Mayor Bill de Blasio arrived at The Nightly Show studios on West 54th and Tenth Avenue a few minutes after 6 p.m., accompanied by a press attaché, Rebecca Katz, and his advance man Frankie. An aide reported that the mayor was snacking on popcorn in the green room ahead of the taping, although your pool was not granted eyewitness access.

The Nightly Show, which began in January, typically features a roundtable of up to four guests. Tonight's taping was the first episode that features a one-on-one interview.

Show began at 6:48! Larry said he was "going one-on-one with New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio. I might ask him questions, might dunk on him. Either way, he's getting a lot of L.W. in his face."

"De Blasio is fighting to save New York City's middle class," Larry added. "All 12 of them." /// "We'll also discuss the mayor's relationship with the NYPD, which is more beef than a New York City hot dog."

Larry opened with an overview of issues facing NYC. "It is the third coldest winter on record. Thanks de Blasio. I don't remember it being this cold when Bloomberg was mayor."

"You know what they say about New York? If you can make it here, you can make it anywhere. Or, as the saying has been shortened to nowadays, you can't make it here. Seriously, man, try Austin." Income inequality is so bad that "the income gap between rich and poor isn't so much a 'Gap' as it is a Prada."

Larry added: "And perhaps most troubling in the last two years, New York City mayors have seen their net worth drop by nearly \$35.7 billion." (This was accompanied, as you might imagine, by a graphic of a smiling BDB and a frowning Michael R. Bloomberg.) "Cover your ears, Mr. Mayor!"

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The stagehands arranged a new set for the show, hauling out two upholstered leather easy chairs for Larry and the Mayor. Here comes BDB! He is wearing a blue tie and dark navy suit. Very loud applause from crowd.

The men sat down in the comfy chairs. Larry: "I thought we might want to manspread a little bit." BDB smiled and played along, flailing out his legs and even tapping Larry playfully with his foot.

"So if we keep it 100 percent Dickens--" Larry began. "Is that a new segment?" BDB replied, smiling.

Larry asked if this is the "best of times or the worst of times." BDB pointed out the 50,000 kids in Pre-K, the 50,000 in afterschool. Half a million with paid sick leave. And the 200,000 units of affordable housing.

At this point, there was a problem with the microphone setup, so the taping paused and restarted a few minutes later. "First technical issue we had and it was in front of the mayor of New York City," said a stagehand.

Larry asked about the Governor. "I know you and Cuomo aren't necessarily seeing eye to eye. When you're asking him for funds, do you feel like the guy on the subway -- I'm not here to beg! I'm actually the mayor of a large city."

BDB kept a big smile on his face. "I actually do that in Albany, it's exactly how I do it."

Larry played a video question on race relations and the police. An older African-American man named Alexander Hamilton asked the question. "That was from one of our founding fathers!" Larry said. "That's how important this issue is." BDB: "Larry, you are booking some amazing guests."

So, about the police: "How's that beef?" Larry asked. "Is it like a west coast, east coast thing?"

"No, thank god," BDB replied. "A lot of work went into everyone finding a way to get onto a better page."

Larry: "You got in trouble for talking about your biracial son -- or, as I like to call him, your black son. If you're having a talk with your son about the cops, that's your black son. It's not like the cops are going to pull you over and say, 'Freeze! Oh, wait, are you mixed or something?""

"Is that called Keeping It 100?" BDB asked with a smile.

BDB: "The first thing that astounded me about the whole reality is, i spoke about these issues when i was running for mayor. It wasn't a new thing. we did a TV advertisement talking about the reality of the conversations we had in our family. A young man of color today needs to have that conversation in his family. It's something that everyone knows. And it's not a comment that's disrespectful to the police. We deeply respect our police, we need our police to protect us.
