



The following is a list of the repairs and improvements made during the quarter by the Engineer's Department—Repairs to steam kettles in general kitchen, requiring 25 feet of 2-inch, 75 feet 1 1/4-inch and 15 feet 3/4-inch steam pipe, one 2-inch by 1 1/4-inch tee, and six 2 by 3/4 tees, two 1 1/4-inch brass unions, six 3/4-inch brass unions, one 1-inch globe valve, twenty 3/4-inch nipples, ten 3/4-inch elbows, six 1 1/4-inch elbows, six 3/4-inch check valves, six 3/4-inch to 1-inch bushings. Repairs and resetting water and dressing sterilizers in operating room; repairs to wheel-stretcher. Repairs to boilers No. 1 and 2, setting 2 new arch plates.

Grounds—Yard in rear of Male Department has been fenced, yard graded and sodded, and flower beds laid out. Walks made to Drug Building, Idiot Pavilion and Morgue. Grounds about Idiot Pavilion drained. Front fence set back four feet, and walk graded.

Repairs to 14 water closets, new marble basin in office of Superintendent of Training School, repairs to 8 basins and two sinks.

The overcrowded condition of the hospital continues, as the table given below indicates. Wards 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 37 and 38 are in the basement and should not be used for patients. They are now occupied by 126 patients.

We are obliged to use one small ward for the lectures and recitations of the Training School. This work could be conducted in the long-talked-of Operating Amphitheatre, as could religious services, for which we at present have no place.

We are unable to have a sufficient number of nurses because we have no accommodation for them. Their quarters are overcrowded and we are obliged to sleep four nurses in the receiving ward in the hospital building. This scarcity of nurses has resulted in their all being overworked and a large sick list.

The Idiot Pavilion was built for 40 patients and now contains 67; the beds are so close together that one is unable to get between them, and the patients eat, sleep and sit in the same rooms.

The one Operating Room is so small that a sufficient number of assistants are in each other's way, and the sterilizing, anesthetizing, etc., all has to be done in the Operating Room.

A most vigorous and rigid enforcement of sanitary and hygienic methods is necessary to prevent the accustomed evils of overcrowding and the discomfort to the patients, and additional work in caring for them under such conditions must be apparent to anyone giving the matter a thought.

In addition to the above, there is not a single dining-room or sitting-room in the Institution for Convalescent Patients, and all are obliged to eat, sit and sleep in the wards with the sick. There are to-day 589 patients, 103 paid employees and 18 unpaid employees (resident medical staff and probationers in Training School). The number of patients is frequently as high as 630.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, July 29, 1898, at 11 o'clock A. M.
Present—President Cram and Commissioner Meyer.
Absent—Commissioner Murphy.

The Board proceeded to open estimates on Contract No. 636, a representative of the Comptroller being present.

Six estimates were received, as follows:

1. George F. Craig, with security deposit of \$700.....	\$15 90 per 1,000 feet.
2. Eppinger & Russell Co., " 700.....	16 38 "
3. Southern Pine Co. of Georgia, " 700.....	16 60 "
4. E. B. Hunting, " 700.....	15 90 "
5. Cooney, Eckstein & Co., " 700.....	15 59 "
6. Charles S. Hirsch, " 700.....	15 68 "

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Comptroller the security deposits made by the above bidders at the time of submitting their estimates, whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for furnishing sawed yellow pine timber, under Contract No. 636, be and hereby is awarded to Cooney, Eckstein & Co., they being the lowest bidders, subject to the approval of the sureties (Henry Zimmern and Louis Dinkelspiel) by the Comptroller.

The minutes of the meeting held July 22, 1898, were approved.

A representative of the Homer Ramsdell Transportation Company appeared and requested a reduction in the rental charged for the privilege of landing at the outer end of the pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-first street.

On motion, the matter was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The following reports on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection: No. 18067. Submitting cost of taking borings and soundings in Newtown creek, Borough of Queens, amounting to \$800.03, for collection from the Department of Bridges.

No. 18088. Submitting cost of cutting gangways on Pier, new 43, North river, amounting to \$262.02, for collection from the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company.

No. 18174. Submitting cost of repairing damage to the pier foot of East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, amounting to \$3, for collection from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company.

No. 18176. Submitting cost of cutting gangway on the north side of Pier, old 42, North river, and closing gangway on the southerly side of said pier, amounting to \$77.32, for collection from the owners of the steamers "Wyckoff" and "Holmdel."

No. 18279. Submitting cost of repairing damage to the Battery Landing, amounting to \$111.10, for collection from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company.

The communication from the Corporation Counsel in relation to the construction of an extension to the crib-bulkhead at Sheepshead Bay by Moses Cohen was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Sheridan & Shea Company, to load cellar dirt on scow at the pier foot of Sixty-first street, East river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$2 per day, in addition to the regular wharfage.

Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company, to construct an office 8 by 16 feet on Pier, new 43, North river, said office to be made free and independent of the deck of the pier, and to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, to remove shed on Pier, old 6, North river, provided said company files in this Department sufficient proof of its ownership of the shed.

Nesmith & Constantine Company, to drive twelve spruce fender piles at the bulkhead between Sixth and Seventh streets, East river.

New York Tarrar Company, to replace hoisting-pile at its dock foot of Ninth street, Gowanus Canal, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted on the usual terms:

Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, to make general repairs to Piers, old 8, 12, 13, 14 and 15, North river, during the ensuing six months.

Merritt & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company, to land three reels of wire at the bulkhead foot of Forty-fourth street, North river.

Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company, to make general repairs to its ferry premises foot of Roosevelt, Grand and East Twenty-third street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, and foot of Grand street, and from South Sixth to South Ninth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, during the ensuing three months.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Department of Finance—Approving sureties on Contract No. 630.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving form of Contract No. 636.

2d. Approving form of bond on Treasurer's Order No. 19538 for paving at the foot of West Twenty-fifth street, North river.

3d. Transmitting forms of leases of the Pier foot of West Forty-third street, bulkhead between West One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, bulkhead between East Seventeenth and East Eighteenth streets, bulkhead foot of East Fourteenth street, and Piers 51 and 52, etc., East river. Officers of the Board authorized to execute same.

4th. Advising that the wharfage rights appurtenant to the bulkheads between One Hundred and Eleventh and One Hundred and Thirteenth streets, Harlem river, in front of the proposed new park, are not yet vested in the City.

5th. In relation to the application made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for grants of land under water to The City of New York.

From the Department of Health—

1st. In relation to the obstruction of sewer at the foot of Temple street, Long Island City, Borough of Queens.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Department of Sewers to extend the sewer further outshore, and also to notify the owners of the sunken canal boat at said location to remove same, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

2d. In relation to the unsanitary condition of the dumps at the foot of East One Hundred and Fifth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, Harlem river.

On motion, the permit granted Kane & Wright to maintain manure dump at the foot of East One Hundred and Fifth street, was revoked, to take effect immediately, and the Secretary directed to notify the Department of Health that the dump on the pier at the foot of East One Hundred and Tenth street, is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Street Cleaning.

From the Department of Highways—In relation to the condition of the unpaved roadway at the foot of East One Hundred and Seventeenth street.

From the Department of Water Supply—In relation to the condition of the pipes stored on the pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street, and requesting that another location be assigned for such storage. Secretary directed to state that a portion of the pier foot of East Twentieth street, will be assigned as soon as the pier is completed.

From Seth T. Stewart, Chairman, Committee on Vacation Schools and Playgrounds, Board of Education—Requesting that a portion of the recreation piers be assigned for Kindergarten purposes. Secretary directed to state that the Board has no objection to the use of the piers for Kindergarten purposes, provided no dividing ropes be placed thereon.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office—Stating that this Board will be notified of the time and place of hearing in the matter of the application of Walter Jennings and Oliver G. Jennings, for grant of land under water at Long Island Sound, Borough of Queens.

From the Manhattan State Hospital—Requesting the Board to waive the bond on the lease of the pier and bulkhead foot of East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, Harlem river. Application granted.

From the Degnon-McLean Construction Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted July 22, 1898, granting permission for the erection of a derrick on the south side of the pier foot of South Fifth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

From J. B. & J. M. Cornell—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted July 22, 1898, granting permission for the erection of a derrick and the placing of tracks on the bulkhead between Piers, new 56 and 57, North river.

From the Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending July 23, 1898.

From Dock Master Harrison—In relation to repairs necessary to the pavement on the approach to Pier 15, East River. Secretary directed to notify the owners and occupants to obtain permit for the repairs now being made to said pavement.

From Dock Master Powers—

1st. In relation to the non-removal of the ice bridge, etc., from the pier foot of East One Hundred and Nineteenth street. Secretary directed to again notify Montgomery & Company to remove said structures.

2d. Reporting the collection of wharfage by I. & S. Bernheimer at the property owned by the City between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth streets, Harlem river. Secretary directed to notify said I. & S. Bernheimer that unless the amount collected is remitted to the City, the matter will be placed in the hands of the Corporation Counsel for collection.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending July 23, 1898.

2d. Recommending that the lessees be directed to make necessary repairs to Pier, new 58, North river; pier foot of West Sixteenth street; pier foot of West Thirty-third street and to the bulkhead between West Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets. Recommendation adopted and the Secretary directed to state that unless the repairs are commenced within ten days, the work will be done by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said lessees.

3d. Recommending that the necessary repairs be made to the pier foot of West Forty-seventh street, North river. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that the work of taking up and relaying the pavement adjoining Pier, new 25, North river, to facilitate repairs to water pipes thereat, be done by the force of this Department, the cost to be collected from the Southern Pacific Company, lessees of said pier. Recommendation adopted.

5th. In relation to the completion of the recreation pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The Secretary reported that the lease of the franchise of the ferry to and from Tenth street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, from and to the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, had been sold to the Tenth and Twenty-third Street Ferry Company, at the public sale held Friday, July 22, 1898, at 11 o'clock A. M., at Pier "A," North river, by Philip A. Smyth, auctioneer, at the upset price of \$5,500 per annum, for a term of nine years and nine months, from August 1, 1898, subject to the following terms and conditions of sale:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE.

The lease will be sold subject to the approval of the terms thereof by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The purchaser will be required at the time of sale to pay, in addition to the auctioneer's fee, to the Department of Docks and Ferries, 25 per cent. of the amount of the annual rent bid, as

security for the execution of the lease, which 25 per cent. will be applied to the payment of the rent first accruing under the lease when executed, or will be forfeited to the Department if the purchaser refuses or neglects to execute the lease with good and sufficient security, to be approved by the Board of Docks, within ten days after being notified that the lease is prepared and ready for execution at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries, Pier "A," North river, foot of Battery place.

Two sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Board of Docks, will be required under the lease, to enter into a bond or obligation jointly and severally with the lessees in the sum of double the annual rent, for the faithful performance of all the covenants and conditions of the lease.

The lease will contain the usual covenants and conditions, in conformity with the provisions of law and the ordinances of the Municipal Assembly relative to ferries, and shall provide that the lessees will maintain and operate the ferry during the whole term, and will provide ample accommodations in the way of safe and capacious boats and sufficiency of trips, as to the sufficiency of which accommodations the decision of the Board of Docks shall be final; also conditions that the lessees shall dredge the ferry slip, etc., as required by the Board of Docks; that during the term of the lease they will erect and build, at their own expense, and will at all times well and sufficiently repair, maintain and keep in good order, all and singular the floats, racks, fenders, bridges and other fixtures of the landing places, and in the event of any damage to the bulkheads or piers from collision by the ferry-boats or otherwise; from any accident or negligence or their part, they will immediately repair and restore said wharf property to its previous condition, free of cost to The City of New York; that if at any time during the term of the lease the Board of Docks shall require any of the wharf property used for ferry purposes in order to proceed with the water-front improvements in the vicinity of the ferry landings, the said lessees shall surrender and vacate the premises, without any claim upon the City for any damages whatever, upon written notice being given to the lessees three months in advance of the intention of said Board; that such notice shall specify by the general terms of description or by reference to the plans and specifications of the proposed work of improvement the character of the alterations and improvements to be made in regard to said water-front, affecting the property and rights hereby authorized to be demised, and upon receiving such notice the lessees may elect to terminate the lease of said ferry privileges or franchise by serving notice of such election upon the Board of Docks within one month after receiving the notice from the Board of Docks of its intention to improve the water-front in the vicinity of the ferry landing; also, that in case only a portion of said wharf property shall be required for the purposes aforesaid, then a reasonable reduction will be made from the rent reserved by said lease; that sworn returns of the amounts of ferry receipts shall be made to the Board of Docks when required by said Board, and that the books of accounts of the ferry shall be subject to the inspection of said Board.

The rates of ferriages and charges for vehicles and freight shall not exceed the rates now charged.

The form of lease which the purchaser will be required to execute can be seen at the office of the Board of Docks.

The right to reject any bid is reserved if deemed by the Board of Docks to be for the best interests of the City.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect, and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract, by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, each in the penal amount of fifty (50) per cent. of the bid for each article.
