There have been two hundred and sixty-seven insane, sick and destitute persons committed to the State Almshouse at Flatbush, Kings County, to be cared for by the State Board of Charities, thus relieving this Department of their care and maintenance.

There have also been six alien paupers sent to their homes in Europe through the State Board of Charities, thus relieving this County of their care and maintenance.

SIR—I respectfully submit the labor report of the Randall's Island Hospital and Schools and Infants' Hospital for the quarter ending June 30, 1895.

South Hospital—Wards 1, 2 and 3.

Carpentry—Repaired 3 locks; made and put on wall strip, 4 inches by 4 feet 6 inches, 5 feet long in pantry of Ward 1; repaired 4 doors, 3 tables, 4 chairs and 2 window frames; renewed 4 locks and keys.

Painting—Renewed 32 lights glass, 8 by 10 inches, in balcony sashes and 7 lights in the several wards.

Plumbing—Cleaned out waste pipes and made general repairs to closets in all the wards.

North Hospital—Wards 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10.

Carpentry—Renewed 24 sash cords; fitted and hung on balcony 1 24-light sash 2 feet 6 inches by 7 feet; repaired 8 stools, 2 long benches, 2 sashes, 2 feet 6 inches by 7 feet, and 6 window frames.

Painting—Renewed 15 lights glass.

Plumbing—Repaired bath tubs and Croton supply pipes and general repairs to stoppages in waste-pipes.

Plumbing—In Ward 21 removed tank not ample for supply to closets and put in large cistern and made necessary connections with 3 elbows and 13 feet ¾ inch pipe, cleaned out gas pipes and sinks; in Ward 22 removed 3 wash-tubs and reset 2, and made all necessary connections with 15 feet ½ inch pipe (lead), cleaned out gas pipes; in Ward 23 general repairs to stoppages in waste pipe and cleaned out gas pipe; in Ward 24 repaired 2 water-closets and cleaned out main waste pipe and renewed two ¾ inch faucets.

Plastering—Renewed 40 square feet fallen plaster in bath-room in Ward 21.

Tinsmithing—Put 280 feet tin flashing on outside of ventilators; put 1 sheet zinc around kitchen range and 1 set fire bricks; cleaned out range.

Wards 25, 26, 27 and 28 Building.

Carpentry—In Ward 25 renewed 2 door knobs, rehung 2 doors and repaired floor in bath-room; in Ward 26 renewed 2 locks and keys, repaired 2 rockers, 2 bed trays, 8 shades and 10 ventilators, made 2 wire screens 7 feet 6 inches by 3 feet for operating room, made 2 surgical extensions with 18 feet lumber; in Ward 27 made 4 surgical extensions with 60 feet ½ inch clear pine, 3 crutches 4 feet 6 inches long, 2 wire screens 7 feet 6 inches by 3 feet for operating room, relaid 18 square feet yellow pine flooring 1½ inch by 4 inches in hallway leading to operating room; in Ward 28 repaired 8 feet flooring and 5 ventilators.

Plumbing—In Ward 25 renewed new closet bowl and cistern and made necessary connections, put on 4 gas holders for globes; in Ward 26 removed old tank and put in larger cistern for supply to closets, with 8 feet ½ inch pipe; in Ward 27 general repairs to 2 closets, cleaned out gas pipes and brackets and waste pipes, repaired hot water boiler and water back in kitchen; in Ward 28 made general repairs and cleaned out waste pipes.

Tinsmithing—In Ward 26 cleaned out range and put in new set of linings and 1 sheet zinc; in Ward 27 cleaned out range and put in new set of linings and 1 sheet of zinc.

Pavilions A, B and C Building.

Carpentry—In Pavilion A: Repaired 3 rockers and 4 commodes; renewed 8 sash-cords. In Pavilion B—Repaired gate and 2 fan-lights; renewed 10 sash-cords.

In Pavilion C—Repaired 3 rockers and 1 table; renewed 15 feet flooring.

Plumbing—In Pavilion A: Renewed 15 feet 2 inches cast-iron pipe in kitchen; repaired water supply pipe.

In Pavilion B—Cleaned out gas-pipes and repaired supply pipe leading to bath-tub.

In Pavilion C—Renewed gas-tips and cleaned out waste-pipes from closets.

Plastering—In Pavilion A: Renewed 35 feet fallen plaster in pantry.

Tinsmithing—Repaired roof and renewed 18 sheets tin.

Pavilion F Building.

Carpentry—Removed 460 square feet plaster partitions of 2 rooms on third floor to enlarge dormitory and trimmed up with 30 feet ¾-inch pine and 22 feet 8-inch baseboard; braced up floor in cellar with 12 round posts, 7 inches, 5 feet long; 2 beams, 4 inches by 8 inches by 24 feet; reset 90 feet girder, 7 inches by 10 inches, and strapped joints with 4 iron strips, ¾ inch by 10 inches by 2 feet 6 inches; on first floor dressed and set in 4 yellow pine uprights, 6 inches by 6 inches by 13 feet; on second floor dressed and set in 4 yellow pine uprights, 6 inches by 6 inches by 11 feet; removed 85 feet shelving from clothes-room on third floor and rebuilt in room for same purpose on second floor; made and put on 30 window guard slats, 4 inches wide, 6 feet long, and repaired 60 square feet flooring with 1½ inches by 4 inches yellow pine; encased girder on first floor with 240 feet ¾-inch clear pine.

Painting—Cleaned down ceiling and side walls of 2 rooms on second floor and calcimined same and painted woodwork, window frames and doors.

Plumbing—Built and set in 215 feet stone drain in cellar; renewed 50 feet 1-inch lead Croton supply and repaired main; tapped main and set in 2 cocks, 1-inch; 2 valves, 1-inch; 2 valves, ¾-inch; run main supply to second and third stories with 60 feet 1-inch, 50 feet ¾-inch and 50 feet ½-inch pipe; 12 ells, 1-inch; 8 tees, 1-inch, and 10 tees, ¾-inch; repaired 35 feet waste-pipe.

Plastering and Masonry—Patched up cracks and loose plaster of 2 rooms on second floor; repaired and pointed up where partitions had been removed on third floor.

Tinsmithing—Renewed 16 sheets tin on roof; removed 3 stoves.

Pavilion G Building.

Carpentry—Made and set in 4 frames, 14 inches by 22 inches, with wire for ventilation to cellar; braced up wood partition with 22 feet 3 inches by 4 inches spruce joists; renewed 35 feet wainscoting in pantry; repaired 2 locks and 3 window sashes.

Painting—Cleaned and painted porch; cleaned down ceilings and side walls of 2 rooms; calcimined ceilings and painted side walls and wainscoting in 2 coats.

Plumbing—Removed hot-water heater and boiler, also sink, to an adjoining room and reset same with 18 feet ¾-inch pipe and made all necessary connections.

Plastering and Masonry—Built in 63 feet stone foundation; renewed 15 feet fallen plaster rear end of ward.

Dormitory 2 Building.

Carpentry—Built a 3-story frame extension with water-closet on each floor, 8 feet by 10 feet by 10 feet 6 inches high; built an outhouse for utensils, 3 feet 6 inches by 6 feet by 8 feet high, with batting door, 2 feet by 6 feet; laid 630 square feet 1½ inches by 4 inches new yellow pine flooring on balconies and 620 square feet same in water-closets; built 1 flight of stairs from ground floor to second floor, rear, outside of balcony, 16 steps, 10 inches wide, 3 feet long, and cased with 90 square feet ¾-inch by 5-inch wainscoting, with 28 feet hand rail; made and set in closets 3 sliding sash windows, 16 inches by 24 inches, and 3 double sash windows and frames, 2 feet by 4 feet, with 24 lights glass; removed 460 square feet plastered partitions to enlarge dormitory on second floor and refitted same with a spruce girder, 6 inches by 6 inches, and 2 uprights dressed, 6 inches by 6 inches, 10 feet high; trimmed and cased same with 155 feet ¾-inch by 7-inch clear pine; removed 2 water-closets and partitions from second and third floors, southeast end of dormitories; made and hung 2 panel doors at entrances to water-closets, 1¼-inch pine, 3 feet 3 inches by 7 feet; altered 1 sash-door to panels, first floor, rear entrance; put up inside stairways, 130 square feet ¾-inch by 5-inch clear pine wainscoting, with 30 feet 1½-inch round nosing; made and hung 1 batting door, 2 feet 6 inches by 6 feet 6 inches, leading to closet on ground floor; put on windows 12 guard strips, ¾ inch by 4 inches by 6 feet long; renewed 3 spruce posts on balconies, dressed 6 inches by 6 inches by 35 feet long; 14 1½-inch yellow pine steps, 10 inches by 3 feet, leading from second to third floors; 3 seats for closets, 15 inches by 5 feet.

Painting—Painted inside and outside of new 3-story frame extension, with water-closet on each floor, 8 feet by 10 feet by 10 feet 6 inches high, entire height 35 feet; cleaned down ceilings and side walls, second and third floors; calcimined ceilings and painted side walls, also a 4-foot wainscoting on each floor in color; window frames and sashes on third floor in 2 coats; grained and varnished window frames, sashes, doors, etc., on second floor; stained in walnut and varnished 2 pairs stairs; painted all woodwork and wainscoting around stairway leading to second floor balcony, rear of building, and 3 new upright posts on balcony, 35 feet long, and 2 panel doors.

Plumbing—Renewed 3 school sinks and reset same with new 4-inch cast-iron waste-pipe in new 3-story frame extension and run 65 feet ¾-inch water supply, with 3 ¾-inch angle valves, 3 4-inch traps, 3 4-inch tees, 1 4-inch Y and 9 lengths 4-inch pipe, and made all necessary connections from same to main sewer.

Plastering and Masonry—Built brick box around trap leading to main sewer, 2 feet deep, 18 inches square; cut 18 holes for anchor bolts through brick walls on balcony; laid 70 square feet new concrete floor in water-closet on first floor; raised walk to reset 1,100 square feet flagging and 140 feet curbing; repaired with plaster openings and cracks where old partition was removed, second floor, west end.

Tinsmithing—Removed 35 feet galvanized iron leader pipe; repaired roof and renewed same with 118 sheets tin and 11 pounds solder.

School for Feeble-minded Building.

Carpentry—Relaid 115 square feet 1½-inch by 4-inch yellow pine flooring on second floor; made 1 large blackboard, 3 feet by 10 feet, with ½-inch centre and 2-inch frame; renewed 23 sash cords; repaired 5 window frames, 3 long benches with 45 feet clear pine, 15 feet fence and 5 window sashes; rebuilt 25-foot picket fence in yard; made 1 top and seat for closet; changed desks and hung shutters in class-rooms.

Painting—Renewed 10 lights glass.

Plumbing—Removed old school sink and set in a new 6-foot Demarest patent flush closet with cistern and made all connections with 18 feet ½-inch pipe and the necessary supplies.

Plastering and Masonry—Reset 35 feet brick walk in yard; renewed in sewing-room, first floor, 34 square feet fallen plaster.

Tinsmithing—Repaired and renewed gutters with 88 sheets tin, 16 feet 4-inch leader pipe and 8 pounds solder.

Grammar School Building.

Carpentry—Renewed 35 feet flooring and 13 feet ¾-inch trimmings; made new panel door, 3 feet by 6 feet 6 inches for rear entrance.

Painting—Cleaned down and calcimined ceiling and side walls of small room adjoining chapel and painted and varnished all woodwork; cleaned down and painted in 2 coats ceiling and side walls of chapel and painted and varnished all window frames and shutters.

Plastering and Masonry—Reset in cement 33 square feet brick walk on north side and 80 square feet on rear; bricked up 4 flue openings and plastered same; pointed up cracks in ceilings and side walls for painters and hard-finished 45 feet ceiling in hallway leading to attic.

Kitchen, Laundry and Boiler-room Building.

Carpentry—In the kitchen, made 6 wood handles for dippers, 2 feet long; repaired stoop; removed sash door and put in panel door, 3 by 6 feet; in Workhouse Women's Dormitory, repaired 2 doors and 3 locks.

Plumbing—In kitchen basement, took down and cleaned out 50 feet 2-inch cast iron waste pipe; in Workhouse Women's Dormitory, cleaned out stoppages in main waste pipe.

Plastering and Masonry—In kitchen, removed small range and set in large one; 38 feet brick walk reset in front of laundry; in laundry, removed 68 square feet loose plaster and renewed same in hard finish.

Office Building.

Plumbing—Renewed 35¾ feet split pipe in cellar and set in 1 urinal and 15 feet ½-inch lead pipe with stop-cock.

Attendants' Pavilion.

Carpentry—Repaired 30 feet lattice frames and 8 ventilators.

Industrial School.

Carpentry—Made and put down yellow pine platform, 12 square feet, at entrance.

Blacksmith Shop.

Carpentry—Made and put on 32 ¾-inch strips, 12 feet long, 2½ inches wide.

Painting—Painted outside of building, 18 by 30 feet and 13 feet high.

Masonry—Built for forge stone foundation and brick chimney, 12 feet by 2 feet 6 inches.

Superintendent's Cottage.

Tinsmithing—Made and put on sheet iron hood to range.

Miscellaneous.

Carpentry—Made 3 water-bed boxes, 3 by 6 feet x 9 inches; made 6 bottoms for hampers; repaired 3 refrigerators and 2 mess boxes; boxed battery for shipping with 74 feet 4-inch pine strips.

Painting—Varnished 15 rustic flower stands; painted 16 cribs and 13 window screens.

Plumbing—Run 75 feet 1¼-inch supply pipe for gas to Branch Workhouse and set on top floor a bath-tub and run 75 feet ¾-inch pipe with hot and cold water connections; run 150 feet ¾-inch water supply pipe from main to playground with 1½-inch bibb-cock and 8¾-inch elbows.

Blacksmithing—Made 3 braces for surgical ward, 18 staples and shooks, 9½-inch iron handles for slide sashes, 5¼-inch bolts for gardener, 8¾-inch anchor irons, 3 feet long; 2 flat-iron bands for flag-pole; 3¼-inch and 1½-inch flat iron braces for coal carts; repaired 2 barrels, horse-mower, 3 lawn mowers, 3 carts, 3 sets trace chains and 8 stove fenders, and general repairs to plow and bellows in forge; rebottomed 4 coal carts with 30 feet 1¼-inch spruce; drilled 132 ¾-inch holes, put up 66 4-foot iron posts and run 1,100 feet wire for fence at rear of Ward 6 and Dormitory 2; set in 8 spruce posts, 2½ by 4 inches by 5 feet.

Laboring.

Workhouse Help in Charge of Attendant—Spreading ashes and rolling paths from Ward 11 to and around Dormitory 2; same around laundry building and North and South Hospitals; cut and trimmed grass around the several buildings; set in 120 square feet stone crossing at wagon road east of Infants' Hospital with curbing; dug out cellar of Pavilion G and lowered same 3 feet for ventilation; leveled grounds south side of Dormitory 2; cut and laid 4,250 square feet sodding; firemen were engaged in the different boiler-rooms wheeling coal and ashes and doing all necessary laboring work.

Workhouse Help in Charge of Keeper—Assisted in unloading ice barges and did all laboring work as required.

Tailoring Department—Made 252 coats, 2 piano covers, 45 pairs suspenders, 53 pairs winter trousers, 144 pairs summer trousers. Cut and sent to General Storekeeper to be made, 1,428 brown muslin shirts, 430 brown muslin chemises.

Tinware Department—Made 4 mess boxes, 10 by 12 by 20 inches; 6 galvanized-iron boxes, 15 3/4 by 15 3/4 by 7 inches; 1 bath-tub, 1 15-gallon tin boiler, 1 biscuit cutter, 1 oatmeal boiler, 30 tin toilet boxes, 24 wash basins, 1 7-gallon galvanized-iron can, 1 4-gallon galvanized-iron can, 6 galvanized-iron watering cans, 1 3-gallon can, 6 1-gallon oil cans, 7 1-pint oil cans, 2 covers for steam boilers, 24 by 36 inches; 6 1-quart dippers, 24 1-pint cups, 2 4-gallon pails, 6 40-quart pails, 8 1-quart pails, 1 galvanized-iron pan, 14 by 16 by 7 inches; 1 pan, 1 by 12 by 20 inches; 12 12-quart dish-pans, 64 messpans, 76 dustpans, 3 5-quart copper kettles, 6 3-gallon saucepans, 12 tin splints, 12 by 2 1/2 inches; 24 muffin rings, 6 jelly molds, 1 3-pint teapot.

Sewing Room (Workhouse women)—The following articles were cut at Industrial School and made in sewing room: 226 dresses, 178 aprons, 23 waists, 266 petticoats, 206 waists for petticoats, 286 chemises, 83 hemmed spreads, 16 cooks' aprons. Repaired 84 shirts, 24 drawers, 27 sheets, 31 pillow cases, 39 jumpers.

LABOR REPORT OF INFANTS' HOSPITAL.

Carpentry—Ward 3, repaired 3 window frames, renewed 3 sash cords and 420 square feet 1 1/2 by 4 inch Y. P. flooring; Ward 4, repaired 2 doors, 5 windows, renewed 3 locks and 5 sash cords; Ward 5, laid 248 square feet 1 1/2 by 4 inch Y. P. flooring and repaired 38 feet spruce flooring; Ward 19, planed 40 feet flooring and repaired 3 windows; Ward 12, repaired 8 windows and renewed 5 sash cords; Ward 17, planed 60 feet flooring, renewed 35 feet base board, repaired 2 doors, renewed 9 sash cords; in stable, put in 8 slides to sashes and repaired frames.

Painting—Ward 3, painted 14 cribs, 15 bedsteads, and renewed 2 lights glass; Ward 10, put in 3 lights glass; Ward 17, cleaned down ceiling and side walls and painted same in 2 coats, varnished all woodwork, window frames and shutters, painted a wainscoting 4 feet high and put in 2 lights glass; main stairways, first to third floors, painted all ceilings and side walls; piazza, 10 by 115 feet east end of building, cleaned down ceilings and side walls and painted in 3 coats all woodwork and window sashes; Chaplain's room on third floor, cleaned down ceiling and side walls and painted in 2 coats; cleaned out and painted in two coats large yawl boat and 1 special trip small boat.

Branch Workhouse Men—Employed in screening coal and ashes, unloading boats of coal and ice, delivering coal to the several boiler rooms, repairing wagon roads, assisting in gathering hay and doing all necessary laboring work about grounds.

LABOR REPORT.

Of the male patients, a daily average of 156 have been engaged as follows: 23 in kitchens, 9 in laundries, 6 in bakery, 7 in dining rooms, 3 in store-rooms, 5 in boiler-room, 1 soap making, 1 mattress making, 5 working on farm, 7 working on sea wall, 8 driving horses and in stable, 8 removing freight from dock, 1 in drug store, 1 in office, 2 in Physicians' kitchen, 3 painting, 1 plastering, 4 whitewashing, 1 tailoring, 1 in carpenter shop, 2 in blacksmith shop, 1 in tin shop, 2 assisting plumber, 22 at housework in wards. Miscellaneous—32 removing ashes from boiler-room, unloading coal, paving, putting clay and loam on filled in land, unloading and storing ice, delivering bread, ice and stores, cutting grass, cleaning up grounds around pavilions and removing rubbish from beach. Of the female patients, a daily average of 717 have been engaged in the following manner: Housework, sewing and knitting, 497; in the laundries, 66; in cutting-room, 5; in general dining-room, 8; teasing hair, making mattresses and pillows, 110; doing fancy work, 5; in Physicians' kitchen, 8; at out-door scrubbing, 18. 212,171 pieces have been laundered for this Asylum and 2,662 pieces for the Asylum, Ward's Island. 42,558 articles of clothing and bedding have been repaired and 1,793 articles made. Following is an itemized statement for Hart's Island Asylum:

The Engineer, Firemen and Assistants put up 3 copper boilers in kitchen, hot-water tank in laundry, 4 radiators in Pavilion 5 and hot-water boiler in cottage; cleaned out 2 horizontal and 2 locomotive boilers; made coil for tank in Pavilion 3; put 14 new faucets in Pavilions 2, 4 and 5; cleared waste pipes of sinks in Pavilions 1, 2 and 4; cleared closets in Pavilions 1, 2, 4 and 5, bath-tubs in Pavilions 2, 3 and 4, and main sewer of Pavilions 2, 3 and 5. Repaired steam pipes in kitchen laundry and subway, cisterns of Pavilions C and 5, water pipes of Pavilions 3, 5 and C, tanks in Pavilion 4 and kitchen, ball cocks and tanks of laundry; connected hot and cold water pipes with sinks in Pavilion 4 and hoisted coal on dock 12 days.

The Plumber and Assistants, North Hospital, put in new pipes and valves in Wards 2, 3, 4 and 5; put new pipes in Wards 6, 7, 8 and 9; put in new grates and lining in furnace and new grates and brick in range in kitchen; put 8 new faucets in laundry and altered pipes. Repaired pipes and put new faucets in men's dining-room and day-rooms; put in new heater in upper day-room; put new waste-pipes in Wards 5 and 6; put new bath-tubs and pipes in Ward 2; put up new boiler and water-back in cottage; repaired stoves and made all other necessary repairs in all pavilions.

The Tinsmith made 40 new bottoms in pails, 2 new pails and 2 new strainers; repaired 12 roofs, using 600 sheets of tin on same; made 180 elbows and 120 feet leaders for pavilions; repaired 12 stoves and put up 300 feet stovepipe.

The Plasterer repaired ceiling of hall, water-closet and side walls of hall, Pavilion 5; ceiling and side walls of hall, Pavilion 2; ceiling of bath-room, Pavilion 4; bedroom and pantry of cottage; whitewashed ceiling and side walls of Pavilions A, E, bath-house, kitchen, bakery, blacksmith's shop, plumber's shop, cellar of Pavilion 4, Attendants' Room 29, and repaired plastering of same.

The Electrician repaired and replaced 230 feet moulding, 280 feet silk cord, 30 plugs, 22 shades, 31 sockets, 36 ceiling cut-outs, 7 ampere fuses, 171 electric lamps, 3 plug cut-outs, 4 rolls tape, 1,500 feet insulated wire and 102 porcelain knobs.

The Painter and Assistant painted outside roof and 2 rooms of cottage; door of cellar, Pavilion 4; ceilings of dining-room and wainscoting, Pavilion 1; railing outside of office and 1 room in office; 6 frames, fire-pumps, guards of grass plots, railing on stairs of dock-landing, the ambulance, ceilings, walls, pipes and bath-tubs in Physicians' bath-room; kitchen carts, mosquito blinds and screens, 2 boats, 3 pairs oars, kitchen, 13 pairs shutters, 2 rooms and partition of Pavilion 2, North Hospital; roof of kitchen, Wards 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8, and carpenter's shop, laundry and female dining-room; lettered 2 signs and hamper for Acting Medical Superintendent; varnished closet in office, frames for 6 notices, 8 round tables and door of cellar, Pavilion 4; sized and puttied the ceiling of Pavilion 1 dining-room; sized wainscoting in south access hall, Pavilion 3, and walls of Pavilion 2; tarred roof of Pavilion A, E, and kitchen at North Hospital; stained 6 frames for notices and 11 round tables; grained 1 door and vestibule at North Hospital; mixed 250 pounds white lead in paint; 12 pounds green paint for Pavilions 1, 2, 3 and A; mixed for North Hospital wall paint; red and white lead for bath-tubs, metallic black paint for kitchen, 150 pounds white lead and 12 gallons metallic paint colors for boatman, plasterer, steam-fitter and for bedsteads in Pavilion A; frosted door lights in Pavilion C and put in 38 window lights where required.

The Carpenter and Assistants made 3 dining-room tables, with turned legs, 6 feet long, 2 feet 6 inches wide; 36 wheelbarrows, 6 picture frames, 1 machine for teasing curled hair; 1 bread box, 4 feet long, 2 feet wide, 1 foot 6 inches deep; 1 crate barrow, for clothes in laundry; 3 hot-bed frames for raising plants; 1 meat box, 2 feet by 1 foot 6 inches; new body for coal cart; sliding skid for unloading meat, and 4 pieces of floor grating for meat-house; 3 centres for Mason to arch over steam-pipes; 1 ash spring crutch for patient; 1 walnut water-closet seat ring; 1 box, 3 feet long, 1 foot 6 inches wide, and 1 set book-shelves, 5 feet high, 2 feet wide; made 2 covers for roof scuttles and 3 sheathed doors, 6 feet by 2 feet 6 inches; 1 screen door and 23 pine coffins; put in 2 new window frames and 2 pairs 6-pane sashes in gable of kitchen, North Hospital; put new cord in 28 window sashes, and new hinges on 8 doors; put up 60 frames on Hospital beds for netting; put awnings over kitchen and cottage; made and put up 4 shelves for holding bread; laid 225 square feet ash flooring in cottage; covered roofs of pump-house and engine-house on dock with tar paper; covered over well-hole with raised platform, 12 feet square, and covered 14 tables with oilcloth; blocked ceiling for machine shafting in laundry and cased in belting; built bath-rooms for male Attendants at North Hospital with double sheathed partitions; sheathed up 4 windows; partitioned 2 rooms for male sleeping apartments; removed 3 storm doors from Physicians' quarters; cut up floor for electric-light wires and replaced same; put on 8 pass locks and repaired 14 old ones; repaired and placed in position 25 window fly-screens in Physicians' quarters; repaired bread wagon and body of ambulance, hand-rail and newel post for outside stairs, shingles on 1 roof, bottoms of wash-tubs in laundry, 6 frame doors, and made all other necessary repairs.

The Stone Mason and Assistants built 5,140 cubic feet of sea wall at North Hospital, 100 cubic feet brick wall underpinning dining-room, 540 feet brick conduit over steam-pipes to main buildings, 100 cubic feet brickwork foundation for tank in Pavilion 5; put in 100 feet 4-inch sewer-pipe from Pavilion 3; blasted 480 cubic feet of rock.

The Baker baked 195,263 pounds of bread.

Baker—Made 90,073 pounds white bread, 4,200 pounds ginger-bread, and 4,200 pounds domestic cake.

Laundry—Male—Washed 11,740 sheets, 7,260 shirts, 22,110 pillow cases, 23,115 roller towels,

2,212 hand towels, 2,222 coats, 4,110 pairs pants, 2,112 vests, 650 spreads, 560 blankets, 1,940 aprons, 950 cooks' caps, 1,100 undershirts, 6,550 pairs socks, and 4,132 pieces underwear. Female—Washed and laundered 1,593 aprons, 112 caps, 3,108 chemises, 72 corset covers, 2,554 collars, 2,294 pairs drawers, 1,336 dresses, 1,071 handkerchiefs, 270 nightgowns, 2,787 pillow slips, 139 skirts, 3,075 sheets, 826 shirts, 234 undershirts, 53 night shirts, 204 pairs cuffs, 253 tablecloths, 542 napkins, 253 waists, 11 ties, 49 cooks' jackets, 762 petticoats, 47 pillow shams, 1,986 stockings, 94 socks, 1,816 roller towels, 2,751 dish towels, 1,836 bath towels, 1,218 hand towels, 120 spreads, and 1 vest.

Sewing Room—Female—Cut 4,868 articles. Made 42 bedticks, 100 bath towels, 12 coffee bags, 240 chemises, 222 pairs drawers, 107 dresses, 265 dish towels, 42 mattresses, 6 napkins, 715 pillow slips, 40 petticoats, 285 roller towels, 248 shirts, 300 pairs suspenders, 6 tablecloths, 75 window shades, 5 uniforms, 534 pillows, 624 pillow ticks, 2 streamers, 3 shrouds, and hemmed 209 spreads.

Tailor Shop—Made 116 coats, 155 pairs pants, and 57 vests. Repaired 220 sheets, 1,450 shirts, 160 pillow cases, 240 roller towels, 1,860 pairs socks, 1,240 coats, 2,890 pairs pants, 990 vests, 840 pieces underwear, 320 aprons, 190 caps, 130 overcoats, 195 pea jackets, 60 spreads, and 4 awnings.

Shoe Shop—Made 6 pairs men's shoes. Repaired 188 pairs men's shoes, 324 pairs women's shoes, and 345 pairs boots.

Engineer—Connected up large sewage pump, 2½-inch steam-pipe with main, 1 set tea and coffee urns, telephone with railroad station and Administration Building, placed and connected up 7 new electric brackets. Repaired 81 valves, 8 steam-traps, 20 steam pumps, 13 machine belts, 5 cooking boilers, 30 hand pumps, 13 hot water boilers, 52 boiler tubes expanded, 1 electric-light engine governor, 1 laundry engine, 2 fire hydrants, 13 fuse wires, 1 wringing machine, 2 boiler "blow off" cocks, fitted up 1 hot water boiler in Female Laundry, moved telephone wire from old to new stable and connected same with Administration; tested fire-hydrants once each month. Cleared 12 sewers, cleaned 8 steam boilers and moving water motor; pumped 5,984,030 gallons water daily into tank, average time daily consumed in pumping 11 hours; discharged by steam pulsator pump 4,113,524 gallons sewage water.

Carpenter—Made 3 portable water-closets, 4 window poles, 6 side boards for carts, 2 lamp backs, 7 towel rollers, 2 bread closets, 1 clothes closet, 8 window jambs, 2 door jambs and casing, 9 barber chairs, 7 coffins, 3 cap boxes, 6 shoe blacking benches, 9 water-closet seats, 4 bread boxes, 1 peel for baker, 2 whiffletrees, 1 platform for tea and coffee urns, 1 wagon pole, 2 wash-tubs for laundry, 1 water tank 5 by 3 feet, 4 backs for clocks, 1 bench for shoe shop, 4 pig troughs, 10 gates. Miscellaneous Work—Put up 60 window shades; put on and fitted 300 mortise locks; put together 250 bedsteads; taking down 3 chicken houses and putting up 4; put up 2,300 feet wire fencing; taking down 900 feet wire fencing; moving gate-house, 3 dozen washstands and bureaus put together; put on 2 handles on lawn mowers; fixed up in water-closets 2 dozen toilet-paper racks, and covered 20 tables with oil-cloth; repaired 1 express wagon, 1 shaft for depot wagon, 12 locks, 40 chairs, 8 settees and 2 doors.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

The bids were found correct as to their formality, and the sureties proposed appear to be sufficient.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the report was approved.
