SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending September 30, 1894:

REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1894, the number of members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons and probationary employees, was 3,886.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries, for the quarter, and the details thereof, are shown in the schedule, marked "A," from which it will be seen that—

An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and frequently is, charged to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the magistrate.

The record maps, consisting of separate maps, giving the record of the calculations, co-ordinates, the fixtures and assumptions on which the calculations were based, the record of grades, etc., were kept up to date for all the sections in progress.

Instructions were given to two (2) field parties for setting the monument points in Sections 10 and 11.

The following is the resume of the results on Sections 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 12, 13, 14, 15, 17, 18 and 19:

Section 6, an amendment was made near Fulton avenue and Crotona Park, which section was reported as completed on last quarterly report.

Section 13, calculations were completed, establishing 15 miles of streets and locating 228 monuments; area of section, without park areas, 360 acres, and with park areas, 464.8 acres.

Section 18, calculations are in progress.

Section 19, calculations were completed, establishing 8.2 miles of streets and locating 116 monuments; area of section is 468.3 acres, which include the greater portion of Woodlawn Cemetery.
