BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF RAPID TRANSIT.

54 EXCHANGE PLACE,
NEW YORK, December 8, 1879. }

To his Honor EDWARD COOPER, Mayor:

SIR—The labors of the Rapid Transit Commission, appointed on the 30th of August last, having reached a point at which a review of their action on your part may prove agreeable and useful, this Board take the liberty of laying before you the following succinct statement of the steps they have so far taken in the performance of the duties imposed upon them by your appointment.

Having organized on the 11th of September, they gave public notice inviting suggestions as to the best available routes for rapid transit railways in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; and being in receipt of various propositions, they spent the first thirty days of their official term in examining, with the assistance of a skillful engineer appointed for that purpose, the merits of these suggestions, and comparing them with the routes designated by the Commissioners appointed on the 2d of April, 1879, also in visiting the territory and inquiring into its wants and capabilities.

Having satisfied themselves on the first point to be decided, they passed on the 10th of October a resolution declaring that there was a necessity in the City and County of New York for steam railways in addition to any then existing.

They thereupon prepared for the performance of the more important duty of designating the routes called for by that necessity.

In examining the wants and capabilities of the district, this Commission had become impressed with the importance of supplying the territory with a comprehensive system of steam railroads, running mainly between streets and avenues, and crossing none of the streets and avenues on grade, while such a system could yet be introduced at moderate cost. Remembering what great loss and what amount of inconvenience had resulted to the city from the want of such a system of steam communication, while the lower portion of Manhattan Island was filling up, this Commission could not help considering it of the first importance that the present favorable opportunity of supplying that great want to the district for all time to come should not be lost.

Having this paramount object in view, this Commission, already in the early stages of their investigation, found that the system of routes proposed by the old Commission promised to supply that want, and that, being based on the topographical nature of the ground, its principal features would necessarily have to be adopted by any system calculated to supply the whole district with the means of rapid transit to the lower parts of the city.

It was not surprising, therefore, that their call for suggestions brought to their notice no other comprehensive plan, but that the projects submitted to this Board referred exclusively to changes in the different branches or to single routes not intended to be embodied in a system. The attention of this Commission has therefore been chiefly occupied with the consideration of the proposed changes, the only one of which of real importance was found to be the project of an elevated railroad over Third avenue, from some point near the Harlem river to the village of Fordham. This plan, however, did not meet the approval of this Board, for the same reasons for which it had been rejected by the old Commission; their principal objections having been that such elevated railroad would damage much private property without compensation to the owners, and that its cost would be too great to justify any reasonable expectation of its being built at an early day. A careful consideration of all the suggestions resulted in convincing this Commission that they could not avoid laying out routes largely coincident with the suburban routes designated by the old Commission.

This, however, could not be done without bringing on a conflict of authority on the question of power to organize more than one company; and since the old Commission had legally organized the West Side and Yonkers Railway Company, this Board here encountered the difficulty which your Honor had pointed out as the principal reason for the appointment of this Commission.

The old Board, claiming that they had the power to organize more than one company, declined to retire from the field in favor of this Commission, and continued their books open for subscriptions to the capital stock of the companies they proposed to organize. It thus became evident that if this Commission designated in part essentially the same routes, a legal conflict would be inevitable before either of the two Commissions could give a valid franchise to any of the proposed companies, and that the wishes of the district would be in danger of meeting an indefinite postponement, if the bringing on of a judicial decision was left to any company that might be organized by either Commission.

The old Commission, having received assurances of the support of capitalists whenever their power of granting further franchises should be placed beyond doubt, thereupon proposed to this Board to submit the question of power to the earliest possible decision of the Courts. This Commission, on the advice of their counsel, and believing this to be the best course for the speedy realization of rapid transit in the district, suggested that in lieu of an action by the Attorney-General against this Commission, a case containing an agreed statement of the facts necessary to present the questions involved should be made for submission to the next General Term of the Supreme Court in this district, and this course was adopted.

By unanimous resolution passed October 31st, this Commission designated certain routes, a part of which were coincident with the routes embraced in the suburban lines located by the old Commission. This Commission found no variation advisable on the East Side route, and but a slight deviation on the Fordham avenue branch; on the Central route, while its general direction was maintained, some variations were deemed advisable, and were adopted. The route designated by the old Commission as the Jerome avenue Branch was not adopted by this Commission, and in its place a route was substituted designating a direct connection from the bridge crossing the Harlem river at the termination of Eighth avenue to the Central route near Fleetwood Park, thereby avoiding the tunnel between the Harlem river and Cromwell's creek, and crossing Jerome avenue but once.

The necessary case and submission having been executed by the Attorney-General in the name of the People on the relation of the old Board as plaintiffs, and by the members of this Commission as defendants, were duly filed on the 8th of November last, and it is expected that the case will be considered and adjudicated on by the Supreme Court at General Term in January next.

Legal proceedings having thus been commenced on the 8th of November, all periods of time fixed by the Rapid Transit Act for the action of both Commissions are, according to section 38 of said act, suspended from that date, and will only commence to run on when the decision of the Court is recorded. This Commission, having, up to November 8th, consumed 57 days of the 60 days allowed by law for the designation of routes, will, when the decision is reached, have three days left for designating any further route or routes that may be deemed necessary, and will then proceed with the other portion of their work as directed by the act.

Their final designation of routes must depend largely upon the decision of the Court; if that decision declares the power of the old Commission exhausted, this Commission will in like manner be restricted to the organization of but one company, and will be able to make to the

routes already designated only such additions as may be conveniently embraced in that one franchise. If, on the other hand, the old Commission is sustained, this Board will be authorized to designate any other independent route, or any branch of existing routes that may be needed.

For such final action this Commission are now preparing by examining into the merits of several further routes that have been suggested to them, one of which is the project of a Rapid Transit route alongside of the N. Y. & Harlem R.R., on the surface of Railroad avenue, which at this moment is under consideration. The sixty days prescribed for this work by the act having on previous occasions been found too short for a careful performance of that difficult duty, this Commission believe that the disadvantages resulting from the delay will be more than compensated by the time gained for more careful consideration.

In the mean time the action of the two Commissions in trying to bring about an early decision on that important point has given to the public such confidence in the suburban routes as designated by both Commissions, that the capital stock of the Suburban Rapid Transit Company, to be organized by the old Commission, has already been sufficiently subscribed for to secure the organization of the company; if the Court decide that the old Commission have not that power, the franchise to be given by this Commission will be open to the parties that have subscribed to that stock.

Should the Court decide otherwise, such deviation from the suburban routes laid down by the old Commission as have been adopted by this Board can be made available to the company to be organized by the old Commission.

Thus the decision of the Court will enable the one or the other of the Commissions to give a franchise of undoubted legal validity, and this Board are conscious that in bringing about this result they have acted in accordance with the views expressed by your Honor, and for the true interest of the whole district.

Any suggestions which your Honor may make as to the future action of this Board will receive the respectful consideration of this Commission.



The Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—Your committee, consisting of Aldermen Sauer and Hyatt, have submitted to me a resolution of your Board in the following words :

“Resolved, That a committee of three wait upon the Corporation Counsel and get him to get Judge Davis’ decision in the case of Washington E. Hall, with his opinion attached.”

In reply, I beg leave to transmit a copy, taken from the “Daily Register” of this date, of the charge of Mr. Justice Davis to the jury upon the trial of Washington E. Hall, an inspector of election, who was yesterday convicted of a violation of the Election Law of 1872.

You will perceive that the conviction was not merely for an omission of the inspectors to annex to their certificate a ballot of the kind cast at the election, with a written indorsement, as required by section 54 of the Election Law of 1872. It also appeared to the satisfaction of the jury that there was on the part of the inspector a willful intent to violate the law.

I further understand, from the verbal statements of your committee, that certain returns are objected to, on the ground that they do not comply with the requirements of section 54 of the Election Law of 1872, in so far as copies of ballots annexed thereto do not bear the written indorsements required with reference thereto.

Upon this understood state of facts, I consider it the duty of your Board, acting as canvassers, to return the papers to the inspectors, that the ballots included in their return may be properly affixed and indorsed, and duly verified by them in the manner required by law.

The inspectors would have no right to annex new ballots not now in their returns, but only to properly affix and certify the same.

If there is any case in which the ballots are not included in the return, I will advise you further with reference thereto.

In the limited period allowed for reply to the questions of your committee, I am unable to give you an opinion as full as I should desire.

PROCEEDINGS IN THE COURTS.

An Inspector of Election Convicted.

The trial of Washington E. Hall, who was indicted together with Thomas Boland, Michael Murphy and Cornelius Murphy, Inspectors of Election of the Sixth Senatorial District, Eleventh Election District, Eighth Assembly District, for not making their returns to the Board of Canvassers as required by law, took place yesterday in the Court of Syer and Terminer, before Judge Davis. It was claimed for the prosecution that the inspectors not only did not return the ballots in the manner prescribed by the statute, but that corrections had been made in the numbers, and had been so altered that a majority of 140 votes was shown in favor of Alderman George Hall, who was declared elected at the election of November, 1878, as against Jacob Hatzel.

Judge Davis charged that if the returns had been properly made, the votes to which the respective candidates were entitled could have been easily determined; but as upon the face of the returns they appeared to have been changed, it was for them to say whether they were willfully changed. “The returns,” said Judge Davis, “do not explain whether it was neglect, omission, or whether it was willfully done. If, in the absence of explanation, you come to the conclusion there was fraud about it, and that the reason was because there was desire to commit some fraud, that the ballots were not put in as the statute requires, and the entry made partly written on the ballots, then you will have to find a willful intent to do a wrongful act which the statute requires you to find. I do not mean to indicate any opinion on my part as to whether you ought or ought not to find that, in the absence of all explanation, from this evidence now before you. It is for you to determine, and I will only add, in addition to what I have said, that in this class of cases, while the jury should require that the facts should be shown satisfactorily beyond reasonable doubt, yet, inasmuch as the public have no protection against this class of fraud and crime except by the enforcement of this law, the jury should never shrink from the duty of enforcing it where they are satisfied that a fraud has been perpetrated, totally irrespective of party considerations, because you, as intelligent men, must know, under our system of government, there is no foundation for the maintenance of our institutions, except in the enforcement of these laws to preserve the purity of elections. Our theory is that the people appear at the polls and determine by their votes who shall be their officers, and if the persons who are to canvass the votes and declare how many are cast for the respective candidates are to tamper with or pervert or change the votes, the whole system at an end, and it won’t stand up under such a course of conduct on the part of public officers, nor will it be tolerated by Courts and juries. So that if you come to the conclusion in this case, from the evidence before you, that the act was done as charged in the indictment, and that the intent was fraudulent—if it was done designedly, and with an intent to defraud any candidate by making a change of the votes, or withholding the evidence of the change—I say, if you come to that conclusion, then I trust that you will not shrink from doing your duty by convicting the accused. But if you fail to come to that conclusion it will then be equally your duty to acquit him.”

The jury, after being out about three hours, gave a verdict of conviction, with a recommendation to mercy.

After reading the report, Supervisor Sauer moved the Committee be discharged.

Which was carried.

Resolved, That in all cases where the returns before this Board show that votes were given for persons named for designated offices, that such votes be tabulated for the persons and offices designated, but that in all cases where the proper ballots are not annexed or not properly indorsed, the tabulation be provisional, and that the Inspectors in the several election districts be sent for to correct, if possible, any omission on their part, and that the question of the right to allow such corrections, and of the right to canvass the votes stated in such returns, be reserved until the close of the canvass, and that in the meantime a committee of three be appointed by the Chair to procure legal advice.

Supervisor Morris withdrawing his resolution,

Supervisor Roberts offered the following :

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the Chair to obtain legal advice.

Which was carried.

The Chair appointed as such committee Supervisors Roberts, Haughton, and Jacobus.

On motion of Supervisor Sauer, the Board took a recess until 12 o'clock, November 13, 1879.

Supervisor Slevin in the chair.

On the call of the roll, a quorum being present, the minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

Supervisor Morris offered a protest in the matter of John W. Browning.
Which was referred to the Committee on Protests.

Supervisor Roberts, on behalf of the Committee appointed to obtain legal advice, presented the following opinion of the Corporation Counsel:

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, November 13, 1879.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, sitting as a Board of County Canvassers:

GENTLEMEN—I yesterday advised your Board as to the first step required by the law to be taken by you for the correction of irregularities appearing upon the face of the returns that were of such a nature that they were capable of correction by the Inspectors without changing or altering any decision made by them. This, as I then stated, applies to the case of ballots appearing in the returns improperly placed, and without the certification required by law.

I have, since rendering said opinion, been called upon by your Committee and requested to advise the Board what irregularities remaining upon the face of the returns, after the Inspectors have exhausted their authority in correcting them, would justify the Board in excluding a return from the canvass. The general principle of law applicable is this, that while the Election Law surrounds the exercise of the elective franchise with a great many safeguards, and requires a great many formalities in the execution of their duties by election officers, the law does not favor the disfranchising of the voting public on account of irregularities committed by election officers, unless such irregularities are matters of substance.

The substance of a return is a statement of the result of the voting, and if the Inspectors of Election have duly signed and certified a statement, in accordance with the law, of what the result of the voting in the precinct was, so that no doubt is raised in the mind of the Board as to what the Inspectors intended to certify as the result of the voting, I think irregularities in other respects appearing upon the face of the return should be disregarded, in order that the public may not be disfranchised by reason of the negligence or inattention to the law of election officers.

I might cite many cases in which this principle has been announced and applied to various states of fact. It is undoubtedly of great importance that the law should be observed by election officers with great exactness, and every disregard of the law by them should be punished if possible, but the law has not favored the disfranchising of the public by reason of their irregularities; and by applying this principle to the cases as they arise, you will be able to solve, doubtless, the various situations which will present themselves.

REPORT :

That your Committee, although clearly of opinion that it was not in the power of your Honorable Body legally to reject the returns, nevertheless held a meeting at which counsel were heard both in favor of and in opposition to the proposition to reject them for the reasons stated; and more to satisfy your Honorable Body and the public that the proposed rejection, if attempted, would be contrary to law, your Committee asked and obtained from the Counsel to the Corporation an opinion as to the powers and duties of your Committee and your Honorable Body in the premises. The opinion of the counsel is herewith transmitted. It is final and conclusive, and your Committee respectfully recommend that the statement of the votes cast in the districts named be counted and allowed to the several candidates therein named; your Honorable Body have no other alternative. If injustice has been done or irregularities in the canvass permitted by the District Inspectors, they alone are responsible under the law, and the aggrieved candidates have their remedies either in the legislative bodies, to which some of them claim to have been elected respectively, or in the courts.

SIR.—The undersigned, on behalf of the Committee of the Board of Canvassers and on behalf of the Board, respectfully request your opinion upon the following facts: There has been referred to us the duplicate returns of the late election in the Thirty-third Election District of the Seventh Assembly District. They are substantially regular in form, are signed by the four Inspectors, and were produced respectively from the custody of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen and the County Clerk, to whom they had been delivered by the Inspectors on the day after election. Their condition in the portion relating to the votes for Senator, as to which alone any question arises, is as follows: In each return the vote stated as given for one of the candidates is written in words and also carried out in figures without change or erasure. On each return the statement of the vote of the other candidate is written over an erasure, both in the words and figures, and is apparently larger than that originally written, though there is no doubt as to the number of votes now stated.

The total vote, which is twice stated in each return, both in words and figures, and has not been altered or written over an erasure, calls for the number of votes for each candidate now stated on the returns.

Without deciding the legal question of our right officially so to proceed, we summoned the four inspectors and two poll clerks before us, and with the assent of the representatives of both candidates, questioned them. They concur in stating that the returns before us are in the condition they were when forwarded by them, and that they correctly state the vote cast. The tally filed in the Mayor's office on the day after election was unsealed by us and found to correspond with the votes stated on the returns. It appeared that this tally was not the original paper on which the votes were noted as called off, but a copy from it on a blank form furnished by the Bureau of Elections. It was claimed before us that there were some discrepancies in the verbal statements of the inspectors, which tended to show that they were not telling the truth. But this was denied. We desire, in this state of facts, to be informed by you: First—Whether the Committee or the Board of Canvassers have any power to consider the evidence we have stated; and, if so, second, whether we are justified by it in rejecting the returns of this district.

There have also been referred to us the duplicate returns from the Seventeenth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District. These returns were filed with the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen and with the County Clerk, respectively, on the Monday after election; they were produced by these officers to the Board of Canvassers in the ordinary manner, and are signed by all the inspectors. The latter were called before us to correct an omission in the returns, and, after this was done, counsel were allowed to call out the fact that the inspectors counted and publicly declared the votes on the night of election, but did not make out any returns until their attention was called to their omissions by the Bureau of Elections on the Saturday following the election. It was stated that the inspectors did not prepare any returns on the night of election, because they supposed it was the duty of the poll clerks to perform that service. The inspectors all stated that the returns correctly showed the vote cast. It was claimed before us that the failure to make a return on the night of election, and the separation of the inspectors, deprived them of any power to make a return subsequently, and that the papers before us must either be treated as not being returns, or must be rejected as being irregular.

We desire to be advised by you: First, whether we have the right to consider the facts above stated; and, second, whether these facts if considered, either require or justify us in rejecting or throwing out the returns.

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of November 18, 1879, requesting an opinion, in behalf of your Committee, in reference to what the action of the Board of Canvassers should be with reference to the returns from the Thirty-third Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, and the Seventeenth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District.

I will consider first the returns from the Seventeenth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District. The facts in that case, as stated by you, are that the inspectors, after counting the votes, made a public declaration of the result on the night of the election, but did not make out any returns on that night, because they supposed it the duty of the poll clerks to perform that service. The returns were made out by the inspectors on some subsequent day, and filed in the offices specified in the law. You state in your letter that the Inspectors, having been called, have testified that the returns correctly showed the vote cast.

Upon this state of facts there is no question of the duty of the Board to canvass the return. A precisely similar state of facts was passed upon in the case of *ex parte Heath and Roome*, reported in 3 Hill, 43. There the statute required ward inspectors of this city to certify the result of the election on the day subsequent to the closing of the polls, and it was held in that case that their certificate was valid, although not made till the second day after the closing of the polls, the principle being that where a statute requires an official act to be done upon a certain day, for a public purpose, the interests of the public are not to be defeated by a mere deviation in the matter of time within which the duty is performed. That case is approved in the case of the People against Cook, 14 Barb., 259, and in the same case on appeal, reported in 8 N. Y. Reports. In the recent proceedings before the General Term of the Supreme Court, with reference to the appointment of Inspectors of Election, in which it was suggested by counsel that there was danger of a failure of the election, on account of the omission of the Board to agree upon the inspectors within the time named in the statute for their appointment, Judge Davis, in an oral opinion, announced the same principle, as follows: "It is a universal principle of law, that where a right of the people is concerned, the failure of administrative officers to perform their duty within the prescribed time can never defeat that right." There is no doubt but what it is the duty of the Board to canvass the return from the Seventeenth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, upon the state of facts stated by you.

With reference to the returns from the Thirty-third Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, you state that they are substantially regular in form, are signed by the four inspectors, and were produced from the offices respectively of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen and the County Clerk, having been delivered and filed in those offices on the day after election. The defect in the return suggested is that the number of votes stated to have been polled for one candidate upon the return is inserted over an erasure, both of the letters and figures stating his vote. You state that there is no doubt as to the number of votes for the candidate intended by the return to be stated; that the total vote of the precinct has not been altered or written over an erasure, and that it equals the votes of the two candidates, added together, as stated upon the face of the returns. You further state that the four inspectors and the two poll clerks have been examined, and concur in stating that the returns are in the condition they were when forwarded by them, and have not been altered, and that they correctly state the vote cast, and that the tally sheet filed in the Mayor's office has been examined, and found to correspond with the votes stated on the returns.

Under this state of facts it is your duty to count the return. In *Morgan against Quackenbush*, 22 Barb., 77, it is said by Judge Harris that canvassing officers "are not at liberty to receive evidence of anything outside of the returns themselves. Their duty consists in a simple matter of arithmetic. They are to bring together the returns made by the inspectors of the several election districts, and ascertain, by computation, the aggregate number of votes given in the whole city for each person for each office, and then declare the result by their certificate." In this case, there being no question what the return purports to certify as the result of the voting in that district, it is the duty of the Board to canvass the returns. This would probably be true, even though there were allegations that the erasure had been fraudulently made by the inspectors, and even if there were some proof thereof; but in this case there seems to be no evidence, so far as your letter reports the statements of parties concerned, that the erasure is anything more than the blunder of some election officer, corrected by the inspectors before the paper left their hands. Such things will, of course, occur in the making out of so many documents as an election throughout this city calls for.

Supervisor Keenan presented the following report of the Committee on Protests:

The Committee on Protests, to whom was referred the annexed protests of John W. Browning, John Cavanagh, Leo C. Desser, James C. Quinn, W. S. Wolf, counsel, etc., respectfully

REPORT:

That your Committee are convinced, and have been so from their appointment, that the duties expected of them were unmistakably beyond their power to perform. The law clearly defines the powers and duties of the Board of County Canvassers, and confines them simply to a comparison and computation of the returns or statements from the several Election Districts, and a declaration of the result. Where errors or discrepancies occur in any of the statements, or irregularities even in the manner of conducting the election at the polling-places, the County Canvassers are powerless to do anything other than return the statements to the District Inspectors to correct the errors or discrepancies. Irregularities, even when they affect the result of the voting, can only be remedied by the parties aggrieved in the courts, or in cases affecting candidates for legislative offices, in the bodies to which they claim to have been elected. The District Inspectors alone are responsible. It being clear that your Honorable Body does not possess the power to investigate any of the allegations contained in the several protests presented, it therefore necessarily and logically follows that you could not delegate to a committee a power not possessed by you, even the eligibility of candidates cannot be determined by your Honorable Body. This inability arises not from positive prohibition, but from lack of power or authority. The Legislature of this State never conferred either upon Boards of County Canvassers.

Your Committee therefore ask to be discharged from the further consideration of the several protests and other papers herewith accompanying.

The Sixth to the Eleventh Election District, inclusive, of the Eleventh Assembly District.

The First to the Twenty-eighth Election District, inclusive, of the Thirteenth Assembly District.

The First to the Sixth Election District, inclusive, of the Fifteenth Assembly District.

The Thirty-fifth Election District of the Fifteenth Assembly District.

That on the day of election aforesaid, in the First Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, three ballots containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator in the said Senatorial District were drawn out, thrown out, and destroyed illegally and fraudulently.

That in the Tenth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, one ballot containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator in the said Senatorial District was thrown out illegally.

That in the Twenty-third Election District of the Seventh Assembly District the ballots cast for the office of Senator for the Eighth Senatorial District were not legally canvassed, the box containing

them was not sealed; that two ballots containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, were illegally and fraudulently thrown out, and one ballot for Senator of the said Senatorial District, upon which the name of Robert H. Strahan was scratched out, was illegally and fraudulently counted for said Robert H. Strahan.

That in the Third Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, one ballot containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, not being indorsed, was illegally thrown out.

That in the Sixth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, one ballot containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, not being indorsed, was illegally thrown out; that the ballots cast for the office of Senator for the Eighth Senatorial District were not legally canvassed, no sample ballots were pasted on the returns.

That in the Seventeenth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, the ballots cast for the office of Senator for the Eighth Senatorial District were not legally canvassed; that no tally sheets of the votes cast were kept at the polls on election day; that the canvassers adjourned without completing the canvass and reconvened on Sunday, the 9th day of November, 1879, and then illegally completed the canvass and made out the returns.

That in the Twenty-fourth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, one ballot containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, was found deposited in the "General" box, and was illegally thrown out.

That in the Thirtieth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, five ballots containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, were illegally thrown out, for the reason that they were not properly indorsed.

That in the Thirty-third Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, the number of ballots cast for the undersigned and for Robert H. Strahan respectively, for the office of Senator of the said Senatorial District, were 142 and 26, instead of 142 and 126 respectively.

That in the Thirty-fourth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, the number of ballots cast for Robert H. Strahan, for Senator for the said Senatorial District, was 114 instead of 122.

That in the Eighth Election District of the Ninth Assembly District, the number of ballots, containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, cast, was 149 instead of 140.

That in the Tenth Election District of the Ninth Assembly District, one ballot containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, was found deposited in the box containing the ballots for Aldermen, and was illegally thrown out.

That in the Eleventh Election District of the Ninth Assembly District, one ballot containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, was illegally thrown out, it not being properly indorsed.

That in the Twenty-third Election District of the Ninth Assembly District, one ballot containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, was illegally and fraudulently thrown out.

That in the Twenty-seventh Election District of the Ninth Assembly District, one ballot containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, was illegally and fraudulently thrown out.

That in the Thirty-first Election District of the Ninth Assembly District, two ballots containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, were illegally, fraudulently, and maliciously thrown out, and one of them was destroyed.

That in the Sixth Election District of the Thirteenth Assembly District, one ballot containing the name of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, was found deposited in the box containing the ballots for Aldermen, and was illegally and fraudulently thrown out.

That in the Eleventh Election District of the Thirteenth Assembly District, three ballots containing the name of Robert H. Strahan for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, were illegally and fraudulently deposited, one of them was deposited by a person who had already voted, commonly called "a repeater," and two of them were deposited by unpardoned convicts; that one ballot for Senator of the said Senatorial District, upon which the name of Robert H. Strahan was scratched out, and the other three said ballots, making four in number, were illegally and fraudulently counted for and credited to the said Robert H. Strahan.

That in the Eighteenth Election District of the Thirteenth Assembly District the number of ballots, containing the names of the undersigned and of Robert H. Strahan for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, cast, were 104 and 164 respectively, instead of 103 and 165 respectively.

That in the Twenty-fourth Election District of the Thirteenth Assembly District, the ballots for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District were not legally canvassed, that the ballots and the tally-lists thereof were illegally, fraudulently, and maliciously destroyed.

That in the Twenty-fifth Election District of the Thirteenth Assembly District, three ballots containing the names of the undersigned for the office of Senator for the said Senatorial District, were illegally, fraudulently, and maliciously thrown out.

The undersigned alleges and charges that the canvass of the said ballots in the said districts was falsely, fraudulently, and illegally made, and that the returns made by the Inspectors in said districts to your Honorable Board are false and fraudulent, in evidence of which the undersigned states, and is ready to prove to the satisfaction of the Board by the oaths of good citizens residing in said Election Districts, that the undersigned received a number of votes in said districts which is greater than the number so falsely and fraudulently allowed to him and returned by said Inspectors in said districts.

Wherefore, the undersigned most respectfully protests against the returns of the canvass of the ballots for Senator for the Eighth Senatorial District, and prays that the errors hereinbefore stated may be corrected, and that your Honorable Board may declare the number of votes legally cast.

such votes, and for a long time prior thereto was and now is a member of the Legislature of the State of New York, and that under section 7, article 3 of the Constitution of the State of New York, all votes cast for said Langbein for said office, he being a member of the said Legislature, are declared void. The undersigned further alleges and declares that he received, as he is informed and believes, the majority of all the legal votes cast at said election for said office; wherefore, the undersigned demands that all votes cast for said Langbein are rejected as void as aforesaid.

To the Honorable Board of County Canvassers of Election for the County of New York, etc.:

The undersigned, John Cavanagh, a candidate at the election held November 4, 1879, for the office of Alderman for the Fifth Aldermanic District, in the City and County of New York, as the same existed in 1878, hereby respectfully protests against the reception and consideration of certain pretended, illegal, and void returns and certifications of the same; of certain pretended elections held in the Twenty-eighth Election District of the Seventh Assembly District, and the Twenty-second Election District of the Thirteenth Assembly District, in the Fifth Aldermanic District aforesaid, on November 4, 1879, in the City and County of New York, whereby it is misrepresented to your Honorable Board, that your undersigned and other candidates, among them Bernard Goodwin, a candidate for the office of Alderman in the same Aldermanic District, received certain votes. Your undersigned respectfully protests against the said Bernard Goodwin being duly declared, by reason of any reception, consideration, and canvass of the said pretended and alleged returns, the successful candidate for Alderman of the Fifth Aldermanic District aforesaid, in the City of New York, and against giving the said Bernard Goodwin any certificate or other official recognition whatever by your Honorable Board, of his pretended and alleged election in consequence thereof, and upon the further ground that your undersigned was duly elected Alderman in said Aldermanic District for the year 1880, as will more fully appear by the legal returns from the different Election Districts in said Aldermanic District.

That the grounds upon which your undersigned bases his protest to the reception and consideration of the pretended, illegal, and alleged returns and a canvass of the same by your Honorable Board, are as follows:

First—There was no election held as prescribed and required by law in the said Election Districts.

Second—There was no legal reception or disposition of any votes in said districts.

Third—There was no tally of the said votes as required by law.

Fourth—There was no session of the Board of Inspectors of Election in said districts as required by law.

Fifth—There was no legal canvass of any votes as required by law.

Sixth—There is no legal certification of the pretended, illegal, and alleged returns as required by law.

Seventh—That a number of voters were prevented from exercising the right of suffrage.

That the undersigned most earnestly calls the attention of your Honorable Board to a consideration of the attached affidavits, and also that an opportunity may be afforded, in order that witnesses may be called and examined in support of the foregoing allegations, etc.

And your petitioner will ever pray, etc.

GENTLEMEN—As a candidate for the office of Justice of the District Court for the Seventh Judicial District, in the place of Charles D. Ingersoll, appointed in the place of Walter S. Pinckney, removed, in the Seventh District, at the election had the 4th day of November, 1879,
