

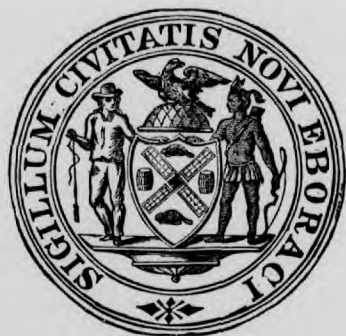

By Alderman McLarney—

Petition to change grade of Eighty-second street, from Avenue B to the East river.
Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

REPORTS.

(G. O. 642.)

The Committee on Railroads, to whom was referred the application of the New York City Suburban Surface Railroad Company for permission of the local authorities to construct, maintain and operate a railroad on the surface of certain streets in the City of New York, respectfully

REPORT:

That they have carefully examined into the facts set forth in the application of the petitioner aforesaid, and have found all the material facts set forth and stated in said petition to be true. The proposed railroad, if constructed, will be of great utility. It will greatly enhance the value of real estate along the line of said road, thereby increasing the assessed value of real estate, and benefitting taxpayers of city at large, as well as the owner of property along the line of said road.

There is no competing surface road anywhere in the location named, the nearest being east of Tremont and the Harlem Railroad.

There is no way of communicating between the points of Tremont and the Harlem river, soon to be a ship canal, except by private carriage or on foot.

There is no way of reaching Woodlawn Cemetery from any of the points on the west side of Jerome avenue, except by private carriage or on foot, while the distance is too great for pedestrians.

Persons residing in Fordham or Tremont desiring to take the Hudson River cars have now to travel to Mott avenue or Forty-second street to connect with trains north. This road will enable such residents to take the cars north from a point north of High Bridge, via Burnside avenue.

The proposed road does not destroy the driving portion of Jerome avenue, as it enters Jerome avenue several miles north of McComb's Dam Bridge, thus saving that thoroughfare for driving purposes for the public at large.

It furnishes transit to several of the uptown parks to which there is now no way of access, except by private conveyance.

When the Harlem River Improvement is finished, it will become a public necessity.

It is proposed to construct the road by the use of the modern rail, which avoids obstruction to travel, and it is to be a railroad with motors other than steam or animal power.

It will enable people of slender means to construct homes within the city limits, whereas now such settlers are driven to Brooklyn or New Jersey.

It will open up for immediate population a region of country equal in size to nearly one-half of Manhattan Island.

The franchise will be in the hands of taxpayers of the immediate locality of the road, men of high character and standing, whose interests will be best subserved by building and equipping a first-class road.

It will bring into active use the new Manhattan Bridge, and afford the rapidly growing population of Washington Heights, facilities for communication with the wards of the city north and east of Harlem river.

It will stimulate the growth of manufacturing establishments in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the city, thereby furnishing employment of labor.

It is a measure demanded by people of all classes, and but little opposition to it has appeared before your Committee.

It will do no injury to McComb's Dam Bridge, but, on the contrary, increase its usefulness, so long as it shall remain a public thoroughfare.

The statutory notice of hearing of said application of fourteen days has been legally advertised, under direction of his Honor the Mayor.

The following resolutions are therefore respectfully offered for your adoption:

Resolved, That the Common Council hereby approves of the application, and hereby consents to the construction of the New York City Suburban Surface Railroad Company, with power to construct, operate and maintain a railroad on the surface of the streets named in said application, with a double track, and the necessary switches, sidings, turn-outs, turn-tables and connections for the convenient working of said road by storage, electric motor or cable traction, or any other than steam power, as follows, viz.:

Commencing at the easterly junction of One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street and Eighth avenue; thence easterly along One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street to the McComb's Dam road; thence via said road to and across McComb's Dam or Central Bridge (so long and whenever said bridge shall be open to public use, but with the right to pass only one car at a time on or over said bridge) to Jerome avenue, and along or by it to the junction of Sedgwick avenue; thence northerly via Sedgwick avenue to the junction of Burnside avenue; thence easterly via Burnside avenue (as soon as the said Burnside avenue is graded for public use), to the junction of Jerome avenue, and thence northerly by said Jerome avenue to a point at or near the entrance gate of Woodlawn Cemetery. And said road being also with a branch or continuation from the junction of Jerome and Burnside avenues easterly through and upon Burnside avenue (as soon as said Burnside avenue shall be graded for public use) to Webster avenue, and upon the latter avenue to the junction of One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, called Tremont or Locust avenue, and thence along and upon said street to the junction of Railroad avenue in Tremont; also with a branch from the junction of

Burnside and Sedgwick avenues along Sedgwick avenue north to Fordham Landing road, and thence easterly to Jerome avenue, with all necessary switches, turn-outs, turn-tables, connections, and stands for the proper and convenient working of the said road; and be it further

Resolved, That the conditions upon which, and not otherwise, the said consent is hereby given are as follows, to wit:

First—That the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, pertinent thereto, shall be complied with.

Second—That the right, franchise and privilege of using the said streets and avenues to construct, maintain, use and operate a street surface railroad upon the said streets and avenues, subject to all the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, and of chapter 642 of the Laws of 1886, shall be sold at public auction to the bidder, which shall be an incorporated railroad or railway company organized to construct, maintain and operate a street railroad in the City of New York, for which such consent is given and which will agree to give the largest percentage per annum of its gross receipts with adequate security by a bond or undertaking in writing and under seal in such form, condition, amount and sureties as shall be required and approved by the Comptroller of the said city for the fulfillment of the said agreement and for the commencement and completion of such road according to the plan or plans, and on the route or routes fixed for its construction within the time or times designated and prescribed therefor by the provisions of chapter 642 of the Laws of 1886.

Third—That in the construction of the said railroad and its equipment, the materials and work employed shall be of the best quality and character, and the said railroad shall be constructed with side-bearing rail, having the outer edge of bearing flush with pavement, with inside drop, not exceeding one inch in depth, and that the cars thereon shall be run as frequently as the convenience of the public may require.

Fourth—That the bidder to which the aforesaid sale shall be made, and any person or corporation using the tracks or any part of the tracks constructed or laid under or in pursuance of this consent, shall comply with all reasonable ordinances or regulations which the local authorities having charge of the aforesaid streets and avenues, or any of them, shall make as to the rate of speed, mode of use of tracks and removal of ice and snow, and with any and all provisions of law applicable to any street surface railroad company organized under chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, and shall not charge any passenger more than five cents from or to any point on the route hereinabove described, nor from any point on said route or any route connecting with the route hereinabove described, to any point on said route or any route connecting with the route hereinabove described, but shall give transfer tickets to a passenger when necessary to secure, and which shall secure, to him one continuous ride between such points for the single fare of five cents.

And the said bidder, as to the whole route hereinabove described, shall be absolutely and unqualifiedly bound, and any person or company using or operating a railroad upon the tracks, or any part of the tracks, constructed upon the said route, under or by virtue of the consent hereby given or the sale had in pursuance thereof, as to the tracks so used by it or him, shall be jointly and severally bound with the said bidder absolutely and unqualifiedly to repair and keep in permanent repair the portion of said streets and avenues upon which the tracks shall be so constructed, between the tracks, the rails of the tracks and a space two feet in width outside of and adjoining the outside rails of the track or tracks so long as such tracks so constructed shall continue to be used, and this obligation in respect to the repairing of the streets shall not be dependent upon the requirements of the local authorities, but is hereby made an absolute and unqualified obligation; and they shall in like manner and to a like extent be bound to and shall remove the snow from the same parts of the streets or avenues immediately after it shall have fallen, or as soon as possible thereafter, and not merely to clear the tracks and the space between them by removing the snow to the space intervening between the tracks and the curb-stones, but to remove the snow entirely from that portion of the streets or avenues made use of for the construction and operation of the railroad, so far as such snow may have fallen or ice may have been formed upon the said tracks, or upon the space between them, or the designated two feet of space upon each side of the outside of said tracks; the snow or ice so removed to be taken from the street and deposited at the nearest and most convenient place used by the city authorities for the deposit of snow removed by themselves.

Fifth—That the railroad to the construction or operation of which this consent is given shall be operated only by storage electric motor, or cable traction, or any other than locomotive steam power, and that no cars shall be operated by any person or company over the route hereinabove described, and under or by virtue of this consent, by any other than animal or horse power, unless the right so to do shall be acquired as provided by section 12 of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884.

Sixth—That any person or company who shall use or operate a railroad upon the tracks or any part of the tracks constructed upon the route hereinabove described, under or by virtue of the consent hereby given, or the sale had in pursuance thereof, shall be subject to the same conditions, liabilities, obligations, duties and payments in respect to such use or operation by him or it or upon such tracks as the bidder to whom the sale shall be made under this consent would be subject were such use or operation made by such bidder, and in computing any percentage upon gross receipts that may thereby become payable, the amount thereof shall be computed upon a fare of five cents as having been received as part of the gross receipts from every passenger who shall ride upon any part of the route hereinabove described, and irrespective of the fact whether such passenger enters or leaves the car at any point upon the said route, and the bidder to whom such sale shall be made shall be jointly and severally liable with any such person or company for any default in any of such conditions, liabilities, obligations, duties and payments.

Seventh—That the percentage upon gross receipts payable under the bid at such sale shall be made annually on the first day of November for the year ending on the next preceding thirtieth day of September.

Eighth—That the said New York City Suburban Surface Railroad Company shall provide for the expense of publication of the aforesaid notice of sale before the said notice shall be published, and the company which, at the said sale, shall be the highest bidder shall, at the time and place of sale, reimburse the said New York City Suburban Surface Railroad Company for all expenses for printing and publishing necessarily incurred by it upon the application and sale herein, under the provisions of said chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, and of said chapter 642 of the Laws of 1886.

Ninth—This consent is given and the said sale shall be made upon the express understanding that the conditions herein stated do not relieve the said bidder or any person or company operating a road upon any of the tracks constructed under this consent from any conditions, obligations, liabilities, payments or duties to which they might have been liable in the absence of such conditions.

Tenth—That if the bidder shall not furnish satisfactory security, the said Comptroller may cancel the bid and sell this consent, and the license in the same manner as is provided by chapter 642 of the Laws of 1886.

Eleventh—That the said bidder shall, within thirty days after the sale at public auction, execute, under its corporate seal, to be attested by its president or treasurer, and by virtue of a resolution of its board of directors, an instrument in writing, which shall be delivered to the Comptroller of the City of New York, and which shall contain and express the acceptance by the said bidder of this consent of the Common Council for the construction, maintenance, use and operation of the proposed railroad upon the streets and avenues above mentioned upon the terms and conditions upon which this consent is granted, and binding the said company to abide by, comply with, faithfully perform and keep the said terms and conditions.

And be it further

Resolved, That the sale at public auction of the right, franchise and privilege mentioned above shall be attended and conducted by the Comptroller of the City of New York, and shall be held at a place in the City of New York to be designated by the said Comptroller, and on the earliest practicable day to be designated by the said Comptroller, or at such time to which the same may be adjourned from the day specified in the notice so published, not exceeding twice, for a period not exceeding four weeks in the aggregate, and only after notice of the time, place and terms thereof, and of the route or routes to be sold and of the conditions upon which this consent is given shall have been published by the said Comptroller three times a week for at least three weeks in two daily newspapers in said city, to be designated by his Honor the Mayor of said city (and if the bidder shall not furnish satisfactory security, the said Comptroller may cancel the bid and sell this consent and the license in the same manner as is provided by chapter 642 of the Laws of 1886).

The Committee on Railroads, to whom was recommended, for amendment, a former report in favor of permitting the construction of a branch railroad in Courtland avenue, from Third avenue, at One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, to One Hundred and Sixty-first street, by the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company respectfully

REPORT :

That on the 20th day of May last, your Honorable Body adopted a preamble and resolutions granting the application, and the papers were duly transmitted to his Honor the Mayor for his approval. It was discovered, however, by the Mayor that the clause requiring the said company to pave and repave the carriageway of the avenue, between and for a space two feet outside the rails, had been inadvertently omitted, and the papers were returned, by request, to this Board by the Mayor, and referred to your Committee to include the stipulation regarding the pavements as one of the conditions upon which the application was granted. This has been done, and the preamble and resolution herewith submitted, again granting the application, contains the stipulation requiring the company to pave and keep in repair the pavements in and about the rails.

In again submitting this application for the favorable consideration of your Honorable Body, it can but reiterate the opinion of your Committee expressed in their former report, "that the construction and operation of such branch or extension, as proposed, will furnish much needed facilities for travel, and be of value generally to the people of the city by adding to the taxable value of the property along the route of said extension." The application of the company is accompanied by the written consent of nearly all the owners of property on the line of the proposed extension, which is an additional proof, were any needed, that the construction and operation of the extension will be directly advantageous to them, and incidentally beneficial to the city at large.

Your Committee therefore respectfully recommends the adoption of the following preamble and resolution, containing the amendment above referred to.

Whereas, On the 27th day of January, 1890, an application in writing was made to the Common Council of the City of New York by the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company for consent to the construction, maintenance, use and operation of a branch or extension of their present railroad upon, through and along Courtland avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward of said city, from One Hundred and Forty-sixth street to One Hundred and Sixty-first street; and

Whereas, The said Common Council caused public notice of such application and of the time and place when the same would be first considered, to be given by publication, for at least fourteen days, in two daily newspapers in the City of New York, to wit, in the "New York World" and the "New York Daily Times," which papers were designated for that purpose by the Mayor of said city; and

Whereas, After public notice given as aforesaid, such application has been duly considered by the said Common Council;

Resolved, That the consent of the Common Council of the City of New York be and the same is hereby given to the said Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company to the construction, maintenance, use and operation, upon the conditions hereinafter set forth, of a branch or extension of their railroad through, upon and along said Courtland avenue, as follows:

Beginning at or near the point or place where Courtland avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, intersects North Third avenue and One Hundred and Forty-sixth street; thence running northerly through, upon and along said Courtland avenue, with double tracks to a point on the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street and said Courtland avenue, together with such switches, sidings, turnouts, turn-tables and suitable stands as may be necessary for the convenient operation of said branch or extension.

Resolved, That the conditions upon which the said consent is hereby given are as follows, to wit:

First—That the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884 pertinent thereto shall be complied with.

Second—That the right, franchise and privilege of using the said Courtland avenue, between said points, to construct, maintain, use and operate such railroad or extension, shall be sold at public auction to the bidder, which shall be an incorporated railroad company, organized to construct, maintain and operate a street railroad in the City of New York, and which will agree to give the largest percentage per annum of its gross receipts to be taken upon such route, with adequate security by a bond or undertaking in writing and under seal, in such form, condition, amount and sureties as shall be required and approved by the Comptroller of the said city for the fulfillment of the said agreement and for the commencement and completion of such railroad or extension, according to the plan or plans and on the route fixed for its construction, within the time designated and prescribed thereby by the provisions of chapter 642 of the Laws of 1886.

Third—That in the construction of such railroad or extension, the equipment, materials and work employed shall be of the best quality and character, and that the cars thereon shall be run as frequently as the convenience of the public may require.

Fourth—That the bidder to which the aforesaid sale shall be made, and any person or corporation using the tracks or any part of the tracks constructed or laid under or pursuant to this consent, shall comply with all reasonable ordinances or regulations which the local authorities having charge of the aforesaid avenue shall make as to the rate of speed, mode of use of tracks and removal of ice and snow upon the route of such extension, and with any and all provisions of law applicable to street surface railroad companies, or extensions of street surface railroads, organized or projected under chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, so far as the same may relate to such extension, the cars to be run upon the same, or to that portion of Courtland avenue through which the said railroad or extension may be constructed or operated, and shall not charge any passenger more than five cents from or to any point on the route hereinabove described, nor from or to any point on said route or any route, line or branch operated by the bidder or under its control, and connecting with the route hereinabove described to or from any point on said route or any route, line or branch operated by the bidder, or under its control, and connecting with the route hereinabove described, and shall give transfer tickets to a passenger when necessary to secure to him one continuous ride between such parts for the single fare of five cents.

And the said bidder as to the whole route hereinabove described shall be absolutely and unqualifiedly bound, and any person or company using or operating a railroad upon the tracks, or upon any part of the tracks, constructed upon the said route under or by virtue of the consent hereby given, or the sale had in pursuance thereof, as to the tracks so used by it or him, shall be jointly and severally bound with the said bidder, absolutely and unqualifiedly to repair and keep in permanent repair the portion of said streets and avenues upon which the tracks shall be so constructed, between the tracks, the rails of the tracks and a space two feet in width outside of and adjoining the outside rails of the track or tracks, so long as such tracks so constructed shall continue to be used, and this obligation in respect to the repairing of the streets shall not be dependent upon the requirements of the local authorities, but is hereby made an absolute and unqualified obligation.

Fifth—That the cars to be used on such railroad or extension may be operated by animal power.

Sixth—That any person or company who shall use or operate a railroad upon the tracks, or any part of the tracks, constructed upon the route hereinabove described, under and by virtue of the consent hereby given, or the sale had in pursuance thereof, shall be subject to the same conditions, liabilities, obligations, duties and payments in respect to such use of operation by him, or it, or, or upon such tracks as the bidder to whom the sale shall be made under this consent would be subject, were such use or operation made by such bidder; and in computing any percentage upon gross receipts that may thereby become payable, the amount thereof shall be computed upon a fare of five cents as having been received as part of the gross receipts from every passenger who shall ride upon any part of the route hereinabove described, and irrespective of the fact whether such passenger enters or leaves the car at any point upon the said route, and the bidder, to whom such sale shall be made shall be jointly and severally liable with any such person or company for any default in any such conditions, liabilities, obligations, duties and payments.

Seventh—That the payment of the percentage upon gross receipts, payable under the bid at such sale, shall be made annually on the 1st day of November for the year ending on the next preceding thirtieth day of September.

Eighth—That the said Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company shall provide for the expense of publication of the aforesaid notice of sale before the said notice shall be published; and the company which at said sale shall be the highest bidder shall, at the time and place of sale, reimburse the said Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company for all expenses for printing and publishing necessarily incurred by it upon the application and sale herein under the provision of said chapter 252, Laws of 1884, and said chapter 642, Laws of 1886.

Ninth—This consent is given and said sale shall be made upon the express understanding that the conditions herein stated do not relieve the said bidder, or any person or company operating a railroad upon any of the tracks constructed under this consent, from any conditions, obligations, liabilities, payments or duties to which they might have been liable in the absence of such conditions.

Tenth—That if the bidder shall not furnish satisfactory security the said Comptroller may cancel the bid and sell the consent and the license in the same manner as is provided by chapter 642, Laws of 1886.

Eleventh—The company that shall be the successful bidder shall stipulate to complete the branch railroad hereby authorized, and run cars thereon within a period of nine months after obtaining the privilege.

And be it further Resolved, That the sale at public auction of the right, franchise and privilege mentioned above shall be attended and conducted by the Comptroller of the City of New York, and shall be held at a place in the City of New York to be designated by the said Comptroller, and on the earliest practicable day to be designated by said Comptroller, or at such time to which the same may be adjourned from the day specified in the notice so published, not exceeding twice for a period not exceeding four weeks in the aggregate, and only after notice of the time, place and terms

thereof, and of the route to be sold and of the conditions upon which this consent is given, shall have been published by said Comptroller three times a week for at least three weeks in two daily newspapers in said city, to be designated by his Honor the Mayor of said city; and if the bidder shall not furnish satisfactory security the said Comptroller may cancel the bid and sell the consent and the license in the same manner as is provided by chapter 642, Laws of 1886.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

The President moved that his Honor the Mayor be requested to return to this Board a resolution permitting the New York Produce Exchange to connect the Produce Exchange with No. 3 Beaver street by means of water-pipes.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Evan Thomas, President of the New York Produce Exchange, to lay two six-inch and two five-inch pipes, inclosed by a wooden box one foot square, across Beaver street, to connect the Produce Exchange building with the Central building, No. 3 Beaver street, for water-power, as shown on the accompanying diagram, provided the work be done in a durable and substantial manner, with as little interruption as possible to the use of the street by the public, and that the said Evan Thomas shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by the exercise of the privilege hereby granted, during the progress of the work of laying said pipes or subsequent to the completion thereof, the work to be done at the expense of the Produce Exchange, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith an estimate of the amount of expenditure required for my court and office for the year 1891:

I again renew the application contained in the estimates submitted last year for the current year and in the communication of October 12, 1888, presenting my estimates for the succeeding year, for the appointment of two additional clerks at a salary of \$1,000, to act as examiners and comparers of the records required by law to be copied and recorded. The necessity for the procurement of these clerks is set forth in these communications as well as in my communication of February 28 ultimo to Mr. Barker, one of the Commissioners of Accounts. He, at the instance of your Board, investigated the matter and was satisfied that these clerks were necessary and so reported. A transfer of \$824.31, an unexpended balance of appropriations to my credit for the year 1889, was made at my request, June 24, 1890, to enable me to secure additional assistance, but this amount was entirely insufficient to provide for more than the employment of a recording clerk until January 1 proximo, who is now being paid the same salary as the other recording clerks.

I repeat my request that provision be made for securing the two Examiners as well as for continuing in employment the said Recording Clerk. On the 20th day of May, 1890, an act, chapter 367 of the Laws of 1890, amending chapter 372 of the Laws of 1887, was passed, requiring the recording of all bonds filed in my office. From the number of bonds filed during the first six months of the present year, two thousand one hundred and ninety-seven (2,197), there is no doubt that the whole number of bonds that will have been filed at the expiration of the year will be double that number, or four thousand three hundred and ninety-four (4,394), containing twenty-nine thousand six hundred and fifty-nine (29,659) folios, or an average of 6 3/4 folios to each bond. Having in mind the constant increase in the business of the office, the figures mentioned will fall short of the number of bonds which will be filed the ensuing year. It is manifest that two additional Clerks will be required for this work, and they will not, even with extraordinary labor and diligence, be able to keep abreast of it. I ask that an appropriation of \$1,000 be made for each of two Clerks to be employed for this purpose. Since the submission last year of my estimates for the current year, chapter 57 of the Laws of 1883, An Act for the preservation of the public records, has been amended by chapter 467 of the Laws of 1890. In pursuance of the authority vested in me by this amendment, I have examined and certified as to the necessity of the copying and transcribing of thirty-two other libers of wills and five (5) libers of indices. My certificate is hereto annexed. These, with such of the libers directed to be copied by previous orders of a Justice of the Supreme Court as have not yet been completed, will probably leave unfinished at the end of this year about fifty-three libers. Eleven libers will be needed for this work for next year at a cost of \$330. For stationery for this work \$100 will be needed. I have employed nine Clerks upon the work. I ask that appropriation be made to pay them the following salaries, as heretofore fixed by your Board, viz.: One Examiner at rate of \$1,500 a year and eight other Clerks at \$1,200 a year each. The service in which these Clerks are engaged is a very important one, and exacts special care and diligence in its proper performance.

I repeat my request for an increase of the salaries of the women employed in making copies of papers and records. These copies are paid for by those ordering them, and the labor expended in supplying them thus secures a return in fees to the City Treasury. Of all those serving in the office none have been more faithful, more efficient, more hard working than they. Their services entitle them to \$1,000 a year each, and I strongly urge a recognition of the justness of their claim.

For contingencies an allowance of \$1,200 is requested.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

It becomes my duty as Commissioner of Public Works and custodian of the many and immense interests involved in the City's water supply, to briefly present to the people of the City the present condition of the supply, and the extreme necessity for care and economy in the use of the water.

For a number of years past and up to the present time, the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit have delivered in the City all the water which they are capable of carrying, the supply thus remaining stationary when the City has been constantly growing in population, buildings, manufactures and commerce, creating new and additional demands upon the water service. The consequence is that at certain seasons of the year, notably in extreme cold weather, when the habit of wasting water from faucets to prevent freezing in the pipes prevails, and in warm and dry weather, when various methods of waste are in vogue, the daily consumption exceeds the supply which can by any possibility be received through the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit, the excess of consumption being drawn from the city reservoirs, diminishing the depth of water and the pressure in the distributing mains. There is no possibility of increasing the water supply received in the

City until the new Aqueduct is brought into operation, and in the meantime the only reliance for a fair and equal distribution of water throughout the city is care and economy in its use on the part of the people. Already the depth of water in the reservoirs is being diminished at the rate of one inch per day, and if this should continue for any length of time, the pressure in the distributing mains would be so reduced that it would be impossible to deliver water in thousands of houses located on high ground, and in some other locations even in the basements or cellars.

I, therefore, most earnestly appeal to all citizens, residents and people carrying on business in this city to be careful and economical in the use of water, in justice to themselves, to the people at large, and especially to those who are so located as to be already suffering inconvenience from insufficient supply of water.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings; or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
