The minutes of the meeting held June 24, 1875, were read and approved.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution :

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the provisions of section 112, chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "Assessment Bonds of the City of New York," as authorized by chapter 307, Laws of 1852, and chapter 580, Laws of 1872, one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), The Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Chairman presented the following communication from the Board of Health :

HEALTH DEPARTMENT,  
No. 301 MOTT STREET,  
NEW YORK, June 30, 1875.

JOHN WHEELER, Esq., Secretary :

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Health, held on the 29th inst., it was—

"Resolved, That sufficient proof is in the reports now on file relative to the dangerous condition and state of the Harlem Flats, the district between Ninety-first and One Hundred and Ninth streets, that the places and grounds hereinafter described are public nuisances, and each of them is such, dangerous to life and health, and the said places and grounds are hereby entered on the records of this Board, and are declared public nuisances, dangerous to life and health, viz. : the property north side of One Hundred and Seventh street, between Fourth and Lexington avenues; north side of One Hundred and Seventh street, between Lexington and Third avenues; the ground between Third and Second avenues, One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets; on south side of One Hundred and Eighth street, between Third and Second avenues; on north side of One Hundred and Seventh street, between First and Second avenues; on north side of One Hundred and Eighth street, between First and Second avenues; the block between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, Fourth and Madison avenues; also the blocks of land between Third and Second avenues, Ninety-third and One Hundred and Second streets, and between Second avenue and East river, Ninety-second and One Hundred and Fourth streets, partially filled under the contract with Messrs. Jones & McQuade, but left in a dangerous and unsatisfactory state; and Lexington avenue, between One Hundred and Third and One Hundred and Fourth streets; One Hundred and Sixth street, between Fourth and Madison avenues; One Hundred and Seventh street, between Fourth and Lexington avenues; Lexington avenue, between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Eighth streets; One Hundred and Seventh street, between Third and Second avenues; and One Hundred and Seventh street, between Second and First avenues;

"Resolved, That in respect to said places and grounds this Board does hereby make and enter the following order, to wit. : That the said places and grounds be covered with fresh earth to a height of not less than two feet above high water, and that the surface thereof be graded so that no water shall remain or stand thereon;

"Resolved, That the public health requires that the foregoing order upon the places and grounds following, viz. : Lexington avenue, between One Hundred and Third and One Hundred and Fourth streets; One Hundred and Sixth street, between Fourth and Madison avenues; One Hundred and Seventh street, between Fourth and Lexington avenues; Lexington avenue, between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Eighth streets; One Hundred and Seventh street, between Third and Second avenues, and Third avenues; and One Hundred and Seventh street, between Second and First avenues, should be executed through the officers of this Board, and by the persons and means to be by this Board engaged;"

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to apportion and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for the expenses of the work under the above resolution."

And offered for adoption the following preamble and resolution :

Whereas, The public grounds of the City of New York, on Lexington avenue, between One Hundred and Third and One Hundred and Fourth streets; on Lexington avenue, between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Eighth streets; on One Hundred and Sixth street, between Madison and Fourth avenues; on One Hundred and Seventh street, between Fourth and Lexington avenues; on One Hundred and Seventh street, between Third avenue and the East river, in the so-called Harlem Flats, having been duly declared by the Board of Health a public nuisance, and dangerous to life, in their present state, and immediate relief having become necessary to preserve life and health, and the said Board of Health having, in pursuance of their power and authority under section 14 of chapter 74, Laws of 1866; article 11 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873; section 12, chapter 757 of the Laws of 1873, and section 7 of chapter 636 of the Laws of 1874, duly ordered the said ground filled in with fresh earth to prevent pestilence and the increase of disease, and being empowered by law to execute its own orders, having duly resolved so to do, and having duly requested an appropriation to enable it to perform this duty, execute its said orders, and remedy this nuisance;

Resolved, That the sum of \$21,067.43, being the unexpended balance of the Department of Health for the years 1872 and 1873, be and the same is hereby transferred to the Health Department, and appropriated for the said work of filling in with fresh earth the aforesaid public grounds.

The Comptroller opposed the transfer of the said unexpended balances of the years 1872 and 1873.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments moved to lay the matter over for the purpose of enabling the Comptroller to ascertain what moneys can be transferred for this purpose, and report that fact at a special meeting to be held on Monday, July 12, 1875, at 12 M.

The Comptroller moved to amend to read Tuesday, July 13, 1875, but withdrew the motion.

The motion to lay over was agreed to.

The Chairman presented the following communication from the Department of Charities and Correction.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION,  
CORNER THIRD AVENUE AND ELEVENTH STREET,  
NEW YORK, July 7, 1875.

Hon. WM. H. WICKHAM :

DEAR SIR—The Commissioners have given very careful and elaborate consideration to the subject of making repairs and alterations in the heating and ventilating apparatus of all the buildings under their charge.

Besides the Supervising Engineer, three other parties of acknowledged expertness have made critical examination into the matter, and they substantially concur in reporting that extensive improvements must be made to render the institutions suitable for occupancy during the coming winter. This is particularly the case with Bellevue and Charity Hospitals, and the Lunatic Asylum on Blackwell's Island. These edifices have been suffered by neglect to fall into a state of dilapidation which renders further delay in the renovation inconsistent with a proper regard to the public interests, or a humane consideration for the unfortunate persons in our hospitals and asylums. Last winter, notwithstanding a profuse use of fuel, it was impossible to keep the inmates comfortably warm during the severest weather. Although startled at the amount of the estimates, the Commissioners feel that this work must be undertaken, and, since it is to be done, it is judicious economy to do it thoroughly. The sum required is \$120,700, which considerably exceeds the nominal surplus of last year's appropriation.

They respectfully recommend that the unexpended balance of the appropriation of 1874 be transferred to their control, that they may forthwith proceed to contract for the repairs so urgently needed.

They will be happy to present to the Board of Apportionment a detailed statement of the requirements of the Department in this regard, and to summon before them the engineer and architects upon whose representation this application is made.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue bonds of the City of New York, as provided in chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, for the purpose of providing moneys for the payment of judgments which have been or may be obtained against the said city, the amount of said bonds not to exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), said bonds to be designated "New York City Bonds for Liquidation of Claims and Judgments," and bear interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, and payable at such time, within three years from the date thereof, as the Comptroller may determine.

To the Honorable the Board of Apportionment:

We, the undersigned, have the honor of herein applying to your Honorable Board in our own behalf, asking an appropriation to be granted the Comptroller of the amount stated below, to pay certain bills rendered against the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction, for services furnished in the years 1872 and 1873.

The charges are correct, according to the showing of the records of the Commissioners of Charities, and work was commenced on the wing of the Idiot House, on Randall's Island, and after a cessation in the work, was again begun in the summer of 1874. Work has again been stopped. The following is a copy of our bills, as rendered against the present Commission, who say they are unable to sign the bills, on the ground that the appropriations of the above years have been exhausted:

SIR—By the provisions of certain statutes herein mentioned, authority was given for the issue of "Croton Water Main Stock," for the laying of pipes to extend the distribution of water through the city, and to furnish a sufficient supply to the institutions in charge of the Department of Charities and Correction, located on Blackwell's, Ward's, and Randall's Islands, and in laying mains to deliver water at higher elevation.

And, Whereas, On 1st April, 1874, the same Committee made a long report to this Board, respecting the prevalence of the same offenses against good morals in the Eighth Ward, and of the insolent demeanor of a certain Police Captain, Alexander S. Williams, who was sent by his superiors to furnish information to said Committee on the matters referred to, as is fully set forth on pages 315, 316, 317, 318, and 319 of the Journal of 1874; and

Whereas, The nuisance complained of continues unabated, and no effective steps appear to have been taken to put a stop to the daily and hourly open exhibition of painted, bedizened, and half-necked harlotry in Greene and Wooster streets, Fifteenth and Eighth Wards of this city, close by Grammar School No. 10, and in the near vicinity of Grammar School No. 8, Grammar School No. 38, and Colored School No. 2, with their thousands of boys and girls; and

Whereas, A Select Committee of the Assembly of this State is now sitting in this city, for the purpose of inquiring into the causes of the steady and rapid increase of crime, and the inadequacy of the proper authorities to cause its speedy suppression; therefore,

Resolved, That the members of the Committee on By-Laws, Elections, and Qualifications be and are hereby appointed a Special Committee to wait upon the Select Committee of the Assembly now inquiring into the causes of the steady and rapid increase of crime in the City of New York, etc., and to lay before said Select Committee of the Assembly the reports of the Committee on By-Laws, etc., of 21st January and 1st of April, 1874, and to take such further action in the matter as to the said Special Committee of this Board may seem proper and judicious.

The President put the question whether the Board would adopt said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Commissioner Dowd presented reports from the Committee on Buildings, as follows:  
To rehire premises occupied by branch Primary Department, Grammar School No. 62, Twenty-third Ward. Adopted.

Also, authorizing Trustees of Eleventh Ward to hire premises corner of Avenue D and Tenth street. Adopted.

Also, authorizing Trustees of the Tenth Ward to advertise for proposals for repairs and furniture for Grammar School Building No. 42. Adopted.

Also, relative to additional primary school accommodations in the Twenty-third Ward. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Wetmore presented reports from the Committee on School Furniture, as follows:

To appropriate \$15,284 for repairs, etc., to School buildings in various wards. Adopted.

To appropriate \$338.04 for bill of Nathaniel Johnson, for extra work to Grammar School No. 65. Adopted.

To appropriate \$500 for storm-doors for the Normal College buildings. Adopted.

Commissioner Halsted presented a report from the Committee on Teachers, relative to the complaint against two teachers for violation of the By-law forbidding corporal punishment. Adopted. Also, relative to the nomination of certain Teachers for Principals. Adopted.

#### Unfinished Business.

Commissioner Wood called up for consideration the resolution relative to the designation of Schools for Visitation by Commissioners. Amended and adopted.

Commissioner Herring called up for consideration the report of the Committee on Music. The report was amended, and laid on the table until the next meeting.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed thereto, on motion of the Recorder, they were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board a copy of an order of Judge Barrett, of the Supreme Court, dated June 4, 1875, vacating an injunction in re Mary G. Pinkney vs. The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York and the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments; and also a stipulation of plaintiff's attorneys, Messrs. Allison & Shaw, for discontinuance of two suits relative to the assessment lists for the construction of the following sewers, viz.:

1. In Sixth, Seventh, and St. Nicholas avenues, between One Hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Sixteenth streets, with branches.

2. In Seventh avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, with branches.

3. In Sixth avenue, between One Hundred and Sixteenth and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets; Seventh avenue, between One Hundred and Sixteenth and One Hundred and Twenty-first streets; and in One Hundred and Twenty-first street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, with branches.

4. In Sixth avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Forty-seventh streets, with branches.

Mr. John C. Shaw, of Messrs. Allison & Shaw, attorneys of Mary G. Pinkney, was heard in relation to the objections filed against said assessment lists.

After consideration of the objections filed by Dr. Wm. G. Wood, Mary G. Pinkney, Bernard Smyth and others, on motion of the Recorder, the said objections were overruled, and the assessment lists were severally confirmed—all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for setting curb and gutter and flagging One Hundred and Ninth street, from Third avenue to Harlem river, to which objections had been filed, and which was laid over at the meeting of June 2, 1875, was taken up for consideration.

Messrs. Henry P. McGown and Robert C. Embree, who had filed objections, requested its consideration be postponed in consequence of the absence of the Counsel to the Corporation.

On motion of the Comptroller, the said list was again laid over.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for outlet sewer in One Hundred and Tenth street, from Harlem river to Fifth avenue, to One Hundred and Sixteenth street, to Seventh avenue, with branches in Second, Fourth, and Fifth avenues, One Hundred and Eleventh, One Hundred and Twelfth, One Hundred and Thirteenth, and One Hundred and Twentieth streets, received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated June 26, 1875, together with objections of H. P. McGown, Wm. H. Gebhard, and others.

Mr. H. P. McGown appeared and asked that the consideration of said list be postponed.

On motion of the Comptroller, the list was laid over.

The Comptroller presented the assessment lists for paving, curbing, and flagging Seventh avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, and for regulating and grading Seventh avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to Harlem river, which had been transmitted by the Board of Assessors with communication dated June 21, 1875, and accompanied by the objections filed thereto by Mary G. Pinkney and others.

After hearing Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney for Mary G. Pinkney, on motion of the Recorder, the lists were laid over.

The assessment list for paving Sixty-third street, from Second avenue to the East river, with stone blocks, which was laid over at the meeting of June 2, 1875, was taken up for consideration.

Mr. Henry R. Beekman, attorney for several objectors, appeared and asked leave to have time to present affidavits to the Board relative to the performance of the work.

Whereupon, on motion of the Comptroller, the assessment list was again laid over.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb, gutter, and flagging Eighty-seventh street, from First avenue to East river, received with a communication under date of June 21, 1875, from the Board of Assessors, with objections filed thereto by Wm. Foulke, Theodore Foulke et al.

Mr. Henry R. Beekman was heard on behalf of the Messrs. Foulke in opposition to the confirmation of said list.
