

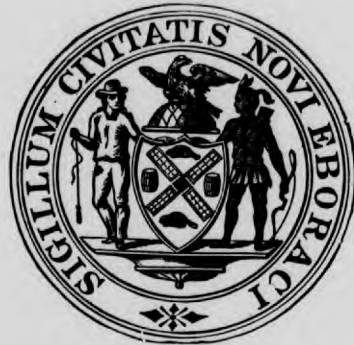

JAMES E. MORRISON, Esq., *Secretary of the Mayor*:

SIR—I have received your letter of November 26th, inclosing an ordinance to regulate the erection of telegraph lines in the City of New York, and requesting me to inform his Honor the Mayor whether the Common Council have the right to pass such an ordinance.

The ordinance in question provides:

1. Where telegraph posts may be located within the public streets.
2. That such posts shall be painted, and that the name of the owner thereof shall be branded or painted thereon.

3. That an offense against the ordinance shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine, and in default of the payment of such fine, by imprisonment not exceeding ten days.

I am of the opinion that the ordinance is within the powers conferred upon the Common Council, and may be lawfully enacted.

1. The charter provides (section 17) that the Common Council shall have power to make such ordinances as may be necessary to carry into effect any or all of the powers now vested in, or by this act conferred upon, the corporation, and enforce obedience thereto by ordaining penalties for violation thereof, in such sums as it may deem expedient, not exceeding one hundred dollars.

2. In the same section the Common Council is authorized "to regulate the use of the streets and sidewalks for signs, sign-posts, awnings, awning-posts, horse-troughs, urinals, and telegraph-posts, and other purposes."

3. By section 21 of chapter 11, Laws of 1833, it is provided that all persons offending against certain ordinances shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or, in default of the payment of such fine, by imprisonment, provided such imprisonment does not exceed ten days.

4. By section 5 of article 4 of chapter 228 of the Laws of 1853, it is provided that the provisions of the last recited action shall apply to all penal ordinances passed by the Common Council. The ordinance referred to seems to be within the provision of the statute herein before recited.

SIR—I have received your letter of January 19, communicating the request of the Mayor for my advice "Whether the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or either of them, can now lawfully meet and transact business, in view of the fact that the Board of Aldermen for 1881 has not chosen a President, who will be a member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or a Chairman of the Finance Committee, who will be a Commissioner of the Sinking Fund."

First. The Board of Apportionment is created by section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, which prescribes that it shall be composed of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The statute further provides that the provisional estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business shall be adopted by the affirmative vote of all the members; that the Board may authorize the issue of stocks and bonds, for the purpose of taking up, at maturity, any stocks or bonds outstanding, by the affirmative vote of three members; that the Board may authorize the issue of stocks and bonds, authorized by law to be issued, by the affirmative vote of three members.

It is plain that the duties of the Board which require the sanction of the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, cannot be performed while the vacancy in the office of President of the Board of Aldermen remains unfilled.

A different question is, however, presented with respect to the performance of the public duties which, under the provisions of the statute cited, require only the sanction of the votes of three members of the Board.

A similar question was discussed by the General Term of the Court of Common Pleas in *Gildersleeve* against The Board of Education (17 Abb., 201), where the Court says, as follows:

"Where in matters of a private nature a power is to be exercised by certain designated individuals all must concur in its exercise, and death, absence, or inability of any one of them, will not make the execution of the power by the remainder of them valid."

"But where powers to be exercised as a continuous public trust or duty are confided to designated persons, the discharge of the public duty or trust is not to be interrupted or fail through the death, absence, or inability of any of the persons to whom the exercise of it is entrusted, provided there is a sufficient number to confer together, deliberate, and in view of the possibility of division of opinion, to decide upon what course is to be adopted."

The powers and duties of the Board of Apportionment are a continuous public trust or duty, and therefore should not be interrupted or allowed to fail through the inability of any of the persons to whom the exercise of such powers is entrusted, provided a sufficient number of the designated persons remains to fulfill the requisition of the statute in relation to the number of votes by which their action is to be sanctioned.

It seems to me, therefore, that the Board of Apportionment may meet and perform the duties which require only three votes to constitute a valid action.

Second.—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund consist of five officers, enumerated in the ordinance.

The ordinance, however, provides (section 54): "Any four or more of the persons named in the preceding section of this title, of whom the Comptroller shall be one, shall be and are hereby authorized to discharge the trusts and duties vested in them by this article."

I see no reason to doubt, therefore, that the Mayor, Recorder, Comptroller and Chamberlain, may lawfully exercise the powers of the Commissioners during the vacancy in the office of Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen.

There shall not be a public or church funeral of any person who has died of small-pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, yellow fever, typhus fever, or Asiatic cholera, but the funeral of such person shall be private; and it shall not be lawful to invite, or permit at the funeral of any person who has died of any of the above diseases, or of any contagious or pestilential disease, or at any services connected therewith, any persons whose attendance is not necessary, or to whom there is danger of contagion thereby.

The Act, chapter 123, Laws of 1880, containing these provisions of law, is published below.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The Comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
