

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 566 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 28, 1885, which is an increase of 9, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 135 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending November 21, 1885, was 536, which is 73.2 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 19.69 per 1,000 persons hving, the population estimated at 1,415,717.
