The following proceedings were this day directed by the Police Commissioner:

On reading and filing report of Sergeant William C. Egan, in charge of horses, and certificates of Veterinary Surgeons J. A. Leighon and E. Straus.

Ordered, That the following horses be and are hereby condemned and ordered to be sold at public auction by the Property Clerk: "Sanders," No. 211, Twenty-seventh Precinct; "Tom," No. 71, Twenty-eighth Precinct; "John," No. 122, Thirty-first Precinct; "Ash," No. 354, Thirty-fourth Precinct; "Philip," No. 143, Thirty-sixth Precinct; "Jim," No. 181, and "Delibina," No. 140, Thirty-eighth Precinct; "Rock," No. 222, Fortieth Precinct; "Dix," No. 378, Eightieth Precinct, and "Steve," No. 127, Boiler Squad.

The Chief Clerk is directed to send the following notices relative to pay-rolls to all precincts and squads:

"In preparing the monthly pay-rolls care should be taken to add on each the original and duplicate the amounts deducted for sickness, absence and fines, and to see that the three amounts agree with the addition of 'total amount' deducted.

Borough of Richmond—"Staten Island Star," "Staten Islander."
