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## DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

### REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1906.

January 1, 1907.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—In transmitting the reports of the General Superintendent, the Superintendent of Final Disposition, the Master Mechanic, the Property Clerk, the Snow Inspector and the District Superintendent in charge of the Borough of Brooklyn of this Department for the year ending December 31, 1906, I would like to call your attention to several points which are of great interest to this Department.

First—The street cleaning has to be done over the surface of the streets as this Department finds them, and at this present writing, on account of the necessity of installation of the salt water mains, the excavations for the Pennsylvania Railroad terminals and bad repair of the streets generally the street surfaces are difficult of cleaning.

Second—The rebuilding of lower New York has increased the traffic to a great extent and the greater height of the buildings gives new conditions for this Department to deal with. The increased amount of coal burned causes the delivery into the atmosphere of large quantities of flue dust, which is, in its nature, exceedingly disagreeable. The influx of large quantities of building material and the constant opening of the streets also add very much to the dust problem. It is added to because of the ashes which blow from the receptacles when it is being emptied into the cart and because of the dust piles left on the street between the time of their accumulation by the sweeper and the time of their collection by the cartmen. This dust problem I consider the most serious one that the Department has to deal with to-day.

Third—The next question that we have to deal with is the enormous output of ashes during the winter, and this ash accumulation is one that has assumed very large proportions and is at present giving a world of trouble.

Fourth—There is a great demand for the removal of trade waste throughout the city, and this comes from the fact that every business house in Greater New York wants the waste which comes from the actual carrying on of their business handled by the city's carts and believes that it should be done at all times, although there is no provision of the law which considers the removal of any part of this material.

Fifth—The push carts are a greater nuisance than ever, and, in my opinion, have no legal right upon the streets. They increase the expense of cleaning; they are a menace to health, a burden on the taxpayer and a constant obstruction to street traffic. They occupy, in many instances, both sides of the streets, are jammed close together and the litter from the push cart traffic is thrown on the street pavement, to one side of or under the cart, and where they are thickest people from the houses, under cover of the push carts, bring bundles or bags of waste and ashes from their houses and deliberately dump them into the streets. For this reason large parts of the lower east side have to be supplied with at least 40 per cent. more sweepers than would be necessary if the push carts were not on the streets, and even with this large number of sweepers it is impossible to keep the streets in proper condition. There are now about fourteen acres of the street surface occupied by the push-cart peddlers of this city.

### Sweeping.

In an endeavor to do away with a part of the dust nuisance I desire to establish a constant force of sweepers and to furnish them with sufficient receptacles in which to place the sweepings as soon as collected and to keep them under cover. It is necessary also to augment hand sweeping by a larger proportion of machine brooms than are being used at present.

There are now in this Department ninety sweeping machines, subdivided as follows: American road roller, 25; Oastler, 19; Hvass, 12; Austin, 27; Warth (McGarry pattern), 7. There are eighty-two watering carts of about 350 gallons capacity and four watering carts of 700 gallons capacity. These watering carts should all be of at least 700 gallons capacity.

On account of the loss to this Department of the use of water for flushing the streets it is found that the number of sweepers employed is too small, and in order to offset the additional burden thrown upon us by this loss of the water it will be necessary to augment the force of sweepers in this borough by three hundred men, in the Borough of The Bronx by ninety men and in the Borough of Brooklyn by six hundred men. Even with this increase the work cannot be as thoroughly done as by the use of water for flushing, as the flushing carries away the fine dust and slime from the street surface, and without flushing we will have to await heavy rains to get rid of this dust. This fine dust and slime cannot be collected by hand, except at an enormous expense and the use of a very large number of men.

### Carting.

As the work of carting has increased it has been found necessary to increase the hours of work of the cartmen, and this labor has become so strenuous as to be out of all reason, the average for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx being nine and one-half hours of work daily. The hours are shorter for Brooklyn. In many instances in Manhattan the number of hours' work considerably exceeded nine and one-half hours. As the nature of this work is well known it is not necessary to comment on it except briefly. Carts are very high, requiring a lift of five feet. The drivers, however, do not have to care for their horses after reaching the stable or before going to work in the morning.

I believe the proper way to meet this injustice is not by an increase of pay, because that would not make the men capable beyond their strength, but by an increase in the number of cartmen. I have gone into the matter carefully and believe that 1,200 is the least number that should be used in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and as far as I am able to make out the last estimate provided for but 812. Brooklyn should have a constant force of at least 550, and the estimate provides for 486. An increase in wages, therefore, would not accomplish what is desired, and that is to give the cartmen reasonable hours and the residents the service that they require and should have. As I have said before, this can only be accomplished by an increase in the number of employees, together with the carts and horses necessary for their work. During the summer months these men can be placed on sprinkling carts and machine sweepers.

It is easy to see that steady employment at reasonable hours and fair wages will give the city the proper men and proper service.

At present the lists of cartmen supplied by civil service do not give us proper men. They are not given the proper examination or properly selected, and before the Department has been able to determine whether or not they are fit to drive they have, in many instances, been the cause for damage suits brought against the city, and a considerable sum in damages has been collected because of the inefficiency of the drivers supplied through the civil service, and before the Department could by any possible means know of the inefficiency of the men so supplied for trial. I would request, therefore, if it meets your views, permission to apply to the Civil Service Commission for authority to examine the men for drivers' position ourselves. I do this believing that the city can be saved a great deal of money arising from damages caused by the inexperienced men supplied on trial. We are thoroughly equipped for examination of and better able to determine the abilities of the men examined than can be determined by the present method of examination.

The carts used by this Department are 1.55 cubic yards water measure and require a lift of five feet. It has seemed to be necessary, however, to adhere to this style of cart because of its ease of handling and ease of discharge at the dumps. I do not believe that the cart is the proper vehicle with which to clean the city. I believe that a truck specially constructed so as to have less lift, of three times the capacity, with, if necessary, three horses and three men, is the proper vehicle to use. When the truck is loaded and on its way to and from the dump the two helpers can replace the empty cans from their last collected load within the stoop line and move out the other cans for the next load to be collected to the curb line. This possibly may and probably will require a change in dump construction.

There is being considered at present a new style of dump which it is believed will do away with a great number of the nuisances which come from the old dump, with its overhanging board and a discharge from the tail of the cart to the deck of the scow of any distance from seven to seventeen feet. The new form of construction anticipates a storage dump as well as one that will do away with a number of the present nuisances. On the old style of dump and in dry weather ashes or rubbish shooting through the air for seventeen feet and being winnowed by a breeze of anywhere from ten to twenty miles an hour must naturally cause considerable nuisance. In the style of dump contemplated the fall will not exceed at any time six feet and will average about three feet and will be protected from the winds. This dump would also permit of the handling and rapid dumping of trucks. These trucks, with two horses and two men, would haul the same load as can be hauled to-day with three horses, three men and three carts.

The advantages of this dump can be readily appreciated from the fact that material will be prevented from falling overboard, making dredgings of the slip less frequent, and during this period of dredging the expense of tearing up and replacing the overhang is not incurred and the dump is practically in commission all the time; that is, there is no time lost for the tearing up and replacing of the overhang. The expense of construction would be about \$75,000. Attention is called to the saving of water front by this style of dump, and the protection from the wind of the carts while dumping; also the protection from the wind of the material while being placed on the scows, thus very largely, if not altogether, doing away with the necessity for a covered dump.

On account of the increasing value of the water front a storage dump should be devised. A storage dump was devised and found unsuccessful. This does not mean that a successful storage dump cannot be devised.

The three boroughs under the charge of this Department are increasing at the rate of 329 souls per day and about twenty-five miles of paved streets per annum. Increased traffic is increasing the work per great-square and the growth of the necessities of this Department is much greater than has been provided for in the estimate for 1907.

### Final Disposition.

The Bureau of Final Disposition can only do its work properly and well when provided, first, with the proper dumping grounds to dispose of material loaded on scows. There are times and will be times when all this material can be placed in fill, but there will occur periods, as at present, when the facilities for land fill are not sufficient and the Department will from time to time be compelled to resort to the archaic method of sea dumping.

At least twenty (20) scows, and, better yet, thirty (30), should be built. These scows should be about 110 feet over all and thirty feet beam, as this has been found by actual experience to be the best sized scow for departmental use. The Department owns at present forty-two scows. Twenty-two of these are small and nearly worn out, while twenty are large and in good condition. These are augmented by three steam dumpers and this fleet has to be still further augmented during the winter months by from twenty to thirty hired scows and during the summer months by from ten to twelve hired scows. This does not take into account the scows stationed about the harbor to receive ashes from tug boats, which are eight in number. From one to two scows would be constantly laid up for repairs, making it necessary to augment the present fleet by at least twenty scows and preferably thirty scows. These scows would pay for themselves at the present cost in about seven years.

In addition to the above a small dry dock, suitable for lifting and repairing our largest deck scow, would be a great saving to the Department. To dock a scow



averages \$37, irrespective of the repairs, and the approximate cost for docking only during the past year was \$1,620.

Although the condition of the city with reference to the collection of ashes has been bad this year, it is not the first time that the city has been in this or in worse condition, and the only way that I can see to forestall a recurrence of such conditions is to have the proper supply of horses, carts, drivers and scows on hand.

This Department has begun the work of still further separating ashes and rubbish, with a view to a possible better utilization of the rubbish and a better disposition of the ashes, so that reasonable contracts can be made for the final disposition of rubbish and ashes, which means a reasonable contract for the towing and unloading of scows. I do not believe that at the present time contracts beneficial to the city can be entered into, as the contractor would have to make figures on such varying conditions of the ashes as the Commissioner might see fit to deliver to him. Clean ashes can be more cheaply handled and will be in greater demand for fill than the present mixture of barrels, boxes, house sweepings and ash. To this end I am conducting an experiment in baling the waste rubbish which is not salable and transporting it in bales instead of mixing it with the ash as heretofore.

A storehouse is needed in Manhattan for the proper care and storage of the supplies necessary for this Department, which are now stored in Stable "A," Stable "B," Stable "E," and Stable "K." The store rooms at present in use in Stable "A" are scattered, difficult of access and improperly lighted, and are not in accordance with any general plan. The want of space at any one point makes it necessary to store articles at several points, and hence they are not under proper surveillance and do not receive proper care in storage. A coal shed in connection therewith would be an economy as far as this Department is concerned.

The necessity for a stable in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the Coney Island District, is shown by the report of the District Superintendent in charge of the Borough of Brooklyn. At present the carts are using from two to four hours of their working time in traveling to and from the district where it is necessary for them to give service.

The Department owns a small piece of property, suited for the construction of a section station, located at Havemeyer street, opposite the junction of Withers and North Ninth streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and it seems advisable that this should be done, as it would save at least \$480 annually for rental.

It is deemed advisable to make alterations in Stable "A," Borough of Manhattan, to admit of the stabling of one hundred extra horses, as these stalls during the times of purchase of horses are absolutely necessary to properly equip Stable "A" as a receiving stable and that the proper care and attention may be given to sick horses which should be stabled at this point. There is plenty of room inside the walls and under the roof of Stable "A" which is not used at present. This stable should have two full floors built throughout its entire length and width, and this would give the necessary room for the storage of sweeping machines and sprinkling trucks, together with the additional room necessary for shops for repairs, etc. The sweeping machines and sprinkling trucks could be stored during the winter and when distributed to the various stables during the summer their place could be taken by the carts which would not be in use during the summer. I consider these matters of prime importance.

I have to say in conclusion that New York has not only increased in area, but has also increased in height; that is, where formerly stood a three to four story residence or office building, with a half or full basement, there now stand twenty-three to twenty-four story buildings, with from three to four basements. The increased coal consumption for the heating of the increased floor space has augmented greatly the output of ash. The increased number of offices and small manufacturing establishments has increased largely the amount of paper waste, etc. This increase of floor space has not only increased the foot passenger traffic, but also increased the vehicle traffic.

The burning of an increased quantity of coal throws into the atmosphere much more foul gases than formerly, carrying with them a considerable amount of fine ash. This fine ash, though not visible, is perceptible everywhere. The increased traffic grinds and pulverizes the sidewalk and street pavements. From these two causes alone we have, in addition to the reasons given in the second paragraph of this report, a greatly augmented dust nuisance. As a withdrawal of the use of water from this Department prevents the removal of fine dust from the streets, and as, so far, nothing has been found to take the place of the water, I have to say that until something is found which is equally efficient for the removal of dust from the street surfaces as the method of flushing inaugurated by Waring, there seems to be no method of relief other than the increase of the number of sweepers and drivers in this Department by at least 1,448 men. The tall houses cut off the sunlight from the streets, and this sunlight is one of the best destructors of disease germs. Therefore the pavements need more care and attention than formerly, so that the health of the city may be preserved.

I attach herewith a tabulated statement of the materials collected during the past year, 1906, with a recapitulation comparing the totals with 1905. Also a statement of the increase in population, mileage of paved streets and buildings in process of erection during the previous year.

To the Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

Sir—I have to report that the work performed by the employees under my supervision during the past year up to date has been faithfully and efficiently done. However, in the cleaning of the streets, especially during the summer, we have been greatly handicapped by the curtailment of the water supply. I would urgently recommend, therefore, that some influence be brought to bear upon the Department of Water Supply in order that this Department may obtain the privilege of a more liberal use of the fire hydrants.

During the current year the sweeping force was as follows:

I would recommend that the sweeping force of the coming year be increased by 10 per cent. over that employed this year. This augmentation is rendered necessary by the additional number of newly paved streets, amounting to six miles in the Borough of Manhattan and twenty miles in the Borough of the Bronx.

The conditions of the stables are most excellent and their management reflects great credit upon the officials in their immediate charge. This relates particularly to those in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. Some of the stables in the Borough of Brooklyn might be improved. However, this does not reflect upon the officers in charge, for the reason that the construction of the buildings there used as Department stables does not compare with that of the stables in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The most difficult problems which confront us in the work allotted to the stables are the lack of a sufficient number of drivers required at all times to perform the necessary cartage service and a want of a sufficient number of cart horses to perform the work of the Department without resorting to hiring, which has been indispensable in numerous instances during the winter months, and which has given such unsatisfactory results, the horses supplied being in a very poor condition and wholly unable to perform cartage work. In order to obviate the hiring of horses at least three hundred (300) more should be purchased at the earliest date practicable.

In reference to the lack of a sufficient number of drivers at all times, it has been found that the men best adapted for such work seek employment elsewhere, where there is more remuneration and less arduous work. This has been the chief cause for failure to remove material promptly in various sections of the city, especially during the winter.

The average number of carts, sweeping machines and watering carts employed during the various months is given below:

It will be observed that there is a large reduction in the number of carts, etc., working during the months of September and October as compared with the preceding months. This was occasioned by the fact that the Department did not have a sufficient number of cart drivers to fill the quota of carts allowed.

In connection with the cartage service I would earnestly recommend that the use of the covered iron carts be discontinued as soon as those now in the Department are worn out, and that the open iron carts with detachable canvas covers (which have been in use in this Department for a long period and have been found far superior to the covered carts) be substituted. The open carts hold from eight to ten cans more material than the covered ones; they are more readily loaded, weigh at least three hundred pounds less, cost \$40 less per cart, are more durable and they cost less to repair than the covered carts, which is in itself an item that should not be overlooked. The additional weight of the covered carts should also be taken into consideration. I hope that this matter will receive the attention of the authorities that it deserves.

To the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, City of New York:

Sir—I have the honor to submit my report in connection with the dumps of this Department, as requested in your letter of the 8th inst.

Beginning with the dumping facilities at the foot of Canal street and North river, I beg leave to call attention to the urgent necessity of acquiring the entire south side of this pier for Departmental use. You will recollect that the firm of Brown & Fleming have dumping privileges at this dump as well as ourselves. These facilities should be accorded to us. The New Jersey Central Railroad Company have a terminal at the bulkhead at the foot of Canal street, where by landing their railroad floats they take up very nearly one-half of the south slip. As our Department rides from one thousand to twelve hundred loads a day to Canal street you can readily understand that with the railroad floats and the Brown & Fleming dumpers the slip becomes very much congested and frequently to such an extent that it is very difficult for us to operate our scows and dumpers. The Department of Docks and Ferries granted to the former Commissioner the privilege of erecting another board at Canal street, but it was concluded to defer this until after the first of the year. Even with this additional board, however, the difficulties will not be overcome.

The imperative necessity of acquiring dumping facilities somewhere in the neighborhood of Fifteenth street and the North river cannot be made too strong. The Department should have not less than two boards at this location, and this would go a great way towards relieving the pressure at Canal and Thirtieth street dumps. This pressure refers not so much to the difficulties in the slip as to the traffic conditions on the runway and board.

The Thirtieth street and North river dumping board is perfectly satisfactory, with the exception that a private dump is maintained there by a Mr. Healy. The enormous amount of heavy material riding to this private dump makes the repairs necessary to the runway and board very considerable. Part of this, however, is usually borne by Mr. Healy.

Forty-seventh street is sufficient for the needs of the sections riding there and will be for some time to come.

Between this point and the One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and North river dumping board the Department has absolutely no facilities other than those that are afforded by private contractors at the foot of Seventy-ninth street and at the foot of Ninety-seventh street. The dock at Seventy-ninth street is large enough to give us a dump with two boards, and so is the one at either Ninety-sixth or Ninety-seventh streets. I am not quite certain as to the possibilities in this respect, as I believe the Department is precluded from erecting any dumping boards at these two points by reason of a law which was passed at the instigation of the West Side Association.

I quote from my report of November 7, 1906, addressed to you, calling attention to the conditions at One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and north river dumping board as follows:

"The location at One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street has always been a dangerous one for scows during the winter season, and the city has become involved in many law suits on account of this. Therefore I urgently recommend that we look forward to an entirely new location, and if we cannot be accommodated at any other point than One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, we should at least receive facilities on the south side of this pier when finished, so as to get away from the immense ice drift in winter."

The Department dump at the foot of Sixty-first street, East river, requires attention, inasmuch as we have only one overhang at this point, and I do not consider this sufficient for the work. We should be allowed sufficient space on the pier to erect another board.

The other Manhattan dumps, which I enumerate below, are sufficient for the needs of the different districts which they tap.

Clinton street, East river.

Stanton street, East river.

Twenty-ninth street, East river.

Forty-sixth street, East river.

Eightieth street, East river.

One Hundred and Seventh street, East river.

One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, Harlem river.

The Borough of The Bronx is by no means in a satisfactory condition in so far as dumping facilities are concerned. We have but one board at the foot of Lincoln avenue and Harlem river, where there should be two boards. I think a sufficient amount of room could be allotted for another board. The land fills on the east side will last for quite some time. Those on the west side, however, will not last very much longer.

If a covered dump could be placed at the mouth of Cromwell creek, which is practically immediately under the Central bridge, and which would have to be reached by bridging the railroad tracks, it would be of great use for The Bronx carts and would afford facilities for a good part of Manhattan above One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street.

The upper part of the Bronx, both for garbage and ashes, is in very poor shape on the west side. The city owns dock property at the foot of Fordham road and Harlem river, and also at the foot of Depot lane, which is immediately under High Bridge. Either one of these points would effect a saving in haul in the very near future.

The Borough of Brooklyn requires but very little in the way of water front dumps since the American Railway Traffic Company are operating there.

We have a floating dump at Clinton avenue, which should be replaced by a permanent board.

The dump at the foot of Gold street, used exclusively for permit material, is sufficient for all present needs, but should the Sewer Department put a sewer through this street, which work was contemplated by them, we would probably have to abandon its use until such time as the sewer people were through.



The only other water dump is on leased property, at the foot of Fifteenth street, Coney Island, on the south bank of Coney Island Creek, and is used during the summer months for the reception of garbage.

Further dumping facilities should be accorded to us by the American Railway Traffic Company by placing an ash station somewhere in the Brownsville section and another ash station to take the material between Fort Hamilton and Sixtieth street, South Brooklyn.

Sir—In compliance with your order, dated November 10, 1906, will submit the following synopsis or general report of the Mechanical Bureau. The mechanical force this date in the different boroughs consists of one hundred and fifteen (115) Mechanics, seven (7) Auto Enginemen and one hundred and three (103) Helpers, stationed at the shops at Stables "A" and "D" in Manhattan and "B" and "D" in Brooklyn, with a harness maker at every stable. During the past year there has been considerable work on the steam dumpers and scows connected with the Department, a new incinerator was built at Thirty-seventh street, South Brooklyn, and the work at Forty-seventh street incinerator and the new dump at the foot of East One Hundred and Seventh street is progressing rapidly. The force are constantly employed on repairs to the different stables, section station, dumps, trucks, incinerators, carts, sweeping machines, asphalt scrapers, ash, paper and sprinkling cans, can carriers, harness, bicycles, carriages and automobiles.

To the Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

Sir—I respectfully report that there is constantly kept on hand in this Bureau sufficient supplies for all departmental purposes. These supplies are all purchased by contract, except those that are furnished by penal institutions, those that require a chemical analysis and those of which only a small quantity is used during the year.

The specifications for all supplies are drawn and all supplies (except horses, forage and coal) are delivered at this office and personally examined by me. There is an accurate account kept of the supplies received and issued. No supplies are issued except on requisitions signed by the officer in charge of the bureau for which the supplies are needed.

At present I have not sufficient storage facilities to properly handle the necessary supplies. I now have supplies stored at the following places: Stables "A," "B," "E" and "K," Canal street and Fifty-sixth street incumbrance yards.

I would respectfully recommend that a building, centrally located, be secured for the sole use of this Bureau, as I cannot give the supervision necessary when supplies are stored in so many different places as at present.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Commissioner of Street Cleaning, New York City:

Sir—Reporting on the work of the Department of Street Cleaning, Borough of Brooklyn, for the current year, I have to say:

The 539 miles of paved streets have been fairly well cleaned by our limited force.

Three incinerating plants have been erected, namely, at Third avenue and Third street, Bushwick avenue and Gillen place and at the foot of Thirty-seventh street, where a total of one hundred loads of rubbish is daily consumed.

The large Department stable in course of construction on block bounded by Flushing avenue, Kent avenue, Little Nassau and Graham streets will be completed about June 1, 1907.

At Stable "B," Butler street, near Fifth avenue, at which is located the office of the Property Clerk of this Department, a new Fairbanks scales has been installed, where it is now possible to weigh truck loads at a time. Formerly it was necessary to have on hand a sufficient force to unload a truck and weigh its contents in small parcels and then reload it.

At Stable "D," North Thirteenth Street and Kent avenue, a relay dump station for garbage was established during this year and same has enabled us to collect all the garbage in the northern portion of the Borough during the forenoon of each day, without increasing the cost of such collection, and has been a source of great satisfaction to the people in that section, as it has insured the removal of the foul-smelling material at a much earlier hour than was usual prior to the establishment of the relay station.

A new stable has been leased, and is now occupied, at Ovington avenue, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth avenues (Stable "F"), which will materially decrease the carting expenses in that section.

Stable "E," located at Jamaica avenue and Gillen place, has been enlarged so that it now houses eighteen horses more than formerly, and this additional room has added materially to an increased efficiency of this Department in a section of the Borough where the demands made upon this Department increase almost daily.

Two new section stations have been added to the Department's equipment at points in the borough where it was calculated its needs would be best served as supervising points, the taking care of Department property and the comfort of Department employees.

Twenty-six of the section stations have been fitted with lockers and these lockers have added much to the tone of these Department depots and the comfort of the officers and men employed therein.

The American Railway Traffic Company began during the year to erect brick structures at their receiving stations, and have to date completed the stations at Bergen street, Ralph avenue and Flatbush avenue. The station at Herkimer street is nearing completion. With the completion of the brick structures at all of the receiving stations will come a diminution of complaints from the parts of the Borough in which they are located, as the structures are not unsightly and are dust proof, or nearly so, and will have little about them to give offense to those in their neighborhood.

With reference to the stations of the American Railway Traffic Company I would recommend that some steps be taken that would lead to the handling of rubbish in a more expeditious manner than at present. At some of the stations the space used for dumping rubbish is so small that but one cart can be unloaded at a time and at some while one cart is being unloaded it is impossible for another cart to make ingress or egress from the station. This causes numerous delays and it is not uncommon for a number of loaded carts to have to wait at such receiving stations for periods extending to half an hour before they can dump their loads, which is the origin for many objections from neighboring residents.

The Department has been deprived of the use of the Sewer Bureau stable at Coney Island, so that it becomes necessary to immediately seek permanent quarters for the care of the carting force in that locality.

To the Commissioner, Department of Street Cleaning:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following statement regarding snow removal by the area system in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn for the season of 1905-1906, when the snowfall actually removed by the contractor was 17.7 inches over 408,771 miles of streets, as taken from the reports submitted to the Snow Office by the District Superintendents of the various districts in the three (3) boroughs. The total cost of removal upon the above mileage was \$762,018.26. In Brooklyn the contract was let at the flat rate of 21½ cents per cubic yard of snowfall removed. In the districts comprising Manhattan and The Bronx the prices at which the contracts were let varied, the average price for the two boroughs being 15.047 cents per cubic yard of snowfall removed. Reduced to a basis of streets with a 30-foot roadway, which means a width of 60 feet, house line to house line, for snow re-

moval by the contractor, the mileage cleaned by the contractor was 267.38. The area system was put in operation during the season of 1902-1903 and the contractor is paid the contract price per cubic yard of snowfall removed from the areas reported cleaned by the District Superintendents of this Department, who act as inspectors of the snow removal in their several districts. The snowfall is reported to this Department by the United States Weather Bureau and the amounts removed by the contractor are computed from the area maps furnished the Department by the Sanborn Map Company. Shrinkage of the snow is taken into consideration by the contractor, as is shown by a comparison of the prices of snow removal per cubic yard during the snow seasons previous to 1902-1903, with the prices of the seasons commencing with 1902-1903, when the new system was inaugurated.

The average price per cubic yard for snow removed from the season of 1895-1896 to the season of 1901-1902 inclusive was 38.8 cents, while the average price per cubic yard of snow removed, commencing with 1902-1903 to 1905-1906 inclusive, was 19.115 cents, which it will be noted is slightly less than half the average price by the old system.

Many streets have been added to the snow schedule from time to time until the schedule practically covered entire portions of the city. This made snow removal more expensive than it ought to be and still left important streets uncovered. In view of this fact the snow removal schedule has been materially reduced in some purely residential sections. In order that the residents and those doing business in the Washington Heights section may be relieved in snowstorms, a schedule has been laid out that will be of great benefit to all that go to that portion of the city. Previous to this season this section of Manhattan has not had the advantage of having any streets cleaned of snow by the contractor. Under the old system the Department was compelled to have most of its officers and many men on the snow work. This was necessary by this system and called for so much less expense on the part of the contractors, and the work of removing ashes, garbage and rubbish and the proper care of crosswalks, etc., was seriously hampered, owing to the lack of men and sufficient supervision. By the new area system the Department has a small force of men in the Snow Bureau office. These men compute the areas cleaned by the contractor, as given in the reports from the District Superintendents, and it is from this office that orders are issued to the contractor and District Superintendents from time to time. By the new system any losses fall upon the contractor.

To the Commissioner, Department of Street Cleaning:

Sir—The following report is respectfully submitted calling your attention to the many violations committed on the lower east side by the push cart peddlers and the nuisances caused by their existence on the streets.

The push-cart question is a very important matter to this Department, both financially and from a sanitary point of view, and should be seriously considered. To abolish the push carts would mean the removal of many evils, in addition to restoring the streets to the general public.

At the present time there are from twelve to fifteen thousand push carts occupying the densely populated streets of the lower east side, blockading the traffic both on street and sidewalk and making public markets out of any thoroughfare they see fit. Most of the push carts occupy the same place every day from early morning until late at night, and during the day refuse to move or allow a driver or sweeper to clean the street or a teamster to make a delivery, the result being goods are unloaded in the middle of the street, causing continual blockade.

Many nuisances are committed where the push carts line the streets, and in such a manner as to escape detection, such as disposing of decayed fruit, vegetable and other filth; also storekeepers sweep and throw refuse of all kinds, and the occupants of the tenements deposit ashes and garbage in the gutter while the crowds are standing around, and under this cover they escape arrest.

Barrels and boxes of all descriptions stand around the sidewalk and street, placed there by the peddlers, their produce being delivered to them on the street by the wholesaler, and, not having room on the push cart, it generally becomes an obstruction. Storekeepers take advantage of the above by placing push carts of their own in front of their doors and sell the same produce or goods that they sell in the store. They also place barrels and boxes of goods on the walks for show. On some streets as many as 40 per cent. of the push carts belong to storekeepers, many of whom have licenses. In many instances they do this to keep peddlers from in front of their premises who sell the same goods.

Recently we cleaned the push carts out of one block of Monroe street. We counted fourteen push carts the owners of which had places of business in basements and stores, which demonstrates as to the large percentage of push carts that have no right on the streets whatever.

As the peddlers in general are considered poor people, we call your attention to the many peddlers on Grand, Mulberry and other streets who carry from \$200 to \$400 worth of stock. The push carts loaded so heavy that it is almost impossible to remove them in case of fire, accident, or to clean the street, and on Grand street many of the fur peddlers have enough stock to set up a store, which they would not leave while they enjoy the lucrative privileges that are allowed them on the street.

In addition to the push carts there is what is known as the hot potato ovens, an unsightly, cumbersome vehicle on four small wheels and a chimney to carry off smoke. There is no license issued to peddle with this kind of vehicle. They stand around the corners where people congregate and at intervals throw out black smoke and sparks, much to the annoyance of everybody around. In some respects they are more of a nuisance than the push carts.

While there are city ordinances to govern and regulate the push carts, it seems a most singular fact that they are permitted to remain on either or both sides of the street, in front of fire hydrants, public schools and within one foot of corner, in direct violation of the law, and not interfered with by the precinct police.

The amount of money expended by this Department in cleaning the streets of the lower east side could be considerably reduced if the streets were free from the push cart nuisance, the streets would be much cleaner, the sanitary conditions improved and it would greatly facilitate the work which in the past has been a difficult problem.

There is no doubt in my mind that a 20 per cent. reduction could be made in both carting and sweeping forces of the Second and Fourth Districts if this nuisance were abolished.

The only solution to the push cart problem is to provide markets for them located in the midst of the territory in the various parts of the city in which they peddle. The success of the fish market proves the necessity of the above and is the only way of successfully disposing of this nuisance, except the issuing of licenses, which, if stopped for one year and then renewed only to those willing to peddle under the bridge or any other designated place.

Inclosed please find summary of arrests made in the Second and Fourth Districts during the past year and a half, showing the action of the magistrates, which up to the present time has had little or no effect in stopping the many abuses and violations committed.

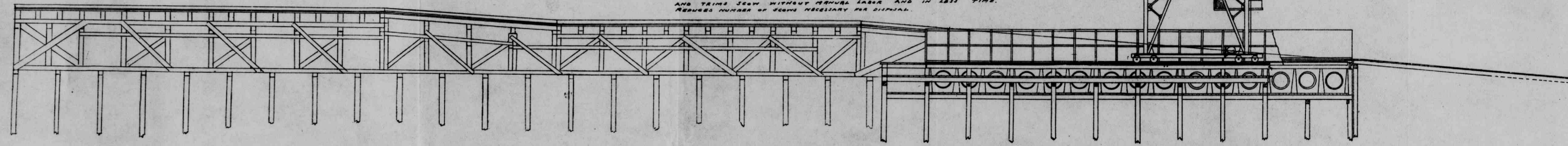


DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING

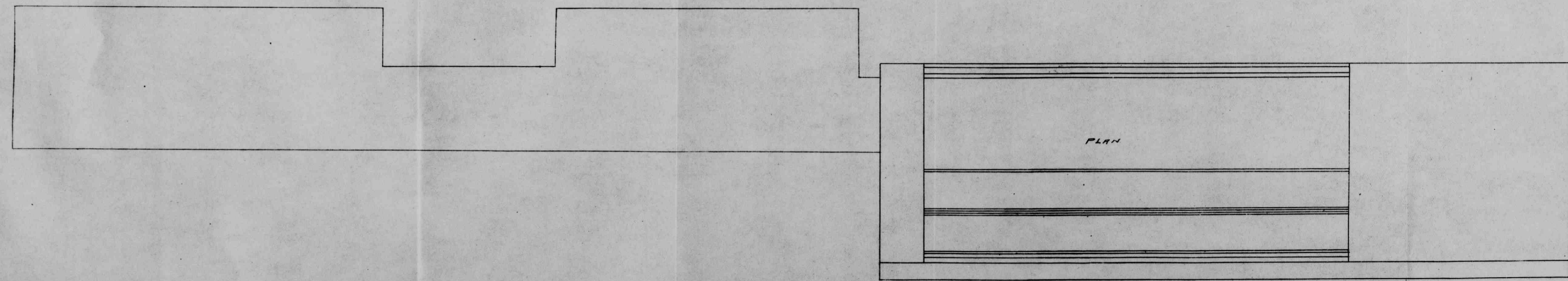

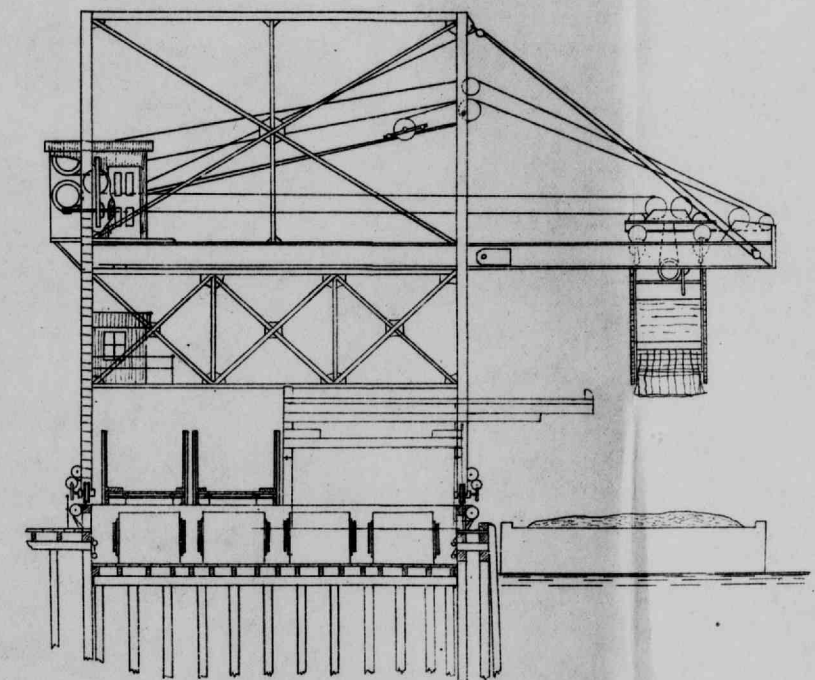

#### BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

February 13, 1907.

Present—Messrs. Warren A. Conover, Charles Buek, Lewis Harding, Charles G. Smith, Edward F. Croker, Henry R. Marshall and William J. Fryer, Chairman.

Meeting called to order at 2 p. m.

On motion, minutes approved as read.

Messrs. Harding and Croker excused by the Chairman.

Appeal 5 of 1907, Alteration 27 of 1907, premises No. 828 Trinity avenue, The Bronx; Goldner & Goldberg, architects and appellants. Laid over at last meeting.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 6 of 1907, Alteration 3248 of 1906, northwest corner Broadway and Morris street (No. 29 Broadway), Manhattan; Youngs & Cornell, architects and appellants.

"No. 1. Building will exceed twelve stories in height. Entire building should be made to conform to the provisions of section 105 of the Code relating to the use of fireproof wood, etc.

"No. 5. Construction of the outside walls of pent house does not conform to the Code.

"No. 6. Lower walls should be made to agree with section 36 of the Code as to thickness."

As to objection No. 1, fireproof wood: This appeal is made on the following grounds: First, there are practical difficulties in the way of removing the woodwork in the existing building and replacing same with so-called fireproof wood, as the building is fully occupied and many of the tenants hold unexpired leases. Second, section 105 of the Building Code, in respect to the use of fireproof wood, does not apply to a fireproof building like the one in question, which now exceeds 150 feet in height, and which was built in strict accordance with the laws in force at the time of its erection, and which is simply to be increased in height—the Code requirement applies only to new fireproof buildings; nor does section 105 apply to an existing fireproof building in respect to the removal of all outside window frames and sash and the substitution of window frames and sash of metal or wood covered with metal. Such substitution would be impracticable in view of the full occupancy of the building and unexpired leases.

As to objection No. 5, walls of pent house: This appeal is made on the following grounds: First, no section of the Code specifically applies to the walls of a pent house situated on the roof of a building. Second, section 32 of the Code, relating to brick walls and the thicknesses for same, does not apply, for as walls may be constructed, as stated in section 27 of the Code, of stone, brick, concrete, iron, steel or other hard

incombustible material, it is obvious that a steel-framed wall may be used instead of one of brick and need not necessarily be as thick as the latter. Third, the construction of these walls of steel frame and burnt-clay filling is equally as good and more desirable in this specific case, for the reason that a lighter weight is thereby placed on the roof and on the interior columns below the same than if solid brick walls were used.

As to objection No. 6, curtain walls: This appeal is made on the following grounds: First, the brick curtain walls of the buildings are all laid up with Portland cement mortar, and therefore better material has been used than is required by the Code, and of their present thickness is an equally good and more desirable form of construction. Second, section 36 of the Code does not apply to this building, where the inclosure walls for this skeleton building were built in strict accordance with the rules of the Department of Buildings in force at the time of the erection of this building in 1890. Third, the curtain walls are carried on steel girders placed at each and every story, and the weight of the three stories to be added will impose no additional weight on the existing curtain walls, as the load is sustained by the vertical columns and by the latter transmitted directly down to the foundations. Fourth, the Code nowhere provides for any addition to the thickness of certain walls, and to line any such wall would be useless for any practical purpose.

1. An approval of the application to use fireproof wood on the three added stories only, including all new outside window frames and sash to be of metal or wood covered with metal—but not requiring the woodwork in the existing lower stories to be removed and replaced with fireproof wood, nor requiring the removal in the existing stories of the outside window frames and sash and the substitution for same with window frames and sash of metal or wood covered with metal.

2. An approval of such of the outside walls of the pent house as are not directly above brick walls, to be constructed of a steel frame filled in with burnt-clay blocks and plastered on the outside with Portland cement and sand mortar.

3. An approval of the application to add three stories to the present height of the building without requiring the existing curtain walls on the lower stories to be increased in thickness.

Fireproof wood, etc.—The existing building is of skeleton construction and is twelve stories and exceeds 150 feet in height. At the time of its erection, in 1890, no provision of law required the use of fireproof wood. The woodwork in the three stories which are to be added is to be "fireproofed," and it is submitted that this is a fair compliance with the intent and meaning of the present Code, and goes as far as the use of fireproof wood is practicable. It is impracticable to remove the woodwork in the existing stories and replace the same with so-called fireproof woodwork, as the building is fully occupied and many offices leased for long terms. Section 105 of the Code, in its fireproof wood requirements, applies only to new buildings, and does not apply to the existing portions of high fireproof buildings which are simply added to in height. This view has been controlled in the Bureau of Buildings in the case of the Tribune Building, the old Times Building, the Continental Fire Insurance Company's Building, and in other cases. Nor in any of these cases was the Code so construed as to require the removal from the existing outside walls of the wood window frames and sash and the substitution of window frames and sash of metal or of wood covered with metal, as it would be impracticable to make such change. We respectfully submit that objection No. 1 be overruled.

Pent House—The area of the pent house, not including the inclosures of elevators, etc., is less than 15 per cent. of the roof area. The entire pent house will be constructed fireproof. The northerly side wall of the pent house will be a 12-inch brick wall, but the other walls which are not over brick walls will be constructed of steel frames and filled in with 4-inch burnt-clay blocks and entirely covered on the outside with Portland cement and sand mortar. The size of the steel shapes and the proper connections of same to be subject to the approval of the Superintendent of Buildings. The floor will be of concrete, skylights of metal and glazed with wire-glass, window frames and sash will be of wood covered with kalomine iron and glazed with wire-glass; wood, doors and trim and base covered with kalomine iron; and an outlet from the standpipe will be provided in the hall of the pent house with hose connection. We respectfully submit that objection No. 5 should be overruled.

Curtain Walls—The weight of the three stories to be added will impose no additional weight on the existing curtain walls; in fact, no existing curtain wall in this building bears any load whatever other than its own weight. The entire weight of the new stories—floors as well as the inclosure walls—is carried by the columns, and by the latter the load is transmitted directly down to the foundations. Every section of curtain wall is carried on steel girders placed on each and every story. All curtain walls are of brick, laid up with Portland cement and sand mortar, while the Code allows lime mortar to be used. There were no requirements of law for the thickness of curtain walls when this building was erected in 1890. There would be no practical use in lining a curtain wall, as such walls bear no weight, but act as screens from the elements and other outside dangers. There is no provision in the Building Code for the lining of a curtain wall, nor does the Code by any language anywhere contemplate any such impracticable and useless requirement. We respectfully submit that objection No. 6 should be overruled.

On motion, laid over for one week.

The Chairman presented and read a letter from the President of the Borough of Richmond, whereupon, on motion, said letter was referred to the Chairman.

Regulating, etc., Concord Avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-first street to Kelly Street.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying crosswalks in Concord avenue, from East One Hundred and Forty-first street to Kelly street, with applications for awards for damages, and also objections in which matter Mr. Maurice Deiches, attorney, filed a brief at last meeting, February 21, 1907, and the further consideration of the same was postponed, on motion, were taken up.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors for further consideration, all the members voting in the affirmative.

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Sewer in Fort Hamilton Avenue.

From February 3 to February 9 inclusive 56 operations were performed at Bellevue, 16 at Gouverneur, 9 at Harlem and 11 at Fordham Hospital, at all but one of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From February 10 to February 16, inclusive, 43 operations were performed at Bellevue, 5 at Gouverneur, 7 at Harlem and 5 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which, with the exception of two minor operations at Harlem Hospital, the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

In consequence of the moisture and the amount of sulphur in the coal there has been so much rusting out of the smoke pipe at the Probationers' Home that it is necessary to replace it with a new pipe with a proper outside shield. Authority is requested to obtain estimates and have the work done by the lowest bidder.

As the New York Diet Kitchen Association states that it is obliged to pay six cents a quart for milk, it is recommended that milk supplied to tuberculosis patients (on the order of the physicians in the tuberculosis clinic of the out-patient department) be paid for at that figure, instead of five and a half cents, as heretofore. As the contract price of milk for the department is six and three-quarter cents, this charge is not unreasonable.

8. The necessity for the lease? Temporary use as a police station during the construction of the new building in Old Slip, now occupied as a station house for the First Precinct.

9. Are premises recommended the most reasonable that can be secured in the neighborhood for the purposes desired? Yes.

10. From what appropriation is the rental to be paid, and is it sufficient to cover? Application has been made for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds for the payment of rent.

Rip-rap stone coming directly on or against the bulkhead wall must be deposited carefully in such manner as will not injure the same.

All the filling, except as otherwise specified herein, shall be of ashes, cellar dirt, broken stone, etc., entirely free from garbage or any organic matter objectionable in the opinion of the Engineer.

At any section of the bulkhead wall the filling shall be brought up level with the top of the platform resting on the bulkhead wall at such section, and no higher, unless otherwise directed.

The filling shall be commenced within five days after the date of the receipt of a notification from the Engineer that the work or any part of it, is ready to be begun. The Department reserves the right of ordering the contractor to deposit not less than 100 cubic yards per day, as directed by the Engineer, and the whole amount of the filling called for to bring the above-described basin up to grade shall be completed within sixty calendar days from the date of the receipt of said notification. #### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
