

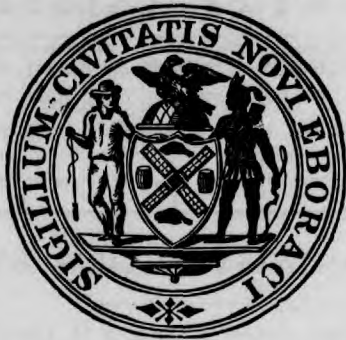

### MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

SESSION OF THE MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTING THE BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Held in the Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, Thursday, January 5, 1899, at 12 o'clock noon.  
Hon. Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor, called the meeting to order.

Van Wyck, Mayor of The City of New York, do hereby call a session of the members of the Municipal Assembly, representing the Borough of Manhattan, to be held in the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, in the City Hall, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on January 5, 1899, at 12 o'clock noon, for the election of a President of the Borough of Manhattan, in place of the Honorable Augustus W. Peters, deceased.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal of office, this second day of January, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine.
