Contracts.

The total number of contracts executed and registered was 28, apportioned as follows: Bureau of Highways, 23; amount, \$203,031.79. Bureau of Sewers, 5; amount, \$3,059.64. Total, \$206,091.43.

There were 31 contracts completed during the quarter, aggregating \$823,155.54; and work is going on in connection with 43 contracts, aggregating \$1,681,772.62, on which \$990,146.58 in payments have been made. There are 11 contracts, reprseenting an estimated cost of \$182,045.05, awarded but not registered.

Thirty-five assessment lists were forwarded to the Board of Assessors.

Bureau of Highways.

The total mileage of pavement in the Borough on December 31, 1914, was 182,500 miles, of which 0.282 miles were Medina block; 46.832 miles granite block; 52,989 miles of sheet asphalt; 59.360 miles asphalt block; 4.376 miles wood block; 0.039 miles brick; 1.545 miles iron slag pavement; 0.077 miles trap; 17.000 miles bituminous pave-

The total amount of pavement laid was 0.574 miles, as follows: Sheet asphalt, 0.574; asphalt block decrease, 0.463; net increase during quarter, 0.111 miles.

Bureau of Sewers. There were built 4,333.1 feet, equalling 0.821 miles, of vitrified pipe sewers from 12 in. to 30 in. in diameter; 4,713.3 linear feet, equalling 0.892 miles, of concrete sewers from 29 in. to 40 in. in diameter to double 8 ft. 6 in. by 8 ft. 0 in., making a total of 9,046.4 linear feet, or 1.713 miles, thus making the total mileage of the sewerage system 344.739 miles.

Seventeen basins were built, making a total of 3,837 basins connected with the sewerage system.

Highways-Maintenance.

Mileage of Streets in Use-Permanent pavement, 182,500; macadam pavement,

123.000; earth roads, 144.500; total, 450.000.

Earth roads and unpaved streets to the extent of 144.50 miles in length and an average width of 30 feet were cleaned and repaired or graded where necessary.

Macadam-Pavement, repaired, tarvia surface, 4,989 square yards; pavement resurfaced with stone and screenings, 17,710 square yards; pavement repaired, 19,223 square yards; pavement cleaned (including gutters), 123 miles.

Square Yards Paving-Granite pavement on sand relaid (surface only), 14,666; granite pavement on concrete grout joints (surface only), 973; granite block pavement on concrete, grout joints (surface and base), 350; wood block pavement repaired (surface only), 138; wood block pavement repaired (surface and base), 31; asphalt block pavement relaid (surface only), 544; granite block pavement, tar and gravel (surface only), 3,262; granite block pavement, tar and gravel (surface and base), 1,159; block asphalt pavement (surface and base), 16.

Street Signs—Painted and erected, 170; sign posts set, 1,274; "Street Closed"

signs painted, 5; school signs erected, 12,

Street Oiling-Macadam roads treated with tar road oil, 301,450 square yards. Experimental asphalt road oil applications, 3,292 square yards.


