

STATEMENT OF THE RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING AUGUST 1, 1890.

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, August 23, 1890.

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In compliance with section 126 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Comp-troller of the City of New York herewith publishes the following "full and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the corporation" during the year ending on the first day of August. 1890, and the "cash balance or surplus" in the City Treasury at that date; also "the different sources of City revenue and the amount received from each source," together with "the several appropriations made, the objects for which the same were made, and the amount of money expended under each"; and also "the money borrowed on the credit of the corporation, the authority under which each loan was made, and the terms on which the same was obtained."


