At a meeting of the Board of Police, yesterday, the following communication was received:

NEW YORK, December 27, 1878. Hon. SIDNEY P. NICHOLS, Chairman Committee on Street Cleaning

Hon. Sidney P. Nichols, Chairman Committee on Street Cleaning:

Sir—I respectfully report the non-removal of ashes in the different wards is caused by the scows of the bureau being froze in at Bayonne, N. J. I sent Roundsman Stevens and men, yesterday, to cut the ice so as to allow the scows to be towed out, but without success. The same trial will be made to-day, but should the present severe weather continue, the same thing is liable to occur at any time. I would also report that I sent to the Department of Docks, yesterday, to see if they could not provide a place that I could unload the scows of this bureau, but without success. I would also report that if the material now on the sidewalks in the receptacles could be deposited on the dumping-boards or in the streets near by, it would afford temporary relief. If this is not done, or some suitable place is not provided for the winter, I respectfully report that it will be impossible to collect the ashes and rubbish in this city with any regularity during this season of the year. It is impossible to go to sea without having proper sea-going vessels, which this bureau does not possess.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent, etc.:

SIR—I would report an inspection of the square between Seventy-fifth and Seventy-sixth streets, Lexington avenue and Fourth avenue. This square five years ago was twenty feet below grade at streets. An old water-course traversed through it, entering southeast corner of Fourth avenue and Seventy-sixth street, and was soil-saturated and covered with stagnant water. Upon drainage certificate, issued by this Department, a subsoil drain was constructed, which was effectual, and the square was dry and the surface was relieved from its then soil-saturated condition.

Upon the construction of the "sunken track," this square was filled with earth by the contractors to within three to five feet of street grade. The water upon the surface, from time to time, was rainfall, which was soon absorbed or evaporated. No stagnant or offensive water remained for any length of time, or was sufficient to produce malaria. At present the frost and cold weather will prevent any deleterious effects from the last heavy rain-fall. When owners are found, I will recommend grading and sewer connection. No drainage necessary.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the laying of mains and pipes in the streets, avenues, and public places of the City of New York for heating buildings and other purposes.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:
Section 1. The Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized to issue to any corporation, person or persons who may apply therefor, permits to lay in the streets, avenues, or public places of this city, mains and pipes for heating stores, factories, dwellings, churches, or other structures, for the use of machinists, for elevators or other purposes, by the use of steam or other appliances.

Sec. 2. For every such permit so issued by the Commissioner of Public Works the corporations, person or persons applying for and receiving the same shall pay to said Commissioner the sum of cents for each and every lineal foot of the mains or pipes to be so laid, which sums so received shall be deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the General Fund.

Sec. 3. Before granting any such permit the Commissioner of Public Works shall pass upon and his approval shall be had and obtained for the size and dimensions of such mains and pipes; of the apparatus and appliances proposed to be used for the purposes mentioned in section 1 of this ordinance; of the part or parts of the streets, avenues, and public places in which such mains or pipes are proposed to be laid; of the material of which such mains or pipes are to be constructed, and of the location of the boilers from whence such steam or other heating appliances are to be distributed.

Sec. 4. The Commissioner of Public Works shall require from any corporation, person or persons receiving such permit hereinbefore mentioned, a bond, with adequate security, to be approved by the Comptroller, conditioned that the pavements removed on laying such mains and pipes shall be relaid and put in good repair, and a further bond in the sum of thousand dollars to indemnify the City of New York for damages in which it may be mulcted in any suit brought against said city arising out of any explosion or other accident, consequent upon the use of any apparatus or appliance hereinbefore authorized.

Sec. 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance

are hereby repealed.
Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

SIR—There were 475 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 21, 1878, which is a decrease of 20, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 73 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending December 14, 1878, was 512, which is 41.2 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.42 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,090,093.
