

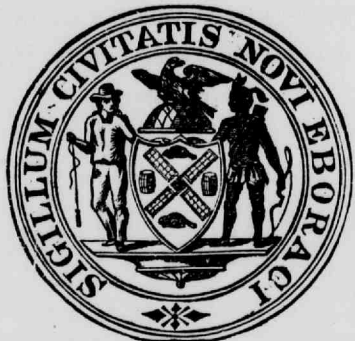

APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the Week ending June 21, 1879.*

Resolved, That the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of section 49 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, hereby authorize and approve of the selection made by the Commissioners of Police of the piece or parcel of land belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, and located on the west side of Elizabeth street, 100 feet south of Canal street, being 50 feet front and rear by 94 feet deep, as a site for the erection of a new station-house for the police force of the Sixth Precinct, hereby set apart, devote, and appropriate the said lots of land for the use and purpose of a site for a new station-house and prison for the contemplated new Sixth Precinct, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby authorized and requested to set apart and appropriate for the use and possession of the Police Department the said lots of land above described.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 16, 1879.

Resolved, That lamp-posts be erected and street-lamps lighted along the line of Riverdale avenue and Broadway, from the Presbyterian Church to the Thirty-fifth Precinct Station-house, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 16, 1879.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected, and lamps lighted in Denman place, from Union to Concord avenue (Twenty-third Ward), under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 16, 1879.

Resolved, That lamp-posts be erected and street-lamps lighted in Washington avenue, from Morris street to Talmadge street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 16, 1879.

Resolved, That Sixty-fifth street, from Eighth to Ninth avenue, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent accidents by the falling of flower pots, and other articles used for cultivating flowers, from the windows of buildings in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall not be lawful for any person to place or keep on any window-sill, railing of balcony, top of porch, or any other projection from any house or other building in the City of New York, any earthen flower-pots, wooden box, or other article or thing whatever for the cultivation or retention of flowers, shrubs, vines, or any other article or thing whatever, unless every such flower-pot, box or other article is securely and firmly fastened or protected by iron railings, so fastened as to render it impossible for any such pot, box, or other article to fall into the street, under a penalty of ten dollars for every offense, to be recovered in the manner now specified by law for the collection of fines imposed for violations of ordinances of the corporation.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 10, 1879.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 16, 1879.

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Common Council be and is hereby authorized and directed to cause one thousand copies of all laws relating particularly to this city, passed at the late session of the Legislature, to be printed in the usual manner, in document form, for the use of the Mayor, Common Council, and Departments; the expense of procuring certified copies of such laws, which shall not exceed the usual legal fees, to be paid from the appropriation for "City Contingencies" by the Comptroller.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 10, 1879.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 16, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to J. D. Hall to erect and retain a tin awning in front of premises occupied by him corner of Hudson and Franklin streets, known as Nos. 101 Hudson street and 165 Franklin street; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879.  
Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 17, 1879, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Samuel A. Suydam to retain the signs now on the awning in front of his place of business, No. 550 Hudson street, as shown on the annexed diagram, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879.  
Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 17, 1879, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to W. Wheeler Smith, agent, to erect an ornamental granite drinking-fountain, for man and beast, on the northwest corner of Madison avenue and Twenty-third street, as shown on the annexed diagram; and the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks are hereby requested to grant all the privileges that may be necessary to carry into effect this humane and generous offer, as the fountain, when completed, is to be donated to the city.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879.  
Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 17, 1879, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the Gold and Stock Telegraph Company is hereby directed and required to remove the telegraph pole belonging to that company now in front of the premises of R. Dunlap & Company, 191 Seventh avenue, to some point distant not less than twenty feet from its present location, and the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized and directed to cause the provisions of this resolution to be carried into effect.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879.  
Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 17, 1879, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Petero Marr to retain a stand as it is now situated in front of premises No. 14 Broad street, he having obtained the written consent of the tenant occupying said premises, which is hereto attached, said stand to remain the same size as it is at present, to wit, six (6) feet long by two (2) feet wide, to be taken down and stored inside the building every night; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Patrick Tuomey to place and retain stand for blacking boots at curb-stone line in front of premises No. 18 Broad street, the consent of occupant of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand to occupy a space not more than three feet in length and two feet in width; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Joseph Androchi to retain fruit-stand at the curb-stone in front of premises No. 82 Wall street, the consent of the occupant of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand not to be more than six feet long and two feet wide; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles Holmes to place and keep a stand for the sale of fruit, four and a half feet long and two and a half feet wide and of the usual height, on the sidewalk near curb-stone in front of No. 1 Murray street, permission being granted by the occupants of the building, the work to be done at his own expense; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Joseph Bonture to retain fruit-stand at the curb-stone on the southwest corner of Wall and Water streets, the consent of the occupants of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand not to be more than six feet long and two feet wide; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Thomas Kent to place and keep a stand for the sale of fruit in front of No. 68 South street, said stand not to be over four feet long by two feet wide; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Michael Garrity to keep a stand for the sale of fruit in front of No. 144½ Bowery, on the sidewalk; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. Kinney to place and keep fruit-stand on sidewalk at curb-stone line in front of premises northwest corner of Nassau and John streets, the consent of the occupant of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand to be not more than five feet long and two feet in width, of the usual height; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles Driscoll to place and keep fruit-stand on southeast corner of Liberty and Nassau streets, said stand to be not more than five feet long and twenty inches wide, and situated at the curb-stone line; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. Adele Prevot to place and keep stand for sale of fruits and candies at the curb-stone line in front of premises No. 21 Broad street, the consent of the occupant of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand to be not more than five feet long and two feet wide, and of the usual height; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Edward Fulbrook to place and retain fruit-stand on sidewalk at curb-stone line in front of premises No. 25 William street, the consent of occupants of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand to be not more than five feet long and two feet wide, and of the usual height; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 20, 1879.  
Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 3, 1879, with his objections thereto.  
In Board of Aldermen, June 17, 1879, taken up and considered, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to the Union League Club to extend the vault eight feet beyond the line of the curb-stone, commencing ten feet east of the house line from Fifth avenue on Thirty-ninth street, and running eastwardly along Thirty-ninth street, a distance of about sixty feet, provided the work be well and securely done, at their own expense, under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works, and that the usual fee be charged therefor.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 10, 1879.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 20, 1879.

Resolved, That the property known as "Sunnyside" and part of "Bassford Farm," in the Twenty-fourth Ward, be and is hereby excepted from the provisions of section 9 of chapter XIII. of the Revised Ordinances of 1859; said property is situated on the northerly side of Talmadge street, and between Railroad and Washington avenues, and belongs to Mrs. H. A. Shannon, and is inclosed.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 17, 1879.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 21, 1879.

### IN BOARD OF ALDERMEN,

JUNE 17, 1879.

Organized as required by chapter 208, Laws of 1879, being "An act to organize the Senate Districts, and for the apportionment of Members of Assembly of the State," the following apportionment of the Assembly Districts of the County of New York was made and adopted:

First District—All that part of the city bounded by the North and East rivers and lying within Peck slip, Ferry street, Gold street, Spruce street, Park row, Broadway, and Canal street, and including Governor's, Bedloe's, and Ellis Islands. Population 34,041.

Second District—All that part of the city lying within Canal street, Broadway, Park row, Spruce street, Gold street, Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Catharine street, and the Bowery. Population, 40,689.

Third District—All that part of the city lying within Canal street, Broadway, Twenty-third street, Third avenue, and the Bowery. Population, 41,454.

Fourth District—All that part of the city lying within Catharine street, Division street, Grand street, Jackson street, and East river. Population, 42,696.

Fifth District—All that part of the city lying within Canal street, Broadway, Bleecker street, Hancock street (or Cottage place), West Houston street, and North river. Population, 39,907.

Sixth District—All that part of the city lying within Division street, Grand street, Jackson street, East river, Stanton street, Clinton street, Rivington street, and Norfolk street. Population, 47,774.

Seventh District—All that part of the city lying within Broadway, West Twenty-third street, Seventh avenue, West Sixteenth street, Eighth avenue, West Fourth street, West Washington place, Sixth avenue, Carmine street, and Bleecker street. Population, 45,698.

Eighth District—All that part of the city lying within the Bowery, Stanton street, Clinton street, Rivington street, Norfolk street, and Division street. Population, 52,235.

Ninth District—All that part of the city lying within West Houston street, Hancock street (or Cottage place), Bleecker street, Carmine street, Sixth avenue, West Washington place, West Fourth street, Eighth avenue, West Sixteenth street, and North river. Population, 41,648.

Tenth District—All that part of the city lying within the Bowery, Third avenue, Eighth street (or St. Mark's place), Avenue A, Seventh street, Avenue B, Clinton street, and Stanton street. Population, 58,254.

Eleventh District—All that part of the city lying within East and West Twenty-third streets, Lexington avenue, East and West Forty-fifth streets, Seventh avenue, West Twenty-fifth street, and Sixth avenue. Population, 40,879.



Twelfth District—All that part of the city lying within Stanton street, Clinton street, Avenue B, East Eleventh street, and East river. Population, 45,937.

Thirteenth District—All that part of the city lying within West Sixteenth street, Seventh avenue, West Twenty-third street, Sixth avenue, West Twenty-fifth street, Seventh avenue, West Twenty-ninth street, Eighth avenue, West Thirty-second street, Ninth avenue, West Twenty-sixth street, and North river. Population, 43,973.

Fourteenth District—All that part of the city lying within Third avenue, East Fourteenth street, East river, East Eleventh street, Avenue B, Seventh street, Avenue A, and Eighth street (or St. Mark's place). Population, 37,623.

Fifteenth District—All that part of the city lying within Seventh avenue, West Fortieth street, North river, West Twenty-sixth street, Ninth avenue, West Thirty-second street, Eighth avenue, and West Twenty-ninth street. Population, 50,506.

Sixteenth District—All that part of the city lying within East Fourteenth street, East river, East Twenty-sixth street, and Third avenue. Population, 43,692.

Seventeenth District—All that part of the city lying within Seventh avenue, West Fifty-second street, North river, and West Fortieth street. Population, 43,331.

Eighteenth District—All that part of the city lying within Lexington avenue, East Twenty-third street, Third avenue, East Twenty-sixth street, East river, and East Forty-second street. Population, 41,858.

Nineteenth District—All that part of the city lying within West Fifty-second street, Seventh avenue, West Fifty-ninth street, Eighth avenue, West One Hundred and Tenth street, Seventh avenue, Harlem river, Spuyten Duyvil creek, and North river. Population, 42,501.

Twentieth District—All that part of the city lying within Lexington avenue, East Forty-second street, East river, and Fifty-ninth street, including Blackwell's Island. Population, 47,199.

Twenty-first District—All that part of the city lying within East and West Fortieth streets, Lexington avenue, East Eighty-sixth street, Transverse road across the Central Park, Eighth avenue, West Fifty-ninth street, and Seventh avenue. Population, 43,886.

Twenty-second District—All that part of the city lying within East Fifty-ninth street, East river, East Ninety-first street, Fifth avenue, East Eighty-sixth street, and Lexington avenue. Population, 40,351.

Twenty-third District—All that part of the city lying within East Ninety-first street, Fifth avenue, West One Hundred and Tenth street, Seventh avenue, Harlem river and East river, including Randall's and Ward's Islands, and that part of the Central Park lying north of the Transverse road, crossing the same at or about Eighty-sixth street. Population, 39,548.

Twenty-fourth District—All that part of the city lying north and east of Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil creek, and known as the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York. Population, 36,206.

Total population, 1,041,886.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held May 11, 1879.

Present—Commissioners Dimock and Vanderpoel.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair.

The minutes of the meeting held the 4th inst. were read and approved.

A communication was received from the Police Department, stating that they would require for the uses of the Bureau of Street Cleaning the whole of piers at Forty-sixth and at Twenty-second streets, East river; and, being read,

On motion, the application from said Department to have said premises assigned for their use was taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the piers at Twenty-second and at Forty-sixth streets, East river, be and are hereby set aside, during the pleasure of the Board, for the use of the Police Department, in order to furnish additional accommodation for the boats of the Bureau of Street Cleaning.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to address a communication to the Captain of the Port, stating that under the provisions of section 4 of chapter 677 of the Laws of 1872, this Department is obliged to furnish to the Board of Police suitable docks, piers, and slips needed for the purpose of removing street dirt, etc., and that, in accordance with the request of the Board of Police, this Department has assigned to its use the piers at Twenty-second and Forty-sixth streets, East river, and requesting that officer to issue such directions as will insure to said Board of Police the free use of said premises.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From Old Dominion Steamship Company, lessee of Pier, old 37, North river, to have Pier, new 26, North river, built upon the site thereof, and inclosing a tracing showing a modified plan of said pier.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare plans and specifications to have Pier, new 26, North river, built upon the lines submitted to and lately approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From Engineer-in-Chief—In reference to completion of boat landing at Pier, new 1, North river.

From J. Minster, Lessee—In reference to dredging at pier at One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Harlem river.

From Department of Public Charities and Correction—Stating the necessity of repairs being made to docks at Blackwell's, Randall's, and Ward's Islands, and at pier at Twenty-sixth street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make an examination, and report as to the repairs required to said premises, and the cost of doing the work.

From Charles Heckman—Requesting that action be taken to have the dumping board occupied by the Police Department removed from the corner of Seventeenth street and Avenue C to its former location, about three hundred feet from Avenue C, on the line of Seventeenth street, as at present it is a great detriment to the health of the residents occupying the block of buildings on the west side of Avenue C, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, owned by him.

Secretary directed to address a communication to the Police Department, stating the remonstrance made by Mr. Heckman against retaining said dumping board in its present location, and asking that this Board be advised for what reason the said dumping board, heretofore situated about three hundred feet from the east side of Avenue C, has been moved up the easterly side of said avenue.

From R. W. De Forest—In reference to the condition of bulkhead between Piers 41 and 42, East river.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to attend the meeting of the owners, at the office of George Briggs, 254 South street, on 13th instant, at 3 o'clock P. M., in relation to the rebuilding of the premises.

From Engineer-in-Chief—In relation to the damage sustained to the schooner O. F. Hawley by collision with the tug Manhattan, belonging to this Department, on the 2d instant.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Maine S. S. Co., lessee of Pier 38, East river, to drive piles and repair premises.

Permission granted; the work to be done, within the existing lines of the pier, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From Glasco Ice Co.—Application for permission to drive two piles on the bulkhead between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, North river, for the purpose of fastening boat-lines.

Permission granted; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From New York & Harlem Navigation Co.—Application for permission to drive ten piles underneath the dock at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, east of Third avenue.

Permission granted; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From Lawrence and Coe—Application for permission to drive twenty fender-piles at the foot of East street, in front of their store, in place of those displaced and broken.

Permission granted; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Report as to work performed during week ending June 7, 1879.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to place a backing log on the 84 feet of bulkhead on the north side of Pier, new 1, North river, and also to repair the approach to said pier.

On motion, the lessee of the east side of Pier 6, East river, was notified and directed to make the necessary repairs thereto, the Dock Superintendent of the district having reported that the planking on said pier, from South street to the bulkhead, is in a very bad condition.

On motion, the owners of the bulkhead between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets, East river, were notified and directed to repair said premises, the Dock Superintendent of the district having reported that the same is in a very unsafe condition.

On motion, the Board adjourned.
