

REPORTED MORTALITY\* for the week ending November 14, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending November 7, 1885.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 562 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 14, 1885, which is an increase of 58, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 97 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending November 7, 1885, was 533, which is 58.6 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 19.60 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,413,320.

#### BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

ARMORY BOARD—CITY OF NEW YORK, November 16, 1885.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held at the office of his Honor the Mayor, City Hall, this date, all the members being present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The following reports from the Architect of the Twelith Regiment Armory were read:

New York, October 28, 1885.

GENTLEMEN—The plumbing work of the new armory, Ninth avenue, Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, has progressed to entitle the contractor, Mr. John Renehan, to the amount of first payment, viz.: Two thousand nine hundred and fifty-five dollars, in accordance with the terms of the articles of agreement. Armory Board, City of New York : SIRS—The steam-heating work of the new armory, Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets and Ninth avenue, has progressed to entitle the contractors, Messrs. Gillis & Geoghegan, to the amount of second payment, viz.: Two thousand four hundred and ninety-seven and 50-100 dollars, in accordance with the terms of the articles of agreement.

The question of recommending to the Sinking Fund Commissioners that money be appropriated for the erection of armories for the Twenty-second and Eighth Regiments on the sites already purchased by the city, was discussed, and the following preamble and resolution passed:

Whereas, A site for an armory for the Twenty-second Regiment, and also one for the Eighth Regiment and the Second Battery, are now owned by the city; and

Whereas, Said organizations are greatly in need of drill and meeting room accommodations, one of said regiments being practically without any armory; and

Whereas, The necessary funds for the erection of armory buildings can now be procured only by having an amount inserted in the tax levy for that purpose; therefore

with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom,
so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents
whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is
flushed with water. The outlet shall be kept closed,
except during the process of flushing, with a tight-fitting
plug, so as to effectually prevent the escape of gases and
offensive odors; and sufficient water shall at all times be
kept in the vaults or sink to prevent solid matter adhering
to the bottom. The sides and bottom of every privyvault, cesspool, or school-sink in the City of New York
must be impermeable and secured against ony saturation
of the walls or the ground about the same.
