

I take pleasure in calling your attention to the fact that up to the present date all requests for nurses and attendants for the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm have been supplied, and the regular force at present on duty.

Several requests for female help have been received through the Board of Health for Riverside and Willard Parker Hospitals, North Brother Island. These requests have been granted only when I have had a surplus of applications after supplying the various hospitals and institutions under your supervision. Frequent requests have also been received from Fordham and Harlem Hospitals.

The very cordial co-operation extended from the heads of the several hospitals, institutions and asylums throughout the Department of Public Charities still continues and adds greatly in the progress of my work.

REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS.

October 15, 1904.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—In submitting the report of this Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1904, I beg to call your attention to the following facts:

There have been 2,682 applicants sent to hospitals for adults, 357 children sent to the institutions for children on Randall's Island, and 651 persons to the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm.

Transportation has been afforded to 163 sick and destitute persons to reach their homes, thereby preventing them from becoming charges upon the City and County of New York.

There have been 27 sick and destitute persons committed to the State Almshouse for care, awaiting transportation.

There have been 343 persons sent to the Municipal Lodging House, and 191 destitute aliens returned to the office of the United States Commissioner of Immigration.

There have also been sent from this Bureau 4 patients to the Craig Colony for Epileptics, 9 to the Syracuse State Institution for Feeble-minded Children, 6 to the Rome State Custodial Asylum, 4 to the State Custodial Asylum for Feeble-minded Women, 39 deaf mutes sent to institutions, 119 men and 189 women sent to Bellevue Hospital for examination as to sanity, making a total of 4,689 cases.

In addition, this Department has examined 6,215 sick and destitute persons, to be cared for in hospitals and homes other than our own, at the expense of the City, of which 1,102 were rejected as improper charges, thus showing that the Department of Public Charities of the City of New York has cared for, at the expense of said City, 5,113 persons, in institutions other than our own, besides 4,689 in our own institutions, making a total of 9,802 cases disposed of in this Bureau during the quarter ending June 30, 1904.

This Bureau has also taken 117 depositions of complaints of abandonment, 80 of non-support, 95 bastardy, all of which have been sent to court. There have been 153 abandonment cases and 16 bastardy cases not sent to court, having been settled in this office. The result of these cases has been a collection of \$27,356.15 for the support of these persons during said quarter, thus saving that much to the taxpayers of the City and County of New York.

REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT CHILDREN FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1904.

New York, September 14, 1904

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

My Dear Sir—I herewith submit the Quarterly Report for the Bureau of Dependent Children for the quarter ending June 30, 1904.

During this quarter there was a marked advance in the number of children proposed for commitment as compared with the corresponding quarter of 1903. During the quarter ending June 30, 1904, there were proposed for commitment twenty-two hundred and twenty-five (2,225) children, and during the same quarter of 1903 there were proposed for commitment eighteen hundred and one (1,801) children, an increase of four hundred and twenty-four (424) children. This increase was in a large measure due to the labor disturbances during the past year, and to the severe winter of 1903-1904, of which we are now beginning to feel the effect.

Supplies—During the quarter there was an electric bell service installed, which enables me to communicate with the office on the upper floor of this building and rear office on the main floor.

Dear Sir—I beg to submit herewith the report of the operations of the Municipal Lodging House for quarter ending June 30, 1904.

In addition to tabulated statistics I beg to say that during this past quarter this entire institution, from the main floor to the roof, has been thoroughly painted, the basement walls have been properly kalsomined and the clothes lockers, etc., in the basement are now being painted and renumbered. This and the ordinary repairs only have been all that was found necessary to keep this institution in its perfect condition.

I also think it proper to mention that when help was greatly needed at the Morgue and Twenty-sixth street dock during the "General Slocum" disaster the unpaid men of this institution volunteered to a man, without hope of reward (although later paid), to render all the assistance in their power to the officials in charge. They did good and efficient work, as is well known, even though their task was a gruesome one.

As regards the reporting of the following matters, I find no reason to alter the language used in my previous report, and so use the same:

Precaution Against Fire.

As is usual, employees are being continually schooled as to their duties in case of fire. All fire extinguishers, fire hose and other fire appliances throughout the institution are inspected at regular intervals.

Supplies.

Supplies of all kinds received during this quarter from the store-house, meat department and bakery were of very good quality.

Requisitions.

Requisitions for supplies, repairs, etc., have been acted upon promptly and in a very satisfactory manner by the officials having charge of them at the Central Office.

Disposition of Inmates.

Reports, etc., as to the disposition of such inmates referred to the Bureau of Dependent Adults and the Bureau of Dependent Children have been received as usual without delay.

Charitable Societies.

All communications, requests, etc., to and from all charitable organizations and interested individuals have been acted upon promptly and courteously.

REPORT OF THE NEW YORK CITY TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES,
BLACKWELL'S ISLAND.

New York, June 30, 1904.

East Twenty-sixth Street, New York:Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit the following as the second Quarterly Re-
port of 1904 of the New York City Training School:April 1, census, 144; June 30, census, 147. The census ran at 153 during the month
of May.

1 Head Nurse, 11 Pupil Nurses, at Harlem Hospital.

1 Trained Nurse, 7 Pupil Nurses, at Fordham Hospital.

2 Pupil Nurses were on vacation.

Of the help—One man and one woman at Fifty-first street house; four men and
fifteen women at Home, Blackwell's Island.One Pupil Nurse was dismissed for unprofessional conduct and one probationer
dropped.In May an extra class of seven probationers came up for examination, six of
whom passed and entered on the preparatory course. Of the class who came up in
March, eleven passed and went into uniform June 1. One member of this class
failed, and was dropped back into the May class. She specially requested another
chance.In this month the lecture course for the graduating examination was concluded
and thirty pupils came up for examination, all of whom passed very creditably, the
percentage of the class being 87.8-15 per cent. The pupils went through a written
and an oral examination on the subjects of special senses, conducted by Dr. Peck;
surgery, by Dr. Foote; gynaecology, by Dr. Goffe; obstetrics, by Dr. Cooke, and
bacteriology, by Dr. Potter. These gentlemen spoke very highly of the standing
of the pupils, saying that it was the best all-round class they had ever examined. As
this is the first class in the three years' course, and the first one to have had pre-
paratory training, we felt very much gratified at the results.A communication, approved by Mrs. Jones, was sent in, asking that \$50 trained
nurses be substituted for the Post-graduate nurses, this to go in effect as soon as
the Post-graduate nurses had completed their course. This would not involve any
increase on the pay-roll, and was granted.In April the ground was broken for the new dining pavilion at the rear of the
present main building. This necessitated the tearing out of the corridor which con-
nected the two buildings, thus leaving no protected entrance to the dining-room.
As the weather has been unusually severe from rain storms a covered passageway
was put up temporarily between the end door of the drawing-room and the end of
the old annex, which is still used as the dining-room, it being found possible to put
the foundation of the new dining pavilion just inside the line of the wooden building,
so that the frame annex remained practically intact.A slight change was made in the plans of the dining pavilion, the store-room
being found inadequate and a linen closet which could be dispensed with on the
top floor, and the space used to make a double bed-room. These changes were
made, and china closets and linen closets were substituted in the dining-room, to
equalize the expense.During the quarter the work on this building has progressed very rapidly, and
we are hoping before the cold weather sets in to be able to occupy it, as the frame
building will be an impossibility, owing to its exposed condition in the winter.On June 1 a sick leave of two weeks was granted to the Superintendent, to re-
cover from a heavy cold contracted during the early spring. It was very beneficial
and very much appreciated.On June 25 the contractor of the north wing, Mr. Reid, notified us that we might
prepare to occupy the bed-rooms of the wing by August 1, so that the care of the
Fifty-first street houses might then be given up. On receiving this notice, a letter
was sent to the agent, notifying him that the houses would probably be vacant
August 1, and asking to be released from the responsibility of some minor repairs
in the houses, owing to the fact that he might be in a position to lease the houses
three months earlier than he had at first expected. No answer has yet been received
to the communication.During this quarter nearly all the furniture necessary for the furnishing of the
north wing was received and stored, and several requisitions were sent in for sup-
plies, the nature of which we had not fully determined until the rooms progressed
near completion. These were all approved and will no doubt be delivered in time.The rest of the work of the quarter has gone on steadily, but with a good deal of
discomfort, owing to the cramped quarters and confusion, which were unavoidable
on account of the buildings. We hope when the next quarterly report goes in to
find ourselves much more settled and our work moving more smoothly and evenly,
as the strain of the last two years has been very heavy on the officers of the school.The work of furnishing our supplies and the quality of the supplies deserves
special mention. In every case where any trouble has appeared it has been very
promptly met and satisfactorily settled, so that this has been much less of a trouble
to us than ever before, and it has been much appreciated, as with the amount of
extra work that was being done it would have been very difficult to keep up our
routine as we have if we had been hampered unnecessarily in this matter of supplies.

Per capita cost per diem for entire maintenance of institution, including Metropolitan Training School, for quarter ending June 30, 1904, was \$0.7825.

Improvements.

The installation of a Twentieth Century static machine, having twenty revolving plates and twenty stationary plates, each 30 inches in diameter, also having aluminum fittings a complete set of electrodes and a full equipment of minor fittings, gave the Metropolitan Hospital a very desirable and effective static outfit.

Five (50-gallon) heavy, round, seamless, cast-iron jacketed kettles, trimmed with galvanized iron, have been put in place in the main kitchen.

The opening of a children's ward was the realization of a very desirable acquisition. This is one of the most interesting divisions in the hospital to both physicians and nurses.

A radical and possibly a far reaching change was brought about by which the Pupil Nurses will be in attendance at all G. U. cases operated under the influence of anaesthetic. This is and has been one of the most debated questions relative to hospital management.

The new and improved dietary for the employees has been very satisfactory, giving those who labor a more liberal diet, the increase having been in meat and vegetables.

The improvement in the dietary during the last few months has been very marked throughout the institution, and it might be well to cite that the food cost per capita has been reduced about one cent (1 cent), which is due to an increased census and a better adjustment of food materials, and bring the waste to a minimum.

Several improvements have been made in the female dormitory in the line of new furnishing, renovating certain sections and painting it entire, yet there is not enough room there for our female help, and there are several rooming in a dormitory which had been vacated on account of conditions making it objectionable, yet, under our crowded conditions, it is impossible not to occupy it.

The public event of the quarter has been the unveiling of a tablet in honor of Dr. Egbert Guernsey. The exercises were on the 5th of May, attended by over two hundred. Among them were the officials of the Department of Charities, several members of the Medical Board. The speakers were Commissioner, Hon James H. Tully, the Rev. Father Barnum, Rev. Littell, Dr. Root.

Summary.

During the quarter one hundred and thirty-nine (139) days were lost owing to illness; thirteen (13) vacations were granted; the Supervising Nurse at the infirmary resigned April 1; five (5) Permanent Nurses resigned, one (1) Post-Graduate was called home by illness and three (3) Pupil Nurses were dropped from the roll owing to illness; of these, five (5) Pupils and one (1) Permanent Nurse were reappointed; six (6) Pupil Nurses completed the course of training; three (3) Post-Graduates, eight (8) Pupils and twelve (12) Permanent Nurses were appointed; one (1) Pupil Nurse was suspended for a term of six weeks.

We had one serious case of illness, malaria and typhoid, which lasted from March 8 to June 28.

On June 28 we learned with much regret of the death of a Pupil Nurse who had resigned in February.

On applying for the registration of the Training School in February, under the new State Law, we were refused owing to not giving the Nurses any experience in the care of children. It was gratifying to learn through inquiries from the graduates and their friends how much interest the question of registration had aroused. When it was finally decided on April 12 to open a children's ward in the Metropolitan Hospital, we notified the State Board of Regents to that effect, and on May 20 received word that the school had been registered.

As the number of patients did not materially decrease, on May 2 we recommended that three (3) extra Nurses should be allowed for the infirmary and a Head Nurse for Ward Q, the service devoted to the most advanced cases of consumption. The positions were granted on May 17, and since they have been filled, many irregularities in the nursing service have been corrected. It has also been possible to give the Nurses more time for recreation.

Lectures were delivered by Doctors Charles Boyle, S. B. Moore, George Morgan and A. Worrall Palmer.

The usual classes were continued and examinations held in May, with the following averages:

Graduating class, 90 19-100 per cent.

Senior class, 84 12-13 per cent.

Intermediate class, 78 7-52 per cent.

On May 28 the commencement exercises were held in the new solarium when diplomas were presented to twelve (12) Post-Graduates and twenty-two (22) Pupil Nurses. Instrument cases were presented to each member of the class.

We beg to acknowledge the receipt of the American Journal of Nursing and the Trained Nurse, for the Library; clinical thermometers for the graduating class; pictures, books, games and clothing for the children's ward; fruit, ice cream and cakes for the infirmary.

During the quarter new sterilizers have been put up in operating room of new reception building. This building is now ready for occupancy, and will be opened as soon as the necessary extra help can be procured.

20,160 square feet of lawns around this building have been graded with 12 inches of loam. 3,849 square feet of walks have been excavated 14 inches deep and filled with cinders and ashes, using 210 cart loads of same. 1,042 square feet of soddings have been used on edges of walks. The grass has come up, and at this date the grounds present an attractive appearance.

At main kitchen two new large vegetable kettles have been set up and two large copper kettles have been retinned and repaired, and new steam and return connections have been made to same.

An entire new bench of retorts has been built and bricked in at Gas House.

New hot-water mains have been laid in the trench with the steam-main from boiler house to north hospital, south hospital and office building. In the office building hot-water connections have been made on the two upper floors (Doctors' apartments) with two bath tubs, two slop sinks, two lavatories and two flush-out closets.

Before hot-water connections had been made between boiler house and south hospital, the south hospital depended for its supply on a large hot-water tank located in that building. This hot-water tank has now been removed and erected in cellar of Ward 27. This arrangement gives a much better hot-water supply to the surgical and medical wards, which heretofore drew their supply from small galvanized iron boiler attached to ranges in the kitchens off the wards. The former hot-water supply was inefficient and the removal of the boiler has been done without additional expense to the Department.

At quarantines 31, 32 and 33 all the old plumbing has been removed and the following new fixtures installed: 3 new cast-iron enameled bath tubs, 6 new flush-out water-closets, 3 enameled kitchen sinks and 3 corner lavatories.

A Hitchings heater has been removed from cellar of Wards 21 to 24, and new hot-water tank has been connected with main steam line. This change lessens danger from fire, and also gives a better supply of hot water.

A new bath tub and new enameled trough have been set up at north hospital.

At Pavilion F, a new flush-out water-closet has been fitted up. An earthen main has been laid in front of this building, and leaders from roof have been connected with the main.

Six Imperial porcelain slop sinks have been erected at the Infants' Hospital to replace those that have been broken. The steam-main in sub-cellar at Infants' Hospital has been repaired.

A gas stove for heating 16 irons has been supplied for the Infants' Hospital laundry, also a galvanized soap kettle and a laundry truck.

Twelve wire baskets have been furnished for heating milk bottles at Infants' Hospital.

On June 7 work was commenced on addition to main laundry.

On June 27 work was commenced on roof of gas house.

New blow-off valves have been fitted up at central power house.

A new toilet room for employees has been erected and fitted up at rear of boiler house.

On June 15, as soon as news of the "General Slocum" disaster reached the island, the Superintendent ordered that the steam launch "Thomas F. Gilroy" proceed to the scene of disaster to render whatever assistance was possible. It arrived too late to assist in the saving of lives, but rendered valuable help from evening until midnight by carrying coffins from foot of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to North Brother Island.

On June 1 James Gaffney was appointed Instructor in Manual Training, in the place of Peter A. Schwarzenbach, who resigned March 31, 1904.

The walls and ceilings have been painted in two coats and all woodwork, benches and tables grained and varnished in Ward 6 play room, Wards 9 and 10, three rooms in cottage and kitchen of Infants' Hospital.

In Pavilion H wash trough and hydrant were painted, instrument case grained and varnished.

Thirty-three spring beds were painted and enameled, 11 closets and 33 window screens painted in one coat.

During the quarter 600 lights of glass were put in.

During the quarter one calf was sent to New York Farm Colony, Staten Island.

Cut 3,698 pieces girls' clothing, 2,611 pieces boys' clothing, 2,919 pieces infants' clothing, 64 pieces women's clothing, 194 pieces men's clothing, 2,351 pieces bedding, 4,508 pieces miscellaneous articles

Shoemaking Department.

691 pairs shoes repaired, 2 pairs of high shoes made.

Basket Making Department.

Made 17 clothes baskets, 25 bushel baskets, 4 waste paper baskets, 1 bread basket, 3 feet by 2 feet by 15 inches; 18 baby carriages, 72 crib frames.

Repaired 45 clothes baskets.

Recaned 51 chair seats, 5 chair backs, 1 settee. 6 feet by 2 feet.

Mat Making Department.

Made 36 brush mats (Coir), 14 chain mats (Coir), 2 rugs, 5 feet by 2½ feet; 1 rug, 6 feet by 3 feet.

Gardening Department—Plants Set Out.

3,500 coleus, 3,300 althernatheras, 1,500 geraniums, 650 cannas, 350 agerathums, 300 abutilous, 100 tropeolums, tall; 150 tropeolums, dwarf; 200 pelunias, 150 salvias, 300 pansies, 6 draceanas, 6 curicolico, 300 begonias.

During the months of April, May and June, 8,747 quarts of farm milk were distributed to the different subdivisions of this institution.

During the quarter the following products of our farm have been distributed and used by the inmates:

Lettuce, 1,010 heads; onions, 25 bushels; spinach, 100 bushels; beets, 3 bushels; parsley, 3½ bushels; peas, 4 bushels; turnips, 5 barrels.

Sent to store house, Blackwell's Island:

Bones, 2,740 pounds; calf skins, 67 pounds; grease, 2,835 pounds.

Eight tons of hay have also been saved.

There has been a marked decrease of bacteria in the farm milk during the last quarter.

SECOND QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE INSTITUTIONS AT FLATBUSH, CUMBERLAND STREET HOSPITAL, BRADFORD STREET HOSPITAL AND THE RECEPTION HOSPITAL, CONEY ISLAND.

Brooklyn, August 1, 1904.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner Public Charities, New York:

Dear Sir—I submit for your consideration the second quarterly report for the year 1904 of the public hospitals and institutions of the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

Kings County Hospital.

There were under treatment at the Kings County Hospital during the quarter ending June 30, 1904, 2,971 patients, 2,352 of whom were admitted during this quarter and 619 remained over from the preceding quarter. Of this number 1,022, or about 34 per cent., were discharged recovered, 783 were discharged improved, 119 were discharged unimproved, 218 were discharged to the State hospitals for insane, 261 died and 568 remained under treatment June 30, 1904.

During this quarter 449 visits were made by the Visiting Staff and 52 major operations were performed. The average daily census was 585, or 22 more than during the same period of 1903. The total number of patients under treatment during this quarter were 516 more than during the same period of 1903.

Kings County Hospital Dispensary.

In this dispensary 910 cases were treated during the second quarter of this year. Of this number 681 were males, 229 were females, 431 were new cases and 479 were revisits.

The New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division.

In this home 1,301 inmates remained from the preceding quarter; 828 were admitted, making the total number of inmates 2,129. Of this number 875 were discharged and 57 died; 1,197 remained June 30, 1904, or 96 more than were in the home on the same date of 1903.

Neurological Hospital.

In this hospital 132 inmates remained from the previous quarter, 68 were admitted, making the total under treatment 200. Of these 60 were discharged improved, 16 died, leaving the number remaining June 30, 124, or 3 more than on the same date of 1903.

Cumberland Street Hospital.

At this hospital 162 patients remained over from the previous quarter, 592 were admitted, making the total number under treatment 754. Of this number, 386, or 51 per cent., were discharged recovered, 132 were discharged improved, 79 died and 157 remained under treatment June 30, 1904, or 17 more than on the same date of 1903.

The number of visits made by the Visiting Staff were 442, and 61 major operations were performed. The daily average population was 160, an increase of 9 over the same period of 1903.

Cumberland Street Hospital Dispensary.

The total number of cases treated in this dispensary during this quarter were 4,442; of this number 2,933 were males and 1,509 were females; 1,263 were new visits and 3,179 were revisits.

Bradford Street Hospital.

There remained in this hospital April 1, 1904, 4 patients; during the quarter 21 cases were admitted, making the total number under treatment, 25. Of these 8 were discharged recovered, 14 as improved, 2 died and 1 remained June 30, 1904.

Bradford Street Hospital Dispensary.

The number of cases treated in this dispensary during this quarter were 1,514; of this number 1,035 were males and 479 were females; 627 new cases and 887 were revisits.

Reception Hospital, Coney Island.

This hospital was opened April 15, 1904, for the admission of patients. During the quarter ending June 30, 34 cases were admitted; of this number 19 were discharged recovered, 10 improved, 3 died and 2 remained under treatment June 30, 1904.

Reception Hospital, Coney Island, Dispensary.

In this dispensary 854 cases were treated during the quarter; of this number 792 were males and 62 females; 226 were new cases and 628 were revisits.

Progress is being made on the various buildings under contract; the new stable is nearly completed and will soon be occupied. The work is nearly completed on the upper three floors of the Domestic Building, and the new store-house is under

cover. Satisfactory progress has been made of late on the new power plant, which will be soon ready for use.

REPORT OF THE NEW YORK CITY FARM COLONY, PORT RICHMOND, N. Y.

July 1, 1904.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner of Charities, New York City, N. Y.:

Dear Sir—As to the Farm Colony, everything has been progressing fairly well during the past three months. The plumbing contracts have been awarded to the contractors for the old buildings, which have never had any plumbing in them and which will be a big improvement. Also the contract for a main for water to the three new cottages, also a water storage tank on the heights, thereby giving a good fire pressure, which the institution has never had, and when once in position will be a great protection from fire.

The four new buildings are not quite finished, but certainly will be ready for occupancy by August 1, 1904.

The new temporary laundry has been completed and is now in general operation and is a success.

The following letter from counsel was read:

No. 32 NASSAU STREET, NEW YORK,
October 20, 1904.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President, Rapid Transit Commission, No. 320 Broadway:

DEAR SIR—Counsel for Mr. McDonald has suggested to Mr. Boardman and myself the propriety of having some agreement entered into in regard to the rate at which rental shall be computed on the part of the Rapid Transit Railroad which will be ready for operation on the 27th inst.

The railroad, for the purposes of the contract, is divided into four sections:

Section 1 extends from the City Hall to the station at Fifty-ninth street.

Section 2 includes all the railroad on the west side north of Fifty-ninth street to the station at One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street and Broadway, and also the railroad on the east side, from One Hundred and Third street and Broadway to the station at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Lenox avenue.

Section 3 includes the railroad on the west side from One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street to Fort George, and on the east side from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Lenox avenue to Melrose avenue.

You will observe that the whole of Section 1 will be in use on the 27th inst., and that all of Section 2 on the west side will be in use on that date. So much of Section 2 as includes the east side line from One Hundred and Third street and Broadway to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Lenox avenue will not be in use for two weeks later. A very small portion of Section 3 will be ready for use. None of Section 4 will be ready for use.

The contract in respect to rent provides as follows:

"The rental shall begin as to each section with the date of the declaration of the Board that such section is ready for operation and shall be payable at the end of each quarter on the first days of January, April, July and October."

It also provides that the term of the lease shall be fifty years—

"and shall run from the date on which Section 1 shall be declared by the Board to be ready for operation; provided, however, that if the railroad shall include Sections 2, 3 and 4, or any of them, the term of the lease as to each of such sections so included shall begin on the date or dates on which it shall be declared by the Board to be ready for operation, and shall end at the end of the first-mentioned term of fifty years."

The contract, therefore, provides for the case of each section as a whole being declared ready for operation. It fails to provide for a method of determining the amount of rental to be paid, where a part of a section is ready for operation before the whole. Under these circumstances it is apparent that some arrangement ought to be arrived at with the contractor, fixing a basis upon which the rent should be temporarily adjusted, pending the throwing open of the remainder of the railroad to the public.

Mr. Wickersham suggests that in ascertaining the rental to be paid on those portions of Sections 2 and 3 which shall be ready for operation on the 27th inst., a percentage should be paid on such a proportion of the total cost of each section as the number of feet of length on the part ready for operation bears to the total number of feet in the whole section. Our suggestion would be that the number of feet of single track should be taken as the basis of computation, rather than the mere length of the whole section and of the part ready for operation.

We submit the matter to the Board for such instructions as they think proper to give.

The following report from the Chief Engineer and counsel to the Board was presented:

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President, Rapid Transit Commission:

DEAR SIR—On June 23, 1904, Mr. McDonald addressed a letter to you, in which he requested that the two deposits of \$1,000,000 each, which he made at two different times as security for the construction of the Rapid Transit road, might be returned to him as soon as the major part of the road was opened to the public. His expectation then was that this event would take place about the first of September; but owing to various causes the opening has been delayed, and it will not be until October 27 next that the west side line will be open to One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, and not until November 10 that the east side line will be opened—also to One Hundred and Forty-fifth street.

The Interborough Rapid Transit Company and the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company joined in Mr. McDonald's request.

This letter (which is printed on page 2780 of the Minutes of the Rapid Transit Board) was referred to the Chief Engineer and counsel for report.

By the Rapid Transit Act, after directing that a continuing bond shall be given to secure the performance of the contract, it is provided that the "Contracting person, firm or corporation shall also simultaneously, with the execution and delivery of every such contract, deposit with the Comptroller * * * the sum of one million dollars in cash or in securities * * * which cash or securities shall, under such terms and conditions as shall be provided in the said contract, be further security for the faithful performance by such contracting person, firm or corporation of all the covenants, conditions and requirements specified and provided for in said contract relating to the construction and equipment of said road."

The act further provides that the City shall also have a first lien upon the equipment of the road.

The invitation to contractors and the proposed form of contract went beyond the provisions of the act, and required the contractor to give security, as follows:

1. A deposit of \$1,000,000.
2. A continuing bond of \$1,000,000.
3. A bond of \$5,000,000 to secure construction and equipment.

When the contract was executed the contractor duly deposited the above \$1,000,000 with the Comptroller, and furnished two bonds in the amounts required. But as a condition for approving the bonds your Board required the contractor to deposit another million dollars as additional security for the performance of the provisions of the continuing bond; and also required an obligation on the part of the contractor for the deposit of an additional million on or before January 1, 1901, to be "held by the Comptroller as security for the construction and equipment of the Rapid Transit Railroad, as provided in the contract." These two deposits were duly made, so that in all \$3,000,000 were deposited by the contractor.

The million dollars deposited as additional to the continuing bond was returned to the contractor, in accordance with the supplementary agreement of November 24, 1903, and at the same time the bond of Mr. Perry Belmont (the original surety on the continuing bond) was withdrawn and the obligation of two surety companies was substituted.

The Comptroller therefore now holds \$2,000,000 in securities, deposited in two sums of a million each, at different times, but both deposited as security for the construction and equipment of the road.

The contractor is legally entitled to the return of these deposits as soon as the road is entirely constructed and equipped, and not before. He now asks, as a favor, that these deposits be returned to him before this period has strictly arrived; and he bases his application upon the fact that the road is now very nearly finished in all respects, and that the City, apart from these two deposits, has the most ample security.

We are of the opinion that your Board, with the Comptroller's concurrence, have discretionary power to grant the contractor's request.

Where the City, in addition to a contractor's bond, holds money on deposit, it has been the frequent practice to release a part or the whole of such deposit whenever it becomes apparent that the retention of the money is no longer necessary for the protection of the City and has become a mere useless burden on the contractor. The provisions of a contract, requiring the deposit or retention of money, are for the City's benefit; and the City may waive such provisions whenever they are no longer of value to it.

In the present case the contractor's obligations to the City relate to four different things, viz.: Construction, equipment, penalties for delay and indemnity against claims.

A. The construction of the road is now about ninety-six per cent. completed. The contractor estimates that it will cost him about \$1,530,000 to do all that remained undone on the first of this month. This estimate we believe to be substantially correct.

B. The greater part, and by far the most expensive part, of the equipment has been procured. The land for the power-house and electric sub-stations has been acquired and the buildings thereon substantially completed. The signaling apparatus and electrical connections along the completed portions of the road have been installed. About half the rolling stock has been received, and the remainder is nearly completed. Five of the nine units for generating electricity have been installed and are in operation, and the others will be ready at an early day. The equipment, in short, is sufficient to operate so much of the road as will be fit for operation within the next few weeks; and its development will keep pace with the completion of the remaining sections. The total cost of the equipment, when complete, will be in the neighborhood of \$15,000,000. Probably eighty per cent. of this sum has been already expended by the contractor in the acquisition of the equipment now installed.

C. Penalties, strictly speaking, are not required from the contractor under the contract. It is provided that in the event of inexcusable delay in construction and equipment "the price to be paid the contractor shall be reduced as follows: From the several amounts which shall become payable to the contractor after the expiration of the said period or periods for work completed or materials furnished thereafter, there shall be deducted and retained by the City as liquidated damages for such delay two per cent. for each and every month after the expiration of the said period or periods until such amounts are severally certified to be due and payable."

The time for completion of the road, as fixed by the contract, expired August 21, 1904. On September 1 there remained due to the contractor about \$1,771,000. If the average delay on this balance should amount to five months (which we think an extreme assumption), the deduction from the payments to the contractor would be ten per cent. of the above or about \$177,100.

The contractor, however, will claim that his delay is excusable. Upon this point we express no opinion.

D. The contractor has agreed to indemnify the City against all claims for damages "resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work or from guarding the same, or from any improper materials used in its construction, or by or on account of any act or omission of the contractor or of the agents thereof."

So far as we are advised, there are no claims against the City for damages for any substantial amount arising out of the contract with Mr. McDonald, except such as are due to the disturbance of foundations on the easterly side of Park avenue. The amounts that will be claimed here are large, but the liability of the City and the contractor, respectively, is uncertain.

Turning now to the security which the City has, apart from the deposits of \$2,000,000, it will be seen that such security consists of the following, viz.:

A. A continuing bond for \$1,000,000, made by John B. McDonald and Interborough Rapid Transit Company as principals, and the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, and United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, as sureties.

B. A bond for \$5,000,000 for construction and equipment made by John B. McDonald with the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, the City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, the American Surety Company of New York and the National Surety Company, as sureties.

C. A first lien on all the equipment furnished by the contractor, as above mentioned. D. The guarantee of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, under the agreements of July 10, 1902. Mr. McDonald at this date assigned the operating part of his contract to the Interborough Company; and that company not only assumed all of the contractor's obligations with respect to the equipment of the road, but it covenanted with the City that Mr. McDonald should "fully perform all the obligations and comply with all the provisions and terms of said contract which are not assigned to and assumed by said Interborough Rapid Transit Company."

Upon this state of facts we are clearly of opinion that the Rapid Transit Board and the Comptroller may properly, if they see fit, return the contractor's deposits to him, as requested in his letter of June 23, 1904. Whether they will do so or not is a matter resting solely in their own discretion, to be determined upon sound business principles.

We need only add that if it be decided to grant the request, the consent of all the contractor's sureties must be obtained. An agreement to that effect can readily be drafted.

Resolved, That section 108 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building, or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York, forthwith to provide, or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable material.

All such materials and substances shall be separated and put into their respective receptacles, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof.

Such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the

premises until the proper time for removal and shall then be placed in the area within the stoop only, and there shall remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

"All light refuse or rubbish likely to be scattered or blown about shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly bundled, packed or otherwise secured."

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
