To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

At a meeting of this Board, held February 5, 1894, there was referred to the Comptroller a resolution of the Board of Parks, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of bonds to the amount of \$1,416.59, for the equipment of the East Wing of the American Museum of Natural History.

In a communication of the Secretary of the Park Department, transmitting this resolution, it is stated that this application is made at the request of the Trustees of the Museum; and that the amount asked for is intended to be applied to the construction of exhibition cases for exhibits which are now placed in the store-room for want of space. Chapter 448 of the Laws of 1893 authorized the issue of bonds to the amount of \$400,000, of which an amount not exceeding \$50,000 was to be expended in reimbursing the Trustees of the American Museum of Natural History for the expendi-tures made by them for the improvement and repairs of the said building.

At a meeting of this Board, held December 19, 1893, the Comptroller was authorized to issue bonds to the amount of \$48,583.41, the proceeds of which were to be used in repaying to the Trust-ees of the American Museum of Natural History the amounts expended by them for improvements, etc., as provided in the aforesaid act, \$350,000 having previously been prepared for the erection and equipment of an addition to the Museum ; the balance, \$1,416.59, now remains unexpended. As the purpose for which the Trustees of the Museum desire this appropriation is strictly within the purview of chapter 448, Laws of 1893, I offer for adoption the following resolution. Respectfully, ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1892, as amended by chapter 448 of the Laws of 1893, the Comptroller be and is hereby author-ized and directed to issue stock of the City of New York in the manner provided by law, payable from taxation, to the amount of fourteen hundred and sixteen dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$1,416,59), bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three per cent. per annum, and redeemable within a period of time not exceeding thirty years from the date of issue, the proceeds of which are to be applied to the construction of exhibition cases necessary in the equipment of the East Wing of the American Museum of Natural History.
