The plot of ground is in three ownerships, the first having a frontage on Pennsylvania avenue of 150 feet, with a depth of 105 feet; the second having a frontage of 80 feet on Pennsylvania avenue, with a depth of 110 feet, and the third having a frontage of 51 feet on Pennsylvania avenue, with a depth of 110 feet.

(c) Omit feed water heater, separators, connections to feed water heater, water weigher connections to engine and compressors, exhaust mains, exhaust head, mains from feed water heater and overhead cranes in engine room.

A contract for the major portion of the work called for in the specifications, apwork proposed to be done under the plans and specifications now before the Board for approval include the balance of the original contract omitted on account of the contemplated changes to the electrical work which have now been approved by the De-

partment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

I have no criticisms to make of the specifications or plans. Concerning the estimate of cost (\$229,000), I have been unofficially informed by the architect that since the original estimate of cost was figured (upon which the appropriation of \$1,350,000 was based), a power plant and other items have been added, and he has some doubt as to the work being completed at the estimate given above, but competition may bring the work within the estimate given by the Department.

Therefore, I herewith transmit resolution to be adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approving the plans and specifications at an estimated cost of \$229,000 of the above-described work. Respectfully,

In connection therewith, I report as follows:

Three years ago day camps for tuberculosis patients were opened on the old ferry-

boat "Middletown," at the foot of East 91st street, Manhattan, and the ferryboat "Susquehanna," at the foot of North 2d street, Brooklyn. The "Middletown" was maintained by the Women's Auxiliary of the Department of Health Clinics until a year ago, when the Sinking Fund Commission transferred the boat to the custody of the Department of Health. Since then the employees on the boat, with the exception of one as provided by chapter 659, Laws of 1910, to an amount not exceeding six hundred Nurse, have been supplied by the Department of Health. The expenses for provisions and twelve dollars and fifty cents (\$612.50), redeemable from the tax levy of the year and supplies have been paid by the Auxiliary. The Brooklyn Bureau of Charities has succeeding the year of their issue.


