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FIRE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1905.

Fire Department, City of New York,

Hon. GEO. B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, City of New York:

Sir—I have the honor of transmitting to you herewith, pursuant to section 1544 of the Charter, the annual report of the Fire Department for the year 1905, which also includes the report for the last quarter of that year. In doing so, permit me to say that the policy of developing and extending the Department and strengthening the various branches adopted by my predecessor in office, and so strongly supported by you, was carried out during the year persistently and effectively. The co-operation of yourself, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen enabled the Department to make the greatest strides in its history. The paid establishment was extended to the Borough of Richmond and to the more thickly populated sections of Queens, which were not already covered by it. In Richmond fourteen companies in the paid service were put into commission. In Queens six companies were established. There are still extensions to be made in both boroughs, but the work was pushed with great energy, and the companies were located on the lines of the largest populations in localities. This policy will be carefully adhered to under the present administration.

The uniformed force of the Department was increased by the appointment of 402 additional firemen during the year, and its total force, officers and men, on the 1st of January, 1906, numbered 3,554.

In Manhattan and The Bronx four new companies were organized and placed in service; five old companies were provided with new houses; two single companies were reorganized as double companies. There are now in Manhattan and The Bronx eighty-three engine companies and twenty-nine truck companies; in Brooklyn and Queens sixty-eight engine companies and twenty-one truck companies; in Richmond eight engine companies, one hose company and five truck companies. There are altogether seven fire boats, and preparations were begun during the year for the construction of three powerful new boats for the marine arm of the service, the money having been secured for them by bond issue. Differences of opinion as to details of plans for these boats have somewhat delayed the letting of contracts, but the work is being pushed as rapidly as is consistent with the best interests of the Department and the proper expenditure of the City's funds.

During the year investigations were made to determine the necessities of the fire alarm telegraph service of the Department, and it was found that the conditions existing were such as to fully warrant an entirely new system in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. Recommendations to this end have already been made. To temporarily reinforce the old system a new contract was made with the telephone company by which every apparatus house can be reached from any part of the city, and by which each apparatus house can communicate with the others. This new system of telephone service has proven satisfactory up to this time, and has apparently added materially to the efficiency of the present fire alarm system.

The work of the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances is now, after two years, producing results which demonstrate the value of a proper supervision over auxiliary fire appliances. Auxiliary fire protection, such as standpipes (fire lines) for buildings of unusual height, or area, and perforated pipes or automatic sprinklers for underground premises (cellars and sub-cellars) present problems new and varied, which are being handled with satisfactory results, not only to the men of the Department, who operate the appliances at fires, but also to the property owner who pays for the installation. The general scheme of auxiliary fire protection is shown in the statistical details furnished in the report of this Bureau.

The facilities for reaching fires more rapidly have been provided for by the gradual introduction of automobiles for the Department, for the use of Chief Officers, and these machines have proven a valuable adjunct to the Fire Department apparatus.

The duties imposed upon the Bureau of Combustibles have been vastly increased by the enormous building operations which have been going on throughout Greater New York for the last few years. To meet this contingency a number of firemen, under command of a Captain of the Department, were detailed to the Inspector of Combustibles for the purpose of aiding in the inspection of the use of explosives at the points where the various construction operations are in progress. This plan has helped materially in safeguarding the lives and property of citizens. It is, however, suggested that this Bureau of the Department should be supplied with additional clerical and expert assistance, for which there is now no appropriation.

The report of this Department is necessarily delayed annually owing to the difficulty of collecting statistics, as to the losses, by the Fire Marshal, it sometimes taking several months to make adjustments. The statistics collected by the Chief of Department are also necessarily delayed owing to the comparison of fires with the Marshal's report, and it is for this reason that the reports are not forwarded at an earlier period of the year. This, however, gives me the opportunity at this time of furnishing general information concerning the Department in the line of the policy of development and extension, which is incorporated in the appended letters already transmitted to you, and which are furnished herewith for the information of the public.

Hon. GEO. B. McCLELLAN, Mayor and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—I have the honor to present herewith an estimate of the financial requirements of this Department for the present year, and for the next succeeding three years.

Investigation of the needs of this branch of the City Government made under my direction by the officials in charge of the various bureaus demonstrates clearly that the growth of the Greater New York has so far outstripped the development and extension of the facilities for the protection of human life and property in the matter of the extinguishment and prevention of fires that it becomes the duty of the Fire Commissioner to urge upon your honorable body the need for immediate favorable action toward the proper equipment of the Department so that it will, within the shortest possible space of time, be brought abreast of the ever-increasing demands being made upon it by the City's growth.

In view of the fact that the extension of the Department means the increased assessable valuation of the adjacent property, and that an enormously large proportion of the expenditures asked for is made up wholly of money sought for sites, apparatus houses and apparatus, the question becomes one not only of the necessary protection of the citizens and their property, but of a sound business investment of the City's money as well.

I therefore have to request that provision be made through the issue of bonds, distributed through the four years mentioned, as the Board deems best, for the following necessities of the Fire Department:

During the last two years or more the National Board of Fire Underwriters, as well as the Local Board of Underwriters, have been making investigations as to the necessities of the Fire Alarm Telegraph Bureau in this Department, and have very strongly recommended the establishment of an entirely new and modern system for the transmission of fire alarms. My predecessor forwarded a letter to you bearing upon this subject last year, and I believe it is a question that should receive immediate attention. The Chief of Department estimates that \$2,000,000 could be profitably spent in this work during the next four years, and I therefore recommend that an appropriation for this purpose, under such conditions as your Honorable Board may direct, be made as soon as it is possible.

It has become necessary that the work of the School of Instruction be done on a much larger scale than at present. Not only is it important that greater room be secured for the training of the men, but it is most essential also that proper facilities should be had for the training of the horses, of the men who are to drive them and of the engineers who are to run the engines. The School of Instruction for probationary firemen was organized in 1882, and located on the fifth floor of Headquarters Building, and occupying also the rear of structure on Sixty-eighth street, with the yard as a drill ground.

During the first years of the School the average attendance was about one hundred, and this continued for a number of years, but on Greater New York being formed the jump became so great that conditions changed, and the average attendance on the formation of the Borough Departments exceeded, in some years, six hundred. This was too great a number for the School to properly handle and to do justice to the men. The Greater New York extension of the paid system to the various Boroughs has continued from year to year, and the Department business has increased to such an extent that the School was forced out of the fifth floor into the yard, which is now and has been for years entirely inadequate in size and appointments for the proper instruction of the probationary firemen.

Hon. JOHN H. O'BRIEN, Fire Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith for your information annual report for the year 1905 of the Bureau Chief of Department, comprising a statement of operations, statistics of fires, appointments, resignations, dismissals, reinstatements, retirements from the service, deaths among those in service and among members relieved or retired from the service, together with a register of the officers of the uniformed force in active service, etc.

On December 31, 1905, the total membership in the uniformed force, boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, was 2,155 officers and members, and the number of alarms responded to by above force during the year was 8,729.

The fire extinguishing force consisted of eighty-two engine companies, including five fireboats; twenty-eight hook and ladder companies, twelve companies being known as "double engine companies" and six companies known as "double truck companies," consisting of an average of three officers and twenty-two members, equipped with double sets of apparatus and formed into two sections, one of which remains in quarters for the purpose of covering unprotected territory during the time the other section responds to alarms. One engine company and one hook and ladder company are equipped with searchlight engines, which are used at night fires, and one engine and three hook and ladder companies are equipped with water tower.

To each company is assigned a district within whose limits commanding officers are responsible for violations of the laws, etc., condition of alarm boxes, hydrants, buildings, etc.

Apparatus companies are organized into battalions, numbering from the First to the Nineteenth Battalion, inclusive, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and the First and Second Battalions in Richmond. The battalions in turn are grouped into six (6) divisions, each under the command of a Deputy Chief of Department, as follows:

First Division, comprising the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Nineteenth Battalions; Second Division, the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and Eighth Battalions; Third Division, the Tenth, Twelfth and Sixteenth Battalions; Fourth Division, the Ninth, Eleventh and Thirteenth Battalions; Fifth Division, the Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth and Eighteenth Battalions, and the Tenth Division, borough of Richmond, the First and Second Battalions.

The notable fires transmitted herewith are such as have necessitated the calling into service of a number of apparatus companies, by reason of the area and magnitude of the fires, or which have been emphasized by loss of life or by pecuniary loss, or otherwise marked by exceptional circumstances.

During the year Engine Companies 80, 81, 82 and Hook and Ladder Company 28 were organized and placed in service in Manhattan and The Bronx, thus affording a much needed relief in parts of the City where property interests required same.

In October and November a paid department was organized in the borough of Richmond, consisting of fourteen apparatus companies and twelve volunteer companies, in lieu of fifty-seven volunteer companies formerly covering this territory. The installation of the paid system, in my opinion, has been of great value to the citizens of Staten Island, and I would recommend that as soon as possible the paid department be extended throughout all boroughs.

It is also absolutely necessary that a large number of sites be secured in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for the purpose of erecting thereon apparatus houses to meet the rapid growth of the City.

The Department is still handicapped owing to the large number of hydrants of antiquated pattern which freeze at the slightest approach of cold weather, and to the need of additional water mains of larger dimensions, and with the installation

of an underground salt water system with pumping stations, etc., the Department will be in a better condition to promptly extinguish fires.

The creation of the Marine Battalion, comprising fireboats of this Department, under the command of a Chief of Battalion, has proven of great benefit to the Department, and with the addition of the new fireboats soon to be built it will place this branch of the service in an excellent condition.

The reorganization of the Fire Alarm Telegraph Branch under the supervision of a superintendent with a practical knowledge of the needs of the Department is of immediate necessity.

Large amounts of new hose of the very best quality that can be purchased, additional apparatus and an increased number of apparatus companies are needed to enable the Department to keep pace with the increasing growth of the City.

Would recommend the changing of the law as to the five (5) year clause by the Sergeant in charge of Boiler Squad, as it prevents firemen in this Department thoroughly experienced in handling steam fire engines from obtaining licenses to operate engines in this Department. Also recommend that application be made to the Civil Service Board to exempt the position of Engineer of Steamer in this Department, as it is impossible to judge the qualifications of an engineer by a written examination; the proper way to determine his fitness is by practical experience in operating a steam fire engine, under the supervision of a competent Board of Examiners composed of practical engineers; also that an amendment be made to the Charter in relation to the salaries of firemen; that fourth grade firemen receive a salary of \$1,100 and that they be advanced yearly \$100 until they reach the first grade; or in lieu thereof, that all firemen receive the same salary. All firemen do the same amount of work, have the same responsibilities and assume the same risk. Observation has shown that the fourth grade firemen, who are usually young married men, come into the Department at a salary of \$800 per annum, find it difficult to get along with the advanced cost of living, payment of uniforms, etc., on a salary of \$800 per annum, and are often forced to go into debt and contract bad habits which they would not otherwise do were the salary at the beginning sufficient.

January 3, 1905, 10.11 p. m., Station 212.

Fire occurred at Pier 36, North river, a two-story frame and iron building, 75 by 900 feet, occupied as steamship offices and pier. Originated on second floor and extended to cock loft, considerably damaging building.

At 2.01 p. m. and 2.08 p. m. respectively second and third alarms were sent out.

January 26, 1905, 1.06½ a. m., Station No. 2-398.

Fire occurred at No. 811 Cauldwell avenue, a three-story frame dwelling occupied as dwelling, 20 by 70 feet.

Hon. JOHN H. O'BRIEN, Fire Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I beg leave to report a summary of the operations of this Bureau for the year 1905.

The receipts of the office from the oil licenses have decreased this year, and it will continue to do so for an indefinite period, owing to the erection of new buildings and the destruction of old ones for bridges, etc. This decrease will continue until eventually it will be almost wiped out. In years past it has been our main source of revenue, but I believe we will have to look to other means to continue the high aggregate that has heretofore come from this Bureau.

The special permits have increased in the \$2 section about 33 per cent, those in the \$5 section are abolished, while the \$10 licenses have increased about 37 per cent. In the issue of these licenses a survey has to be made. The result is that the places where the storage is allowed is visited at least four times by a member of this staff before the operation is completed, embracing as it does the storage of crude drugs, paints, oils and other dangerous substances, it requires a skilled surveyor to do this kind of work. The \$20 permits have been abolished. The chimney fires have decreased from two hundred and three in 1904 to one hundred and eighty-three in 1905. This does not show that less chimney fires have occurred, but rather indicates that they have increased in a much poorer neighborhood than heretofore.

The wholesale fireworks have increased but one, while the manufacturers of matches for 1904 were five, and in 1905 were two, the reissue being in 1904 thirteen and in 1905 fifteen. The wholesale matches in 1904 were ninety-eight, while in 1905 there were but ninety. The number of oil stations have increased 40 per cent. The certificates issued in 1904 were three hundred and twenty-six, while those issued in 1905 were four hundred and ninety-two, owing to the number of tunnels and other large operations that took place during the year. Street fires have decreased about 35 per cent, owing to the fact that the Commissioner of Public Works issues permits for building fires in the street, the right being vested entirely by law in the Fire Commissioner.

Recently a pump hose took fire, which caused the loss of three lives. This could be entirely obviated by the lubricating oil having been tested by a competent man, but owing to the carelessness or the avarice of those who sell such lubricants these lives were sacrificed.

The increase in receipts for the year 1905 over 1904 was \$3,918, which I think speaks for itself in the efficiency of the men in our Bureau.

Hon. JOHN H. O'BRIEN, Fire Commissioner:

Sir—I have the honor to forward herewith copy, in duplicate, of the report of this bureau for the year 1905.

There were for the year in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, 7,750 fires, an increase of 201 fires over that for year 1904. The total estimated loss amounted to \$5,271,955, an increase of \$741,012 over the total loss for year 1904. The average loss per fire is \$680.25, an increase of \$80.05 over the previous year's average.

The following is a summary of figures for the different Boroughs:

Of the whole number of fires, 3,337 or 43 per cent. were for losses less than \$10; 2,644 or 34 per cent. for losses between \$10 and \$100; and 1,297 or 16 per cent. for losses between \$100 and \$1,000.

In ascertaining the origin and cause of the different fires, the following were found to be among the principal causes:

There were also 2,681 fires, causes of which could not be positively ascertained. They were in most cases, as far as the investigation could go, probably due to carelessness with matches, or with lit cigar or cigarette butts.

During the year 1,057 complaints were received and investigated. They consisted of defective flues, dangerous conditions of dumb-waiter shafts or other generally dangerous conditions found in buildings, mostly tenements. They were disposed of as follows:

I desire to say that considerable work is attached to this branch of the bureau, necessitating several visits to premises when a complaint is found, in order to see whether orders given have been complied with, in the delivery of written orders, or again, sometimes in the delivery of second orders or Corporation Counsel notices. The figures, therefore, have a threefold value in denoting the amount of work accomplished.

Respecting the record of arrests for arson and their disposition by the courts, we find that, during the year 57 arrests were made. These, together with 4 cases pending from year 1904, made 61 cases, which were disposed of as follows:

Thus it will be seen that about 23 per cent. of the number arrested for the crime of arson were convicted, a very creditable showing when the difficulties in securing convictions for this crime are considered.

In the fuller investigations called for by some fires, or in the obtaining of evidence to show guilt of the crime of arson, about 2,000 witnesses were examined by me during the year in my office, and their testimony taken down in shorthand; and in all important cases again transmitted into typewriting, copies being forwarded to the District Attorney whenever necessary.

I would again remark that my work is oftentimes much impeded by the want of a competent interpreter. Many of the fires that happen in the lower East Side occur in the homes of Hebrews, Italians and Greeks, who take advantage of the absence of an interpreter to plead an entire ignorance of English. In such cases we are compelled to trust to the interpreter they sometimes bring, or to those we may, by chance, find in the building. An interpreter attached to the bureau might also be used, when disengaged, in assisting in the clerical work, which of late has greatly accumulated in the bureau.

I desire also to call your attention to a few facts gathered in the course of my examinations of the past year's fires. I find that not a few fires happen through apparent negligence in the use of candles, used in religious services in the homes of those of the Hebrew persuasion. Care, therefore, should be taken by occupants in having windows closed or candles removed to a safe distance from curtains while such religious services are being observed.

I was also surprised at the many cases to be found among the poorer classes where three or more different persons boarding or lodging with one family, in the same suite of rooms, were each in possession of a fire insurance policy. They, in most cases, had nothing outside of wearing apparel in the premises, the value of which represented but a small fraction of the amount of their policy. I was informed that no trouble was experienced by them in procuring these policies from agents of fire insurance companies.

Moreover, these people seem to have the delusion that all would partake in a large claim if fire occurred on the premises. This idea, no doubt, is often the cause of negligence in causing fires, if not sometimes an incentive to some to commit arson.

Again, insurance claims are often adjusted for fires of which we have no cognizance. These are generally small fires, and it is only when an exorbitant claim is demanded, or a fire appears suspicious to the mind of the insurance adjuster, that the bureau is then notified.

Risks have also come to my notice which were decidedly hazardous, but not apparently deemed so by the companies, from the heavy insurances in the possession of some parties having a fire. It appears, therefore, that if some insurance officials were not so lax in respect to "risks assumed," if more discrimination was used in the disposition of claims and the "moral hazard" and other features of a risk taken into consideration, there would be a material decrease in the number of fires.

I would also recommend that some attention be given to the erection or installation of electric light signs used for purpose of advertising, and found common of late in front of buildings or on roofs of same. In times of fire they are often a menace to the lives of firemen from being improperly erected or having defective insulation. Therefore, if some contrivance were introduced by which the circuit could be turned off from the street by a member of the department, in case of fire, it would about serve the purpose desired.

It might also be suggested, that a good law could be enacted for the purpose of licensing electricians, in order to lessen dangers to life from imperfect workmanship of incompetent electricians.

work with greater facility, and certainly to better advantage than if such information were not possessed by the officer first to arrive, and consequently available for the chief officer in command at the fire.

The card index system, installed during the latter part, of the year is not as yet complete, but will be finished within a short time, and the office records will then be in better shape than ever before.

The volume of business handled by this Bureau, as stated in my report for last year, and as shown by comparison with this year's work, increases each year, and the necessity for additional help and more office space becomes evident each day.

The Bureau occupies about 150 square feet of floor space in centre of fourth floor, and there is no semblance of privacy for the officer in charge, which condition has a tendency to delay to some extent the work of this office.

Recommendations.

That an officer of the uniformed force, with experience as an engineer, be assigned or detailed as assistant to officer in charge; the number of uniformed firemen now detailed and acting as inspectors to remain the same.

That the force of this Bureau be added to by the addition of one (ununiformed) clerk.

That at least 700 square feet of floor space be provided for this Bureau.

That the Corporation Counsel be communicated with for the purpose of formulating better arrangements or new laws governing the services of notices, as there have been many cases wherein service on owners has been practically impossible; also as to providing means for punishing responsible persons who wilfully neglect or refuse to install means for preventing or extinguishing fires in buildings occupied for various purposes, and in which loss of life is liable to occur through such neglect or refusal, as the present method is slow and cumbersome.

I would further recommend that company commanders be given ample opportunity in which to make proper inspections of the various buildings in their company districts, and that in such districts as contain an unusual number of large structures chief officers be directed to facilitate the work as much as possible, and further, that permission be given to forward semi-annual reports at least one month in advance of the regular time.

These figures cover only such cases where fire appliances were installed by order of Fire Commissioner and under supervision of this Bureau during the year, and do not include installations in former years or in new buildings.

The work of securing installation of sprinklers or perforated pipes in cellars and sub-cellars is progressing as rapidly as circumstances and the force available will permit, and it is expected that within the incoming year protection will be provided in all cellars and sub-cellars in at least the lower part of the City. This will practically remove a dangerous condition which has heretofore been a source of great anxiety to the Fire Department.

A supply of the Fire Department regulations for standpipe (fire line) and perforated pipe equipments was furnished the Superintendents of Bureaus of Buildings of the various boroughs for information of architects and engineers when filing plans, with result that this Bureau has been recognized and consulted, the best interests of this Department conserved and better conditions secured as to auxiliary fire protection.

The numerical force of this Bureau is small, the work is more or less of a supervisory nature and of value in securing proper initial installations, the correction of defects and the tabulating of statistics, whereas the inspection work of the company officers is of greater value in that they secure information as to the construction of the building, the location of entrances, the means of exit, the communications between floors and walls, the nature and character of stock and the condition of the auxiliary fire appliances, all of which enables the Fire Department, in event of fire, to

BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS.

EDWARD F. CROKER, Chief of Department:

Sir—I have the honor to submit for your consideration the following annual report for the year ending December 31, 1905, embracing schedules showing membership of the uniformed force, number of companies, description of apparatus and fireboats, statistics of fires, fire alarm telegraph system, a brief sketch of notable fires, rescues performed, presentation of medals and a register of officers in these boroughs.

With few exceptions, the fire extinguishing apparatus in service is in excellent condition, as proven by the efficient service rendered during the year, and by a recent test made through the courtesy of the Hon. Nicholas J. Hayes, then Fire Commissioner, by authorized agents of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, who stated, on completing such test, that the engines in service in these boroughs were the second best in the United States.

I respectfully reiterate the fact that the Department in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens is not keeping pace with the remarkable growth in population and consequent increase in the number of dwellings and manufacturing establishments (9,027 during 1905) in these boroughs. There was an increase of slightly less than 5 per cent. in the number of fires for the year 1905 as compared with that of 1904, but, withal, the losses were decreased \$1,029,023, or about 33 per cent., and the average loss per fire decreased about 36 per cent., as a result of the very efficient manner in which the officers and men in all branches of the service in these boroughs performed their duty. With your permission, I take this opportunity of extending to them my deep appreciation of their hearty co-operation.

During the past year the paid system has been extended to Rockaway Beach and Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens, by the organization therein of five engine companies, Nos. 164, 165, 166, 167 and 168 (No. 164, in Far Rockaway, being equipped with a small hook and ladder truck), and one hook and ladder company, No. 71. There are 41 fire alarm boxes in the Rockaways, the classification of which has been changed from the volunteer system to that of Class 4, by the introduction of new circuit wheels. With an increased water supply, and an improved distribution of the same, the territory above mentioned will be as well protected as any outlying section of these boroughs.

In eight years, if we except the above extension, but three engine companies and four hook and ladder companies have been organized, less than one a year. There is a balance of about \$46,000 of the bond issue of 1901, which was specially made for the erection of quarters for Engine Company 150. I believe that plans for the same have been drawn up. I would recommend that the said building be erected at the earliest possible date. Of the bond issues of 1903 and 1905 for sites and buildings, there is a balance of about \$124,000, which will be expended for the erection of two new apparatus houses, and the extensive alteration and repair of two others.

That the Department in these boroughs may assume a proper status, I have recommended twenty sites (five of which have been secured), the erection of suitable buildings thereon (plans for three of such buildings being now under way), and the organization of thirteen engine companies, seven hook and ladder companies and three combination companies (equipped with hook and ladder trucks). I respectfully refer you to my reports of February 11, 1904, and January 24, 1905.

During the year contracts were awarded for extensive alterations and repairs to four company quarters, all of which are nearing completion, and, when finished, will leave these houses in excellent condition. Twenty-seven company quarters still await similar treatment. Though this will

pushed forward with all possible dispatch, until every circuit in these Boroughs is placed underground in the most approved modern style. Since the fire alarm boxes of underground systems are usually placed in lamp-posts, I would recommend that the globes on such lamp-posts be of red glass.

The urgent necessity for at least twenty-five fire alarm boxes, Class 1, seventy-five fire alarm boxes, Class 2, and thirty fire alarm boxes, Class 4, is most apparent. In my report of 1904, I recommended the placing of sixty-five Class 2 boxes in the outlying portions of the Borough of Brooklyn, six of which have been placed, and twenty-five Class 4 boxes in that part of the Borough of Queens known as Long Island City, but two of which have been placed. These boxes should be contracted for, furnished and placed at the earliest possible date. It is due to the inhabitants of these parts that they be afforded better means of communication with this Department in the event of fire, and not be compelled to resort to the telephone, with all its attending delays. The lamp-posts adjacent to these boxes should also be provided with red globes.

That the fire alarm boxes in the Borough of Brooklyn should be arranged in numerical order is quite beyond dispute. After a thorough investigation and considerable study, I find that to do so would be a stupendous task, owing to its divers bays, creeks and canals, and the roundabout arrangement of its streets and avenues. Nevertheless, work with this aim in view is now in progress.

Gooderson, Jr., Chief of Battalion Graham and Acting Chiefs of Battalion McGuire, Friel and Rieckenberg.

The services of twelve engine and three hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in two and one-half hours.

At 4:01 a. m., 4:01½ a. m. and 4:19 a. m., respectively, second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

March 1, 6:12 p. m., Station 3-231.

Fire occurred at Gardiner and Maspeth avenues, two-story frame building, 25 by 25 feet, occupied as office and dwelling.

Fire originated on second floor, and extended to all floors, totally destroying building and contents; also extended to one-story frame building, same location, occupied as stable, with trifling damage to building; also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 25 feet, same location, occupied as kerosene oil shed, totally destroying building and contents; also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 175 feet, same location, occupied as stable, with total loss to building and contents; also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 225 feet, same location, occupied as oil tank shed, totally destroying building and contents.

Chief officers present were Deputy Chief of Department in charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Thomas Lally, Acting Deputy Chief of Department McCarthy, Chiefs of Battalion Graham and Matschke and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Rieckenberg and Braisted.

Assistant Foreman George W. McGahey, of Hook and Ladder Company 58, while working at fire, was struck on stomach by a hand hole plate from a tank which had exploded. He was removed to St. Catherine's Hospital, where he died the next day. Foreman Marcus Fitzgerald, of Engine Company 132, was struck by a 3½-inch pipe, and had his leg fractured in two places.

The services of five engine and two hook and ladder companies, and one fire-boat were required, and the fire was under control in about three hours.

At 6:25 p. m., 6:27 p. m. and 6:36 p. m., respectively, special call, second alarm and special call were sent out.

April 21, 1:08 p. m., Station 613.

Fire occurred at Nos. 27 and 29 Belmont avenue, four-story and basement brick building, 50 by 125 feet, occupied as furniture store and warehouse.

Fire originated on the third floor and was confined to same, considerably damaging building and contents. A separate fire was also discovered in the cellar of same building, No. 11 Rockaway avenue, occupied as shipping department, slightly damaging building and considerably damaging contents.

Chief officers present were Deputy and Acting Chief of Department Binns, Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Duffy, Acting Deputy Chief of Department Thomas, Chiefs of Battalion O'Hara, McGroarty and Matschke, and Acting Chief of Battalion McKenna.

The services of fourteen engine and five hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about one and one-half hours.

At 11:25 p. m., 11:28 p. m., 11:36 p. m. and 11:57 p. m., respectively, second, third, fourth alarms, and special call, were sent out.

July 1, 2:58 a. m., Station 648.

Fire occurred at No. 290 Devoe street, three-story frame building, 25 by 60 feet, occupied as bakery and dwelling.

Fire originated in hallway on first floor and extended to second and third floors and roof by way of stairway, considerably damaging building and contents.

Chief Officers present were Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Acting Deputy Chief of Department McCarthy, Chiefs of Battalion Graham and Matschke, and Acting Chief of Battalion McKeon.

The services of three engine and two hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about twenty minutes.

The bodies of three persons who were burned to death before the arrival of the Department were found on the third floor.

At 3:09 a. m., second alarm was sent out.

October 5, 12:07 a. m., Station 376.

Fire occurred at No. 280 Reid avenue, four-story brick building, 30 by 80 feet, occupied as store and apartment house.

Fire originated on first floor and extended through dumbwaiter shaft and stair well to roof, considerably damaging building and contents.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Gooderson, Chiefs of Battalion McGroarty, Matschke, Farrell and Acting Chief of Battalion Braisted.

The services of eight engine and two hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about thirty minutes.

Three children were burned to death, and several persons badly burned and removed to hospitals. A considerable number of persons were rescued from the burning building by way of fire escapes and ladders of Department.

At 12:12 a. m. and 12:16 a. m., second and third alarms were sent out.

October 4, 4:33 a. m., Station 475.

Fire occurred at Nos. 35 to 43 Seigel street, six-story brick building, 50 by 100 feet, occupied as clothing factory.

Fire originated on the second floor, and extended by way of stairwell to third, fourth, fifth and sixth floors, considerably damaging building and contents; also ex-

tended to No. 38 Leonard street, two-story frame building, 20 by 20 feet, occupied as dwelling, slightly damaging building and contents.

Chief Officers present were Chief of Department Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Burns, Chiefs of Battalion Graham and Matschke, and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Friel and Rieckenberg.

The services of twelve engine and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about one hour.

At 4.39 a. m., 4.40 a. m., and 4.47 a. m., respectively, second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

October 12, 10.14 p. m., Station 255.

Fire occurred at Nos. 18 and 20 Sackett street, four-story brick building, 40 by 90 feet, occupied as pipe foundry.

Fire originated on first floor and extended to a portion of second floor, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to No. 13 Union street, two-story frame and brick building, 30 by 30 feet, occupied as liquor store and dwelling, with trifling damage to building and contents.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Acting Deputy Chief of Department Cunningham, and Chiefs of Battalion Cummings, Dooley, Kirk, Geo. Rogers and Kenlon.

The services of nine engine and four hook and ladder companies, and one searchlight engine were required, and the fire was under control in about thirty-five minutes.

At 10.20 p. m., and 10.22 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

October 17, 11.18 p. m., Station 51.

Fire occurred at Nos. 38 and 40 Tiffany place, four-story brick building, 40 by 100 feet, occupied as printing ink factory.

Fire originated in cellar and extended to first and second floors, considerably damaging buildings and contents.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Acting Deputy Chief of Department Cunningham, Chiefs of Battalion Cummings, Dooley, Kirk, and Acting Chief of Battalion Friel.

The services of six engine and four hook and ladder companies and searchlight engine were required, and the fire was under control in about thirty-five minutes.

At 11.20 p. m. and 11.41 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

November 13, 9.55 a. m., Station 472.

Fire occurred at Nos. 86 and 88 Miserole street, five-story brick building, 50 by 75 feet, occupied as glass factory.

Fire originated in the cellar and extended through elevator shaft to fifth floor, slightly damaging building and considerably damaging contents.

Chief officers present were Deputy Chief of Department in charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Thomas Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Burns, Chiefs of Battalion Matschke and McCarthy and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Wm. J. McCarthy and Braisted.

The services of eight engine and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about thirty minutes.

At 9.58 a. m. and 10.02 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

A large number of persons were rescued at this fire by members of this Department by means of fire escapes, fire ladders and life nets, fifteen persons being rescued by the last-named means.

November 10, 1.44 a. m., Station 585.

Fire occurred at Nos. 518 to 522 Broadway, lumber yard, 75 by 100 feet.

Fire extended throughout entire yard, considerably damaging same; extended to No. 524 Broadway, three-story frame building, 25 by 55 feet, occupied as store and dwelling, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to No. 526 Broadway, one-story frame building, 40 by 60 feet, occupied as store, slightly damaging building and contents; also extended to Nos. 526 and 528 Broadway, rear, one-story frame building, 15 by 15 feet, occupied as stable, considerably damaging building and slightly damaging contents; also extended to No. 516 Broadway, three-story brick building, 20 by 45 feet, occupied as dwelling, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to No. 514 Broadway, three-story brick building, 20 by 45 feet, occupied as dwelling, slightly damaging building and contents; also extended to No. 512 Broadway, three-story brick building, 20 by 45 feet, occupied as dwelling, with trifling damage to building and contents; also extended to Nos. 286 to 280 Heyward street, four-story brick building, 50 by 150 feet, occupied as public school, slightly damaging building and contents.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Burns, Acting Deputy Chief of Department McCarthy, Chiefs of Battalion Cunningham and Matschke and Acting Chief of Battalion Rieckenberg.

The services of nine engine and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about one hour.

At 1.50 a. m. and 1.51 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

November 27, 9.55 a. m., Station 635.

Fire occurred at Nos. 190 and 192 Snediker avenue, one-story frame building, 25 by 40 feet, occupied as stable.

Fire originated on first floor and extended throughout building, considerably damaging building and slightly damaging contents; also extended to Nos. 1912 to 1916 Pitkin avenues, three-story frame building, 60 by 100 feet, occupied as sash and door factory, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to Nos. 285 and 287 Van Sinderen avenue, two-story brick building, 30 by 100 feet, occupied as sash and door factory, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to No. 283 Van Sinderen avenue, one-story frame building, 20 by 50 feet, occupied as carpenter shop, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to No. 281 Van Sinderen avenue, one-story frame building, 20 by 40 feet, occupied as store-room for sashes and doors, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to No. 202 Snediker avenue, one-story frame building, 15 by 20 feet, occupied as stable, considerably damaging building and slightly damaging contents; also extended to Nos. 194, 200, 206 Snediker avenue, two-story frame buildings, 25 by 55 feet each, occupied as dwellings, with trifling damage to buildings.

Chief officers present were Deputy Chief of Department in charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Gooderson, Acting Deputy Chief of Department Thomas, Chiefs of Battalion Farrell, O'Hara, McGroarty and Matschke.

The services of nine engine and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about one and one-half hours.

At 10.02 a. m. and 10.06 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

December 14, 1.58 a. m., Station 335.

Fire at Nos. 1249 and 1251 Bedford avenue, four-story brick building, 89 by 105 feet, occupied as stores and offices.

Fire originated on the first floor and extended to the fourth floor and roof, through pipe recesses, considerably damaging building and contents.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Acting Deputy Chief of Department Cunningham, Chiefs of Battalion McGroarty, Dooley and Kellock and Acting Chief of Department Braisted.

The services of twelve engine and three hook and ladder companies were required and one water tower, and the fire was under control in about three hours.

At 2.03 a. m. and 2.15 a. m. respectively third and fourth alarms were sent out.

December 23, 1.05 a. m., Station 64.

Fire occurred at Nos. 52 to 58 Nassau street, three-story brick building, 80 by 75 feet, with an L on Adams street, 50 by 60 feet, Nos. 186 to 190, occupied as express office, storehouse and stable, considerably damaging building and contents.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Duffy, Chiefs of Battalion Dooley, Cummings, Cunningham and Kirk and Acting Chief of Battalion Fitzgerald.

The services of nine engine and four hook and ladder companies, one water tower and one searchlight engine were required, and the fire was under control in about one hour.

At 1.11 a. m. and 1.12 a. m. respectively second and third alarms were sent out.

ROLL OF MERIT.

Rescues at Personal Risk, in Line of Duty.

January 9, 1905. By Fireman second grade Richard R. Siegert, Engine Company 118. Fire at No. 1055 Broadway, 11.59 a. m., Station 314. A woman at third-story window was crying for help and Fireman Siegert was ordered to procure scaling ladder and rescue her. He reached the window by way of scaling ladder and was about to put his hand on windowsill when the woman threw herself on him in her excitement, almost precipitating both to the street. With great difficulty Fireman Siegert held her and then brought her safely to a shed on second floor, and then by way of Department ladder, which had meanwhile been raised, to the street. The name of Fireman second grade Richard R. Siegert has been placed on the Roll of Merit, in Class "D."

January 17, 1905. By Fireman first grade Frederick Schultz, Engine Company 116. Fire at No. 190 Miserole street, at 4.12 p. m., Station 456. On the arrival of Engine Company 116 the building was heavily charged with smoke, the fire having originated in and extended throughout the cellar and to hallway and stairs on first floor. Department ladders had been raised to front of building and occupants were being rescued, when suddenly a Mrs. Schuhle and her two children, Christie and Bertha, aged two and three years respectively, appeared at a window of the fourth floor crying frantically for help and for someone to catch her children, as she was about to throw them to the street. A 35-foot ladder had been raised directly under the window but was about four feet short of reaching the windowsill. Fireman Schultz, with another fireman, was ordered to ascend the ladder and rescue the woman and children. Fireman Schultz stood on the top rung of ladder and, holding windowsill with one hand, took the child which Mrs. Schuhle was holding out the window and passed it to another fireman, and then passed the other child out in the same manner to the same fireman, who carried them in his arms to the street in safety. Fireman Schultz then drew himself up to window, entered same and passed Mrs. Schuhle out to a fireman, who brought her safely to street. The name of Fireman first grade Frederick Schultz has been placed on the Roll of Merit, in Class "B."

February 11, 1905. By Fireman first grade Michael Brennan, Engine Company 103. Fire at No. 155 Columbia street, 3.25 a. m., Station 125. The fire was under good headway in rear of first floor, cutting off escape by rear fire-escape and charging house with heat and smoke, the apparatus being delayed by extremely heavy snow in the streets. A scream from the burning building was heard and Fireman Brennan, who was detailed as Driver to Chief of Twenty-second Battalion, was ordered to go through building by way of stairway. In the rear rooms on third floor he found Mrs. Jane Moore, aged sixty-five years, who was paralyzed, in bed, and Mrs. Ennis, aged twenty-seven years, unable to assist her, having become powerless from fright and the smoke and heat coming from first and second floors. Fireman Brennan picked up Mrs. Moore from bed, and with Mrs. Ennis holding his shoulders, brought both women to first floor in hallway, the engine companies having meantime arrived and holding fire in check with their lines. The name of Fireman first grade Michael Brennan has been placed on the Roll of Merit, in Class "B."

December 11, 1905. By Fireman first grade John H. Liddy, Engine Company 104. Fire at No. 187 President street, 4.59 p. m., Station 951. Fireman Liddy went to fourth floor window by ladder and entered room, which was heavily charged with heat and smoke. He worked his way to an adjoining room and there found David Levi, aged twenty-one years, lying on the floor in an unconscious condition. The fire, which originated on the third floor, was rapidly being placed under control, and Fireman Liddy, with the assistance of two other firemen, was able to take the unconscious man down the stairway to the street, where Levi was attended by ambulance surgeon, and later removed to hospital. The name of Fireman first grade John H. Liddy has been ordered placed on the Roll of Merit, in Class "B."

Presentation of Medal.

Fireman first grade John W. Larkin, of Engine Company 106, was presented with the Brooklyn medal by his Honor Mayor George B. McClellan, at Fire Headquarters, Borough of Manhattan, on October 21, 1905, for rescuing John Walsh, age sixty-two years, from the third floor of burning building No. 153 Adams street, Borough of Brooklyn, at 1.33 a. m., January 1, 1904, Station 39.

Fireman Larkin entered the building, which was heavily charged with heat and smoke, and ascended the stairway to the third floor, and discovered John Walsh lying unconscious on the floor, his clothing on fire at the time. He carried him in his arms down the stairway to the street, his hands and rubber coat being burned. Walsh was removed to the hospital, where he died the following day from the effects of his burns.

On recommendation from the Chief of the Twenty-first Battalion, the name of Fireman first grade John W. Larkin, Engine Company 106, was placed on the Roll of Merit, in Class B, for meritorious services attended with personal risk.

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith the report of the Bureau of Fire Marshal, boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, for the year ending December 31, 1905.

I recommend that sufficient appropriation be made for the year 1907 so as to provide for the following staff:

One Fire Marshal.
Two Assistant Fire Marshals.

Two Inspectors.

One Clerk with a knowledge of Hebrew.

One Clerk.

One Stenographer.

This Bureau is in great need of two Patrolmen, skilled in the securing of legal evidence in arson cases, and I respectfully request that requisition be made on the Commissioner of Police to furnish same.

The records of this Bureau could both be improved and simplified by installing a "Card Index" system, as set forth in the reports of 1902-3. I respectfully call your attention to the great increase of the work of this Bureau since 1898, the year of consolidation.

The appropriation for the year 1900 for this Bureau was \$13,800, and the office force consisted of the following:

One Fire Marshal.
Two Assistant Fire Marshals.

Two Inspectors.

One Clerk.

One Stenographer.

Two Patrolmen detailed from the Department of Police.

The population has increased about 450,000; the number of buildings over 45,000; the number of fires has increased over 1,200. The above ratio of increase will continue each year, and the necessity for increasing the working force of this Bureau is apparent.

Report of Chief of Battalion in Charge of Supplies, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

Charged with receiving and examining, and the custody and issuing of forage, fuel, kerosene oil, bedsteads, bedding, furniture and general supplies, to the various quarters, companies and offices in the paid system within the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, and the issuing of forage, coal, horse blankets and such other supplies as the Commissioner or Deputy Commissioner may from time to time order, to the Volunteer System in the Borough of Queens. The following statement shows in part the work done and transactions in and about the office and storeroom during the year ending December 31, 1905. Attention is respectfully called to the want of space in the storeroom for the proper handling and inspection of supplies therein. Notwithstanding the increase in number and variety of the supplies required in the service the storeroom space has been so diminished that the space left is inadequate. More space for storing and handling supplies is earnestly requested.

All articles are separately and carefully examined when received, and, if found in all respects up to standard, are accepted, taken into stock, and an accurate account kept of each article; they are issued upon requisition only. There were 2,825 requisitions received from Engine and Hook and Ladder Companies, Deputy Chiefs, Chiefs of Battalion, and other officers. These requisitions are carefully scrutinized and recom-

mended made that item be allowed (or disallowed), and, after approval, articles allowed are issued and invoiced, 1,846 invoices having been drawn. Articles when received are receipted for, and 1,846 receipts were drawn, sent out and returned.

A communication was presented from the Board of Coroners, Borough of Queens, dated June 21, requesting approval of a leave of absence without pay for two months granted Dr. Benjamin G. Strong, Coroner's Physician, on account of illness, and asking the consent of the Commission to employ Dr. John C. Teas, of Flushing, as Coroner's Physician, in Dr. Strong's absence. The leave of absence was approved, and there being no eligible list for Coroner's Physician from which names could be certified for temporary employment, the Chief Examiner was directed to summon Dr. Teas for non-competitive examination to qualify him for service as Coroner's Physician for a period of two months, in the office of the Board of Coroners, Borough of Queens.



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
