Certificates were granted for the installation of 101,559 new incandescent lights, 893 arc lights, 11 generators of a total of 489½ k.w. capacity, 1,957 motors of a total of 4,042½ H.P. capacity.

A new map of the streets and parks of Manhattan, from the Battery to Fourteenth street, on a scale of 400 feet to the inch, has been completed; also a map showing the distribution of the mains of each gas company in the streets of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Report of Bureau of Repairs and Supplies for Quarter Ending June 30, 1899.

Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, 1

No. 21 Park Row, New York, August 1, 1899.

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1899:

### CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

The usual orders were renewed for cleaning glass in doors and windows. Plumbers' and carpenters' supplies for use of employees, supplies for cleaning purposes, engineers' supplies consisting of oil, waste, etc., and electrical supplies were furnished; 150 feet 34-inch rubber hose and 50 feet of wire-wound rubber steam hose, with reel, nozzle, couplings, etc., complete, also furnished. Steam leaks throughout building were repaired. To repair leakage of gas in prison pens it was necessary to dig up concrete, etc., locate same and replace defective pipe with new gas-pipe. The 3-volt meter in above building, was entirely overhauled, repaired and put in first-class order. Commutation of generators were turned down and 36-carbon dynamo brush were furnished.

Armature of motor for booster was repaired; snow guards on main roof were removed and replaced with new guards properly secured. Spanish tiles on roof were repaired and where found defective replaced with new tile. Two 100-light gas governors complete were furnished and put up as directed. The window shades throughout the building were overhauled and repaired, using new slats, cords, eyes, etc.
Three zinc boxes, 22 inches by 9 inches by 8 inches, with nickel-plated faucets, were furnished

The Elevators.

No. 3. One new operating cable and 4 new lifting cables were furnished.

No. 4. Four new operating cables furnished.

No. 5. Cut out repaired.

No. 6. Main piston and valves repacked and I new operating cable furnished and put in

No. 6. Main piston and valves repacked and I new operating caste luministed and pat in place.

Court of General Sessions—In Parts I., III., III. and IV. of above court electric fans, properly installed and connected, were furnished and put in. 2 cane-bottom revolving chairs furnished, also a supply of law books were furnished.

Supreme Court Part I. (Criminal Building)—An electric motor fan, properly installed and connected, was furnished.

District Attorney's Office—Two 12-inch electric fan motors, with necessary wiring, etc., complete, were furnished and installed. 12 typewriting machines were entirely overhauled and repaired and put in first-class working order. I water-cooler and stand furnished, also I revolving high stool furnished.

Civil Service Commission—Shelving was made and put up on three sides of record room, and partition in storeroom was extended to ceiling. Plastering of ceiling and sidewalls of examining room was repaired.

Sixty yards of Wilton velvet carpet were furnished and laid, 3 umbrella stands, 2 cocoa mats, 2 5-foot roll-top desks and 2 business directories were furnished.

Civil Service Commission (Labor Bureau)—Two 3-gallon water coolers and stands, 2 letterpress cabinets, 1 Bates numbering machine, 2 36-drawer cabinet files, 4 card index cabinets with necessary cards, etc., 1 copy-holder and 1 dozen typewriter ribbons were furnished.

# COUNTY COURT-HOUSE.

The usual orders for supply of steam was renewed, cleaning and engineers' supplies were furnished. Worn-out and detective parts of Welsbach lights throughout the building were replaced with new parts. An order was given for cleaning all the glass in windows and doors of above building. Twelve window awnings, with necessary pulleys, etc., complete, were furnished and put up on windows of above building. One spring for regulator was furnished and put on elevator pump in above building, and one new tiller rope was furnished and put in place on elevator in above building.

County Clerk's Office—24 cane-seat chairs and 2 revolving chairs furnished; also 16 electric motor fans properly connected were furnished and installed.

Surrogate's Office—Ten electric motor fans properly connected were furnished and installed. Five roll-top desks, 5 desk chairs and 1 revolving chair furnished. Eighteen window shades and 15 transom shades made of best quality nonpareil shade cloth hung on Hartshorn spring rollers were furnished and put up complete.

Supreme Court—"Law Journal" was bound and I revolving chair furnished.

# CITY HALL.

Cleaning supplies for use of Janitor were furnished and two United States flags made of best quality standard bunting was furnished. An order was given for cleaning all the glass in windows and doors of above building. Order was renewed for supplying steam to above court-house.

Bureau of Licenses—Three "Lang" steel-file cases with locks complete were furnished.

Board of Alderme—One electric clock was furnished.

SIR—In compliance with the directions contained in your letter of the 15th ultimo, I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for the quarter ending June 30, 1899:

Exhibit "A" is a statement showing the amounts on vouchers for gas and electric currents supplied to the various public markets, offices, armories, etc., and for lighting public lamps.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting," 1899, showing vouchers drawn during the quarter, amounting to twenty-nine thousand nine hundreda and ninety-three 'thousand two hundred and four dollars and fifty-three cents (\$29,957.43), with liabilities amounting to two hundred and ninety-three 'thousand two hundred and four dollars and fifty-three cents (\$293,204.53). These liabilities consist of claims from the various gas and electric-light companies for the lighting and maintenance of the public lamps, and for gas to the various public markets, offices, armories, etc., for the months of April, May and June, which claims cannot be audited for the reason that contracts have not as yet been entered into for said work.

Exhibit "C" is a summary of the lamp account, and this shows the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued during the quarter; one hundred and fifty-three new gas lamps, eighteen new naphtha lamps, forty-two new Welsbach naphtha lamps, and thirty-seven new electric lamps have been lighted; thirty-nine gas lamps have been relighted, two hundred and forty-seven gas lamps and nineteen naphtha lamps discontinued. The total number of lamps lighted on June 30 was twenty-four thousand nine hundred and eighty-two gas, one thousand five hundred and eighty-one naphtha, four hundred and forty-one Welsbach naphtha, and four thousand three hundred and ninety electric lamps, making a total of thirty-one thousand three hundred and ninety electric lamps, making a total of thirty-one thousand three hun

Str.—In accordance with your instructions I submit herewith a statement of the transactions of this office for the quarter ending June 30, 1899.

Men have been employed outside in checking the number and location of new street lamps and of lamps shown on maps previously compiled. A new map of the streets and parks of Manhattan on a scale of 400 feet to the inch has been completed from the Battery to Fourteenth street, he wise transactions are largest the latter designated as Standard Consolidated on Showing 1,108 are lights and 3,939 gas lamps, the latter designated as Standard Consolidated or Equitable; ordinary lamps, Welsbach or fire-alarm.

A series of maps, showing the present street system of the Borough of Manhattan, has been prepared on a 400-foot scale for use in extending this work.

Tracings of the entire Borough of The Bronx have been made and prints of same taken for the

use of men in the field.

An index map of the region below Fourteenth street has been compiled, showing the names of all churches, schools and public places furnished by this Department with extra lights, and

all churches, schools and public places furnished by this Department with extra lights, and includes:

78 churches and schools connected with them, with 201 s'reet lamps.

5 primary schools, with 10 street lamps.

18 grammar schools, with 42 street lamps.

11 hospitals, police stations, etc., with 24 street lamps.

Progress has been made in the office on maps showing the distribution of the mains of each gas company in the streets of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Inspection has been continued of the lighting in public buildings and a weekly record kept of the gas registered by each meter, by means of special report cards furnished each janitor, and returned by him to this office.

During the year 1898 the pressure of gas in all important buildings was reduced to a uniform pressure of ten-tenths or less, and in many the Welsbach system was introduced. A general saving has resulted as shown in the following table comparing the consumption of gas for the second quarter of 1899 with the average of the corresponding quarters of the years 1894 to 1897, inclusive. quarter of 1899 with the average of the corresponding quarters of the years 1894 to 1897, inclusive. The year 1898 is omitted as a period of partial change.

The question of improvements and economies in the use of fuel in the public buildings has received careful attention and will form the subject of a special report.

On April 1 the number of new and repaired meters on hand to be tested was 2,528, and during the same month there were received 1,766, for May 1,718 and for June 1,006, making a total for the quarter, including special tests, of 7,018, ranging in capacity from 3-light to 300-light, of these 6,390 were approved, tested, sealed and badged with my official seal, as correct. 371 were rejected and returned for repair and adjustment on account of being fast or slow or not being sound.

One hundred and ninety-four special tests were made upon request of companies or consumers, of which 93 were found to register from 1 to 10 per cent. fast, 72 were found to register from 1 to 15 per cent. slow and 29 were found to be correct, all of which certificates were issued bearing my official signature.
