#### RESOLUTIONS.

"§ 15. The owner or occupant, or person having charge of each house or other building, or lot or lots of ground in the City of New York, shall, within the first four hours after every fall of snow, or hail, or rain, which shall freeze on the sidewalks and in the gutters, cause the same to be removed entirely from the sidewalks opposite such house, building, lot, or land, under the penalty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, occupant, or person having charge, severally and respectively."

"§ 16. In case the ice or snow shall be so concealed that it cannot be removed without injury to the pavement, the owner, occupant, or person having charge of any building, lot, or land as aforesaid, shall, within the first four hours after every fall thereof, cause the sidewalks opposite his, her, or their premises to be strewed with ashes or sand, under the penalty of one dollar, to be paid by the owner or occupant, or person having charge thereof, severally and respectively."

MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, January 28, 1875.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—The subject of ready communication between the several quarters of the City has received much attention, and has been fully discussed during the past few years.

The necessity for rapid transit is now generally recognized, and the question which confronts us to-day is of selection between the several practical methods proposed for accomplishing it.

That, when some proper means of rapid transit shall have been ascertained, it will have an important influence in retaining here the wealth which is created by the enterprise of our citizens, and in stopping the stream of population which has set so strong from the City during ten years past, has been strenuously maintained. And it may, I think, be now safely assumed that the discussions of the subject have produced a concurrence of opinions on these cardinal points: that any substantial improvement upon the present inadequate means of transportation and travel within the City will be effective in developing the growth and general prosperity of the City, and in enabling us the more easily to bear our present heavy burden of debt and taxation; that the work should be constructed, if practicable, by private capital, and not by the City; that capitalists should be encouraged to undertake the enterprise by permission to select routes along which business is likely to be profitable; that the roads should be built upon a system which will not only connect the localities in which are residences with the business quarters, but reach the points at which travelers arrive in or depart from the city; that the construction of a road along an avenue or street will not necessarily, even temporarily, depreciate, but, in the end, will enhance the value of neighboring property; and that the owners of premises situated on the route should regard that result, and their share of the great benefit to our community at large, as compensation for what they may have expected to be for a time a local disadvantage.

At the present time the conditions upon which assistance can be had from the State Legislature differ from those of previous years. The recent amendments to the Constitution seem to prohibit the Legislature from granting a special charter for

construction of such roads as are here contemplated, and to forbid the municipality from contributing from its own funds to aid such an enterprise in the hands of private parties. The general laws which the amendments to the Constitution contemplate to meet the cases in which special legislation is prohibited, have not yet been enacted or framed; but so far as the scope and terms of such laws can be foreseen, the power of legislation on this subject will, in effect, be ultimately devolved upon the Common Council. The matter thus comes with great force to your attention.

My own views upon the subject were suggested to you in my message of the 4th instant, and I am quite ready to support and further any reasonable measure to attain the object.

It will probably be found that energetic capitalists are prepared to build the road, and that advantageous lines and economic modes of construction can be selected and determined.

I recommend that you give prompt consideration to this subject, and that you appoint a committee with instructions to investigate it thoroughly by hearing all the parties more particularly interested, and thereupon to report at an early day such measures as are ascertained to be most feasible and best adapted to the necessary conditions of such a work.

Effectual relief from our present difficulties may be thus secured, and it is only by the Common Council, that measures can be initiated to meet the popular demand for some action in the premises by the City Government.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, January 28, 1875.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—The questions of Assessment and Taxation are of recurring and increasing interest. There is no man so poor that his comfort and welfare are not affected by them. Assurance that the burden of taxation is equally distributed does much to reconcile the tax-payer to the demands of government upon him; and with anything short of that, he is not, and ought not, to be content.

In my message to you of the 4th instant, I referred to this subject and to the facts that, under the laws at present in force, the City of New York is required to pay more than its just share of the State tax, and that the contributions, exacted from us for the Common Schools, Asylums, and Reformatories supported by the State, must be admitted to be unreasonably large when it is remembered that we have besides to maintain our own Public Schools and Charities at the expense of the local tax-payers.

These questions of assessment and taxation will probably be brought in a short time before the Legislature in a report of a Committee appointed at the last Session.

Upon the facts and arguments submitted to that Committee, this community has a right to expect the recognition of principles and the adoption of measures which will assure to us substantial justice in the distribution of taxation. But the interests involved in the final settlement of these questions are so important as to demand from you immediate and prompt action, and I respectfully recommend the appointment of a Committee of the Common Council to represent the City of New York before the Legislature, or before any Committee of either House of that body which may have in charge measures relating to the matter of taxation. This seems the more necessary because of the fact that, while this City pays more than half of the entire State tax, we have no representative in the Board of State Assessors, which is composed of three gentlemen appointed from counties of which the aggregate assessment is less than one-fifth of that of this City alone.

To you, then, I commend this subject, well assured that you will appreciate its importance, and that you will act wisely and promptly upon it.


