

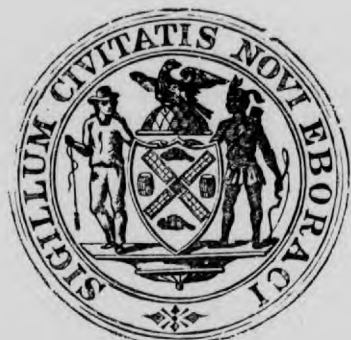

WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending March 31, 1899.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and the issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 451,781, classified as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 9,364, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 785 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 2,878 miscellaneous permits, under the Sanitary Code.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending March 31, 1899, the number of notices issued by the Board was 10,465. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 355, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

Air-shafts cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with sewer.

REPORT No. 92.

NEW YORK, June 29, 1899.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I return herewith, with my report, a communication of the Deputy Comptroller to yourselves, dated June 21, 1899, which you referred to me.

It is true that two series of parcel numbers were used for the land taken on the site of the New Croton Reservoir. The first series of numbers was used for the first takings in Katonah, which preceded the rest.

When the taking was being prepared for the rest of the reservoir site, which contains by far the largest proportion of the area, it was thought proper to begin a regular series of numbers from one end to the other, thus canceling the original parcel numbers at Katonah. This change was arranged with the Assistant to the Corporation Counsel.

I am not aware that the Comptroller was not advised of the aforesaid change in the parcel numbers, but, inasmuch as the Law Department knew of many agreements having been made in regard to the rents of former owners, we should have expected that the Aqueduct Commissioners would have been advised of the awards before payment of the same.

I may add also that each agreement which has been handed to the Comptroller bears the name of the owner, as well as the parcel number. I suggest that, inasmuch as the names on the agreements were correct, sufficient doubt should have arisen as to the legitimacy of the payment to cause an inquiry to be made. In the case of one of the awards (the award to Miss Phoebe Adams), I am informed that the agreement, although in the Comptroller's office for a long time, had not reached the Award Department at the date of the Deputy Comptroller's letter. New numbers have been entered on the agreements in the Comptroller's hands, which now correspond with the Chief Engineer's returns as to names and numbers.

I take this occasion to reiterate my statement that, in my opinion, a copy of the list of awards ought to be sent to the Aqueduct Commissioners for their information as soon as they are decided upon.

Division Engineer Wegmann thinks that he may be able to collect the money erroneously paid—from the former landowners or from some of them—named in the Comptroller's communication. Such being the case, I would suggest that you instruct and authorize Mr. Wegmann to collect from the said landowners such money as he may be able to recover.

The following communication was received from the Law Department:

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,
NEW YORK, June 24, 1899.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

SIRS—I am in receipt of a communication dated June 2, from Hon. John J. Ryan, President of your Commission, stating that the contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam was executed on the 31st day of August, 1892, and the contract for the construction of the Jerome Park Reservoir was executed on the 23d day of August, 1895. That on the works for the carrying out of these contracts the men in the employ of the contractors work more than eight hours per day, which of course requires the presence of your engineering force for the purpose of supervising and seeing that the work is done in accordance with contract, specifications, etc.

President Ryan further states that in your engineering force are inspectors, laborers and others who are employed by the day, but must remain at work as long as the contractor's men are employed, for the purpose of supervising, etc., as before stated, for which your per diem men receive extra time and pay when employed longer than eight hours, eight hours being a legal day's work.

And President Ryan asks: Is the continuance of this manner of employment, or is the employment of your inspectors, laborers and others who are employed by the day, in conformity or not with chapter 567 of the Laws of 1899, or, in other words, on the work above referred to can your per diem men receive overtime and pay therefor when employed more than eight hours?

The persons to whom the eight hours law applies are "all classes of employees in this State except those engaged in farm and domestic service, unless otherwise provided by law" (Laws of 1899, chapter 567, section 3).

In section 2 of the Labor Law it is provided:

"The term employee when used in this chapter means a mechanic, workingman or laborer who works for another for hire."

The restriction, therefore, to eight hours' work applies to mechanics, workingmen and laborers.

It is apparent from your communication that some of the men are clearly within the eight hours provision and some are not.

The laborers clearly cannot work more than eight hours a day, nor can they receive pay for overtime, as the section provides:

"This section does not prevent an agreement for overwork at an increased compensation except upon work by or for the State or a municipal corporation or by contractors or sub-contractors therewith."

Therefore, under this portion of the section overwork by municipal employees of the character specified is forbidden.

As to the employees of the contractors in the cases suggested by you, it is not necessary to consider them for the reason that it is provided in section 3 of chapter 567 of the Laws of 1899:

"Nothing in this act shall apply to any existing contract for public work."

I believe the foregoing answers your questions.

You will remember that in the letter of the Mayor bearing date June 2, all city departments are requested to not only observe the Labor Law in its letter, but to carry out its provisions in accordance with its spirit.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Department of Health, held July 5, 1899, the following amendment to the Sanitary Code was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 194. Spitting upon the floors of public buildings, and of railroad cars and of ferry-boats is hereby forbidden, and officers in charge or control of all such buildings, cars and boats shall keep posted permanently, in each public building, and in each railroad car and in each ferry-boat a sufficient number of notices forbidding spitting upon the floors, and janitors of building, conductors of cars and employees upon ferry-boats shall call the attention of all violators of this ordinance to such notices.

And it shall be the duty of all persons or corporations manufacturing cigars or conducting the business of printing, where ten or more persons are employed on the premises, in The City of New York, to provide, and they are hereby required to provide, proper receptacles for spitting, in proportion of one to every two persons employed by them, and that said receptacles be disinfected and cleaned at least once during each working day. That a copy of the second paragraph of this section be kept permanently posted in a conspicuous place in all cigar manufactories, and in printing offices where ten or more persons are employed.
