

The streets, avenues and public buildings have been lighted as far as practicable, during the quarter, under existing contracts entered into prior to January 1, 1898.

Contracts and specifications for lighting the streets, avenues and public places with electricity during the year 1898 have been prepared and are now in the hands of the Corporation Counsel awaiting his approval.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

During the quarter orders aggregating \$3,000 were issued for repairs and supplies to the Town Hall, Village Hall, Health Department and Finance Department in Jamaica, and to other public buildings, offices and courts in this borough.

Bills amounting to \$13,564.72 for lighting Long Island City have been received and audited. No provision has yet been made for the lighting of the various towns, villages and political divisions, other than Long Island City, included in this borough.

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner, Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1898.

CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

Building.

The usual orders were renewed for keeping clocks in perfect order, cleaning glass in windows, doors and skylight, inspection and insurance of elevators and plumber's and carpenter's supplies for use of employees. The usual supplies for cleaning purposes have been furnished. Machinery, kerosene, boiled linseed and raw linseed oil, distilled water and electrical and engine supplies were furnished for use of Engineers. A water distiller and condensing tank was furnished and erected complete in engine room. All the flag-staffs on roof were painted, new halyards properly reevel were furnished and at base of one of the flag poles a new metal collar was furnished and put in place. place.

The Elevators.

No. 1—4 main lifting and 2 counter-weight cables were renewed, hand rope repaired and a safety tank placed on pressure valve.

No. 2—Hand rope repaired and 4 main lifting and 2 counter-weight cables were renewed.

No. 3—Piston and operating valve repacked, 2 counter-weights and 1 lever operating cable

renewed.

renewed.

No. 4—Hand rope repaired and 2 counter-weight cables renewed.

No. 6—Automatic cut-off cable adjusted, 4 main lifting and 2 counter-weight cables renewed.

Recorder's Private Office—The order for use of telephone in above office was renewed.

District Attorney's Office—4 typewriters, 4 typewriters' chairs, 1 letter copying press and stand furnished. Four typewriters in use in above office were entirely overhauled and repaired.

Court of General Sessions—Vol. 3 "Rice on Evidence" furnished, and in Judges' Chambers toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, also furnished.

Clerk's Office, Court of General Sessions—Toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, furnished.

Supreme Court Part I.- In Judges' Chambers of above courts a toilet cabinet, with a supply of

clean towels, was furnished.

Civil Service Board—Books, papers, etc., were removed from the office in Borough of Brooklyn to office in Borough of Manhattan. The old lettering on doors were removed, and doors relettered, and in the Labor Bureau a telephone with extension desk sub-connected with exchange furnished.

COUNTY COURT-HOUSE.

The usual orders for a supply of steam and inspection and insurance of elevators were renewed. Cleaning supplies and two barrels machinery oil were furnished. The following repairs to the four boilers in above court-house were made, fire-boxes relined, bridge walls rebuilt, new cheek blocks and arch plates furnished and set in place.

Supreme Court—500 assignment cards of Justices of above court furnished and the New York Law Journals were bound.

Surrogates' Court—One desk and desk chair furnished and four safes were moved as directed.

County Clerk's Office—The order for the telephone now in above office was renewed, I time stamp clock and a supply of law books were furnished. I water-closet was put in and the location of 2 water-basins were changed.

CITY HALL.

The order for the supply of steam to above building was renewed. Cleaning supplies were furnished, 9 awnings complete were put up, window shades and window tops made of best quality shade cloth, hung on Hartshorn spring rollers, with fixtures complete, were hung throughout the

Mayor's Office—The following articles for use in the above office were furnished: I desk, I table, I file cabinet, I typewriter's chair, I perforator for bonds, I Brooklyn directory, 54 volumes of the reports of the Court of Appeals, I copy of Adh's Consolidation Act with amendments, 2 copies of the Charter of Greater New York and one copy of the Penal Code. Extension sets of telephone instruments connected with exchange; orders for same were renewed, also for the use of

Municipal Assembly—An order was given for the use of telephone connected with exchange, also for the use of toilet cabinets and a supply of clean towels weekly, 2 signs lettered on tin as directed, 97 copies of Ash's Greater New York Charter, 89 copies of the book of maps showing the political divisions of The City of New York and a letter copying press and stand furnished. An order for a sufficient supply of electric current to operate motor for exhaust fan was also given.

President of Municipal Council—One oak door centre panel of glass, lower part of same ground glass and upper part etched "President of Municipal Council" was furnished and hung complete; 7 chairs, 2 desks, I table, I costomer, I letter copying press and stand and I screen also furnished.

President of the Borough of Manhattan—The following articles were furnished for use of above office: I toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly, I letter copying press, 4 dozen copying pads, I letter-press stand, I bulletin board with 15 glass doors, I typewriter, I typewriter's desk, I water cooler, I revolving bookcase, I long table, 2 rugs, 2 desks, 12 leather seat chairs and I copy of the Charter of Greater New York. Municipal Assembly-An order was given for the use of telephone connected with exchange,

City Clerk-An order was given for the use of an extension desk set of telephone instruments, City Clerk—An order was given for the use of an extension desk set of telephone instruments, also telephone connected with exchange during year 1898. Safes were moved as directed, also the following furnished: I letter copying press and stand, a supply of law books, and the use of a toilet cabinet and a supply of clean towels weekly. Old desks that were not in use in the Brownstone Building, but could be used in above office were repaired, painted, grained, varnished, removed and set in place. On desks in above office an iron railing about 41 feet long, of selected pattern, with gate, cash openings and O.G. Division panels finished in bronze was made and put up.

Bureau of Licenses—A new flooring was laid in above Bureau and carpenter work consisting of shelving, repairs to desks, etc., was also done.

BROWNSTONE BUILDING.

The usual order for the insurance and inspection of elevators was renewed. The top and Included order for the insurance and inspection of relevators was reduced. The top and bottom cylinder heads of elevator were removed and replaced to permit of inspection of entire length of rods, which were found satisfactory. I short lever for steam pump was turnished. The City Court now occupies the above building, and to make same tenantable for the use of above court the following repairs, additions and alterations have been made, all of which have been done in a satisfactory manner:

in a satisfactory manner:

Mason-work—All walls, partitions, stairs, etc., which require altering, also the removal of furnaces, pipes, etc., in the cellar not required in altering the present heating and ventilating system, has been done.

The present cellar floor has been excavated 8 inches below the present level and filled in with clean sand or ashes to a depth of 5 inches, then 4 inches of concrete formed of 5 parts of broken stone, 3 parts sand and 1 part of Dyckernoff cement, finished on top with 1 inch of the best form of Granolithic pavement.

Where old wooden floors have been removed from toilet-rooms, new marble floors have been replaced and changes made in the mason-work. New bluestone and granite piers have been placed where required.

placed where required.

Ironwork—New girders formed of rolled beams (steel), cast-iron separators and steel plates have been placed over second story. Also cast-iron columns have been placed to support third story

floor and partitions.

There have been cast-iron lintels of 1-inch metal placed where required, together with all anchors, etc., where necessary; also all ironwork painted one good coat of asphalt paint before

being set.
Ornamental Iron Contract—Cast-iron stairs have been built leading to basement and storage vaults beneath.

Court Rails-Cast-iron rails have been placed in court-rooms where required, together with

Court Kails—Cast-fron fails have been placed in contributions where required, together with other necessary work.

Plastering—All partitions, ceilings, cornices, furring, etc., have been covered with the best approved galvanized iron wire laths, and covered with the approved plastering, as per specifications, together with all old work requiring repairing.

Carpentering—The entire carpentering work of building has been overhauled, and where necessary the following work has been done: Lintels, window frames, priming, chain weights, glazing, floors, cementing jambs, saddles, trim lockers, etc., have been replaced with new, in first class manner. first-class manner.

Hardware—New hardware has been furnished and all old hardware, where necessary, has been

Roofing—The entire roof and skylights have been repaired and left in first-class condition.

Steam-heating Work—The present steam-heating apparatus has been overhauled, radiators changed and the entire system put in good condition.

Marble Work—The marble tiles have been removed from the new clerks' offices and replaced in best manner, also all the floor on all stories, including the new jury-room on third story. Also all other marble work throughout the entire building.

Plumbing and Drainage—The plumbing and drainage work throughout the entire building has been overhauled and placed in first-class condition, according to the specifications.

Cabinet Work—The entire cabinet work of building has been overhauled and, where necessary, the following work has been attended to: Bookcases in library, doors of cases replaced with French plate glass, shelving put up, etc.

Painting—The entire building has been painted, grained, etc., including all iron work, and left in first-class condition. Also all decorative painting has been overhauled where required. In addition Judges' benches, jury boxes and rails, court furniture, etc., have been erected and furnished; 216 window shades have been hung on Hartshorn spring rollers throughout the building. A total of 33 new gas-lamps and 10 new electric-lamps having been lighted, 48 gas-lamps relighted and 851 gas-lamps, 103 naphtha-lamps and 10 electric-lamps discontinued. The total number of public lamps lighted at the close of the quarter was 24,517 gas, 1,175 naphtha and 4,570 electric-lamps, making a total of 30,262; of which 22,745 are in the Borough of Manhattan, 7,134 in the Borough of The Bronx and 383 in Long Island City, Borough of Queens.

Dear Sir—Attached please find tabulated report of work done by Electrical Inspection Bureau of Interior Wiring from January 1 to March 31 last.

The actual working time includes 76 days, during which 10 men were employed, as follows:

1 Chief Inspector, 6 Inspectors, 1 Stenographer, 2 Clerks.

The total number of electrical installations inspected is shown as 2,577, or an average of 33.9 per day. These installations consisted of 125,963 incandescent lamps, the daily average number of incandescent lamps installed being 1,657.4; 1,222 arc lamps, a daily average of 16; 603 motors of aggregate horse-power capacity of 4,402¾, the average horse-power installed per day being 59.11, and 60 generators with aggregate capacity of 3,849½ kilowatts, the daily average kilowatt capacity installed being 50 and .65.

The total number of inspections made is shown as 6,082, the daily average being 80.02, or an average for each installation of 2.36. The average number of inspections made during the quarter by each inspector being 1,013.66, or an average of 13.33 per man per day.

507 notices of violations of rules were issued during the quarter, being an average of 6.67 per day, or an average per installation of .19.

Owing to the fact that the Municipal authorities of The City of New York have questioned the validity of all contracts entered into by the former Town Boards (Trustees) and the several lighting companies for lighting the towns and villages throughout the Borough of Queens, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment failed to make any appropriation for lamps and lighting in the Borough of Queens with the exception of Long Island City.

Pending a ruling of the Courts apropos of this matter, these companies continue to light their respective districts as far as permitted by their incomplete system, all new work having been stopped by this Department (in accordance with the instructions of the Corporation Counsel).

The Hollis lighting district was formerly lighted by the New York and New Jersey Globe Gas-light Company, whose contract expired on April 15, 1898, and as the Jamaica Electric-light Company was unable to complete its plant and have its lights in operation by the 15th day of April, as stipulated by the terms of its contract (owing to the action of this Department), the said district is now without any lighting facilities, which is incompatible with public interest and creates a condition that is a menace to public safety.

In conjunction with a Sanitary Inspector, I have made a thorough examination of the Municipal Buildings in the Borough of Queens, within the jurisdiction of this Department, and find that the plumbing in the Town Halls of Jamaica, Flushing and Newtown is in an unsanitary

Borough Hall, Long Island City, possessed by The City of New York by virtue of lease and officially occupied by the Departments of Sewers, Highways, Street Cleaning, Water Supply, Finance, the Deputy City Clerk and the President of the Borough, as considered hygienically, is in such an unsanitary condition as to endanger the health of the occupants of the building. The plumbing has been condemned by the Health Department, and the owner of the building notified

to make the repairs and alterations necessary to put it in a sanitary condition, but he has declined to comply, on the ground that his lease simply requires that he shall keep the roof in repair.

In conclusion, I respectfully recommend that legal steps be immediately taken to determine the legality of all lighting contracts in the Borough of Queens for the public welfare and the better administration of this Department.

Have prepared spec fications for the repair and repainting of the Village Hall, in the First Ward of this Borough, lately injured by fire. Secured estimates and let contracts for the same. Work now in course of procedure.

Granted permits for repair work on overhead construction to the Staten Island Flactice, the

Work now in course of procedure.

Granted permits for repair work on overhead construction to the Staten Island Electric, the Staten Island Midland and the Staten Island Electric Railroad Company, and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company. Notified the Police Department concerning permits issued.

Inspection is being made as to the condition of poles, wires and overhead construction throughout the Borough, and the information received will become a record in this Department for the proper prosecution of its business. This, together with the appointment and assignment to their several duties of the various men employed by the Department in the Borough, and the correspondence, both local and departmental, incident to the transaction of public business, in a general way covers the working of the office during the quarter.
