

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending April 25, 1885.

Resignation of Charles A. Binder as a Commissioner of Deeds. Resolved, That Herman Bruns, Jr., be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of Charles A. Binder, who has resigned.

Resignation accepted and resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 20, 1885.

Resolved, That Ninety-third street, from Eighth to Ninth avenue, be paved with trap-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid at terminating avenues where required, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 13, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, April 22, 1885.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to lay water-pipes in One Hundred and Thirtieth street, from Cliff avenue, two hundred feet east, pursuant to the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, sections 189 and 194.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 13, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, April 22, 1885.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted in One Hundred and Sixteenth street, from Sixth to Eighth avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 13, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, April 22, 1885.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Bloomingdale Bros. to extend vault in front of premises on the north side of Fifty-ninth street, commencing one hundred and five feet ten inches west of Third avenue, a distance of six feet eight inches, and extending along Fifty-ninth street thirty-nine feet and two inches as shown on the annexed diagram, upon payment of the usual fee, provided the work be done in a safe and durable manner, and that the said Blooming-dale Bros. stipulates with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may occur during the progress of or subsequent to the completion of the work, which is to be done at their own expense and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council. such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend section 24 of article IV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880," approved October 25, 1884.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 24 of article IV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, as amended by the above-entitled ordinance, approved October 25, 1884, is hereby again amended by adding thereto, at the end thereof, the following: "Any boy between eighteen and twenty-one years of age, being the support of a widowed mother, or having anybody depending upon him for support, shall, upon satisfactory proofs, be granted a permit by his Honor the Mayor to drive a public cart "—so that said section, when so amended, shall read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Every driver of a public cart shall be at least twenty-one years of age, a citizen and resident of this State, and shall be licensed by the Mayor, and pay for such license the sum of one dollar, which license shall be renewed on the 1st day of December in each and every year after the 1st day of December, 1885, upon payment of fifty cents annually. He shall also, while at work, wear a badge with the number of his license engraved thereon, and of a size and style to be prescribed by the Mayor or Mayor's Marshal, and who are also empowered to revoke all such licenses. A failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed a violation of this article. Any boy between eighteen and twenty-one years of age, being the support of a widowed mother, or having anybody depending upon him for support, shall, upon satisfactory proofs, be granted a permit by his Honor the Mayor to drive a public cart."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORTED MORTALITY * for the week ending April 18, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending April 11, 1885

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 696 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 18, 1885, which is a decrease of 44, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 78 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending April 11, 1885, was 705, which is 35.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.40 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,388,512.
