

COMMISSIONERS OF RAPID TRANSIT.

CITY OF NEW YORK, SATURDAY, April 12, 1879.

At a meeting of the Commissioners, held to-day, at the office of the Central Trust Company, corner of Pine and Nassau streets, at 10 o'clock A. M., there were Present—All the Commissioners, viz.: Henry F. Spaulding, Henry G. Stebbins, Benjamin G. Arnold, Lewis G. Morris, and Samuel R. Filley.

Upon motion of Mr. Filley, it was Resolved, That the Commissioners appointed by his Honor the Mayor of the City of New York, under and pursuant to the provisions of chapter 606 of the Laws of 1875, do now organize as a Board, with Mr. Henry G. Stebbins as President.

On motion of Mr. Spaulding, Mr. Filley was requested to act as Secretary of this meeting.

The Secretary then presented the applications made to his Honor the Mayor of the City of New York, of fifty reputable householders and taxpayers of the City and County of New York, verified upon oath before a Justice of the Supreme Court, that there is need in the City and County of New York of a steam-railway or railways for the transportation of passengers, mails, or freight, which applications are as follows: applications are as follows:

To Edward Cooper, Mayor of the City of New York:

Sir—We make this application to you under the first section of chapter 606 of the Laws of 1875, which provides as follows:

"Whenever it shall appear, by the application of fifty reputable householders and taxpayers of any county in this State, verified upon oath before a Justice of the Supreme Court, that there is need in such county of a steam railway or railways for the transportation of passengers, mails or freight, the Board of Supervisors of said county may, within thirty days after presentation to them of such application, duly verified as aforesaid, appoint five commissioners, who shall be residents of the said caunty, and who shall have full power and authority to do and provide all that they are hereinafter directed to do and provide, and a certificate of whose appointment, signed by the Chairman and Clerk of such Board, shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State, and a daplicate thereof in the office of the Clerk of such county. But whenever any such proposed railway shall be wholly within the limits of any city in the State, then such application shall be made only to the Mayor of said city, and such Mayor shall appoint such commissioners as aforesaid."

We are residents, householders, and taxpayers of the City and County of New York, and we severally allege that there is need in the City and County of New York, that is to say, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the said city, wholly within the limits of the said city, of a steam railway or railways, for the transportation of passengers, mails or freight.

We further allege, that there is special need of a steam railway or railways to connect the New York Elevated Railroad (which elevated railroad is now in actual operation), from different points on the southerly side of the Harlem river and of the Spuyten Duyvil Creek, with one or more points on the northerly side of said streams, and with one or more points in the said Twenty-third and Twenty-t

We therefore respectfully request, that you will appoint five Commissioners, residents of the City and County of New York, who shall have full power and authority to determine upon the necessity of such steam railway or railways, and to fix and determine the routes thereof, and to locate the same, and to determine the routes by which the said New York Elevated Railroad may connect with any other steam railways, or the depots thereof, or with steam ferries, and to do and provide all that the said commissioners are directed to do and provide by the said act.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,618, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 802 tenement houses, 146 private dwellings, 47 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 40 stables, 30 slaughter-houses, 3 lodging-houses, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 2 public sewers, 2 ash dumps, 7 manure dumps, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 3 gut-cleaning establishments, 28 sunken and vacant lots, 1 smokehouse, 2 uninhabitable dwellings, 60 yards, courts, and areas, 52 cellars and basements, 112 wastepipes and drains, 121 privies and water-closets, 37 street-gutters and sideswalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky chimney, 4 cesspools, 1 piggery, 11 other nuisances, together with 64 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 474.

During the past week 136 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The certificates of 406 births, 43 still-births, 167 marriages, and 512 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 19, 1879. This shows a decrease of 14 births, and an increase of 9 still-births, 49 marriages, and 41 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 34 births, and 51 deaths, and an increase of 13 still-births and 43 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week the deaths from croup decreased 2; whooping cough, 9; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 5; inanition, 1; cancer, 1; phthis pulmonalis, 13; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; enteritis, gastritis and peritonitis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 2; scarlatina, 31; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; rheumatism and gout, 2; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 6; heart diseases, 6; aneurism, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 4; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 16; premature and preternatural births, 1; and suicide, 1.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 99 were in institutions, 275 in tenement houses, 127 in houses containing 3 families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 78 on the first, 150 on the second, 88 on the third, 55 on the fourth, 24 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 509 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents. 55 were stated to be single, 145 married, 60 widowed, and the condition of 252 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 512; still-births, 43; bodies in transitu, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 58 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 406 births, 167 marriages, 43 still-births, 512 deaths, 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 39 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 24 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 19, 1879, was 45.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.983, the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,276, and the total amount of rain-fall was 2.09 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 492 deaths and still-births, or 88.65 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 7; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 213; City, (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 72; Greenwood (undenominational), 36; Lutheran, (undenominational), 75; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 40; Woodlawn (undenominational), 12; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Machpelah, L.
