To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN—A lease was made to the City by Moritz Bauer, for the term of five years from May 1, 1881, of a building corner of One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and Third avenue, at a yearly rent of \$2,000, for the use of the Sixth District Police Court and the Tenth District Judicial Court. The lease was not renewed when it expired on May 1, 1886, but the occupation by the courts was continued, and has been held by them to the present time, a proposal then made to remove the courts to another building not having been carried out because the Board of Aldermen did not designate the place for holding the Civil Court in it.

It is now proposed to renew the lease of said premises for the continued use of the said courts, for the term of three years from May 1, 1886, at the same rent, which I consider fair and reasonable. Certain repairs are necessary which the owner has agreed to make at his own expense, according to the details thereof described in a report herewith submitted, made by E. E. McLean, Civil Engineer of the Finance Department, excepting storm-doors.

A resolution is submitted to authorize a lease accordingly.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to prepare a lease to the City from Moritz Bauer of the building corner of One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and North Third avenue, for the use of the Sixth District Police Court and the Tenth District Judicial Court, for the term of three years from May 1, 1886, at the yearly rent of two thousand dollars, the lease to contain the usual covenants and conditions, with the provision that the owner will make immediately all such necessary repairs of the premises as are described in a report thereon by E. E. McLean, excepting storm-doors; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease should be made; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Which report was accepted and resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report on offices for the Receiver of Taxes :

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN—At the meeting of the Board held March 22, 1887, a resolution was adopted authorizing and requesting the Comptroller to furnish offices for the accommodation of the Receiver of Taxes, in any City building, and, if they could not be procured in such building, he was authorized to lease such premises as he might select, to be approved by this Board, for such offices.

The only City building containing rooms possibly suitable for the purpose are rooms in the basement of the New Court-house in City Hall Park, in possession of the Supreme Court.

I immediately addressed a communication to the Supreme Court Justices inquiring whether the rooms referred to could be appropriated as offices for the Receiver of Taxes, and herewith I submit a reply from Judge Van Brunt stating that all the rooms in possession of the Supreme Court are absolutely necessary for the Court and that none can be spared.

The offices of the Receiver of Taxes must necessarily be near the Finance Department and in the vicinity of the City Hall Park, for convenient transaction of the public business and the accommodation of the tax-payers.

Diligent search has been made in that locality, and the only premises which can be found suitable for offices of the Tax Receiver are two large rooms marked O. and P., on plan of the Stewart Building, fronting on Chambers street, and the two basement rooms under them, marked OO. and PP., the former extending through to Reade street.

These rooms will afford ample accommodation for the offices of the Tax Receiver.

The rent asked is \$17,500 per annum.

I respectfully present this report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, with a resolution to lease the rooms for one year, for such action as may be deemed necessary, or such further instructions as they may deem advisable.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from Henry Hilton of rooms marked O. and P., in the Stewart Building, fronting on Chambers street, and rooms in the basement marked OO. and PP., the former extending from Chambers to Reade street, as shown upon the plan of said building, for the use of the Receiver of Taxes as offices, for the term of one year, at a yearly rent of \$17,500, with the usual covenants and conditions, and such others as the Comptroller may deem expedient; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease should be made; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882—provided that the term of one year under said lease shall commence May 1, 1887, and the rental be paid from the date of occupation by the Receiver of Taxes; for the payment of which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to make provision by a transfer of the amount of rent payable during the year 1887, from appropriations made to the Department of Public Works for the years 1886 and 1887, entitled "For Additions to the Brown-stone Building," with the consent of the Commissioner of Public Works.

The report was accepted and the leasing of the rooms in the Stewart Building discussed, and the matter was recommitted to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution :

Resolved, That a brief advertisement of the Sale of Real Estate belonging to the City to be made on Thursday, May 5, 1887, be published in two daily newspapers, the expense of which shall be paid out of the appropriation entitled "Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Expenses of," for 1887, and such publication is hereby authorized and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller made a verbal report of the facts in the matter of a sale of certain premises in East Eighty-second street, at public auction, in the year 1867, which sale had never been consummated by the payment of all the purchase money and the conveyance of the title to the purchaser, and offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby authorize the Comptroller to take whatever measures may be necessary to close the sale of certain premises sold at public auction to Terence Farley, in the year 1867, by direction of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, said premises being then known as No. 174 East Eighty-second street, and now known as No. 108 East Eighty-second street, and Ward No. 68, on Block 372, Nineteenth Ward of the City of New York, whereon a payment was made on account at the time of sale, payment to be made of the balance of the purchase money remaining due upon said premises, with interest thereon at three per cent. per annum, together with all arrears of taxes, assessments and water rents; and the Counsel to the Corporation is hereby requested to prepare a deed conveying said premises to said Terence Farley or his assignee, and when such payments shall have been made, the Mayor is hereby authorized and requested to sign such deed and the Clerk of the Common Council to affix the seal of the City thereto, as approved by the Counsel to the Corporation.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following :

At a sale of property for non-payment of assessments, held October, 1884, Theodore F. Tone bought Map No. 17981, Block 1285, in Twelfth Ward, sold for assessment for St. Nicholas avenue opening. The plot is land under water, has never been granted by the City, and was sold in error. The amount of the assessment (\$94), a part of the purchase price paid, was deposited in the City Treasury to credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt.

Resolved, That a warrant payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain for ninety-four dollars (\$94), for deposit in the City Treasury, to credit of Assessment Sales—Moneys Refunded, to refund purchase money paid for property sold in error, as per statement herewith.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following :

Applications have been made, as per statement herewith, for the refund of Croton water rent paid in error. The applications are severally approved by Commissioner of Public Works, the Receiver of Taxes or Clerk of Arrears, and the amount so paid, one hundred and eighty-one dollars and three cents (\$181.03), has been deposited in the City Treasury to credit of the Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt.

The Comptroller presented the following communication from the Health Department, with a resolution in relation to the land appropriated to that Department by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the use of the Hospital for Contagious Diseases, situated between East Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, adjoining the Eighteenth Ward Market Building, protesting against the transfer thereof to the Street Cleaning Department :

MR. EDWARD V. LOEW, Comptroller, No. 15 Stewart Building, City :

DEAR SIR—Relative to the request of Commissioner Coleman, of the Department of Street Cleaning, to have transferred to him a portion of the land leased to the Health Department by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 7th of March, 1884, but ever since and still occupied by the Street Cleaning Department as a blacksmith shop, in the rear of the Eighteenth Ward Market Building, I beg to inclose you the following preamble and resolution of the Board of Health, protesting against depriving us of the use of this land.

The blacksmith shop occupying the plot of ground in question is an unsightly and dangerous wooden structure, projecting into the hospital grounds, and, owing to its construction is a menace to the safety of the City property in that neighborhood, owing to the liability of fire. The mistake of this Department was in not insisting that Commissioner Coleman should surrender this piece of land to the Health Department at the time this Department acquired a right to it. It is much needed for an extension of the building in which the disinfecting wagons are now stored, as it would permit us to build a stable without which we are greatly inconvenienced. I beg to submit that a blacksmith shop in the yard of the hospital is not desirable, as it is noisy and tends to annoy the patients, and as the building is a miserable shed, patched and cleated to make it temporarily weather-tight; its removal would destroy nothing of value. I beg, therefore, that the resolution presented for the consideration of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by Commissioner Coleman, accompanying his letter of February 15, 1887, be not passed, and that the Health Department be authorized to request the immediate vacation of the premises in question. If desired I will, at any time, personally appear before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and defend the position taken by this Department.

In December last, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, recognizing the necessity of stable accommodations for this Department on this property, appropriated \$7,500 for this purpose.

There is no other place upon the grounds where this stable can be built, and until we acquire possession we shall be under the necessity of retaining the inconvenient and expensive premises in Worth street, now occupied as the Department Stables. When this stable is erected, the Health Department can surrender to the City the valuable piece of property in Worth street which we are now occupying. Permit me also to respectfully call your attention to a grave evil described in a report made to the Mayor a few days ago. I refer to the location of the Dog Pound in East Sixteenth street. Its position between the Willard Parker Hospital and the Small-pox Reception House, in immediate proximity to both, is a grave outrage on humanity, and has already resulted in increasing the deaths among patients, as the dreadful noise attending the drowning of dogs in the morning has, in many cases, caused patients to leap from their beds in wild delirium, and incur fatal exposure. If you can aid me in my efforts to secure the removal of this institution to some other and more appropriate place, you will put the officers of this Department under great obligation. I am amazed that my predecessor should have remained indifferent to a matter which every one connected with the medical staff of this Department considers a grievous wrong to the involuntary patients for whose detention and treatment the two hospitals of this Department were established.

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held March 7, 1884, did lease to the Health Department of the City of New York the space between the Eighteenth Ward Market Building and the site for a hospital on East Sixteenth street, being about sixty-nine feet nine inches front on said street, more or less, and extending across the block for the same width to the southerly line of East Seventeenth street, for the use and occupation of this Department in connection with said hospital; said lease to include the site of said hospital heretofore granted December 27, 1882; and

Whereas, The Department of Street Cleaning has requested that the title to the ground, on which the Health Department is about to erect a stable building, which is now occupied by the blacksmiths and horseshoers' shops and coal shed of the Department of Street Cleaning, and also the vacant ground bounded by the easterly line of the blacksmiths' shop extending northerly to the dock, be vested in said Department; therefore

Resolved, That this Department respectfully protests against any change in the lease granted

March 7, 1884, by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the reason that it will seriously interfere with the plans and necessities of the Department in connection with the hospital for contagious diseases and the building for disinfection, already erected upon the site.

The Mayor stated that the subject of the removal of the Dog Pound from the Eighteenth Ward Market Building, referred to in the communication from the Health Department, had been brought to his attention by that Department, and that he was very desirous of abating the nuisance complained of and was attending to the matter, having given directions to the Keeper of the Dog Pound to seek for other premises to which it could be removed as soon as possible.

Upon motion of the Chamberlain, that portion of the communication from the Health Department relating to the Dog Pound was referred to the Mayor, and that part relating to the use of the land connected with the Hospital was referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller presented a communication from the Mayor, enclosing one from Mr. H. H. Wimmel, in regard to a plot of land owned by Mr. James Reilly, between One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Fifth streets, adjacent to the Old Croton Aqueduct, and asking for relief from injury to his property by the sale of the aqueduct lots so as to cut off access to a street.

The communications were ordered to be placed on file.
