

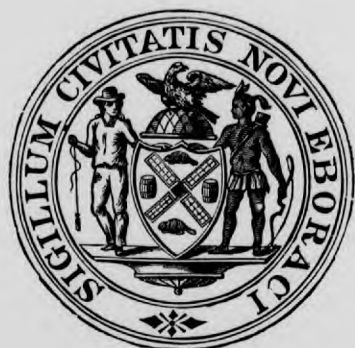

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 25, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,457.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 337.

During the past week 130 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 41 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 6 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 8 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 30 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 422 visits were made, and 38 disinfections and 12 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 10.

The number of vaccinations performed was 817, of which 433 were primary, and 384 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned, 11,245 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 45, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 11.

The certificates of 497 births, 62 still-births, 190 marriages, and 805 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 25, 1886. This shows a decrease of 78 births and 62 marriages, and an increase of 10 still-births and 10 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 74 births, 58 marriages and 167 deaths, and a decrease of 13 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 5; diphtheria, 3; croup, 10; typhoid fever, 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 10; cancer, 1; heart diseases, 2; convulsions, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 7; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 3; erysipelas, 1; mania, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 10; bronchitis, 7; pneumonia, 6; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 8; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 6; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 1; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from whooping-cough, malarial fevers, alcoholism and rheumatism and gout was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 152 were in institutions, 482 in tenement-houses, 150 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 135 on the first, 193 on the second, 171 on the third, 104 on the fourth, 28 on the fifth, 5 on the sixth; 782 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 23 non-residents; 94 were stated to be single, 209 married, 91 widowed, and the condition of 413 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week were as follows, viz.: City deaths, 805; still-births, 62; bodies in transitu, 11; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 87 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 497 births, 190 marriages, 62 still-births, 805 deaths; 11 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 116 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 1 transcript of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 78 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending December 25, 1886, was 35.7 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 30.037; the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,012, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.20 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 757 deaths and still-births, or 87.31 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 24; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 325; City, pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 86; Greenwood (undenominational), 48; Lutheran (undenominational), 117; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 14; Evergreen (undenominational), 48; Woodlawn (undenominational), 25; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 26; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 13; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 9; Washington (undenominational), 12.

The actual mortality for the week ending December 18, 1886, was 811; this is 191 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1885, and 181.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.90 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,459,000.

It will be seen that, while the cost of food supplies has in one of the six months periods run as low as 28% cents per day for each person, the cost for the entire period of thirty months, has been a little above the average for the last six months. These figures include the provisions furnished to the Resident Physicians and their corps of assistants, as well as the patients at all the hospitals.

I have been unable to find statistics of cost of feeding inmates of a public institution when the conditions were exactly the same as those in our hospitals. For purposes of comparison, however, the following detailed estimate of cost of a "fair day's ration" for a mechanic in the Middle and Eastern States is quoted from Edward Atkinson's article on "Food Supply, etc.," in the December number of the "Century" magazine, showing items of substantial food only, without delicacies of any kind, at a cost of 25 cents per day, which is probably the minimum figure at which good food can be furnished.

To the Board of Health, Health Department, New York City:

In the matter of a petition dated November 24th ultimo, signed by twenty-five citizens, asking that the occupants of the premises, No. 122 East Thirty-seventh street, be removed therefrom, and that said premises may not be occupied or used for the purpose of an hospital; referred to the Sanitary Committee of the Board of Health.

Your Committee have the honor to report:

That the premises, No. 122 East Thirty-seventh street, are occupied by Dr. H. Marion Sims of this City, a surgeon of repute, as a private hospital for the treatment exclusively of surgical diseases of women, the patients being non-residents of New York, who otherwise would be lodged in hotels or boarding-houses, and that the capacity of the house permits of the reception of only sixteen (16) such patients at any one time.

Two other such private hospitals devoted to the same purpose exist in this City; that of Professor Thomas in Lexington avenue, near Fifty-second street, has been in use for the past four (4) years; and that of Dr. Emmett in Madison avenue, near Twenty-ninth street, has been in use for thirty-three (33) years. There is no record or complaint that either of these two hospitals has been a nuisance to the neighborhood or the source of any contamination of adjacent dwellings.

With this instructive experience to refer to and knowing that this class of diseases demands absolute cleanliness and sanitary surroundings for their successful treatment your Committee respectfully recommend that the petition be denied.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
