BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK, MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, Wednesday, October 20, 1897, 11 o'clock A. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment. Present—Wm. L. Strong, the Mayor; Ashbel P. Fitch, the Comptroller; Edward P. Barker, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments; Francis M. Scott, the Counsel to the Corporation.

Absent—John Jeroloman, the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held October 19, 1897, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following: DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, NEW YORK, October 15, 1897. Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Chairman, Mayor, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—The exigencies of the service of this Department require several transfers of appropriations.

1st. The sum of \$2,250 to the appropriation for "Boulevards, Roads and Avenues, Maintenance of," from the appropriation for "Salaries—Department of Public Works," from which the amount can be spared. This will enable the Department to continue the work of improving the condition of the macadam roadways.

2d. The sum of \$4,250 from "Laying Croton Pipes—Salaries for 1897" to "Laying Croton Pipes for 1897." The necessity for this transfer arises from the fact that a contract for laying Croton pipes has been prepared to meet the urgent demand for the extension of the water service, and that the contract could not be executed and carried out unless this transfer is made.

3d. The sum of \$4,400 to "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices—Salaries for 1897," from "Supplies for Cleaning Public Offices for 1897," from which the amount can be spared. The necessity for this transfer arises from the fact that this year, as well as in three or four preceding years, the appropriation for salary account has been inadequate, and transfers had to be made each year to enable the Department to perform the service required under that appropriation.

4th. The sum of \$8,000 to the appropriation "Public Buildings—Construction and Repairs for 1897," from the appropriation for "Lamps, Gas and Electric Lighting for 1897," from which the amount can be spared. The present appropriation for public buildings, construction and repairs is nearly exhausted. Necessity and ultimate economy requires that all the municipal buildings shall be put in the best possible condition, especially as to roofs, for the coming winter season, and it is for that purpose that the transfer is needed.

5th. The sum of \$68,000 to the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewal of Pavements and Regrading for 1897," from the appropriation for "Repaving Streets and Avenues for 1897." The Department has made special efforts this year to place the stone-block pavements, of which there are over six million square yards, in the best possible condition, and in these efforts the present appropriation for repairs of pavements has been nearly exhausted, as for instance Sixth avenue, between Twenty-third and Fifty-ninth streets.

It is eminently desirable that the work shall be continued, so that the pavement shall be in the best possible condition at the close of the working season, and that there shall be no danger that during the winter season, when paving work has to be practically suspended, they should become dangerous in places through neglect of work which could be done before winter sets in.

6th. The sum of \$6,000 from "Repaving Streets and Avenues for 1896" to "Sewers—Repairing and Cleaning for 1897." This transfer is rendered necessary by the greater number of basins to be cleaned this year than last year, also by the large amount of sewer-cleaning remaining to be done this season.

An early and favorable action of your Board on these requests will be beneficial to the service of this Department. Very respectfully,

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction: GENTLEMEN—On July 21, 1897, you instructed me to request Mr. Dykman to institute dispossession proceedings against Nelson Brothers, the former owners of Parcels Nos. 112 and 115. I did so on July 24, and Mr. Dykman employed a local attorney, Mr. Haines, to attend to that case.

Mr. Haines now informs the Division Engineer that before proceeding he would like to have the Aqueduct Commissioners send written instructions to Mr. Dykman and to Division Engineer Edward Wegmann, to the effect that they take immediate possession of the above-mentioned parcels, by the Sheriff, if necessary. Mr. Haines says that without such explicit and positive orders from the Aqueduct Commissioners he and the Division Engineer might be sued personally for the consequences of the dispossession.

This is to ask you to send such instructions to Mr. Dykman and to Mr. Wegmann. I would also ask you to make the instructions cover Parcel No. 113, formerly owned by Z. M. Knowles, who is in the same position towards you as Nelson Brothers. Yours respectfully, A. FTELEY, Chief Engineer.

M. Knowles, and in all cases to require the services of the Sheriff, if necessary.

Resolved, That a voucher be and hereby is ordered drawn in favor of Edward Fox for the sum of two hundred and ninety-four dollars and fifty cents (\$294.50), being amount of judgment rendered for salary, and interest thereon, due said Edward Fox while employed as an Inspector of Masonry on the New Aqueduct, and certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The same were adopted by the following vote: Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Cannon and Green—4.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That, pursuant to section 2, chapter 428, of the Laws of 1897, the New York City Civil Service Commission is hereby appointed a Board of Examiners in the examination "for fitness" for reinstatement of James Gregory.

The Committee presented a communication, received from the Secretary, reporting that the sum of \$3,800 had been received from Coleman, Ryan & Brown, contractors for the construction of the New Croton Dam, being for the use and occupancy by them of the buildings owned by the City of New York near said dam, from August 31, 1892, and until such time as the City may

resume control of the work; and stating that said amount had been transmitted to the City Chamberlain for the credit of the "Additional Water Fund," and that his receipt therefor was on file.

On motion of Commissioner Cannon, the action of the Secretary was approved and the communication ordered filed.

The Secretary gave notice of the filing of a lien by Adam P. Dienst and Henry Seib against Clark & Co., contractors, amounting to \$205.99. Which was ordered filed.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of estimates contained in Vouchers Nos. 11886 to 11888 inclusive, amounting to \$103,826.58, and of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 11889 to 11911 inclusive, amounting to \$2,850.03.

Present—The Commissioner of Public Works and Commissioners Duane, Tucker and Green.

The Construction or Executive Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, James C. Gregory be and hereby is appointed "Patrolman" in the Engineer Corps of the Aqueduct Commissioners, at a salary of three dollars and fifty cents per day, he having been certified by the Civil Service Commission as eligible for such position; said Gregory, however, to furnish his own means of transportation at his own expense, and his salary to commence when he is assigned to duty by the Chief Engineer.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.

The Committee presented the following communication, received from the Chief Engineer:

NEW YORK, October 19, 1897. To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—The work which has been prosecuted at Carmel last summer at the Auxiliary Dam and on the new highways is practically completed.

At the request of the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, I have already transferred to him the possession of the office buildings which his department is now repairing in view of permanent occupancy, and, although the machinists employed by you have to put the new ball-bearings on the Gate System, an operation which will not interfere with the maintenance of the dams, I respectfully recommend that the transfer of the property now under the control of the Aqueduct Commissioners near Carmel to the Commissioner of Public Works take place on November 1, 1897, and that the Chief Engineer be directed to make such arrangements as may be necessary with the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct for the change of supervision of the property.
