Sir—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending September 30, 1894: REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1894, the number of members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons and probationary employees, was 3,886.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries, for the quarter, and the details thereof, are shown in the schedule, marked "A," from which it will be seen that— The time lost was 9,441 days.
