AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, January 13, 1892, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of vouchers Nos. 7585 to 7591, inclusive, amounting to \$19,296.01; also of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 7592 to 7604, inclusive, amounting to \$718.99.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following opinion, received from the Counsel to the Corporation:

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, January 11, 1892.

JOHN C. SHEEHAN, Esq., Secretary of the Aqueduct Commissioners:

SIR—I have received your letter of July 20, 1891, enclosing a copy of the letter of L. Laflin Kellogg, Esq., representing certain Aqueduct contractors, requesting the payment of certain sums of money which have been retained by the City out of moneys earned by the contractors in the construction of the New Aqueduct.

The sums referred to have been retained from the amount earned, as shown by the Engineer's certificate upon the respective contracts, as damages sustained by the City in consequence of the delay of the contractors in finishing the work.

The several contracts provided a specified limit of time within which the contractors agreed to complete the work done thereunder.

The several contracts further provided that, in case of non-completion within the stipulated time, the contractors should become liable to a charge of \$1,000 per day as liquidated damages.

In 1890 the question was raised in relation to the liability of the contractors to such damages, and was considered by Mr. James C. Carter, whose opinion in relation thereto, concurred in by myself, was transmitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners, under date of June 5, 1890.

In that opinion the effect of alterations in the Aqueduct and additional work thereby made necessary was considered, and the conclusion was expressed that in consequence of such alterations the stipulations contained in the contracts for liquidated damages were not enforceable.

Mr. Carter, however, advised that a sum equal to the losses which the City could be shown to have sustained by reason of the failure should be retained, and the sums referred to were so retained as indemnity to the City for the salaries of Commissioners, Engineers, Assistants, office rent and necessary supervision during the period of delay.

The litigation then imminent, in respect to the large claims made by the contractors for work which has not been allowed in the Engineer's certificate, has since been brought before the Court in an action by O'Brien & Clark, contractors for several of the sections of the Aqueduct.

In the action which was tried the City set up as a portion of its defense its claim for such losses and expenses.

Upon the trial, the plaintiffs failed to recover the claims for work not covered by the Engineer's certificate; judgment was directed for the amounts certified, and the counterclaim indicated was not sustained. It is now deemed expedient by Messrs. Root & Fox, by whom the trial was conducted, to acquiesce in this result. I concur in this opinion, and advise you that the moneys so retained should be paid to the contractors.

Whereas, The Aqueduct Commissioners, in accepting the several sections of the New Aqueduct and directing vouchers to be prepared for the final payment for work done and materials furnished under the several contracts for said sections, requested the Comptroller to deduct from the amounts shown on said final estimates certain sums of money to reimburse the City for the actual loss or damage provable upon said sections for superintending said work from the date of the last extension of time for the completion of said work up to the date when said sections, respectively, were accepted; and,

Whereas, The Counsel to the Corporation, under date of January 11, 1892, has advised this Commission that in a trial of an action brought by certain contractors for sums claimed to be due upon one of said sections, judgment was directed for the whole amount included in the final estimate, and the counterclaim of the City was not sustained; and has further advised this Commission that it is deemed expedient by the counsel by whom said trial was conducted, and by the Counsel to the Corporation himself, to acquiesce in such decision; and has further advised that the moneys so retained should be paid to the contractors; therefore,

Resolved, That a copy of the aforesaid opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation be transmitted to the Comptroller, and that he be and hereby is advised to pay to the several contractors for sections of the New Aqueduct which have been accepted and for which final estimates have been certified to him, the several amounts heretofore requested to be retained to reimburse the City for the actual loss or damage provable upon each of said sections, respectively, for superintending the work from the date of the last extension of time for the completion of said work up to the date when said sections were finally accepted, said amounts and sections being as follows:

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The Chief Engineer of this Commission has certified to this Commission in writing that, in his opinion, John Fox has completely performed and carried out the provisions of the agreement made by him with this Commission, as per resolution of the 21st day of May, 1890, for furnishing six 2 by 5 feet sluice gates similar to those furnished for the One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Gate-house of the New Croton Aqueduct, including frames, valves or other movable parts, guides, stems, couplings, etc., for Bog Brook and Sodom Dams; and has stated from actual measurements the whole amount of work done and materials furnished under and according to the terms of said agreement, and of the true value thereof; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by John Fox under the agreement above referred to, and direct that a proper voucher for the final payment for work done and materials furnished under said agreement be approved by the Commissioners, and certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following preamble and resolution :
Whereas, On the 6th day of January, 1892, William H. Baker, contractor for building the head-house and engine-room superstructure at Shaft No. 25, on Section No. 12 of the New Aqueduct, in a written communication addressed to the Aqueduct Commissioners requested their consent to the assignment of said contract to John Peirce, of the City of New York ; and the Chief Engineer of the Aqueduct Commissioners having reported in favor of said assignment, and the agreement made by said William H. Baker assigning said work and all the estimates and moneys now due under the contract for doing said work to said John Peirce being now before the Aqueduct Commissioners, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do hereby assent and consent to the assignment of the work of construction of building the head-house and engine-room superstructure at Shaft No. 25, on Section No. 12 of the New Aqueduct, to said John Peirce, and also assent and consent to the assignment of the moneys that now are or hereafter may become effectual ; and provided also that the bondsmen of said William H. Baker shall consent in writing to the subletting of said contract and the assignment of said moneys, and agree that the same shall not impair or affect their liabilities for the faithful performance of said contract by said William H. Baker or by his said assignee.

The same was adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

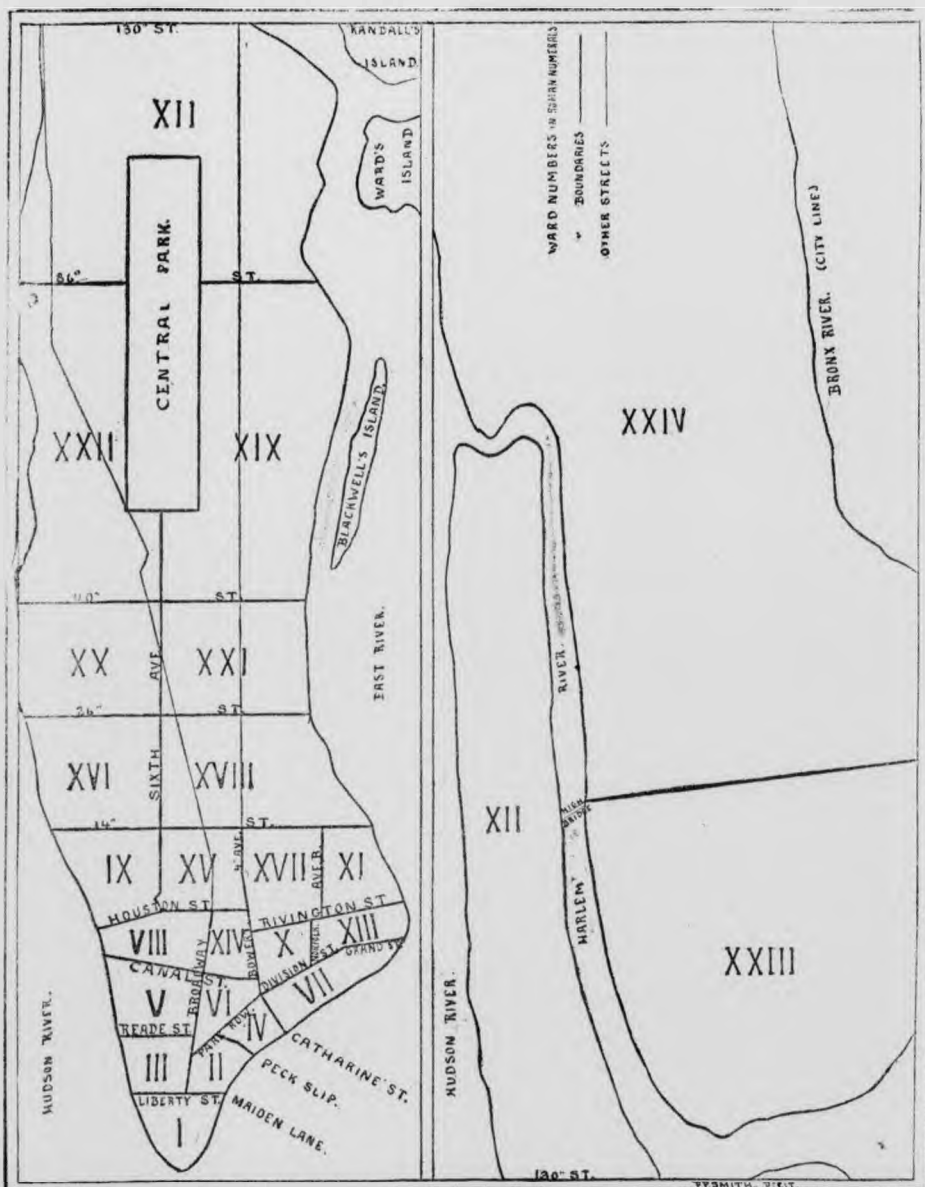

The 969 deaths represent a death-rate of 29.63, against 27.20 for the previous week and 24.06 for the corresponding week of 1890.

Contagious and infectious diseases show an increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever and typhoid fever respectively being 125, 117, 224 and 13, against 152, 83, 196 and 12 for the previous week, a total of 479 against 443, the increase being in measles and scarlet fever. Diphtheria increased between Park Row and Division street and the East river, between Canal and Houston streets, west of Broadway, and between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, West, the changes elsewhere tending towards decrease. Measles increased between Division and Rivington streets, east of Norfolk street, between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, west of Avenue B, and between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, East and West, decreasing, as a rule, elsewhere. Scarlet fever increased markedly between Division street and East river, between Division and Rivington streets, west of Norfolk street, between Houston and Canal streets, the Bowery and Broadway, between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, West, between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, above Eighty-sixth street, from river to river, and in the lower part of the annexed district, varying little elsewhere; 8 of the cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 3 of the remaining 5 below Fourteenth street.
