DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Report for Week Ending June 20, 1914.

WATCHING THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT AT WORK.

Not so many years ago it was believed that the proper functions of a health department were limited to the registration and tabulation of certain vital statistics, to the abolition of nuisances, the inspection of premises in order to discover damp cellars, leaking cesspools, foul drains, etc., and to matter relating to the spread of the more readily communicable diseases, such as smallpox, diphtheria and scarlet fever. In accordance with this conception, the Department of Health of this City was organized into two bureaus, the Bureau of Records, and the Sanitary Bureau. Contrast all this with the modern conception of the duties of health authorities: Diagnostic laboratory work production and distribution of antitoxic sera and vaccines, performance of intubation, home supervision of tuberculosis, hospital and sanatorum treatment of tuberculosis, school medical inspection, intensive work in infant hygiene, supervision of midwives, control of the milk supply, bacteriological research, and organized public health education! In order to give an instructive outline of modern public health work, we present in the following pages, a resume of a single week's activities in the nine bureaus of the Department of Health of The City of New York:

BUREAU OF GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

The Bureau of General Administration is concerned chiefly in keeping and authenticating the acts, records, papers and proceedings of the Department of Health; preserving the books and papers of the Department of Health and conducting its cor-

The Staff consists of: 1 Director, who is also Secretary of the Board of Health; 1 Chief Clerk, 1 Law Clerk, 1 Auditor, 5 Assistant Chief Clerks, 1 Clerk in charge of the purchase and inspection of supplies, 1 Clerk in charge of the sale of laboratory products, 1 Clerk in charge of Board papers, 1 Inspector in charge of construction and repairs, 1 Clerk in charge of stationery and printing, 1 Clerk in charge of the library and file and 167 other employees.

The following paragraphs show the varied activities of this Bureau, and will give some idea of the work performed:

During the week ending June 6th, 2.212 complaints were received. Out of this number, after investigation by Inspectors, 806 demanded the issuance of Board Notices; 433 showed no cause for action; 62 were abated by personal effort; 258 were referred to other City Departments; 49 demanded new service of orders, and the remaining 604 were complied with.

The Sanitary Code requires that certain industries be conducted under permits granted by the Board; the same applies to the keeping of animals, poultry, etc. The following list shows the number of permits granted, denied and revoked during the week ending June 6, 1914:

Stationery, printing and supplies are handled by another office. The stationery and printing include all material, such as letterheads, pads, pens, ink, etc., report cards and printed forms for the use of the various bureaus; in addition pamphlets, circulars, posters, printed rules and regulations and hanging cards for public distribution. The supplies include all housekeeping materials, drugs (except compounded prescriptions), bandages, etc., used by the various Infants' Milk Stations, Clinics and Dental offices maintained by the Department of Health.

Requisitions received

The work of the Bureau of Records may be divided into two classes, one consisting in recording and indexing all certificates filed in the Bureau, and searching and issuing transcripts thereof; the other, in the preparation of statistical tables based upon the certificates received.

During the week ending June 6th, 1914, there were received 1,510 certificates of death, 2,686 of birth and 1,556 of marriage, making a total of 5,752 certificates. These certificates were scrutinized, numbered, stamped and filed. In addition to this 1,538 burial or transit permits were issued during the week.

Each certificate of death is cross indexed under the name of the deceased and under the street and number where he or she resided at the time of death. Each certificate of birth is indexed under the name of the child and also under the name of the street and number where the birth took place. Each marriage certificate is indexed not only under the name of the groom but also under that of the bride. During the week ending June 6th, 12,579 index cards were written and filed. Each certificate of birth that was received by the Bureau was acknowledged by postal card within forty-eight hours after its receipt. 3,345 searches were made of the various records and 1,225 paid transcripts issued, for each of which the City received fifty cents. In addition to this 1,454 free searches were made in order to provide certificates to children desiring to obtain admission into public schools or to obtain employment certificates. 330 letters were written during the week, 494 persons were interviewed, 640 telephone messages sent or calls received. 90 applications were made to correct certificates of birth, death and marriage and to file certificates of birth, which by reason of the negligence of the physician or midwife, were not filed within the ten days prescribed by law. 400 books of certificates of birth, death and marriage were sent upon request of physicians, midwives and clergymen. Ten physicians presented their diplomas and signed the signature book of the Department. Five ministers of the gospel signed the register of persons authorized to perform a marriage ceremony.

The statistical work of the Bureau during the week consisted in the preparation of the tables for the Weekly Bulletin. Work was also done on the monthly, weekly

and yearly statistical tables. Attached to the Bureau of Records is a small bookbindery, which binds the certificates of birth, death and marriage into volumes of five hundred each.

SANITARY BUREAU.

The Sanitary Bureau deals with matters pertaining to general sanitation.

Its staff consists of the Deputy Commissioner (Sanitary Superintendent), 1 Assistant Sanitary Superintendent in charge of the Bureau, and 3 Assistant Sanitary Superintendents and 2 Sanitary Inspectors in charge of the Borough offices, 5 Medical Inspectors, 16 Sanitary Inspectors, I Sanitary Engineer and 106 other employees. The following list represents some of the activities:

Investigation of and report on all citizens' complaints.

Reinspection and report on notices and Board orders issued on recommendations of the Sanitary Inspectors.

Reinspection and report on applications for "modification of" or "relief from" notices or Board orders and for "extension of time" on Board orders.

Inspection and report on the ventilation, heating, overcrowding, plumbing, cleanliness and sanitary conditions of roofs and cellars in dwellings, factories, hotels,

boarding or lodging houses, theatres, offices, buildings, stores and stables.

Inspection and report on applications for permits for the following purposes: To open burial vaults, to maintain bathing establishments (bathing beaches, floating baths, stationary pools), to rent bathing suits, maintain camps, house-boats, tents and bungalows, to conduct lodging houses, to use well water for bathing, flushing and cooling purposes; to use well water for domestic purposes (except in the Borough of Manhattan), to keep pigeons, chickens and other fowls; to keep birds and small animals for sale, to maintain shelters for animals, to yard horses or sheep, to lead animals through the streets, to conduct inedible fat rendering plants, to manufacture fertilizer, to maintain cellar stables, to remove offal or night soil to docks, to dump ashes, refuse or street sweepings (not garbage) on vacant lot; to transport refuse material, to maintain manure dumps, to maintain leaching cesspools, to empty and clean cesspools or privy vaults, to conduct offensive trades, such as the preparation of skins of animals and the business of scavenger.

Original inspections for violations of sections of the Sanitary Code, Charter and

Code of Ordinances which might cause a nuisance.

Inspection at the request of the Board of Education of all proposed buildings to be used for school purposes.

Supervision, in sanitary matters, of lodging houses, stables, roof tanks, buildings in course of construction, barber shops, elevated and subway stations, elevated, sur-

face and subway cars. Supervision of the drainage of all salt marshes in the City of New York: filling. oiling or draining inland mosquito-breeding streams or swamps, and other work pertaining to the elimination of mosquitoes in the City of New York.

During the week ending June 6th, 5,573 inspections were made by this Bureau. These included the investigation of citizens' complaints, reinspections on notices and orders pending, and complaints held for observation.

BUREAU OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The activities of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases are as follows:

The supervision and control of all communicable infectious diseases; the establishment and maintenance of proper quarantine in cases of certain infectious diseases; the administration of immunizing sera and vaccines; the registration of cases of tuberculosis; the maintenance of 17 tuberculosis clinics and 2 day camps, and the home supervision of cases of tuberculosis; the admission of tuberculous cases to sanatoria and hospitals; the disinfection of infected premises and infected material; the maintenance of 3 venereal clinics for the diagnosis of venereal diseases; the bacteriological

examination of specimens for diagnosis. The staff consists of 1 Director, 1 Assistant Director, 7 Chiefs of Divisions, 5 Borough Chiefs, 19 Physicians in charge of district units, 22 Diagnosticians, 65 Clinic Physicians, 1 Dentist, 216 Nurses and 244 other employees.

BUREAU OF LABORATORIES.

The work of this Bureau is so extensive and varied that its expression in terms of numbers is almost impossible. Only a very general statement is given at this time, it being our intention in the near future to discuss the work of the laboratory in a special number of the Monthly Bulletin. The following is a brief summary of the

1. The manufacture of biologic products for the diagnosis, prevention and treatment of disease, in man and animals. Among them may be mentioned Diphtheria and Tetanus Antitoxin, Tuberculin, Mallein, Vaccine Virus, Antirabic Virus, Stock and Autogenous Vaccines of all kinds; Meningococcus, Streptococcus, Gonoccoccus and Pneumococcus Serum and Normal Horse Serum for the control of hemorrhage.

2. The Clinical Department advises Physicians in the use of the above products, and, when requested, administers the treatment to patients in their homes. 3. Chemical and bacteriologic examination of water, milk and food (including

shell fish). 4. Bacteriologic and epidemiologic investigations of local epidemics of various

infectious diseases. 5. Serologic diagnosis of syphilis, gnorrhoea, glanders and other diseases. 6. Experimental work on infectious and other diseases. The work of the Bureau

is published annually in the form of "Collected Studies." This is sent to those known to be interested in research work, laboratories, medical institutions and libraries throughout the world. The latest number, which has just been received from the printer, contains articles on the subject of meningitis, scarlet fever, diphtheria, pneumonia, tuberculosis, Vincent's angina, plague, trachoma, rabies and smallpox; also articles on biochemistry, immunity, pathology, physiology and protozoology.

BUREAU OF CHILD HYGIENE.

The Bureau of Child Hygiene, organized in 1908, is the first Bureau established under Municipal control to deal exclusively with health problems concerning children from birth to legal age. The staff consists of 1 Director, 1 Assistant Director, 5 Chiefs of Divisions, 5 Borough Chiefs, 14 Supervising Medical Inspectors, 1 Superintendent of Nurses, 161 Medical Inspectors. 10 Dentists, 17 Supervising Nurses, 289 Nurses and 201 other employees. Its activities are as follows:

Control and supervision of the practice of midwives; investigation of cases of ophthalmia neonatorum; work directed against infant mortality through 55 Infants' Milk Stations; supervision of foundlings boarded out in private homes; inspection of institutions caring for dependent children; inspection of day nurseries; medical inspection and examination of school children; maintenance of hospitals and clinics for the medical and surgical treatment of diseases of the eyes, nose and throat and teeth found among school children; performance of vaccinations at Infants' Milk Stations. schools and Department offices; issuance of employment certificates; investigations of still-births and of cases of puerperal septicaemia; special investigations of congenital deaths for research purposes; special work in checking up registry of births; activities in relation to Baby Week.

The field work, including that of Infants' Milk Stations and Clinics for school children, consists of visits, physical examinations, lectures, consultations, treatments. operations (eye, nose and throat), investigations of applicants for permits. 

If the grantees shall determine to exercise the privilege of renewal they shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The deermination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the grantees and the

If the grantees and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the grantees shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested free-holders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the grantees; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investi-gations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the grantees and their officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual compensation shall, in any event, be less than that required for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual compensation shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the annual compensation theretofore prevailing shall continue until the new rate shall be determined, and the grantees shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual compensation then determined over the previous annual compensation. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the grantees, each paying one-half thereof.

Second-As compensation for the privilege hereby granted the grantees jointly and severally agree to install equipment and furnish electrical current to the City without charge to it, as follows:

(a) Install, reserve and maintain for the exclusive use of the City, as an integral part of the generating and distributing systems of the grantees, generating machinery, sub-station ap-paratus, cables, switches and controlling apparatus up to the switchboards in the structures of the drainage chambers now or to be hereafter provided by the Board of Water Supply of the City for the unwatering of the pressure tunnels of the Catskill Aqueduct; said drainage chambers situated or to be situated

(1) At or near Croton Lake at the shaft known as the Croton Lake Drainage Shaft;
(2) At or near the intersection of Clinton and South Streets at the shaft known as

No. 21 of the City Aqueduct; and (3) In Morningside Park between West 120th and West 121st Streets, if the same were extended, at the shaft known as No. 11 of the City Aqueduct,

-sufficient in capacity to deliver 850 kilowatts of three-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second at a pressure of 2200 volts at each of the shafts Nos. 11 and 21 and 850 kilowatts of three-phase al-ternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second at a pressure of 40,000 volts at the Croton Lake Drainage Shaft.

(b) Furnish when called upon by the Board of Water Supply or its authorized representatives electrical energy up to the capacity of 850 kilowatts of three-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second at a pressure of 2200 volts at each of the shafts Nos. 11 and 21 and up to the capacity of 850 kilowatts of three-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second at a pressure of 40,000 volts at the Croton Lake

Drainage Shaft. (c) Install and maintain for the use of the City wires, cables or other conductors and controlling apparatus up to the switchboards in the buildings or other structures owned by the City and used in the operation of the Catskill Aque-

quency of sixty (60) cycles per second, at a pressure of 110 or more volts, sufficient for operating all motors and other apparatus as may required for the maintenance and operation

of the aqueduct.

(e) Furnish whenever required single-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second, at a pressure of 110 or more volts, or direct current at a pressure of 120 or more volts, sufficient for lighting all said buildings, bridges and grounds as may be neces-sary, and for any and all other purposes as may be required in connection with the maintenance and operation of the aqueduct and appurtenant works and structures.

Any and all payments to be made or service to be rendered by the terms of this contract to the City by the grantees shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made and such service renpayments shall be made and such service rendered in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, to operate

same or other terms and conditions, to operate upon a route upon all or any part of lands acquired for aqueduct purposes.

Fourth—The service hereby required to be rendered as payment for the rights hereby granted shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to service to be rendered as payment for the rights hereby granted, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this

Fifth—The consent hereby granted shall not be assigned, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of any of the grantees, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth-Should the grantees at any time fail to supply the service herein required as payment for the privilege herein granted in an efficient manner satisfactory to the Board of Water Supply, then the right herein granted shall cease and determine, and all sums paid or deposited with the City shall be and become the property

of the City.

Seventh—It is understood by the parties hereto that the right herein granted is subject to any and every limitation imposed by law upon the use of the aqueduct lands outside of the present limits of the City or by any and every condition upon which such lands were purchased or ac-quired. It is understood also that no rights of any kind whatsoever are herein granted to or in any of the aqueduct lands lying within the present limits of the City.

Eighth-The transmission line hereby authorized shall be used only for the transmission of electrical current to and within the Counties of Westchester and Putnam of the State of New York, and shall not be used as a portion of or ing into any other portion of the State of New York nor into any portion of any other state; provided that the Board may by resolution authorize the use of such transmission line for the transmission of electrical current from, to and within districts outside of said Counties of Westchester and Putnam, but the Board may, upon the adoption of such resolution, require such compensation for the additional right and prescribe such terms and conditions to govern the same as in its discretion it may deem proper.

Ninth-The grantees shall immediately begin the construction of ducts, conduits, poles and towers and the installation therein or thereon wires, cables or other conductors and complete so much of such construction and stallation as shall be necessary to furnish the service herein required and stand ready to supoly the current herein required for the pur-poses of the Board of Water Supply, and the City of New York on or before October 1, 1914; otherwise this right shall cease and de-termine; provided that the time for completion of such construction and installation and the commencement of current supply, as required may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time shall not exceed twelve months; and provided further that when the completion of the construction or installation or the delivery of current shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement or from other causes not within the control of the grantees, then such time may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prose-cuted by the grantees and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the grantees shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay and shall have delivered to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the grantees shall in writing consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Tenth-Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, the conduits, poles, towers, fixtures, wires, cables and equipment of the grantees constructed pursuant to this contract shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the grantees shall, upon thirty (30) days' from Elisha P. Cronkhite and wife to the City of New York, dated June 9, 1910, which is recorded in the office of the Register of the County of Westchester and is on file with the Foard of Water Supply, and along said detour or right of way again joins such Aqueduct Lands at Parcel No. 957 of said maps of said Section No. 13; thence continuing upon said Aqueduct Lands, shown upon said maps of said Section No. 13.

Thirteenth—All structures and appurtenances erected hereunder shall be kept in good and safe repair and in accordance with the instructions given by the Board of Water Supply.

Fourteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions.

or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on option of the Roard by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the ducts, conduits, poles, towers, wires, cables, conductors, fixtures and all structures, constructed or in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. If the grantees fail to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appear in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to he just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the grantees shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

The grantees shall pay all taxes on all property constructed or maintained pursuant to this contract and shall reimburse the City for all taxes upon said property which the City may be required to pay and shall reimburse the City, its officers and agents for any and all costs or expenses whatsoever of every name and nature to which the City may be put by reason of the construction, operation or maintenance of the transmission line and its appurtenances and shall save the City, its officers and agents harmless therefrom.

Seventeenth-If at any time the powers of the Board or of the Board of Water Supply, or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or efficers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or the Board of Water Supply or other authorities, officer or officers.

SEC. 3. Nothing in this contract contained shall be construed as reviving or validating any lapsed or invalid franchise heretofore granted to any of the grantees herein or to their predecessors, or as enlarging or adding to the powers or privileges contained in said grants of franchises or as waiving any forfeiture thereto.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose. and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as con tracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak ing the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or con sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by certified check upon one of the the order of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
