Honorable TOWNSEND COX, President, etc.:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to forward the following report of labor performed by the inmates of this institution during the quarter ending March 31, 1880:

OUT DOOR IMPROVEMENT.

Unloading and carting 2,236 tons of coal to both institutions; collecting and preparing manure for farm; unpitting vegetables and carting same to both institutions; cutting and housing a small quantity of ice; digging and screening sand; screening coal ashes; filling up holes on farm; repairing and building sea-wall; taking up and relaying gas pipes; keeping roads and walks in order and repair; killing and dressing 48 hogs.

CARPENTERS' DEPARTMENT.

New rails, baluster; newel post and flooring in Assistant physician's office, also new desk and writing shelves for same; new gas sticks for Wards E and F; new shutters to cells in Wards B and H; new water closets in Ward M; new urinal in Ward H; new tables for attendants, Ward N; new box for pipes, Ward B; seven shelves for fire extinguishers; six pail racks; new tables for tailors' use; new tables for attendants in annex 2; clothes horse and ironing board for laundry; six tailboards for carts; five shelves in Ward O; two boxes for office records; new dressers for Assistant Physician's dining room; boxes for gas pipes; general repairs to doors, windows, locks and furniture throughout the building; replacing 150 old locks with new ones.

PAINTERS' DEPARTMENT.

Two coats of paint to 5,500 square feet of fence; two coats of paint to 27 bath-tubs and 6 wash-stands; painting 25 iron bedsteads; varnishing 7 doors in Ward G; sanding and varnishing 7 doors in Ward H; varnishing 7 doors in Ward E; new doors in Wards B and H stained, painted and varnished; putting in 348 panes of glass.

ENGINEERS' DEPARTMENT.

Repairing, relaying and grading 600 feet of gas pipe; repairing fire-hydrant in Ward F and water pipes in Wards A and B; taking out and refitting urinal in Ward E; putting new grate bars in furnace; taking out and repairing coil in hot water tank and putting in 50 feet of iron pipe; repairing roof of engine house; repairing stove grates and pipes in wash house; cleaning and repairing sewer and water closet and pipes in wash house, men's dormitory; cleaning and repairing gas pipes, and general repairs to steam and water pipes throughout the building.

SEWING ROOM.

Repairing and altering 2,921 cotton, 2,335 woolen, and 2,316 linen articles of clothing, bedding etc.

CITY PRISON,
NEW YORK, April 1, 1880.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at First, Second, Third, Fourth, and Fifth District Prisons from January 1 to March 31, 1880, by prison labor, and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material.

First District Prison—The halls, corridors, iron railings, etc., in male prison have been painted, also the windows and iron work in prison yard; the counsel rooms and offices of female prison have also been painted.

The soil and water-pipes have been covered with pine in 16 corner cells, and wainscoting placed along stairs from second to fourth corridors, male prison; two large windows for Leonard street side of female prison; and stairs have been built from second tier, female prison, to church-room in Magdalen, also closets, tables, etc., have been built.

New water-pipes, force pump, etc., have been put in, and water and soil-pipes have been repaired, three bath-tubs, etc., have been placed in cells on second and third and fourth tiers.

Second District Prison—Tables, benches, etc., have been constructed for inmates.

Third District Prison—Repaired roof of prison, painted ventilators, etc., placed a new roof on office and covered it with tin, also placed a new floor in office.

Fourth District Prison—Built a storm-house, two clothing closets, etc., four partitions, floor in doctor's office; repaired water-closet, water and soil-pipes; built a water-closet, flagging at entrance, etc., etc.

Fifth District Prison—Repaired water and soil-pipes, etc.

NEW YORK PENITENTIARY, BLACKWELL'S ISLAND,

DEAR SIR—Annexed I beg leave to submit to your Honorable Board my report for the quarter ending March 31, 1880, the number of prisoners received and discharged, the labor on which they have been employed, and the results accomplished by such labor during the quarter.

Blacksmiths—Made 200 and repaired 33 iron bedsteads; made 1 hand-cart, 2 butcher knives, 1 cleaver, 1 steel scroll gong, 1,078 rivets, 286 bolts, 125 bucket handles, 236 bucket straps, 33 steel plugs, 108 steel hand-drills, 84 points, 72 chisels, 275 bucket ears, 168 standards, 255 plugs, 5 pitch-

ing tools, 100 buckles, 8 cell doors and locks, 15 feet iron stairs and 30 feet railing, 5 iron tier brackets, each 25 pounds, for Prison.

Prisoners are constantly employed repairing prison vans, wagons, carts, ambulances, buggies, etc., etc.

Tinsmiths—Made 25 galvanized iron boxes, each 24 inches by 17 inches by 12 inches, 12 rat and 12 mouse traps, 100 buckle tubes, 8 tin boxes, 100 mess pans, 2 oil cans, 10 wash basins, 100 quart cups, 22 spittoons, 25 salt boxes, 12 dust pans, 106 feet 8-inch pipe, 30 feet 5-inch pipe, 30 dippers, 12 water cans. All necessary repairs to the tinware belonging to the Institution have been done.

Prisoners have been daily employed on roof of Prison; also considerable repairs have been done to roof of Work-house, and buildings on Randall's Island.

Carpenters—Made 588 coffins, 1 forty-five-foot ladder, 48 wristlets, 19 pails, 1 desk, 1 wagon for Out-Door Poor, 12 tubs, 2 twelve-foot tables, 69 fine axe handles, 76 hammer handles, 31 dozen scrub blocks, 2 new shovels, 3 hand-barrows, 300 tallies, 3 wheelbarrows, 1 dozen wash kids. Repaired 20 tubs, 31 barrels, 282 buckets, 66 wheelbarrows, 15 settees, 95 stools, 115 chairs, 23 benches, 11 tubs, 1 Quacker Washing Machine, 19 pails, carts, wagons, ambulances, wheels, wheelbarrows, prison vans, etc., etc., have been repaired, also steamboat Fidelity.

Tailors and Coat Makers—Made 246 pairs men's pants, 400 men's vests, 255 pairs woolen mitts, 16 citizens' suits for Bellevue Hospital, 75 cot bottoms. Repaired 637 jackets, 1,361 pairs pants, 540 vests, 15 caps, 81 pairs mitts, 505 cot bottoms.

Broom and Brush Makers—Made 120 dozen scrub brushes, 136 dozen brooms.

Shoemakers—Made 2,040 pairs men's shoes, 1,360 pairs women's shoes. Repaired 1,608 pairs men's shoes, and 84 pairs women's shoes.

At the Sewing Room, female prisoners have made 310 men's shirts, 140 pairs men's summer pants, 26 undershirts, 77 women's dresses, 75 chemises, 25 sacques, 100 wrappers, 540 children's drawers, 350 aprons, 50 diapers, 100 shirts, 75 petticoats, 150 dresses, 704 pillow-cases, 1,190 towels, 104 sheets, 200 crib spreads, 1,228 pairs women's shoes bound, and repaired 2,647 men's shirts, 2,103 socks, 213 women dresses, 288 petticoats, 368 chemises, 152 stockings, 8 sheets, 4 pillow-cases, 651 pillow-ticks, 13 bed-ticks, 7 towels.

By prisoners employed at out-door labor, the seawall and roads have been repaired, 5,000 tons of coal and 80 barges of dirt have been discharged.

At the Stone Shed, prisoners are daily employed cutting building stone, window-jamb, door-steps, water-tables, vases, lintels, ashlar, etc., etc.

The average daily number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 680, employed as follows:

An average of 52 men at Randall's Island, unloading barges of dirt, filling in low grounds, quarrying stone, and building seawalls.

An average of 53 men at Ward's Island, unloading dirt barges and grading.

72 men in quarry.
14 men in seawall.
90 men as stonecutters.
40 men as stonebreakers.
35 men as blacksmiths.
13 men as tinsmiths.
48 men as carpenters and painters.
82 men as shoemakers, tailors, cot, broom and brushmakers.
28 men as gardeners.
20 men in bucket gang.
2 men in guard boat.
14 men as whitewashers and plasterers.
26 men continually in hospital.
20 men disabled and locked in cells.
70 men in and around prison as utility men.
1 man at Insane Asylum.

SIR.—There were 813 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 17, 1880, which is a decrease of 109, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 20 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending July 10, 1880, was 916, which is 141.4 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 39.35 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,210,463.

CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT IN RELATION TO THE PAYMENT OF local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Section 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Section 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Section 4. No provision of this act heretofore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Section 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT IN RELATION TO ARREARS OF TAXES in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Section 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
