Hon. BIRD S. COLER, President, Borough of Brooklyn:

Dear Sir—I beg to forward you report of the operations of the various Bureaus under the Department of Public Works, for the quarter ending March 31, 1908, consisting of reports of the Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Bureau of Incumbrances, Topographical Bureau and General Bookkeeper.

Assistant Commissioner.

The report of the Assistant Commissioner of Public Works shows that during the first quarter ninety-two (92) contracts were entered into at a total cost of \$640,735.87, divided among the Bureaus as follows:

Bureau of Highways.

This Bureau laid 57.3 mile of new pavements during the quarter, .054 mile being asphalt and .019 granite pavement. This work of repaving was done on streets that were paved with cobbles.

Contracts registered during the quarter amounted to sixty-five, fourteen of which were for repaving streets; the total amount of contracts charged to "Repaving Streets Fund" and "Street Improvement Fund" is \$477,916.33.

Seventy-eight preliminary estimates for original improvements aggregating \$837,900 have been prepared for use in the Local Boards.

The report of the Repair Division of this Bureau shows 7,445 square yards granite pavement relaid, 1,589 yards Belgian, 1,264 yards cobbles, 432 yards brick and 618 yards macadam pavement repaired. There was 10,217 square feet of flagging relaid also by said Division.

Work was performed by the force on macadam and unimproved roadways to a considerable extent, they having built 506 square yards of macadam roads, formed 12,718 linear feet of sidewalks of asies. Also cleaned 4.5 miles of gutters and 2.2 miles dirt roads, in addition to this miscellaneous work of cleaning and repairing.

Asphalt Plant.

The asphalt plant was shut down for a period of six weeks, and in operation for seven weeks. During the period the plant was shut down the force was employed overhauling and making general repairs.

Accompanying the Highway Bureau's report is the report of the Superintendent of Incumbrances.

Bureau of Sewers.

This Bureau reports that 5,787 linear feet of sewers, or the equivalent of 1,096 miles, including all sizes of sewers, were laid during this first quarter, and the mileage of the Borough has been increased by that amount. The total mileage of the Borough at the end of the quarter was 804,422 miles.

There were remaining on January 1, 1908, six resolutions for sewers, estimated cost of which is \$662,400, for which plans and specifications have not been prepared, they being held pending the adoption of "changes of plan," some of which are in course of adoption, and some are in advanced stages of preparation.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have authorized but two sewer improvements since January 1, 1908, estimated cost of which is \$6,500. These are ready for advertisement for bids. The plans and specifications for sections 1, 2 and 3 of Division 4 of Relief Sewers, and for section 4 of Division 2, which Mr. Fort, Chief Engineer, reports completed on December 31, 1907, and held in readiness for advertising, have since been advertised for bids on June 3, 1908, but an injunction, restraining the City from receiving proposals on said sewers, was served upon the City officials. The matter is now pending in the Supreme Court.

The report of the work of the Superintendent of Maintenance is in detail, and shows work done and material used in maintaining the sewerage system in this Borough, from January 1 to the end of the quarter.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

In this report, the Superintendent sets forth in detail the number of orders issued for the various Bureaus, statement of moneys expended for supplies and repairs, statement of contracts for repairs to various public buildings, court houses, baths, etc., under his jurisdiction.

Topographical Bureau.

The Chief Engineer in charge of this Bureau sets forth in detail the number of surveys made to prepare plans and profiles for all original work to be undertaken by the Highway Bureau, to determine, for contracts let by the Highway Bureau, the amount of excavation, fill, number of linear feet of curbing, etc.

In addition to this the above Bureau performs work for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Corporation Counsel, in the preparation of damage and benefit maps in condemnation proceedings; also work for the Local Board and various other Departments and Bureaus of the City Government.

General Bookkeeper.

The report of the General Bookkeeper shows, in detail, the financial transactions of the various Bureaus, in the Department of Public Works, and includes the Bureau of Buildings.

It also shows the amount of supplies ordered during the quarter, and for the purposes intended.

Also statement of contracts entered into for public improvements and sets forth the proper accounts in which each contract is to be charged.

Hon. DESMOND DUNNE, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith the quarterly report for the three (3) months ending March 31, 1908.

The work of the Topographical Bureau consists of matters relating to the determination, the preservation and the changes in the established lines and the established elevation of public streets, parks, etc., the preparation of maps for the legal opening of streets, etc.; the making of reports on the legal status of streets, etc.; the preservation and maintenance of lines, monuments, records, etc., and connecting to the several secondary stations in this Borough, the traverse lines, monumented street lines, and the monumented lines holding the triangulation stations.

The work of this Bureau is directly for the use of the Local Boards, for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the Corporation Counsel's office in the matter of condemnation proceedings for street openings, and for the various other departments of the City. Hence it affects the map of the City, which is the basis of all City improvements, and, therefore, not only the local improvements, such as highways, sewers, etc., but in a greater or less degree, the work of all the other Departments of the Borough depends upon the work of the Topographical Bureau.

To make surveys and to prepare plans and profiles for all original improvements that are made by the Bureau of Highways; to determine for all contracts let by the Bureau of Highways the amount of excavation, the amount of fill, the number of linear feet of curbing, the number of square feet of sidewalks, the number of cubic yards of concrete, and the number of square yards of asphalt, and to furnish the contractors with line stakes, grade stakes, and monthly estimates.

There has never existed a map of the Borough of Brooklyn showing all the changes that have been made in the street system of the various sections of the Borough since the original Commissioners' maps were adopted. I am now preparing such a map on a uniform scale of 200 feet in the inch. Upon this map it is intended to note

all the changes in street lines that were made in the past, and, also, such changes in the map of the City as may be hereafter adopted. As a result of this work there will be in this office a map which will be complete and always up to date.

A. Field Work.

The field work, which was required for and which is included in the maps and reports under the head of "Office Work," consists of chaining, line work, angular measurement, leveling and damage survey work. The amount of this work, which was done as required, completed during this quarter, is as follows:

2. Triangulation of the Borough of Brooklyn.

In accordance with chapter 406 of the Laws of 1903 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in co-operation with the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, is authorized to extend and complete the triangulation of The City of New York. The field parties have been engaged in reducing the triangulation stations to the ground, or, in other words, tying each triangulation station to the street lines or the monument lines in its immediate neighborhood. This is the most difficult and tedious part of the triangulation, and requires a great amount of work and of care; because the triangulation points, as a rule, are points upon high buildings, and therefore it is impossible to bring them down to the ground, except by a small system of triangulation. The following triangulation stations were connected with the street lines in their neighborhood.

1. Seventy-ninth Street School.
2. Forty-fourth Street School.
3. Ralph avenue.

IX. From January 1, 1908, to March 31, 1908, a total of 191 street opening proceedings were confirmed.

SUMMARY.

The following summary shows in a brief and general way the quantities and the kinds of work completed during the three (3) months ending March 31, 1908:

A—Field Work.

1. Two hundred and ninety-one thousand feet of precise and approximate chaining; 128,000 feet of precise line work; 1,128 precise angles measured; 6 feet of leveling for profile maps; 15,682 feet for profile for damage maps for 11 streets; 637 feet for plans and profiles (original improvements) for 1 street; 9,710 feet of line and grade stakes set (original improvements) for 9 streets; 3 surveys to determine encroachments, and 15,682 feet for damage surveys for 11 streets.
2. Surveys for preliminary hearings in matter of 6 street cleanings.
3. Forty-two monument points set, 15 monuments referenced, 6 monuments reset, 4 monument covers set, 6 miles of surveyors' private cuts referenced, 6 cement walks cut to render monuments accessible, 3 monuments dug for that were not previously reported found, 2 monuments found that were not previously reported.

4. Triangulation.

Triangulation points were set in and around the following points:

1. Seventy-ninth street school.
2. Forty-fourth street school.
3. Ralph avenue.

B—Office Work.

1. Thirty-three maps for adoption for 11 streets, 80 maps for filing for 16 streets; 22 miscellaneous maps for 11 streets, and 6 maps showing encroachments for 3 streets, making a total of 141 maps for 41 streets.
2. No certificates of dedication for streets, and 9 statements of facts for 9 streets.
3. Twenty rule maps for 5 streets, 10 profile maps for damage surveys for 5 streets, 15 draft damage maps for 5 streets, 6 draft benefit maps for 6 streets, 113 sheets of final damage and benefit maps for 6 streets, no maps (plan and profile) for original improvements in streets, 6 diagrams showing curb stakes for 6 streets, no profile maps for streets, making a total of 51 maps, 113 sheets, 6 diagrams and 33 sheets.
4. Two hundred and thirty-three communications were received and 387 letters and reports were sent.

Hon. JAMES DUNNE, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith report of the operations of the Engineering Division of this Bureau for the first quarter, ending March 31, 1908.

As you will note from the tables next attached, 5,787 linear feet of sewers of all sizes were laid during the quarter, or the equivalent of 1.096 miles, and the mileage of the Borough has been increased by that amount. The total amount of sewers, divided among sewers of various sizes, built during the quarter, is as follows:

—making the mileage of the Borough on March 31, 1908, 804.422 miles.

Of 6-inch house connection drains there were laid 6,785 feet, or 1.285 miles, which makes the total amount of 6-inch house connection drain built by the Bureau to the date of this report, 16,670 miles.

The number of basins built during the quarter has been 33, which makes the total number of basins now connected with the sewerage system, 9979.

There remained on January 1, 1908, six resolutions for sewer improvements, the estimated cost of which is \$602,400, and for which plans and specifications had not been prepared. These have been held pending the adoption of changes of plan, some of which are in course of adoption and some are in advance stages of preparation.

There remained on January 1, 1908, three petitions for sewers to be built under private contract, two of which have been completed and are awaiting the submission of the private contracts by the owners before completing the proceedings. The other petitions, having no outlet for the sewer petitioned for, will be held pending the adoption of the change of plan for map "X."

Since January 1, 1908, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have authorized but two sewer improvements, the estimated cost being \$9,500. The plans and specifications for these have been forwarded for advertising for bids.

Seventy-nine reports upon sewer improvements, in response to petitions for paving, and in reply to petitions for sewers, have been made, the estimated cost being \$177,200, covering 4.8 miles of sewers. Thirty-two of these reports are in response to petitions for paving, the estimated cost of the sewer improvements being \$13,150, and forty-seven reports are in response to petitions for sewers, the estimated cost being \$164,050.

In addition to the above there have been made four miscellaneous reports relating to changes of plan, making the total number of reports during the quarter 83.

Plans and specifications for sections 1, 2 and 3 of Division 1 of the relief sewers and for section 4 of Division 2 have been completed since December 31, 1907, and held in readiness for advertising for bids.

The redesign of the sewerage system of the whole of map "Z," embracing 715 acres of former map "Z," and 300 acres from former map "AA," and the redesign of 746 acres of map "X" have been completed, and the necessary plans have been prepared and forwarded.

The plans showing proposed changes of grade in Bensonhurst, made necessary by the redesign of the sewerage and drainage system in map "Z," have been completed and forwarded.

The redesign of the sewerage and drainage system of map "CC," covering a part of Coney Island, has been amended, and the plans as amended have been forwarded for adoption.

The extension of drainage map "N," to include streets adjacent to the waterfront and along new streets proposed by the Department of Docks, which territory is outside of the present drainage district, is now well along toward completion.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business in which it relates, or in any portion of the profit thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National Banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bid required, as provided in section 426 of the Greater New York Charter.
