

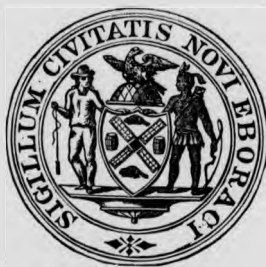

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the Meeting held September 23d, 1884.

Present—Franklin Edson, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; S. Hastings Grant, Comptroller; Henry B. Laidlaw, Chamberlain; and Hugh J. Grant, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following report of the Chamberlain and Comptroller, to whom were referred the communication from the Armory Board, recommending the purchase of twenty (20) lots, situated between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets and Ninth and Tenth avenues, as a site for an armory for the Twelfth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y.:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Comptroller and Chamberlain, to whom were referred the annexed communication from the Armory Board, relative to the purchase of a site and the erection of an armory for the Twelfth Regiment, N. G., respectfully

REPORT:

That they have visited the property proposed to be purchased, situated on Ninth avenue, Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, and are satisfied that it is a desirable site for an armory for the said regiment. The price (\$208,000) is deemed to be fair and reasonable. They recommend, therefore, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund concur in the action of the Armory Board. The following resolution is accordingly submitted for adoption.

GENTLEMEN—The application of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, for a lease of the premises corner of One Hundred and Forty-third street and College avenue, for the use of said Department, having been referred to the Comptroller, I respectfully

REPORT:

That these premises are now in use by the Park Department, the lease of which expired last May, and it appears to be necessary to continue the use of the same for the said Department. I consider the rent fair and reasonable, and submit a resolution to authorize a lease of said premises.

Townsend & Co., from October 1, 1884, to June 1, 1885, at the rate of \$1.50 per day for each bath, is herewith submitted, and, as I consider the rent to be fair and reasonable, I submit a resolution to authorize such lease.

SIR—I am in receipt of your letter under date of September 1, 1884, inclosing specifications for a proposed contract for lighting Ward's Island by electricity, and stating that the Department of Public Charities and Correction has applied to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its consent to the advertising and making of such contract. This application seems to be induced by the circumstance that the articles which will have to be used under such contract are patented, and that therefore the conditions to secure a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition are to be prescribed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided in section 63 of the Consolidation Act.

My predecessor, Mr. William C. The amounts herein requested to be transferred can be spared from the several appropriations from which they are proposed to be taken.

The reasons for which these transfers are required are as follows:

Heretofore the appropriation for "Contingencies" was charged with such traveling expenses only as are incurred in the general business of the Department, and traveling expenses incurred on account of any particular work have been charged to and paid from the appropriation for such work. The Comptroller takes the view that they must all be charged to and paid from "Contingencies," which makes the transfer of \$10,000 to this account necessary. A considerable amount now due to officers and employees of the Department cannot be paid until the transfer is made.

The transfer of \$500 to "Lamps and Gas—Salaries" is needed, because in place of my estimate of \$6,920 for this appropriation the Final Estimate allows only \$5,816. The Comptroller insists that the wages of two employees in the Bureau of Incumbences, and several employees in the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies, which have heretofore been paid from "Removing Obstructions in Streets and Avenues," and from "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices," respectively, must be charged to the salary accounts attached to these appropriations, and this action makes the transfers to these two accounts necessary.

The effects of the large and constant increase in the consumption of water must be counteracted as far as possible by extending more and more the various measures for suppressing waste of water. The transfer of \$5,000 to the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc.—Salaries," is needed to enable the Department to continue this service effectively to the close of this year.

The transfers of \$2,000 to "Laying Croton Pipes—Salaries," and \$3,500 to "Repaving Streets and Avenues—Salaries," are required to pay for the proper inspection of pipe-laying and repavements for the remainder of the year. Each of these appropriations is about twenty-five per cent. less than the departmental estimate. It is necessary to make provision for the proper inspection of the work on repairs and improvements of Essex Market building, the iron shed or awning to be erected around Jefferson Market, and other works; and the transfer of \$1,000 to "Public Buildings—Construction and Repairs—Salaries" is needed for this purpose.

The transfer of \$1,000 to "Public Drinking Hydrants" is required because of the extra expenditure incurred this year in fitting the hydrants with stop-valves to prevent overflow and waste of water. Excavations made in the progress of repairs on Essex Market building show the foundations to be so bad as to render the building unsafe.

The addition of \$4,500 to the appropriation for that purpose is absolutely necessary to put the building in safe and proper condition.

Third—A strip of land thirty-three feet in width on each side of the centre line of the survey of said Aqueduct route as shown on said maps, said centre line beginning at a point on the boundary between the City of New York and the City of Yonkers, which point is distant about 220 feet northwesterly from the intersection of the said Croton Avenue, and is marked by a locust plug with a copper tack in a circle of red; thence running on a course north $22^{\circ} 31'$ east 103.70 feet to a point on the north side of Midland Avenue, and thence running on the said side of Midland Avenue to the intersection of the said side of Midland Avenue with the centre line of said Aqueduct route, and containing 1.572 acres, more or less, and including within its boundaries the Parcels numbered on said maps 77 and 78.

Fourth—A strip of land thirty-three feet in width on each side of the centre line of the survey of said Aqueduct route as shown on said maps, said centre line beginning at a point marked by a stake, which stake is distant 500 feet in a course south $70^{\circ} 30'$ east from the easterly right of way line of the New York City and Northern Railroad; thence running on a tangent (1) north $19^{\circ} 30'$ east 46.6 feet; thence (2) north $14^{\circ} 33'$ east 359.26 feet; said strip of land containing 10.093 acres, more or less, and including within its boundaries the Parcels numbered on said maps 252, 260, inclusive.

Fifth—A strip of land thirty-three feet in width on each side of the centre line of the survey of said Aqueduct route as shown on said maps; beginning on said centre line at a point distant 58 feet from the intersection of the dividing line between the lands supposed to be owned by James Pyle and the aforementioned lands of Knapp, and running thence along said centre line on a tangent north $34^{\circ} 52'$ east 32.7 feet to the point of intersection of the said centre line with the north side of Ashford road, at its intersection with said centre line, as shown on said maps; said strip of land containing 8.277 acres, more or less, and including within its boundaries the Parcels numbered on said maps 300, 301, 302, 303, 304, 305, 306, 307, 308, 309, 310, 311, 312, 313, 314, 315, 316, 317, 318, 319, 320, 321, 322, 323, 324, 325, 326, 327, 328, 329, 330, 331, 332, 333, 334, 335, 336, 337, 338, 339, 340, 341, 342, 343, 344, 345, 346, 347, 348, 349, 350, 351, 352, 353, 354, 355, 356, 357, 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
