

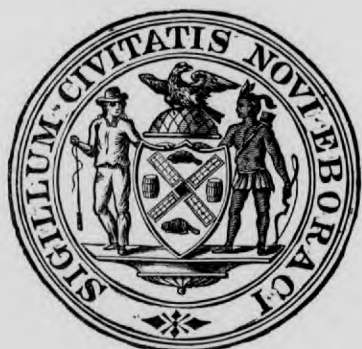

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH—CITY OF NEW YORK,
CENTRE, ELM, WHITE AND FRANKLIN STREETS,
BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, NEW YORK, July 12, 1898.

To the Honorable Board of Health:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to report that the health of the city during the first six months of the current year has been excellent. A comparison of the deaths in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx with the deaths for the corresponding period of 1897 gives the following results: The total deaths in 1898 were 19,113, against 19,509 in 1897, showing a decrease of 396 deaths and a death-rate of 18.66 in 1898, on an estimated population of 2,048,830, against 19.60 in 1897, on an estimated population of 1,990,562, and being lower than the number of deaths in the corresponding months of any previous year since 1886.

The deaths of children under five years of age, perhaps the best test of sanitary conditions, numbered 7,041 in 1898, as compared with 7,238 in 1897, a decrease of 197, notwithstanding the increase of population.

It will be noticed that the decrease in deaths from diphtheria and croup alone in 1898, as compared with 1897, amounts to 432, nearly 45 per cent., the total number of deaths from these diseases being the lowest, not only relatively but absolutely, since 1872, twenty-six years ago, a decrease which cannot be attributed to the waning of a cycle of morbidity, but can be accounted for only by the improvement in the methods of sanitary control, of which the chief are the use of antitoxin and the medical inspection of schools.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

ELECTION MINUTES.

At a meeting of the Board of Police of The City of New York, held on the 25th day of May, 1898.

Present—Commissioners York (President), Sexton and Hess.

The minutes of May 21 were read and approved.

Whereas, The Chairman of the Democratic-Republican General Committee of the Democratic Party of the County of New York has certified to this Police Board, as custodian of Primary Records,

First—That the Democratic County General Committee of the County of New York shall be composed of delegates elected from each Assembly District of the County of New York, and that the membership of the Democratic County General Committee, according to its now existing rules and regulations, is 5,710.

Further, That the delegates to said Committee shall be elected at large within each Assembly District.

Second—That there shall be in each Assembly District in New York County an Assembly District Convention to be composed of delegates elected at large within each such Assembly District for the purpose of electing delegates and alternates to the next Democratic State Convention.

Third—That the Assembly District shall be the unit of representation to all conventions within the county and of the County General Committee, excepting that the ten election districts of the Annexed District, which are a part of the First and Second Assembly Districts of Westchester County, be together made the unit of representation to all conventions and of the County General Committee; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of the Primary Election Law, the Police Board, as custodian of the Primary Records, do determine and apportion and do adjudge and determine that the membership of the Democratic County General Committee of New York County shall be 5,662, and do apportion such to each respective Assembly District as follows:

Resolved, By the Police Board, as custodian of Primary Records, that the ratio of representation of the Democratic Party in its County General Committee shall be one delegate for each three hundred and eighty-two votes, or the major part thereof, cast in the County of Kings at the general election in 1896 for the candidate for Governor on the Democratic ticket, and that such number of delegates consist for the County of Kings of two hundred and ten, and this Board of Police do apportion such delegates, as follows:

To the Local Board, Borough of Queens, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The committee to whom was referred the subject matter of complaint filed by D. S. Jones & Co. against Long Island Railroad Company, as to its occupancy of the northerly one-half of First street, in Long Island City, now First Ward, this borough, hereby make report as follows:

From personal observation, it is a fact that the Long Island Railroad has inclosed with a high board fence running through centre line of said street and resting upon the sewer manhole covers therein, all the land between said fence line and the southerly line of the block lying north of said centre line. That within said fence and to the building line of said block, the width is thirty (30) feet, and such is from Vernon avenue to West avenue along said block; is occupied by numerous railroad tracks upon which railroad cars are kept stored by said Long Island Railroad Company.

That, by reason of said fence, the necessary free access to the sewer in said street by way of its manholes is barred against the Department of Sewers.

That it is not denied that the manholes to said sewer are filled up to the top with dirt so that the said public sewer has thereby become inoperative.

That the curbing and paving of said street is beneath a heavy accumulation of dirt, or was dumped thereon, whereby such improvements have been rendered useless.

That in support of claim that said street is a public highway the following has been offered for consideration:

Extracts from deed by Trustees of Union College to Long Island Railroad Company.

"All that certain, lot piece or parcel of land situate at Long Island City, in the Town of Newtown and County of Queens and State of New York, which on a certain map of the Hunter Farm made by Charles Perkins, dated one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three.

"Beginning at the angle formed by the intersection of the west line of Central avenue with the north line of First street as shown on said map, running thence westerly along the northerly line of said First street, as the same runs, six hundred feet to the easterly line of West avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of said West avenue, as the same runs, one hundred and ninety feet to the south line of West Second street widened to eighty feet; thence easterly along said West Second street, as widened, six hundred feet to the westerly line of said Central avenue one hundred and ninety feet to the place of beginning.

"And also the lands fronting the said premises to the south to the centre of the said First street and to the north to the centre of the said West Second street.

"And also the right and privilege to lay down and maintain a track on the north side of First street west of Central avenue, and to use the same for the purpose of a railroad with the right to run locomotives on First street west of Central avenue. That the said Long Island Railroad Company, its successors and assigns, shall not permit railroad cars to be left standing in any of the streets longer than necessary for loading and unloading, and will not exercise the exclusive right to run cars on said First street. The Covenant of Warranty of quiet enjoyment shall not apply to the right and privilege to lay tracks on said streets nor the right to run locomotives."

The complainant further contends that for the improvement of the streets to the centre of the same fronting the premises of the Long Island Railroad Company, lying on the north side of the said First street, from Central avenue to West avenue, there was assessed upon said land the sum of \$10,328.06, which said company paid to the Treasurer of Long Island City on the 17th day of November, 1879, holding that such payment is an acknowledgment that First street was a public highway, and that for more than twenty years last past the said street lying between Vernon and West avenues aforesaid has been a public thoroughfare, especially for hauling heavy merchandise; furthermore,

That said First street is sixty feet wide as it runs from Central avenue (now Vernon) to West avenue, and has been a public street since the filing of the aforesaid maps, and has been maintained and repaired at public expense.

The following appears to us to have some relation to the subject, viz.: Chapter 765, Laws 1871, being "An Act to provide for the laying out of streets, avenues, roads and parks in Long Island City," provides—

That no compensation shall be allowed for any encroachment upon the line of any public street after the maps or survey of same have been filed according to law.

The plans and maps when made and filed shall be final as well upon the City as upon the owners and occupants of lands and upon all persons whomsoever.

In view of the foregoing, recommendation is made that a copy of the foregoing, duly certified, be transmitted to the Board of Public Improvement with request that it duly adopt the following directions:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Sewers be and he hereby is respectfully requested to cause the public sewer in First street, from Vernon avenue to the East river, to be thoroughly cleaned and the manhole heads, wherever required, to be replaced, and all obstructions to the free access of said manholes removed; also,

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Street Cleaning be and he is hereby respectfully requested to cause First street, from Vernon avenue to West avenue, in First Ward, this borough, to be cleaned from any and all incumbrances, fences and railroad tracks between the curb lines of said street, and the cleaning up of the dirt on same on the southerly sidewalk thereof.

In conclusion, would suggest that permit, subject to the pleasure of the proper authorities, be granted to said Long Island Railroad Company to erect a suitable fence in and along the curb line of the northerly sidewalk of said First street, from Vernon avenue to West avenue.

On motion, it was unanimously

Resolved, That the report of the committee as made upon the subject matter of complaint by D. S. Jones & Co., against Long Island Railroad Company as submitted, be approved and received, and its recommendations as therein set forth be and they are hereby adopted.

The following was also adopted:

Whereas, It appears by the minutes of the Common Council as per Resolution No. 1032, adopted June 18, 1895, that Taylor street and Hopkins avenue, in the First Ward, this borough, wherein to cause the construction of a public sewer (petition has been filed in this office) was by Anna E. Trowbridge, by deed dated February 16, 1895, conveyed to Long Island City, and by said Common Council on behalf of said city duly accepted thereof;

Resolved, That we hereby respectfully urge upon the Board of Public Improvements to take immediate action toward the prompt and speedy construction of such sewer, as also certified to the Board of Health as necessary to be done.

Communication received from Charles Benner dated June 16, 1898, in response to that of the President's of the 15th instant, calling his attention to an error in petition as submitted for the changing of city maps so as to reduce the width of Van Alst avenue, was read and filed, and the following, relating thereto, duly adopted:

Resolved, That the petition to have Long Island City Map changed so as to reduce the width of Van Alst avenue "northerly from Main street" be corrected as requested on behalf of the signers thereof to read, "Northerly from Hoyt avenue," and so is hereby approved by this Board.

The President offered the following, which was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The ever-increasing shipping on Newtown creek, between Kings and Queens counties, has necessitated the almost constant opening of the bridge over same from Manhattan avenue, Greenpoint, Borough of Brooklyn, to Vernon avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, as against the steady line of pedestrians, factory and merchandise trucks, business wagons, carriages and vehicles of all descriptions, requiring to cross to and from these important highways to ferries, manufacturing and business places, to their great delay, annoyance, loss and damage; and

Whereas, The condition of affairs has been greatly augmented by wholly unsuitable bridge structure, and the antiquated manual run-around-the-ring lever-power wherewith the bridge is operated with snail-like slowness; and

Whereas, Such a deplorable state of affairs and the failure of the authorities of the adjoining counties to promptly meet the demands of public interests in respect to such wholly inadequate bridge facilities, caused a constant state of agitation to exist and considerable effort to be expended for years without accomplishing the desired object; and

Whereas, It appears that the Hon. John L. Shea, the Commissioner of Bridges of The City of New York, and a resident of Brooklyn, has demonstrated in the short time that he has occupied such position that he is possessed not only of the capacity to comprehend the public needs for greatly improved bridge facilities at points above stated, but also the determination to fully respond to the public demands for such, together with the other essential to carry the same to a successful finish, viz., executive ability; and

Whereas, The Hon. Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor of The City of New York, has signified his approval and support in the undertaking to the speedy construction of a new bridge as submitted by said Commissioner, therefore

Resolved, That we congratulate our people and the manufacturing and business interests upon the prospect of the early commencement and speedy completion of such bridge, and hereby respectfully petition the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to vote a generous appropriation for the construction of a substantial bridge of most approved design and construction and with latest appliances for the quick opening and closing of same that will adequately meet the growing requirements of the Boroughs of Kings and Queens for many years to come.

In the absence of the reports of committees on complaint of William H. Pink and William Deans, no action was had.
