Communications Received.

From the Civil Service Commission—Transmitting copy of Municipal Civil Service Rules, with proposed amendments, with the view of simplifying such rules. Suggestions requested from Department of Correction. Public hearing to be held. Suggested changes of interest to the Department of Correction under consideration. Referring to request for granting a non-competitive examination to Daniel J. McCann, Assistant Foreman, to sixth grade Clerk, the Commission calls attention to the fact that such promotion would not be "in the direct line of duty and according to grade," and request, therefore, cannot be complied with. Copy of letter sent to Mr. McCann, Assistant Foreman at the Kings County Penitentiary. Transmitting eligible list for position of Keeper. All notified to call at office on October 9, 1903. Certifying names from list for position of Stationary Engineman. William Rooney, veteran, must be given the preference. Rooney failed to respond to letter sent to him; Brown is ill, and unable to accept; Trumble has a position. Approving the appointment of Dr. Francis J. Ellis as Resident Physician at Riker's Island, for one week, under the provisions of rule 7, paragraph 2. On file.

From the Comptroller—Returning proposal of the P. R. Mitchell Company for supplies, for substitution of the sureties. Substitution approved. Receipt for security deposits accompanying proposals received this day. Certificate indorsed upon the proposals of Henry Wieber, of No. 28 East Twentieth street (1) for heating Warden's house, and (2) for heating dormitory, both on Riker's Island. Contractor notified. Time allowance begins October 1, 1903. Returning proposal of the P. R. Mitchell Company for supplies, with approval of the sureties. Award to be made and contracts drawn.

From the District Attorney—Stating that Christopher Walter, now confined in the City Prison, charged with assault, seems to be suffering from softening of the brain, or some other malady, and asking that said prisoner be transferred to Bellevue Hospital for examination.

Letter of District Attorney acknowledged. Warden instructed to have prisoner transferred to Bellevue.

From the Corporation Counsel—Stating that Mr. Justice Leventritt had appointed two Examiners in Lunacy to ascertain the mental condition of Simon Erenstoft, an alleged insane prisoner. On file.

From the Department of Docks and Ferries—Acknowledging request of Department of Correction for repair and extension of dock at Hart's Island, and repair of dock at foot of East Seventieth street, and stating that these matters would receive consideration.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Proceedings of the Municipal Explosives Commission at meeting held on Monday, October 12, 1903, at 4 p. m.

Present—Fire Commissioner and Chairman Thomas Sturgis and Commissioners Charlton, Eaton and McKenna.

Reading of minutes of meetings held October 7 and 8 was dispensed with.

The sub-committee appointed to investigate the circumstances connected with the reported explosion of a tank in the automobile storage warehouse at Fifty-fourth street and Broadway presented a report, which was read and approved and ordered on file.

Commissioner Eaton reported that he had a conference with Mr. W. A. Anderson, Superintendent of the Bureau of Surveys of the New York Board of Fire Underwriters, with a view of arranging for a series of joint conferences between representatives of the Board of Underwriters and the members of this Commission to consider the tentative regulations, as formulated by this Commission, governing the storage, sale, etc., of volatile and inflammable oils before same are finally adopted. After discussion the Acting Secretary was directed to inform Mr. Anderson that Friday, October 23, 1903, at 3.30 p. m. would be convenient for the members of this Commission to attend a joint conference.

The Commission resumed consideration of chapter 3, Part VI., proposed regulations governing chemical manufactories and technical establishments, completing said chapter in tentative form with the exception of two schedules, which Commissioner McKenna stated he had in process of preparation and would shortly submit to the Commission.

Upon motion, the Commission adjourned until Tuesday, October 13, 1903.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
