

## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held June 17, 1879.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Nicholas Haughton, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The Mayor submitted the petition of Mary Burchill, for a "Correction Deed" of lot of land on easterly side of Fifth avenue, between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth streets. Which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

The subject of the introduction of steam into the city under the "Holly Combination System,"

The subject of the introduction of steam into the city under the "Hoffy Combination System," was taken up for consideration. Edwards Pierrepont, called attention to the resolution submitted by the Comptroller at the last meeting, relative to the condition upon which the grant shall be made to Francis B. Spinola and his associates, and stated that the parties he represented were willing, after allowing ten per cent. (instead of seven as provided in the said resolution) on the capital invested, to pay to the city five per cent. per annum (instead of three per cent. as required in said resolution) on all profits above that amount. The subject under consideration was discussed by the Commissioners, Mr. Pierrepont, and James Owens, a representative from the Central Tax-payers' Association. The Comptoneller submitted the following resolution :

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution : Resolved, That after the company has earned ten per cent. on the amount invested, the next three per cent. on the amount invested shall be paid into the City Treasury to the credit of the Sink-

ing Fund for the redemption of the city debt. On motion, the resolution was adopted, the Comptroller, Chamberlain, and Chairman of Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor and Recorder in the negative

The Mayor submitted the following preamble and resolution : Whereas, The Counsel to the Corporation states, in his opinion sent to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on June 15, that he inclines to the opinion that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have now the power to fix the terms, limitations, conditions and restrictions, upon which Mr. Spinola and his associates may lay pipes in this city north of Chambers street; but that "the provision of the statute is somewhat indefinite, and the question of its true construction and meaning is not entirely free from doubt": free from doubt"

The free from doubt''; Resolved, That any action of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in relation thereto shall not be final and conclusive until it shall have been approved by the Common Council. On motion, the resolution was adopted, the Mayor, Recorder, and Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, voting in the affirmative, and the Comptroller and Chaimberlain in the negative. The action on the resolution submitted by the Comptroller, was, on motion, reconsidered, and the said resolution was then offered as an amendment to the resolution on the same subject, submitted at the last meeting, which amendment was unanimously adopted ; whereupon the resolution, as amended, viz. : "Resolved, That after the company has earned ten per cent. on the amount invested, the next three per cent. on the amount invested shall be paid into the city treasury to the credit of the Sinking Fund, for the redemption of the city debt," was, on motion, adopted, the Recorder, Comp-troller, Chamberlain, and Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, voting in the affirma-tive, and the Mayor in the negative.

In case the pavements or flagging disturbed under said permit are properly restored, and kept in good order, to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works, for the period of two years, the sum so deposited shall be returned to the grantees, but in case the pavement to be replaced and maintain the pavement as above provided, the said sam shall be forfeited to the city, or, at the option of the Commissioner of Public Works, he may himself cause the pavement to be replaced and maintained for the said period of two years, the expense thereof to be paid out of the sum so deposited and the balance returned to them at the expiration of two years. provisions of chapter 606, Laws of 1875, on the 2d day of April, 1879, have fixed and determined routes, in addition to any heretofore authorized or now existing, for steam railways in this city, copies of which, together with maps, showing the same, are hereto annexed, and respectfully ask that you communicate to the Common Council the result of our action, and request the consent of that body, in the manner provided by law, to the location, construction, and operation of such steam railways, over, upon, along, across, or under the streets, avenues, and places fixed and de-termined by us as routes for such steam rollways. termined by us as routes for such steam railways.

In the discharge of the duties devolving upon us we have carefully examined the entire system of railways within the limits of the city, with the view, if possible, of so utilizing the roads now organized or in operation, that, in connection with the routes fixed and determined by us, all parts of the city should share in the great benefits to be derived from a complete system of rapid transit roads.

The success of the roads now in operation has demonstrated the fact that rapid transit is prac-ticable, and the public at large demand increased facilities and additional routes.

Acting in harmony with this public sentiment, and recognizing it to be our special duty to fix and determine such routes as might appear to us to be desirable and necessary, we have carefully examined all applications made to us, and for that purpose have been in almost daily consultation, and have had the professional advice and assistance of competent and experienced civil engineers. It affords us great pleasure to add that the result of our action is a unanimous report in favor of the routes as designated.

We now submit this important branch of our work, through you to the local authorities, whose consent as also the consent of the requisite number of property owners as provided by law,


