FIRST DEPARTMENT, OCTOBER GENERAL TERM, 1874.

Present—Daniels, Donohue, and Lawrence, JJ.

Appeal from an order directing a mandamus to issue against the appellants.

Lawrence, J.

I am in favor of affirming the order in this case, so far as it relates to the appellant Neilson, but I have, with great reluctance, been forced to the conclusion that the order below is erroneous so far as it relates to the appellants Green and Earle.

In my opinion, neither Mr. Green nor Mr. Earle has anything to do with the claim of the relators.

At the time bills of the relators were audited by the Executive of the College, and approved by the Trustees, the Board of Education was not a department of the Municipal Government of the City of New York, and the provisions of the Charter of 1873, in reference to the payment of moneys from the City Treasury, did not apply to that Board. (Laws, 1873, p. 492.)

The Board of Education, prior to the amendment to the Charter of 1870, passed 1871, had never been one of the departments of the City Government, but had always been a separate organization, having its own separate funds, and empowered to draw money from the City Treasury in accordance with the provisions of special statutes. (Laws, 1871, vol. 2, p. 1244.)

See act referred to in P. J. Davis' opinion; also Dane's Laws, p. 1054, section 16.

By the Act of March 21, 1873, the Board of Education was again reconstructed as a distinctive educational branch of government, and was not made a part of the general City Government. (Laws, 1873, p. 196.)

So, too, in the enumeration of the different departments of the City Government contained in the Charter, the Board of Education is omitted. (Charter Laws, 1873, p. 491.)

The provisions relating to the drawing of moneys from the City Treasury, (Charter 1873, p. 491), only relates to departments and officers of

the City Government, as such, and do not, in my opinion, apply to this case, where, as is conceded by the Court below, and by the relator's counsel, the claim is neither against the City nor County.

The acts referred to in the opinion at Special Term, and other acts relating to the same subject, contemplate that moneys required for the purposes of the Board of Education, or of the College of the City of New York, should be drawn out from the Treasury of the City only by the draft of the President of said Board (of Education), countersigned by the Clerk of said Board. (Laws 1847, p. 208; Laws 1866, p. 560.)

The Clerk of the Board of Education is not a party to this proceeding. He should have been made a party, and the mandamus should have been asked for against him, as well as the President (See also Laws 1851, p. 737. Dane's Laws, p. 1054, section 16.)

The City Auditor and Comptroller were not, in my opinion, either necessary or proper parties to the proceeding, and the provisions of the Charter which are relied upon by their counsel do not seem to me to give to the one the right to audit, nor to the other the right to draw a warrant for, any claim arising out of an employment by the Trustees of the College of New York.

If it should be said that a portion of the relator's claim accrued while the Board of Education constituted a part of the City Government, the obvious answer seems to me to be, that long before the work had been completed, the Board of Education had been reconstructed, and separate and distinct governmental agency; and that the provisions of the City Charter did not therefore apply to any action which that Board, acting as the Trustees of the College of New York, took subsequent to the passage of the new act; and that the auditing, ratification, and approval of the relator's bills took place subsequent to the passage of said act.

As it is admitted that the money has been raised, that the amount claimed by the relator is due, and that there is nothing but a technical objection to the payment of the relator, I think that the proper order in this case will be to affirm the order below, so far as relates to the appellant Neilson, to reverse it as to the appellants Earle and Green, without costs, and with leave to the respondents to immediately apply to the Court for a mandamus against the Clerk of the Board of Education, to compel him to countersign the draft of the President of the Board, in case such Clerk should refuse so to do.

Compulsory Education.

Commissioner Townsend presented the report of the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, relative to Compulsory Education, as follows:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications respectfully report: That they have presented the provisions, arrangements, rules, and regulations, concerning habitual truancy in the City of New York, of children there between the ages of eight and fourteen years, passed by the Board of Education on the 16th day of December, 1874, to Justice Noah Davis of the Supreme Court, and have requested him to approve of the same, and have had several interviews with him, and that he has approved of most of them, but has raised some objections to others of the same, and has suggested and offered amendments to those objected to by him, which amendments the Committee also approve.

The said provisions, arrangements, rules, and regulations, as approved and amended by Justice Davis, are contained in the following eleven sections.

That said eleven sections, with one other, for the appointment of a Superintendent of Truancy, and for the appointment of eight Agents of Truancy, recommended by this report, will, in the opinion of your Committee, essentially accomplish all which the provisions, arrangements, rules, and regulations passed by the Board of Education on said 16th of December, 1874, were designed to accomplish.

That your Committee are assured by Justice Davis, that when said provisions, arrangements, rules and regulations, passed December 16, 1874, shall be modified into said eleven sections, as approved and modified by him, that he will formally approve of the same.

Your Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Board of Education of the City of New York do hereby, pursuant to the provisions of the Act of the Legislature of the State of New York, passed May 11, 1874, entitled "An Act to secure to children the benefits of Elementary Education," make the provisions, arrangements, rules, and regulations concerning habitual truancy in the City of New York, and children there, between the ages of eight and fourteen years, who may be found wandering about the streets and public places of said city during school hours of the school days of the term of the public schools of said city, having no lawful occupation, and growing up in ignorance, which are contained in the following eleven sections, viz.:

Sec. 1. A complete census of all children in each Ward of the City of New York, between the ages of eight and fourteen years, shall be made in duplicate as soon as the same can be done, and one thereof shall be kept by the School Trustees of each Ward, and the other shall be filed with the Clerk of the Board of Education.

Sec. 2. Each Ward will be divided into as many districts as there shall be school-houses in the Ward, and each district shall be so located that the school-house therein shall be in the centre thereof, or as nearly so as practicable.

Sec. 3. From the census above directed to be made shall be made and kept in the school-house of each district, in each Ward, a record, showing the name, age, and residence of each child in the district between the ages of eight and fourteen, and of each child attending school in that district, who resides elsewhere, with the name and residence of the parent or guardian of the child, with a statement whether the child attends school, and, if so, the place where such child attends school.

Sec. 4. It shall be the special duty of the Agent of Truancy, or other officer or agent appointed by the Board of Education for each of the eight School Districts into which the City of New York was divided by statute before these rules and regulations were made, to procure the attendance of the children within their respective districts and elsewhere in the City, between the ages of eight and fourteen years, at some public school of the City of New York, and to carry out and enforce the said law of May 11, 1874, and to do so by means of argument and persuasion, and by means other than force, if the same can be done; that each of said Agents of Truancy shall devote his whole time to his said duties, and shall have such annual salary as shall from time to time be determined by the Board of Education.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Principal of each school to keep the said register in said school, and correct the same from time to time, as children named there shall cease to attend said school, and as children not on such register shall attend said school, and otherwise as may be needed, and to use their influence to induce the children in the district around said school, between the ages of eight and fourteen years, to attend said school, to ascertain which of such children do not attend school, and to inform the Agent of Truancy of the District where any child resides of the non-attendance of any child who has been accustomed to attend or ought by law to attend school.

Sec. 6. The duties of the Superintendent of Truancy, or other officer for that purpose appointed

by the Board of Education, shall be to see that said law, passed May 11, 1874, and its provisions are carried out and enforced throughout the whole city, and that the several Agents of Truancy perform the duties imposed upon them, and that actions for fines and penalties under said act are prosecuted in the manner directed by said act, and to perform all other duties enjoined on him by these regulations or that may be required of him by the Board of Education.

Sec. 7. Said Superintendent of Truancy and said Agents of Truancy shall meet twice in each week or oftener, and transact such business in relation to their duties as may be necessary at such meetings; said Superintendent shall preside, and in his absence some Agent of Truancy shall be elected by said Agents of Truancy to act as chairman, and said Agents of Truancy shall each at such meetings, and from time to time, report to said Superintendent all matters and things done by him, or which ought to be done, or which may have come to his knowledge or otherwise, relating to carrying out and enforcing the provisions of said Act of May 11, 1874, and said reports shall be kept by said Superintendent for the use of the Board of Education, and be transmitted to it or its Clerk whenever required; and it shall be the duty of said Superintendent to report to the Board of Education, at each of its meetings, the doings of himself and of said Agents of Truancy, and all matters which relate to the enforcement and execution of said law; and said Superintendent and Agents shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board of Education, and they and all their acts shall be subject to the control and direction of the said Board.

Sec. 8. The City of New York shall, for all the purposes of ascertaining and fixing the duties of the Trustees of Schools therein, be, and hereby is divided into twenty-four districts, corresponding exactly with the several wards of said City, and the School Trustees of each ward shall be the Trustees mentioned in said Act of May 11, 1874; and it shall be their duty, as such Trustees under said Act of May 11, 1874, in the months of September and February of each year, in their respective wards, to make the examinations and do all the acts and things by the third and fifth and other sections of said act required to be done by any Trustee or Trustees of Schools, and all other lawful acts to carry out and enforce the provisions of said act.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of said Agents of Truancy, in their respective districts, when they shall not be able by persuasion, argument, and other means than force, to procure the attendance at school of any child between the ages of eight and fourteen years, who under the provisions of said act ought to attend some public or private school, and who is under said act liable to arrest, to make complaint before a police justice of said City, and procure a warrant to be issued by said justice to a police officer of said City, and such child to be arrested and brought before said justice, and if found guilty of a violation of said act and liable to commitment, to be committed to Randall's Island, to be restrained and detained by the Commissioners of Charities and Correction, and sent to school there, or, in the discretion of said justice, to be committed to the Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents in the City of New York, on Randall's Island, and the managers thereof, to be by them restrained and detained and sent to school there, and whilst so restrained and detained in either case, said child shall be subject, as to the time and manner of such restraint and education, to the control of the Board of Education, so far as is consistent with law and the well-being of other children detained in those places respectively.

Sec. 10. Those portions of Randall's Island respectively under the control of said Commissioners of Charities and Correction, and under control of said Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents, and its managers, are hereby set apart and provided by the Board of Education as suitable places for the discipline, instruction, and confinement of children in said City, between the ages of eight and fourteen years, convicted of violating the provisions of said act, and whenever any child between the ages of eight and fourteen shall be brought before any police justice charged with a violation of said act of May 11th, 1874, and it shall have been ascertained and determined by such justice upon the examination of such witnesses as may be produced before him by any party interested in the hearing, either on subpoena or otherwise, that said child is subject to arrest and commitment under the provisions of said act, and said child is convicted of a violation thereof and found to be liable to arrest and imprisonment thereunder, and shall be committed under the provisions of said act by said police justice, he or she shall be detained and restrained and sent to school at one of the places hereinbefore designated, as in the discretion of said justice shall appear most proper and suitable for said child.

Sec. 11. Each police officer in the City of New York is hereby required to aid and assist in all things, to the extent of his power and ability, in the enforcement and carrying out of all the provisions of said Act of May 11, 1874, and of the aforesaid rules and regulations.

Resolved, That so much of the eleven sections of provisions, arrangements, rules, and regulations concerning habitual truancy in the City of New York, passed by the Board of Education, December 16, 1874, as are inconsistent with the foregoing eleven sections, or any of them, be and the same are hereby repealed.

Resolved, That the Board of Education in the City of New York, in the month of January in each year, or as soon thereafter as the same can be done, shall appoint a Superintendent of Truancy for the whole City of New York, and an Agent of Truancy for each of the eight School Districts into which the City was divided before the 1st day of June, 1874, and that such Superintendent, and said Agents of Truancy, each shall receive such

salaries as shall be fixed by the Board of Education.

Resolved, That it be and it hereby is referred to the members of the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, and the members of the Committee on Finance, as a Joint Committee, to nominate to the Board of Education of the City of New York a suitable person to be Superintendent of Truancy for the whole City of New York, and a suitable person to be Agent of Truancy in each of the districts into which the City of New York was divided before June 1, 1874, and to report what, in the opinion of said Joint Committee, would be a suitable salary for said Superintendent, and for each of said Agents of Truancy.

Commissioner Matthews presented the report of the Committee on Evening Schools, recommending payment of Teachers in Evening School No. 40, for services in registration of pupils.

Adopted.

Sites and New Schools.

Commissioner Patterson presented a report from the Committee on Sites and New Schools, recommending that an application be made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for five lots of ground on north side of East Sixty-seventh street, between Lexington and Third avenues, for school purposes.

Adopted.

Finance.

Commissioner Dowd presented a report from the Finance Committee, recommending the payment of sundry bills for the Eleventh Ward, amounting to \$314.95.

Adopted.

Also, approving the purchase of pianos for Grammar Schools Nos. 45 and 47.

Adopted.

Also, from the same Committee, as follows:

To the Board of Education:

The Finance Committee, to whom was referred, at the meeting held on the 4th of November last, the resolution relative to the reduction of the sum of \$380,000 made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in the estimate of this Board for the support of public instruction for the present year, respectfully report: That in compliance with the instructions conveyed by said resolution, your Committee, in company with the President of this Board, attended, by arrangement, a meeting of the Board of Aldermen, at which this reduction was discussed. The President, by invitation of the Board of Aldermen, and at the request of your Committee, addressed that body upon the subject, setting forth, by the facts and figures presented, the injury that would be inflicted upon the Public School system by an adherence to the reduction proposed; and the attention of the Board of Aldermen was especially invited to the sum deducted from the estimate for salaries, \$186,500, as especially calculated to create general dissatisfaction among the teachers, and in many cases absolute distress, by thus compelling this Board to make an indiscriminate reduction by percentage on the salaries now paid. In consequence of these representations and the remonstrance of your Committee, as it is presumed, the Board of Aldermen advised the restoration by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the sum deducted from the estimate for salaries. Previous to this action, and subsequently, your Committee sought an official interview with the Board of Apportionment, but failing to obtain this, the individual members of your Committee addressed themselves to the individual members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in remonstrance against the reduction proposed, and with such effect as to obtain the restoration of \$280,000 of the sum deducted. Your Committee regret that the whole amount was not restored, as requested, but are gratified in being able to state that the \$100,000 deducted will not positively obstruct the progress of the public schools or interfere with the future plans of the Board, except to defer for a time the erection of a building in the Eighth District and limiting the purchase of school sites. Satisfied that all that could be done to induce the financial authorities of the City to reconsider their action in reference to the great public interests in the charge of this Board, has been done, and that if their reconsideration has not reached our proposition in full, that we may congratulate you and all others interested in the cause of public education that the injury which threatened it by the unadvised action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been averted, and that we may resume the business of the year before us and the performance of the duties imposed upon us without fear of financial embarrassment, we respectfully submit the re-

port of our labors and the result for your consideration.

Resolved, That section 56 of the Sanitary Code be amended to read as follows:

SEC. 56. That the keeping and slaughtering of all cattle, and the preparation and keeping of all meat and fish, birds and fowl, shall be in that manner which is, or is generally reputed or known to be, best adapted to secure and continue their safety and wholesomeness as food. Neither the slaughtering nor the driving of cattle shall be permitted or conducted at any place in the City of New York south of Fortieth street; nor shall the slaughtering of cattle be conducted at any place in the City of New York north of said street, without a special written permit from this Department; unless the same shall be done in buildings located directly upon the water front, each having a capacity sufficient for the yarding and slaughtering daily of one-half of the entire number of cattle, or hogs, or small stock (all or separately, according to the particular object of each abattoir) slaughtered in this City, at the time the application for the permit for such abattoir shall be made; and so constructed as to receive all stock deliverable thereat, directly from the cars or transports; and to discharge therefrom all liquid refuse below low-water mark, and to secure the proper care and disposition of all parts of the slaughtered animals upon the premises, or the immediate removal thereof by means of boats.
