

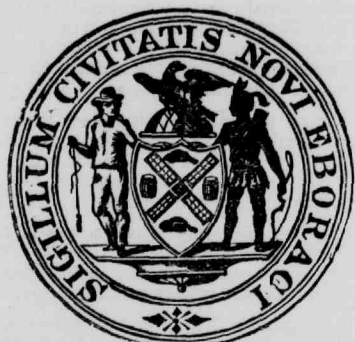

Referred to the Attorney.

The violation of law in the plumbing and drainage of houses on the north side of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, 300 feet west of Sixth avenue, was referred to the Attorney to secure compliance with the law.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 5, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,220, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 601 tenement houses, 77 private dwellings, 24 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 38 stables, 54 slaughter-houses, 1 brewery, 1 public sewer, 1 foundry, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 18 sunken and vacant lots, 25 yards, courts and areas, 53 cellars and basements, 152 waste-pipes and drains, 120 privies and water-closets, 11 streets, gutters and sinks, 5 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 5 cess-pools, 7 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 514.

During the past week 235 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

86 permits were granted consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

189 permits were granted scavengers to empty, cleanse and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 79 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 75 houses, 75 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

2 cases of contagious diseases were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 551 births, 40 still-births, 153 marriages, and 939 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 5, 1882. This shows an increase of 99 births, 4 still-births and 46 marriages, and a decrease of 278 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 26 births, 4 still-births, 13 marriages and 101 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small pox decreased 3; measles, 6; scarlatina, 4; diphtheria, 1; croup, 9; whooping cough, 10; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; malarial fevers, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 172; inanition, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 8; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 2; heart diseases, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 7; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; convulsions, 7; apoplexy, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 15; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 7; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 1; drowning, 1; while the deaths from typhus fever increased 1; typhoid fever, 1; alcoholism, 5; aneurism, 1; direct effect of solar heat, 11; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5. The number of deaths from puerperal diseases, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, and premature and preterm births was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 364 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 467 under two years; 508 under five years; and 46 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 261 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 54.10 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 163 were in institutions, 531 in tenement-houses, 227 in houses containing three families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 180 on the first, 241 on the second, 177 on the third, 107 on the fourth, 43 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 928 were stated to be residents of New York City and 11 non-residents; 70 were stated to be single, 172 married, 74 widowed, and the condition of 623 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 939; still-births, 40; bodies in transit, 20. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 103 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 551 births, 153 marriages, 40 still-births, 939 deaths, 20 applications for transit permits, were recorded, indexed, and tabulated; 58 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 39 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 5, 1882, was 74.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.037, the mean humidity was 86, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 866, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.01 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 847 deaths and still-births, or 86.52 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 18; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 333; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 117; Greenwood (undenominational), 70; Lutheran (undenominational), 143; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 21; Evergreen (undenominational), 51; Woodlawn (undenominational), 26; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 21; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 1; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 9; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 14; Washington (undenominational), 19.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending July 29, 1882, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 19; Second, 2; Third, 8; Fourth, 19; Fifth, 25; Sixth, 14; Seventh, 42; Eighth, 34; Ninth, 42; Tenth, 38; Eleventh, 62; Twelfth, 143; Thirteenth, 32; Fourteenth, 35; Fifteenth, 13; Sixteenth, 38; Seventeenth, 87; Eighteenth, 61; Nineteenth, 243; Twentieth, 92; Twenty-first, 107; Twenty-second, 95; Twenty-third, 41; Twenty-fourth, 19.

The actual mortality for the week ending July 29, 1882, was 1,311; this is 492 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 621.8 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 53.16 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,282,394.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau, for the week ending August 12, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1587, as follows, viz.: 589 tenement houses, 111 private dwellings, 62 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 37 stables, 54 slaughter-houses, 3 lodging-houses, 1 pier, 1 public sewer, 1 brewery, 1 glycerine works, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 1 roadway, 1 lard rendering establishment, 43 yards, courts and areas, 79 cellars and basements, 186 waste pipes and drains, 215 privies and water-closets, 19 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 8 smoky chimneys, 9 cesspools, 11 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 541.

During the past week 255 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

83 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, in vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

156 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 79 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 74 houses, 74 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 507 births, 52 still-births, 189 marriages, and 828 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 12, 1882, this shows a decrease of 44 births and 111 deaths, and an increase of 12 still-births and 36 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was a decrease of 53 births and 21 deaths, and an increase of 11 still-births and 56 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 1; diphtheria, 4; typhoid fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 80; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 8; rheumatism and gout, 4; pneumonia 9; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 3; direct effect of solar heat, 32; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 53; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; whooping cough, 11; erysipelas, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 6; malarial fevers, 3; cancers, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 8; heart disease, 1; marasmus, tabes, mesenterica and scrofula, 8; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; premature and preterm births, 8; suicide 2, and drowning 3. The number of deaths from measles, croup and typhus fever was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 163 were in institutions, 437 in tenement-houses, 207 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 17 were on the basement floor, 168 on the first, 201 on the second, 149 on the third, 84 on the fourth, 29 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 818 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 10 non-residents; 58 were stated to be single, 150 married, 64 widowed, and the condition of 556 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 828; still-births, 52; bodies in transit, 23; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 85 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 507 births; 189 marriages; 52 still-births; 828 deaths; 23 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 66 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 11 transcripts of the birth record, 2 of marriage, and 39 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 12, 1882, was 76.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.811, the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,136, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.02 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Christopher street basin, corner Grove street.

Eighty-fifth street sewer, between Eighth and Ninth avenues.

Lexington avenue sewer, between Eighty-first and Eighty-second streets.

Tenth avenue sewer, between Forty-nine and Fiftieth streets.

Eighty-first street sewer, between Ninth avenue and Summit West.

One Hundred and Twelfth street sewer, between Madison and Sixth avenues.

Sixty-ninth street sewer, between Eighth and Ninth avenues.

Seventy-sixth street sewer, between Eighth and Tenth avenues.

Fifty-seventh street sewer, between Fifth and Madison avenues.

New avenue (West) sewer and One Hundred and Twenty-second street, between One Hundred and Sixteenth street and Tenth avenue, etc.

Ninth avenue and New avenue sewer, between One Hundred and Fifteenth and Manhattan streets.

One Hundred and Tenth street sewer, between New and Ninth avenues, etc.

Section 5 of the said act provides that, "If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment."

The above assessments are payable to the Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears, at the "Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," from 9 A. M. until 2 P. M., and all payments made thereon, on or before Sept. 13, 1882, will be exempt from interest as above provided, and after that date will be subject to a charge of interest at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments in said Bureau.

NOTICE.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS,
Nos. 117 and 119 DUANE STREET,
NEW YORK, April 22, 1882.

RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED
for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provision of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks, and published, to take effect on and after
MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent, of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any such structure, erection, or obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occupant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unladen, after service by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee, master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally and respectively.

No. 4.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for

the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper, or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and every day, during which any part of said cargo shall remain upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after the expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be recovered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every kind encumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such property, and all expense incurred for such removal and storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any engine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under a permit of the Board, on any unshedded pier, or other wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day which may elapse before the discontinuance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper planking be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof, but if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel unless canvas or similar material be extended from the vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which such vessel is being unladen, to prevent the falling of the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the sand dumped thereon from going through into the water, then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel, unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure, or other property, from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or if any such substance be thrown from any vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed, on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department, shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be, fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise ordered by the Board.

No. 14.—The term "Board," when used in the foregoing rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York," and the term "Corporation," when so used, shall be taken to mean "The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York."

ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

THE COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED BY CHAP-

The notice must specify the particular assessment complained of, the date of the confirmation of the same, the property affected thereby, and in a brief and concise manner the objections thereto, showing, or tending to show, that the assessment was unfair or unjust in respect to said real estate.
