

ELECTION MINUTES.

At a meeting of the Board of Police of The City of New York, held on the 25th day of May, 1898. Present—Commissioners York (President), Sexton and Hess. The minutes of May 21 were read and approved. Whereas, The Chairman of the Democratic-Republican General Committee of the Democratic Party of the County of New York has certified to this Police Board, as custodian of Primary Records,

First—That the Democratic County General Committee of the County of New York shall be composed of delegates elected from each Assembly District of the County of New York, and that the membership of the Democratic County General Committee, according to its now existing rules and regulations, is 5,710. Further, That the delegates to said Committee shall be elected at large within each Assembly

District.

Second—That there shall be in each Assembly District in New York County an Assembly District Convention to be composed of delegates elected at large within each such Assembly District for the purpose of electing delegates and alternates to the next Democratic State Convention.

Convention. Third—That the Assembly District shall be the unit of representation to all conventions within the county and of the County General Committee, excepting that the ten election districts of the Annexed District, which are a part of the First and Second Assembly Districts of Westchester County, be together made the unit of representation to all conventions and of the County General Committee ; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of the Primary Election Law, the Police Board, as custodian of the Primary Records, do determine and apportion and do adjudge and determine that the membership of the Democratic County General Committee of New York County shall be 5,662, and do apportion such to each respective Assembly District as follows :

LONG ISLAND CITY, June 17, 1898.

To the Local Board, Borough of Queens, City of New York: GENTLEMEN—The committee to whom was referred the subject matter of complaint filed by D. S. Jones & Co. against Long Island Railroad Company, as to its occupancy of the northerly one-half of First street, in Long Island City, now First Ward, this borough, hereby make report as follows :

follows: From personal observation, it is a fact that the Long Island Railroad has inclosed with a high board fence running through centre line of said street and resting upon the sewer manhole covers therein, all the land between said fence line and the southerly line of the block lying north of said centre line. That within said fence and to the building line of said block, the width is thirty (30) feet, and such is from Vernon avenue to West avenue along said block ; is occupied by numerous railroad tracks upon which railroad cars are kept stored by said Long Island Railroad Company. That, by reason of said fence, the necessary free access to the sewer in said street by way of its manholes is barred against the Department of Sewers. That it is not denied that the manholes to said sewer are filled up to the top with dirt so that the said public sewer has thereby become inoperative. That the curbing and paving of said street is beneath a heavy accumulation of dirt, or was dumped thereon, whereby such improvements have been rendered useless. That in support of claim that said street is a public highway the following has been offered for consideration :

"And also the lands fronting the said premises to the south to the centre of the said First street and to the north to the centre of the said West Second street. "And also the right and privilege to lay down and maintain a track on the north side of

street and to the north to the centre of the said West Second street. "And also the right and privilege to lay down and maintain a track on the north side of First street west of Central avenue, and to use the same for the purpose of a railroad with the right to run locomotives on First street west of Central avenue. That the said Long Island Railroad Company, its successors and assigns, shall not permit railroad cars to be left standing in any of the streets longer than necessary for loading and unloading, and will not exercise the exclusive right to run cars on said First street. The Covenant of Warranty of quiet enjoyment shall not apply to the right and privilege to lay tracks on said streets nor the right to run locomotives." The complainant further contends that for the improvement of the streets to the centre of the same fronting the premises of the Long Island Railroad Company, lying on the north side of the said First street, from Central avenue to West avenue, there was assessed upon said land the sum of \$10,328.06, which said company paid to the Treasurer of Long Island City on the 17th day of November, 1879, holding that such payment is an acknowledgment that First street was a public highway, and that for more than twenty years last past the said street lying between Vernon and West avenues aforesaid has been a public thoroughfare, especially for hauling heavy merchandise ; furthermore,

furthermore, That said First street is sixty feet wide as it runs from Central avenue (now Vernon) to West avenue, and has been a public street since the filing of the aforesaid maps, and has been maintained and repaired at public expense.
