Resolution Relating to the Publication of 1,000 Copies of the Code of Ordinances.

Resolved, That the City Clerk be and he is hereby authorized and requested to make requisition on the Board of City Record for the publication in pamphlet form, bound in heavy manilla, of one thousand copies of the “Ordinance Constituting the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, approved this day by his Honor, the Mayor; said Code to include the Sanitary Code when the same shall have been finally revised and filed with the City Clerk, in accordance with the provisions of the Greater New York Charter; said publication, however, not to take place until an appropriate index, together with all the sources and dispositions of the matters contained therein shall have been prepared; and further, that five copies of said publication shall be forwarded to each member of this Board by the City Clerk, the remainder to be held for distribution among the respective courts, departments and bureaus of the city government, in each instance a receipt to be taken therefor.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICES.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Public Charities:

Commissioner of Public Charities—Request for Authority to Make Repairs on the Steamer “Fidelity” Without Public Letting.

Department of Public Charities of the City of New York, Municipal Building, tenth floor, March 25th, 1915.

Re Repairs to Steamer Fidelity.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—We would respectfully request permission to authorize James Tregarthen, Son & Co., who are now repairing the above named Steamer on their dock, at the foot of East 7th Street, in accordance with a contract with this Department, to do additional work on this boat to an estimated amount of about \$8,000.

The rules of the United States Steamboat Inspection Service require that when a boat goes on dock these Inspectors are to be notified at once.



Under date of March 10th the Steamboat Inspection Service notified this Department that additional work other than that called for in the specifications, as prepared by us, is required on this boat. A copy of their communication is enclosed herewith.

In connection with this work we requested Tregarthen, Son & Co., to submit a proposition for doing the additional work as called for by the local inspectors on the unit basis. Their quotation is as follows:

"Planking, ceiling, knees, plankshear, and guards on straight side at 75c per ft. B. M."

"Crooked guards around stern, keelsons and timbers at the rate of \$1.00 per ft. B. M."

This price includes the cutting out of all old material, the installation of the new, and the complete fastening and finishing of the new work installed.

It is necessary that this work be done at once in order that the Contractor will not have a claim against the City for dockage and we may have the use of the boat without any unnecessary delay.

Trusting that a resolution in the enclosed form or some other suitable form will be adopted by your Board immediately as we are anxious to place this boat into commission, I am, Respectfully yours,

Resolved, That, pursuant to section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Public Charities of the City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to enter into an agreement with James Tregarthen, Son & Co., Shipwrights, foot of 7th and 8th Streets, East River, to make certain additional repairs on the Steamer Fidelity as required by the United States Steamboat Inspection Service to an amount of about \$8,000.

Department of Commerce, Steamboat-Inspection Service, March 10, 1915.

Capt. McAvoy, Department of Charities, Foot of East 26th Street, New York N. Y.:  
Sir—Referring to the examination made on the 9th instant of Steamer "Fidelity," the following is required:

*Starboard Side.*

Six top timbers or stanchions to be renewed; second clamp in engine room to be renewed; 3 pairs of frames in engine room on port side to be renewed and also ceiling repaired; waterway inside of house on both sides to be repaired or renewed; 6 stanchions on port side to be renewed; 8 pairs of frames on port side to be renewed; all transom frames to be renewed or repaired where necessary on port side aft; starboard after transom frames to be renewed or repaired; 5 pairs of frames to be renewed on starboard side aft; all seams above copper between guards and above to be caulked; port rail abaft of gangway to be renewed; starboard rail forward to be renewed; all planks between guards that are not renewed to be refastened; forward keelson from boiler to be renewed about 30 feet; 2 planks on port bow damaged to be renewed; 4 planks on starboard side damaged to be renewed; starboard after upper guard to be renewed about 25 feet; starboard lower guard to be renewed about 25 feet; 4 planks out under stern to be renewed; 3 planks out on sides to be renewed.

Upper and lower guards on both sides to be removed from the gangway aft to the center of the stern for a distance of about 65 feet and renewed.

Five streaks of outside hull planking on top sides to be removed, each side, for a distance of about 65 feet, and renewed.

All defective top timbers to be renewed or reinforced; forward and after end of deck where not sheathed to be recaulked; new stem and apron and all split planks renewed; rudder post and shoe to be refastened; all seams in hull to be searched and caulked.

Liner on shaft in stuffing box to be renewed or refastened; new gland in stuffing box; stern bearing to be rebushed, and shaft and engine aligned; new ash pans to boiler; new cross bar in furnaces; all defective pipes to be renewed; new wheel.

This office must be notified when the above repairs are well under way and before the vessel leaves the dry dock so that a further examination may be made.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Police Department:

No. 1594.

**Police Department—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$165,000, to Meet Deficiency in the Appropriation for the Uniformed Force.**

City of New York, Police Department, Office of the Commissioner, March 29, 1915.

The Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City, N. Y.:

Sirs—I respectfully request that revenue bonds be authorized to the amount of \$165,000 for the purpose of meeting a deficiency in the appropriation for the uniformed police force, which will occur if appointments are made during this year to fill vacancies now existing in the force.

There are now 206 fewer patrolmen on the force than there were last year. The force actually engaged in uniformed patrol duty has been still further reduced, owing to the necessity of making increases in the traffic squad, in the detective bureau, and in the special squads having to do with the suppression of vice and particularly of the drug evil, and in other special work of the Department.

The traffic squad during the year has been increased from 522 to 580. Even with this increase the needs in this branch of the service have not been met, as there are many points at which traffic men are not stationed where the need is as great as at those places at which traffic men are now assigned. The question of street safety is a pressing one, and it is important that the Department take every means possible not only to reduce the danger to life and property but also to facilitate street traffic. It is felt, however, that the patrol force cannot further be reduced in order to provide the additional men for traffic work.

There are now eighty-one more patrolmen assigned to the detective bureau than last year. When I came into the Department I found this important branch of the service undermanned. So many cases were assigned to a detective that satisfactory results were not being obtained and little attention was being given to preventive work. In order to increase the efficiency of the Detective Bureau it was essential that the force be increased.

Early in the year the Department started on a systematic campaign for the suppression of the drug evil, and the passage of the Boylan Law, which went into effect on July 1, made it incumbent upon the Department to give still more attention to this work. It has been necessary, therefore, to assign forty-four additional men to plain clothes duty.

Other branches of the service, such as the Telegraph Bureau, Harbor Squad, etc., had been depleted to such an extent that the efficiency of the service was seriously impaired. In order to meet the needs in these other services, it was necessary to make further reductions in the patrol force. These depletions of the uniformed force, which were necessary to the accomplishment of the best work, could only partly be foreseen seven months ago at the time the budget estimates were made up.

At that time I had been in the Department only a little over two months and had been unable to look carefully and thoroughly into the needs of the different branches of the service in order to estimate accurately what the requirements would be. At the time the budget was being prepared a study was being made of a redistribution of the force and of a modification of the patrol system in a number of the outlying precincts. It was thought by the changes then under contemplation that it would be possible to save enough men so that the force could be temporarily reduced by from 175 to 200 men. The budget as submitted carried this reduction, amounting to \$200,000. It was recognized at that time that there was need for additional men in traffic work, but because of the short time available for study of the requirements in the Detective Bureau and in other branches of the service the needs for additional men for work other than patrol duty were not adequately anticipated. In addition to the needs for regular police work, the conditions of unemployment and distress,

which has been unusual this year, has added directly and indirectly a great deal of work to the force.

In addition to the reduction of \$200,000, a further reduction was made at one of the last meetings of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment prior to the adoption of the budget, in that a sum of approximately \$70,000 was transferred from the account of the uniformed force to other appropriation accounts covering the employment of civilians. The purpose of this was to replace policemen doing clerical, inside work with civilians, so that the policemen could be returned to more distinctively police work.

In order to make this possible it was, of course, necessary to allow vacancies in the uniformed force to accrue. The most careful estimates which we can make indicate that it will be necessary to accumulate a gross of 425 vacancies during the year 1915. The employment of civilians will make it possible to return to police duty about 60 policemen, so that the net reduction in the force will be about 365. To avoid this reduction, \$165,000, as stated in the first paragraph of this letter, will be required.

We are very much handicapped in giving proper police service to the city by the reductions in the force, which have been made necessary as described above. The needs for police service are constantly growing with the growth of population, and the city is taking, in my judgment, a backward step which is wholly unwarranted if we permit the police force to be reduced. From incomplete studies which we are making, I am pretty well convinced that instead of reducing, we need a substantial increase. I, therefore, earnestly request favorable consideration of this matter, to the end that the strength of the force be restored to what it was last year.

**Board of Inebriety—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$9,000, for Care of Men at the Hospital and Industrial Colony of the Board at Warwick, N. Y.**

Board of Inebriety of The City of New York, 300 Mulberry Street, New York, March 30th, 1915.

Hon. GEORGE MCANENY, President, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Sir—I am directed by the Board of Inebriety to request the Board of Aldermen to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds in an amount not exceeding \$9,000 for the purpose of caring for one hundred men at the Hospital and Industrial Colony of the Board at Warwick, New York, in a camp colony, from May 1st to October 15th, 1915, a period of 168 days. It is proposed to place the men in tents accommodating ten each, and to use a marquee as a dining room. The request is prompted by the desire of the Board to use the splendid facilities at its disposition to the fullest advantage during the summer months, especially following the success of a small camp operated last year. A detailed statement of the estimated cost is attached. The economic value of treating one hundred men for that period will far more than offset the cost involved, and their labor can be used in cultivating the large farm operated by the Board, and in the construction of permanent buildings. "Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of Subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of three thousand eight hundred and forty dollars and ninety-one cents (\$3,840.91), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Sheriff of Richmond County for the purpose of paying bills for supplies, labor and services furnished to the Richmond County Jail during the year 1913."

In reference to the foregoing resolution, it is reported as follows:

An examination was made of the accounts of the Sheriff of Richmond County at the time this request for special revenue bonds was submitted, and the outstanding liabilities for food and medical supplies, household equipment, forage, shoeing of horses and telephone service in excess of the 1913 appropriation were found to be as follows:

Cash balance available at that time to liquidate these claims amounted to \$207.72, leaving a net balance due of \$3,840.91, the amount of the special revenue bonds requested. Since then, however, Daniel J. Roach, named above, was paid \$170.47, leaving at this date liabilities outstanding aggregating \$3,878.16.

An analysis of the food supply account was also made in the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics of this Department, and a report submitted thereon, dated October 5, 1914, disclosed the fact that employees of the Sheriff's office were receiving their meals at the jail in direct violation and contrary to the provisions of Section 6, Chapter 701 of the Laws of 1911, which provides that the food furnished for the prisoners in the County Jail of Richmond County shall be used exclusively for the board and sustenance of prisoners.

Under date of February 8, 1915, a report upon this application for special revenue bonds, was submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion on the following points:

First—Has the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authority in year 1915 to pass a resolution under subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter to authorize issuance of bonds to pay charges for the year 1913, not heretofore authorized, by them?

Second—What authority, if any, did the Sheriff have under chapter 701 of the Laws of 1911, and section 92 of the County Law, to contract for supplies, labor and services in excess of the appropriations made to said office?

Third—Are the liabilities mentioned in the report legal charges against Richmond County, and, if so, in what manner shall they be paid?

On March 4, 1915, Mr. Frank L. Polk, Corporation Counsel, advised me as follows:

The report of the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics to which you refer and which was transmitted with your communication shows that the budgetary appropriation for food supplies for the office of the Sheriff of Richmond County for the year 1913 was for "Food Supplies, Care of Prisoners."

Under Section 6 of Chapter 701 of the Laws of 1911, it is expressly provided that the food furnished for the prisoners in the County Jail of Richmond County shall be used exclusively for the board and sustenance of such prisoners, and it is made a misdemeanor punishable with fine and imprisonment for the Sheriff or any person to convert such food to any other or different use or to his own use, or for any person having the charge thereof to permit the same to be used for any other purpose.

It appears from the said report of the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics and from a letter under date of November 9, 1914, addressed to you by the Sheriff of Richmond County, which accompanies said report, that food purchased out of the appropriation for food supplies for the care of prisoners above referred to for the year 1913 was devoted not only to the use of the prisoners, but also to the use of employees.

While it may be that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may make an appropriation for food to be supplied to employees by reason of the nature of their duties at the jail I think that this would not justify the Sheriff in devoting to the use of such employees, in the absence of such an appropriation, food purchased out of the appropriation made expressly for the care of prisoners, and certainly it would not justify the use of such food for the maintenance of employees indiscriminately and without reference to the necessity for their maintenance by the County by reason of the character of their employment.

There appears to be no way of determining what part of the food supplies for 1913 was appropriated to the use of the prisoners and what part to the use of the employees, nor does it appear what part of the supplies was devoted to the maintenance of employees who could in any sense be said to be properly maintainable at the cost of the county.

Under these circumstances, it seems to me that the additional expenditure for supplies cannot be said to be an authorized expenditure, and that to permit the payment thereof would be in direct defiance of the provisions of the Act of 1911.

As to the other charges mentioned in the said report, in view of the mandatory duty of the Sheriff to keep the County Jail and to safely maintain the prisoners therein, if the items of those charges were necessary for the performance of that duty, and are

reasonable in amount, they are a proper county liability and should be paid, and for this purpose revenue bonds may be issued under the provisions of Subdivision 7 of Section 188 of the Charter.

From the foregoing opinion it appears that the only items for which payments can properly be made are the following:

This latter amount is further reduced by available balances in the respective accounts to which these items are chargeable, amounting to \$38.03; it will, therefore, be necessary to issue special revenue bonds, pursuant to subdivision 7 of Section 188 of the Greater New York Charter to an amount not exceeding \$1,056.54.

The adoption of the attached resolution modifying the schedule to include the above amount is accordingly recommended.

Gentlemen—On January 8, 1915, you referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget a communication from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated December 24, 1914, requesting \$6,000 in corporate stock for the purpose of installing two additional stairways on the Williamsburg Bridge to connect with the outside platforms of the trolley stations that are located between Bedford and Driggs Avenues.

At a meeting of your Board on June 26, 1913, the sum of \$12,000 was authorized for

" \*\*\* the construction of two additional passenger platforms on the Brooklyn approach of the Williamsburg Bridge and two additional stairways to Driggs Avenue \*\*\* "

The outside platforms, which are in addition to a center platform, have been constructed and were opened to the public on October 6, 1914. They are about 165 feet long. In order to minimize their encroachment on the roadway, they are only 7 feet 9 inches wide, with a clearance of 5 feet 9 inches on the platform. Since the opening of these platforms the traffic has greatly increased, so that the operation of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit surface cars at the south platforms during the evening rush hours has caused great congestion.

The Department of Bridges caused a count to be made on November 5, 1914, a month after the opening of these outside platforms. On that day 3,834 persons used the north platform (Metropolitan and Third Avenue lines) and 2,426 persons used the south platform (Brooklyn Rapid Transit and local bridge line).

Upon the construction of these stairways, the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company proposes to divert the northbound crosstown cars through Driggs Avenue. This will further increase the use of these platforms, but at the same time much confusion and congestion now existing at the easterly end of the bridge plaza will be eliminated. So rapid has been the increase of traffic at the south platform that at a recent count approximately one thousand persons per hour used this platform during the rush hours from 5 to 7 p. m.

On February 10, 1915, Mr. S. W. Huff, Vice-President of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system, forwarded to Commissioner Kracke a communication from the superintendent of the surface lines of that railroad, calling attention to the traffic conditions on the south platform from 5.30 to 7 p. m., which, he states, has increased to such an extent as to make the operation of the surface cars at this point very dangerous.

The traffic on the north platform, while not congested, is rapidly increasing. It is proper to provide both stairways at this time, rather than wait until conditions on this platform become as congested as those on the south side.

It appears that this improvement is necessary and urgent.

The original authorization of June 26, 1914, which provided for these additional stairways to Driggs Avenue, was insufficient.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the authorization of \$6,000 in corporate stock for this purpose. Respectfully,

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 404 of Chapter 9 of Part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to "Cleaning of Streets and Sidewalks."

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 404 of Chapter 9 of Part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 404. No person, or persons, shall throw, cast or lay, or direct, suffer or permit any servant, agent or employee to throw, cast or lay any ashes, offal, vegetables, garbage, dross, cinders, shells, straw, shavings, paper, dirt, filth, broken glassware, crockery, bottles or rubbish of any kind, whatsoever, in any street in the City of New York, either upon the roadway or sidewalk thereof, [except that in the morning before 8 o'clock, or before the first sweeping of the roadway by the Department of Street Cleaning, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, dust from the sidewalk may be swept into the gutter, if there piled, but not otherwise, and at no other time], and it is hereby made the duty of the owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person in charge of any building, to clean or cause to be cleaned, and kept clean, the portion of the sidewalk adjoining said building, and to place or cause to be placed, all materials removed therefrom into their proper receptacles, and not on the roadway.

Any person found guilty of any of the foregoing provisions of this section, by a City Magistrate, or other tribunal, shall be punished by a fine of not less than One Dollar, and not more than Ten Dollars, or by imprisonment for a term of not less than one day nor more than five days.

Sir—Pursuant to the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 23, 1915, I submit below the information required:

"Whereas, A great number of parks and playgrounds have been established throughout the city for the beneficent purpose of providing breathing spaces for our citizens and their many visitors, and

"Whereas, Under the provisions of Section 50 of the Greater New York Charter, it is the function of the Board of Aldermen to officially name such parks and playgrounds, be it

"Resolved, That the Park Board be and it is hereby requested to inform this Board at an early date what parks and playgrounds have been opened to the public since January 1, 1898, what names they bear, and by what authority such names were selected."

The only parks under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx, to which names have been given, or which are locally known, acquired since January 1, 1898, are as follows:

*Joseph Rodman Drake Park:* Located at the junction of Hunts Point Avenue and Oak Point Avenue; contains 2.88 acres, and is the old cemetery where the poet Joseph Rodman Drake is buried. It is not known by what authority this park was named, and probably it has not been regularly named by any authority.

*Devoe Park:* Located at Fordham Road, between Sedgwick and Aqueduct Avenues; contains 5.87 acres. Was locally known as Devoe Park many years before it was finally acquired by the City for park purposes. It is probable that it has never been formally named.

*Old Fort Number Four Park:* Located west of the Jerome Park Reservoir, between Sedgwick and Reservoir Avenues; contains 6.71 acres, and was transferred to this department from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in 1914. Has not been regularly named by any authority, but its local name is one suggested by the Daughters of the Revolution.

All other named parks under the jurisdiction of this department were opened to public use prior to 1898.

This department has no named playgrounds, those in use now being known only by the names of the parks in which they are located.

The only case where the name of a park has been changed since 1898 is that of Cedar Park, located on the west side of Mott Avenue, between the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad, Spuyten Duyvil & Port Morris Branch, and 158th Street; area 17.47 acres. The name was changed in 1904 from Cedar to Franz Sigel Park, by authority of the Board of Aldermen. Very truly,

It, therefore, recommends that the accompanying substitute ordinance prepared in compliance with the rules of the Board be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 21 of Article 3 of Chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, relating to "snow and ice."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 3 of Chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, relating to "snow and ice," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§21. Property owners. 1. *Must clear sidewalks.* Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the City, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is [paved], graded, shall, within 4 hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow and ice, dirt or other material



from that portion of the sidewalk [and gutter] that is paved; and where no portion of the walk is paved, from a space four feet in width in the center of said sidewalk space, the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in the above period of four hours; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the commissioner of street cleaning, or by the borough president of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said commissioner of street cleaning, or of said borough president of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow and ice, dirt and other material; except that in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said 4 hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable time.

2. *May use ashes, etc.* In case the snow and ice [on the sidewalk] shall be frozen so hard that it cannot be easily removed from the sidewalk [without injury to the pavement], the owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground as aforesaid may, within the time specified in the preceding subdivision, cause the entire sidewalk, from curb line to street line, abutting on the said premises to be strewn with ashes, sand, sawdust, or some similar suitable material, and shall, as soon thereafter as the weather shall permit, thoroughly clean said sidewalk.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE relative to removal of snow, ice or other material from sidewalk; Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Sec. 409. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city, abutting upon any street, avenue or public place where the sidewalk is [paved] *graded*, shall, within four hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow and ice, dirt or other material from that portion of the sidewalk [and gutter] that is paved; and where no portion of the walk is paved, from a space four feet in width in the center of said sidewalk space, the time between nine p. m. and seven a. m. not being included in the above period of four hours; provided, however, that such removal shall in all such cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or by the Borough President of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said Commissioner of Street Cleaning or of said Borough President of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow and ice, dirt and other material, except that in the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street, avenue or public place for a linear distance of 500 feet or more shall be considered to have complied with this ordinance if such person shall have begun to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said four hours, and shall continue such removal and shall complete it within a reasonable time.

Sec. 410. In case the snow and ice [on the sidewalk] shall be frozen so hard that it cannot be easily removed from the sidewalk [without injury to the pavement] the owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground as aforesaid, shall, within the time specified in the last preceding section, cause the entire sidewalk from curb line to street line, abutting on the said premises to be strewn with ashes, sand, sawdust, or some similar suitable material, and shall, as soon thereafter as the weather shall permit, thoroughly clean said sidewalk.

Dear Sir—I hereby respectfully make an application for the issuance of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$1,001, for the employment of emergency process servers in this office. In the budget for this year request was made for the establishment of four additional positions of process server in our office, but only one extra position was provided, making a total of only four regular process servers. It is impossible for these few men to serve the large number of subpoenas issued for the attendance of witnesses in the various courts and before the Grand Jury.

Due to the steadily increasing population of the County, with a corresponding increase in the number of crimes committed, and the fact that many crimes are committed in Queens during the summer months by visitors from other sections of the City, it has been found necessary to employ emergency process servers in the District Attorney's office. In the year 1914 my predecessor expended therefor the total sum of \$1,641.50; of this amount \$941.50 was taken from account No. 3542, General Contingencies, and the sum of \$700 was obtained through your efforts in obtaining the issuance of special revenue bonds.

In the budget for the current year the sum of \$600 was provided for General Contingencies, Code No. 3542, as against \$1,155 for 1914. During the past two months I have been compelled to engage emergency process servers for a total of 143 days, or a total expenditure of \$500.50. In order to properly conduct the prosecution of crime in Queens County I shall be required to continue employing these extra process servers for the next ten and one-half months.

I feel that I shall reasonably need the sum of \$1,001 for this purpose during the remainder of the year, and I therefore respectfully urge that you expedite the issuance of special revenue bonds in this amount.

On January 27, 1915, your Committee presented the following report and resolution, which was adopted (See Jol., pp. 135-136-137):

"To the Board of Education:

"The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that the General School Fund for 1914 is insufficient for its requirements. The deficiency at December 31, 1914, was \$42,579.14, with other claims yet to be presented.

"The costs of sundry extra propositions, not contemplated at the time of preparation of the 1914 Budget, were defrayed from the General School Fund during 1914, as, for instance:

"(a) Experimental provocation work in accordance with the Wirt and modified plans, undertaken by the Board of Education with the active support of his Honor the Mayor and other members of the City administration.

"(b) On December 29, 1913, the Legislature enacted Chapter 838 of the Laws of 1913 (known as the Velte Law), which provides that male persons who were on December 31, 1911, on an eligible list for license No. 1, or who were on that date serving as pupil teachers in the fourth term work of any training school, should, upon appointment, be paid in accordance with the salary schedules for men in force on July 1, 1911.

"(c) On April 11, 1914, the Legislature enacted Chapter 264 of the Laws of 1914 (known as the Velte-Schaap Law), which extends the above-mentioned Velte Law to include male persons who were at December 31, 1911, students in any training school, or male persons who were regularly matriculated students in a prescribed course in education, approved by the State Commissioner of Education, in any college located in the City of New York, and recognized by the Regents of the University of the State of New York, or male persons who had resigned from the teaching force prior to December 31, 1911, and who were, or may be, subsequently reappointed.

"(d) On April 20, 1914, the Legislature enacted Chapter 479 of the Laws of 1914, to take effect May 1, 1914, which provides for the organization of a Bureau of Com-



pulsory Education, School Census and Child Welfare, and the appointment of a Director and Assistant Director therefor.

"These various propositions imposed obligations upon the General School Fund for which provision had not been made in 1914 to the extent of

"(a) The Wirt and modified plans for experimental prevocational work, with some additional costs yet to be apportioned.....	\$13,834 04

"The work under the Wirt and modified plans was undertaken upon an understanding with the financial authorities that the funds of the Board of Education would, in case of necessity, be reimbursed for the extra cost. Also, the request of the Board of Education, on July 8, 1914 (see Journal, pages 1672-73), for Special Revenue Bonds to meet the extra obligations imposed by the Legislature was not granted at the time with the understanding that the request might be renewed if necessity arose.

"The necessity for reimbursing the General School Fund for 1914 now exists. However, since there are balances in other funds of the Board of Education in excess of requirements, it is deemed expedient to ask for transfers rather than to renew the request for Special Revenue Bonds.

"Your Committee submits for adoption the following resolution:

AN ORDINANCE relating to fees chargeable by Borough Presidents for permits authorized by law or ordinance to be granted and issued by them, and to charges that shall be made and paid in connection with the restoration of pavements or sidewalks and the foundations thereof, removed, excavated, or disturbed for private purposes.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Article I of Chapter 5 of Part I of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section, to be section 92a thereof, to read as follows:

Sec. 92a. The President of each Borough shall prepare and keep on file in his office the following schedules:

Schedule A. A schedule of fees which, except as otherwise provided by law, shall be charged and collected for the granting and issuing of permits, which he shall have been authorized by law or ordinance to grant and issue for any purpose:

Schedule B. A schedule of rates of charges that, except as otherwise provided by law, shall be made and paid for work, labor and material furnished by the City of New York in restoring pavements or sidewalks and the foundations thereof removed, excavated or disturbed in any manner, by any person or corporation, for private purposes, which charges shall also include the reasonable expense of the supervision and inspection of such restorations.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### Report of the Committee on General Welfare, in Favor of Adopting Ordinance Relating to Traffic Regulations on the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, The Bronx.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on March 16, 1915 (Minutes, page 1638), the annexed ordinance relative to traffic regulations governing the use of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse in The Bronx, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, it believes the proposed regulations to be necessary. This is a substitute for a proposed ordinance heretofore introduced, and the Committee is assured that there is no objection to the rules herein prescribed.

It, therefore, recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE relating to traffic regulations governing the use of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse in the Borough of The Bronx.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The following regulations shall govern vehicular traffic upon the drives and roads of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse in the Borough of The Bronx:

1. Side Drives. The side drives are primarily for the use of passenger automobiles and motorcycles of all kinds. Trucks, delivery wagons and other business vehicles are prohibited from using the same, except when requisite for the purposes of stopping at property fronting thereon, and in such cases the use thereof by such vehicles is prohibited further than is necessary for entering upon and leaving the Concourse by the nearest side street or streets.

2. Stopping. Vehicles intending to stop will draw up close to the curb, and must not occupy more than one-half the width of the driveway, or stand so that the length thereof is otherwise than parallel to the curb.

3. East Drive. The east drive is for north-bound traffic.

4. West Drive. The west drive is for south-bound traffic.

5. Center Drive. The center drive is for the use of north and south-bound horse drawn pleasure vehicles and for equestrians, but not for business traffic of any kind.

6. The storage of building or other material in any of the roadways is prohibited, except upon special permit from the Borough President of The Bronx.

7. Application of Police Regulations. "The Rules for Driving and Regulation of Street Traffic," issued by the Police Department of the City of New York, and the "Rules of the Road" of the Code of Ordinances, shall not apply to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse where they conflict with the foregoing Rules and Regulations.

Section 2. Any person who shall violate any provision of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than Ten Dollars or by imprisonment for not exceeding ten days.

The Committee on Health, to which was referred on February 23, 1915 (Minutes, page 1197) the annexed ordinance providing for the proper inspection of meat in the City of New York, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That it held a public hearing on this subject, at which no one appeared in opposition, and the Health Department was officially represented in favor. The Committee believes this ordinance, with a slight amendment, to be one which will help

in protecting the health of the residents in this city very materially, and it, therefore, recommends that the accompanying substitute ordinance be adopted.

#### SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE to Provide for the Proper Inspection of Meat in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. No carcasses or parts of the carcasses of cattle, sheep, or swine, shall be offered for sale, sold, or given away in any Public Market in the City of New York until they shall, respectively, have been inspected and passed as fit for human food by a duly authorized inspector of the United States Government or a duly authorized inspector of the Health Department of the City of New York, or, in the case of parts of a carcass, unless such part shall have been cut from a carcass or part of a carcass which had previously been inspected and passed as hereinbefore provided.

Section 2. Such inspector of the Department of Health, upon finding such carcass or part of a carcass, as the case may be, fit for human food, shall, upon receipt of the sum of five cents, to be collected by such inspector for each carcass or part of a carcass thus inspected and found fit for human food, proceed to mark such carcass or part of a carcass by branding or stamping thereon a number and the words "Department of Health" and "Inspected and Passed," together with the date of inspection and the name of the inspector, all set forth in conspicuous type in the following form:

and such inspector shall also, upon branding or stamping such carcass or part of a carcass, deliver to the person paying the aforesaid sum a certificate, which shall be substantially in the following form:

(Brief description of carcass or part of carcass) ....

(Place of Inspection) ....

(Name of Dealer) ....

Inspected and Passed. ....

(Date) ....

(Name of Inspector) ....

Such brand or stamp marks, as well as such certificates, shall be consecutively numbered, and the number of the brand or stamp mark shall, in every instance, correspond with the number of the certificate.

Section 3. Every such certificate shall be made in triplicate form, and the inspector shall deliver the original to the person paying the aforesaid sum, and file a copy thereof, respectively, in the Department of Health and in the office of the Comptroller.

Section 4. For the purposes of this ordinance, no such carcass or part of a carcass shall be deemed to have been inspected and passed as fit for human food by an inspector of the Department of Health unless such carcass or part of a carcass shall have been branded or stamped and a certificate shall have been issued, as hereinbefore provided.

Section 5. The provisions of this ordinance shall not, however, apply to carcasses or parts of the carcasses of cattle, sheep or swine killed in any slaughter-house in the City of New York conducted under a permit issued by the Board of Health.

Section 6. Any person who shall violate or neglect to comply with any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than One hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### ORIGINAL.

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Section 3. Every such certificate shall be made in triplicate form, and the inspector shall deliver the original to the person paying the aforesaid sum, and file a copy thereof, respectively, in the Department of Health and in the office of the Comptroller.

Section 4. For the purposes of this ordinance, no such carcass or part of a carcass shall be deemed to have been inspected and passed as fit for human food by an inspector of the Department of Health unless such carcass or part of a carcass shall have been branded or stamped and a certificate shall have been issued, as hereinbefore provided.

Section 5. The provisions of this ordinance shall not, however, apply to carcasses or parts of the carcasses of cattle, sheep or swine killed in any slaughter-house in the City of New York conducted under a permit issued by the Board of Health.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

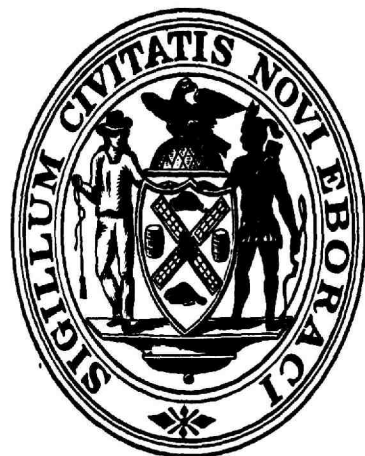

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
