Amended No. 10—This is a plan showing a sewer in Hunters Point ave., between Hayward st. and East ave., to permit paving improvements to proceed.

Amended No. 21—To provide for changing the outlet of the sewer in DeKalb ave., between Onderdonk ave. and Seneca ave.

Amended No. 10—A plan showing amended sizes and grades in Thompson ave., between Orton st. and Van Dam st., rendered necessary by grade changes.

Amended No. 40B—Showing new grades and sizes of sewers due to the extension of Colby st., from Freedom ave. to Atlantic ave.

Amended No. 40B—Showing new grades and sizes of sewers rendered necessary by the change in the street layout particularly, Ashland ave., between Oxford ave. and Myrtle ave.

BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Dear Sir—I herewith submit quarterly report of the transactions of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of Queens, for the quarter ended September 30, 1913. Yours respectfully,

Flushing, October 15, 1913.

The principal work done under the supervision of this Bureau during the quarter ended September 30, 1913, was as follows:

Queens County Court House, Long Island City—The hallways in this building from the first floor to dome have been renovated, cracks in ceilings and side walls have been cut out, replastered and painted two coats of paint. All railings and woodwork have been cleaned and varnished. A new private entrance has been made on the first floor connecting hallway with Judges' chambers. The three steam boilers have been relined with fire brick, and the back walls surrounding boilers have been rebuilt. The floors in boiler room have been repaired with concrete where necessary, new exhaust pipe has been installed, and two pumps taken apart and thoroughly overhauled. The coping on the rear of the building has been reset and all joints cemented. Considerable difficulty has been experienced owing to the stoppage of the main sewer pipe connecting the Court House and jail with the sewer, necessitating the digging up of pipe from the building to sewer. The plumbing in the building has been regularly inspected, repaired when necessary, and kept in good working condition. Repairs have been made to main passenger elevator and new parts installed. The electrical equipment has been examined by the Electrician of this Bureau and kept in good order. All minor repairs have been made throughout the building as occasion required. The plaza in front of the building has been kept in an attractive manner with flower beds and shrubbery, and the grass regularly cut.

Borough Hall, Long Island City—Carpenters and Painters have been employed in this building throughout the quarter, making alterations and repairs, and renovating the offices of the various bureaus. The plumbing has been overhauled in the prin-

cipal toilet, new basins, flush tanks, etc., have been installed. The electrical work consists of removing old equipment from the offices of the Bureau of Highways and installation of new equipment in the Statistical office, changing locations and extending wiring, recharging batteries, adjusting bells and buzzers, cleaning panel cut-outs and service board, etc.

Interior Bath, 8th st., Long Island City—Repairs have been made to tile floors, steam and hot water boilers, plumbing, electrical appliances and other small repairs made to the interior and exterior of the building. The attendance at this bath during the quarter was as follows: July: males, 8,225; females, 3,553. August: males, 6,327; females, 2,497. September: males, 5,225; females, 2,130. Total: males, 19,774; females, 8,180.

Free Floating Bath, Foot of Jamaica ave., Astoria, Long Island City—This bath was in commission from June 16 to September 15, 1913. During the season it was kept in good condition and used extensively by males and females. Appended is the attendance from date of opening until closing: June: males, 2,790; females, 1,717. July: males, 14,887; females, 8,044. August: males, 11,920; females, 6,161. September: males, 3,248; females, 2,485. Total: males, 32,845; females, 18,407. After closing the bath on September 15, stairways, landing platforms, etc., were disconnected from the bath, and everything put in order for the winter and placed in charge of a Watchman.

Town Hall, Jamaica—The steam boilers have been taken apart, cleaned and new parts installed where necessary. New leader pipes have been placed on building where the old ones were rusted out, and repairs made to gutters. Small repairs have been made by Plumbers, Carpenters and Painters. The most necessary work of replacing plaster ceilings with metal was not accomplished during this quarter as funds were not available for the purpose. An issue of special revenue bonds recently approved, will permit this work to be done at an early date. Work is now under way grading and laying a new concrete sidewalk on the Fulton st. and Flushing ave. sides of the building. The grounds adjoining this building have been cared for by the Gardener, flower beds maintained, shrubbery trimmed, and grass cut.

Comfort Station, Jamaica—This station has been regularly cared for by the cleaning force of the Town Hall, Jamaica. Owing to the materials of various kinds that are thrown in the basins, the services of a Plumber have been required almost continuously. Repairs have been made as required.

Magistrates' Court Building, Far Rockaway—This building was put in good order during the previous quarter, and only few small repairs have been necessary during the present quarter.

County Building, Jamaica—The boilers in this building have been cleaned and repaired, new smoke pipe installed connecting furnaces with chimney. The plumbing has been repaired from time to time and new closet seats, flush tanks, etc., furnished. All necessary repairs have been made to woodwork, new sash cord put in windows, painting, glazing, etc. Electrical repairs have been made to lighting and private telephone systems, and panel and switchboards cleaned.

St. Marys Lyceum Building, Long Island City, Magistrates and Municipal Courts—Repairs have been made by Carpenters, Painters and Plumbers. Cabinets made for filing Court documents and other papers, repairs to desks, chairs and seats in settees.

Post Office Building, Long Island City, Second and Third Floors—During the quarter, offices have been acquired in the above-named building for the use of bureaus under the Department of the President, Borough of Queens, numerous alterations have been made to partitions, plumbing, etc. A laboratory has been equipped, and installation of a complete electric lighting system is now in progress. Walls, ceilings and woodwork have been painted, and awnings and window shades placed on the windows.

Town Hall, Newtown—New toilet facilities have been supplied in the Judges' private office; carpentry, plumbing and painting and general repairing done when necessary; testing and repairing bell and annunciator systems have been taken care of by the Electrician.

Town Hall, Flushing—Painting, lettering, office signs, repairing locks, door knobs and hinges. Installing new flush tanks and seats in toilets; also general repairs to plumbing; jobbing by Carpenter and Tinsmith. The electric lighting system has been cared for and panel and switchboards cleaned.

In addition to the work of repairs mentioned, the buildings have been regularly cleaned, the buildings supplied with fuel, ice, water, towel supply and all necessary Janitors' cleaning supplies.

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the work done by the Topographical Bureau for the months of July, August and September, 1913:

Before proceeding to a detailed description of the work done by this office, a few words regarding its duties and organization may facilitate a better understanding of the details that follow.

The work of this Bureau falls naturally into two divisions: First, to quote from the Greater New York Charter, "to prepare a map of that part of the territory embraced within the Borough, of which a map or plan has not heretofore been finally established and adopted;" and second, make the surveys and maps required by Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment.

For the better prosecution of this work, the force of this office is similarly divided into two divisions—one division charged with the preparation of the Final Map of the Borough; the other division charged with all work incidental to Street Opening Proceedings.

The division charged with the preparation of the Final Map of the Borough is divided into three corps:

Monumenting Corps—Charged with all the surveys and field work incidental to the preparation of the Final Map and the Monumenting of the Borough.

Computing Corps—Charged with all the computations incidental to the preparation of the Final Map of the Borough.

Drafting Corps—Charged with all drafting work required to prepare the Final Maps.

The division charged with the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment is subdivided into two corps:

Surveying Corps—Charged with all the field work necessary to the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners.

Office Corps—Charged with all the computations and drafting necessary for the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners.

In addition to the several corps mentioned above, we have a small corps engaged in gathering data, and making reports, concerning the legal status of the various streets in the Borough.

The following detailed description of the work done by this Bureau is arranged according to the work performed by these several corps and in the order in which they are mentioned above. Respectfully,

Monumenting Corps.

During this quarter this corps has succeeded, by a reading of the old village records of College Point, and by means of affidavits from old citizens of College Point, in establishing the fact that 29 streets in the Village of College Point were paved and paid for by the former village, and can thereby be repaved out of Repaving Fund.

What we have done in proving that these streets in College Point were paved by that village, and thereby entitled to repaving out of the Repaving Fund, could be extended to other sections of the Borough at a small cost, and I would suggest that some means be devised whereby we could make further investigations of a similar nature.

We are also using the facts obtained by this investigation to secure from the Corporation Counsel opinions that these streets are legally dedicated streets of The City of New York.

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU.

Hon. JOSEPH FLANAGAN, Commissioner of Public Works:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the work done by the Division of Substructures of the Topographical Bureau for the months of July, August and September, 1913.

The purpose of this division is to accurately locate and map all substructures in the streets of the Borough. These consist of electric and telephone conduits, gas and water pipes, sewers, vaults, tunnels, cesspools, etc.

The Borough has been subdivided into sections and sections Nos. 1 and 2, which includes all of Long Island City, have been plotted upon layout maps, which show the complete street and monument systems of the section, are indices of the final record maps; they show the exact boundaries of each sheet and provide a system of numbers by which to designate the sheets.

A system for obtaining notice of every permit granted in the Borough has been established and the division is at present receiving daily memoranda of permits granted in the 1st Ward, which permits are being investigated and the installations located.

The forces of this division fall naturally into two parts: The field force, engaged in making surveys and locations; the office force, engaged in indexing, mapping and filing.

During the quarter ending June 30, 1913, 12,640.48 feet of vitrified pipe sewers from 12 inches to 30 inches in diameter, or 2.39 miles; 3,755.93 linear feet of concrete sewer 29 inches by 40 inches in diameter to double 13 feet by 9 feet, or .71 miles, making a total of 16,396.41 linear feet built during the quarter, thus making the mileage of the sewerage system 326.24 miles; 58 basins were also built, which makes a total of 3,648 basins connected with the sewerage system.

During the quarter ending June 30, 1913, there were entered into 49 contracts, amounting to \$1,151,073.34.

There were 36 contracts completed during the quarter to the amount of \$719,883.18, and work is going on in connection with 87 contracts, amounting to \$4,182,504.13, on which \$1,316,904.39 in payments have been made.

There are 19 contracts, representing an estimated cost of \$183,492.06, either executed or being advertised.

Twenty-one assessment lists were forwarded.

During the quarter the following work was done and materials used in the maintenance and repairs of streets in the Borough:

Paving—Granite pavement, tar and gravel joints repaired, 2,519 square yards; granite pavement, tar and gravel joints and base repaired, 68 square yards; granite pavement on sand repaired, 8,301 square yards; wood block pavement repaired, 183 square yards; asphalt block pavement surface and base laid, 50 square yards; asphalt block pavement repaired, 649 square yards; concrete pavement repaired, 5 square yards; sanding wood block pavement, 74,535 square yards; experimental pavement (White Plains ave.) repaired, 305 square yards.

The Topographical Bureau reports for the quarter the preparation of 13 rule maps for 18 streets, 13 damage maps for 18 streets, embracing 359 plots covering 3,785,901.50 square feet, or 1,514,369 city lots; 8 benefit maps covering 3,957 plots, and 638 final damage and benefit maps.

The Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices expended \$4,855.28 on supplies furnished to the several public buildings of the Bureau for the quarter.

During the quarter 121 petitions were considered by the Local Boards of Morristania, Chester, Crotona and Van Cortlandt, as follows:

Number of Proceedings Considered—For regulating, grading, etc., 35; for sewer construction and appurtenances (embracing 44 streets), 22; for acquiring title to lands necessary for streets and avenues, 12; for paving with granite blocks (5 streets), 4; for receiving basins, 8; for placing guard rails, 5; for flagging, 3; for paving with sheet asphalt, 3; for paving with block asphalt (14 streets), 4; for paving with bituminous concrete on cement, concrete foundation, 12; for laying out map of City of New York, 1; total number of petitions considered, 121.

Of the petitions considered 83 were adopted and resolutions forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

The Building Bureau reports that during the quarter, plans and specifications were filed to the number of 113 for 135 buildings, the estimated cost of which is \$2,651,150.

Of the number of applications received 17 were for other than frame dwelling houses, to cost less than \$20,000 each, estimated at a total of \$115,800; 31 for frame dwellings, estimated at a total of \$125,700; 11 stores at an estimated cost of less than \$15,000 each, to cost about \$95,950, and 28 tenement houses over \$15,000 each to cost in the aggregate \$1,474,000.

There were 240 alterations to buildings, plans being filed amounting to an estimated cost of \$368,488. Work was begun on 129 new buildings during the quarter, and there were completed in the same time 297, leaving 516 new buildings in progress. Alterations were commenced on 197 buildings; alterations completed on 150 buildings, leaving alterations on 270 buildings in progress.

During the quarter there were 106 violations of the building law for defective plumbing; 301 for defective construction and material; 432 for erecting and altering without permit; and 102 for unsafe buildings. Notices were issued to remove violations of the law to the number of 1,085, and to remove unsafe buildings, 177.

Complaints to the number of 314 were received, and upon investigation were remedied, except in 229 instances where complaints were unfounded, and in 85 cases notices were issued.

Passenger elevators to the number of 95 were investigated and found to be in compliance with the law. Respectfully,

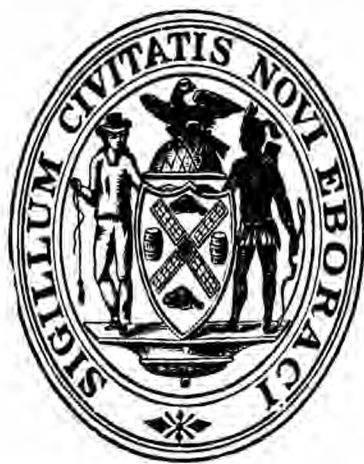

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
