AN ORDINANCE to empower the Police Department of The City of New York to test certain boilers and examine the operators thereof.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. All boilers in vessels now used on the waters in and around The City of New York not coming under the jurisdiction of the Marine Department of the United States Government or the Police Department of The City of New York are hereby placed under the jurisdiction of said Police Department, which is hereby authorized and empowered to test said boilers and examine the persons operating the same as to their qualifications as engineers and firemen. Such tests of boilers and the examination of persons operating the same shall be conducted in accordance with such provisions of the Greater New York Charter and Laws of the State of New York as are applicable to boilers operated on land.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

After disposing of the Public Improvements Calendar the following Financial and Franchise matters were considered by unanimous consent:

FRANCHISE MATTERS.

AMENDMENT TO SECTION 242 OF THE CHARTER.

The Secretary presented the following:

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The attention of the Board has several times been drawn to the fact that, in view of a recent decision of the Court of Appeals, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has not the power to grant revocable consents for the laying of spur tracks in the streets of the City, even when such tracks would constitute no nuisance, but, on the other hand, would greatly facilitate business and remove obstructions from the public streets. The Corporation Counsel has also advised the Board that all grants for such spur tracks made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and by its predecessor, the Board of Aldermen, were unauthorized and that the tracks laid under such consents are illegal.

I think there is no doubt but that such tracks may often be unobjectionable and possibly desirable, and it would, therefore, seem that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should have authority to grant revocable consents for such purposes, and after informal conferences with the Corporation Counsel's office, I beg to submit herewith a draft of a bill amending section 242 of the Greater New York Charter by adding a paragraph distinctly giving to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the power to grant such revocable consents. I also submit a resolution requesting the Corporation Counsel to have such a bill introduced in the Legislature, and, if possible, to secure its passage during the present session.

Mr. NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer:

SIR—Under a recent decision of the Court of Appeals, it was determined that the provisions of section 242 of the Charter were not sufficiently broad to permit the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to grant revocable consents for the use of spur tracks in the streets of the City, even when the same should not constitute a nuisance.

More recently the Corporation Counsel has rendered an opinion to the Board, in which he states that under such decision it is his opinion that all grants heretofore made by the Board of Aldermen, as the predecessor of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for such revocable consents, were unauthorized, and that in consequence such consents, and the tracks constructed thereunder, are illegal.

In my annual report I pointed out to you the desirability of securing legislation which would give the Board discretionary power to grant to individuals and corporations, for their exclusive use, rights to cross the streets by means of tracks, tunnels, bridges and pipes, which practice had been in vogue for a great number of years.

I have, therefore, prepared a draft of a proposed bill amending section 242 of the Charter in such manner as will give the Board discretionary power in certain cases, but which will in no way affect the franchise granting power of the Board, or in any way modify the provisions of the Charter pertaining to franchises and to public service corporations using the streets.

In view of the foregoing, I think it is most desirable that the Board should go on record as favoring such legislation, and urge the passage of this act at the present session, and I would suggest that the Board approve the same, and direct the Corporation Counsel to have the same introduced at the earliest possible moment, and do all in his power to secure its passage at once.

I enclose herewith draft of the proposed bill, together with a resolution for adoption by the Board.

AN ACT to amend section 242 of the Greater New York Charter with respect to the powers of the board of estimate and apportionment.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two hundred and forty-two of the Greater New York Charter, entitled "An Act to unite into one municipality under the corporate name of The City of New York the various communities lying in and about New York harbor including the city and county of New York, the city of Brooklyn and the county of Kings, the county of Richmond and part of the county of Queens, and to provide for the government thereof," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 242. The board of estimate and apportionment shall have power over the following subjects:

(1) To appropriate, from time to time, for the maintenance, improvement and extension of the system of water supply of the borough of Brooklyn, the moneys received from water rents in the said borough, subject, however, to the charges now imposed by law upon said revenues.

(2) To appropriate, from time to time, for the maintenance of the New York and Brooklyn bridge the moneys received from the revenues of said bridge.

The board of estimate and apportionment shall have also (3) the control of all the streets, avenues, highways, boulevards, concourses, driveways, bridges, tunnels, parks, parkways, waterways, docks, bulkheads, wharves, piers and all other public grounds and waters within or belonging to the city except as in this act otherwise

provided. The powers by this act granted to the board of aldermen with respect to the streets, avenues, highways, boulevards, concourses, driveways, bridges, tunnels, parks, parkways, docks, waterways, bulkheads, wharves, piers, and public grounds and waters which are within or belonging to the city shall be subject to such control of the board of estimate and apportionment. If and when the board of estimate and apportionment shall deem it proper in the case of any application or matter affecting any street, avenue, highway, boulevard, concourse, driveway, bridge, tunnel, park, parkway, waterway, dock, wharf, pier, or public ground or water within or belonging to the city, whether the board of aldermen or any other department or officer shall have acted or omitted to act, the board of estimate and apportionment may itself originally act or may, by amendment, revision or repeal of any resolution, ordinance, grant or other action adopted or had by the board of aldermen or any other department or officer, exercise its said power of control; and if and when the board of estimate and apportionment shall so act or exercise such control such action or control shall be fully and finally operative, notwithstanding any resolution, ordinance, grant or other action adopted or had by the board of aldermen or any other department or officer of the city or any omission to act on the part of the board of aldermen or other department or officer. The board of estimate and apportionment shall hereafter, except in the cases where franchises, rights or contracts shall be granted or authorized pursuant to the rapid transit act, chapter four of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one, and the amendments thereof, have the exclusive power in behalf of the city to grant to persons or corporations franchises or rights or make contracts providing for or involving the occupation or use of any of the streets, avenues, highways, boulevards, concourses, driveways, bridges, tunnels, parks, parkways, waterways, docks, bulkheads, wharves, piers or public grounds or waters within or belonging to the city, whether on, under or over the surface thereof, for railroads, pipe or other conduits or ways or otherwise for the transportation of persons or property or the transmission of gas, electricity, steam, light, heat or power, provided, however, that no such exercise of power by the board of estimate and apportionment shall be operative until the same shall be in writing approved by the mayor separately from and after the action of the board of estimate and apportionment; and provided, further, that this section shall not prevent the exercise by the board of aldermen of the powers expressly granted it by sections forty-nine, fifty, fifty-one and fifty-two of this act; but such exercise of powers by the board of aldermen shall in every case be subject to the control by this act granted to the board of estimate and apportionment over all the streets, avenues, highways, boulevards, concourses, driveways, bridges, tunnels, parks, parkways, waterways, docks, bulkheads, wharves, piers and all public grounds and waters which are within or belong to the city. If and when the board of rapid transit railroad commissioners for The City of New York shall, under any of the provisions of chapter four of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one, or of any of the acts amending the same, conclude or determine upon the construction of any rapid transit railway or railways or adopt any route or routes, plans or specifications therefor, or if and when the said board of rapid transit railroad commissioners shall grant any right or rights, franchise or franchises or enter into any contract or contracts under any of the provisions of the said chapter four of the said laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one or any of the said amendments thereof, the said board shall transmit to the board of estimate and apportionment a copy of any and every such determination or conclusion, grant or contract, and in case any such determination, conclusion, route, plan, specification, right, franchise, or contract shall require or involve the use of any street, avenue, highway, boulevard, concourse, driveway, bridge, tunnel, park, parkway, waterway, dock, bulkhead, wharf, pier or any public ground or water which is within or belongs to the city, the said board of estimate and apportionment shall within sixty days after the receipt by it of such copy of such determination, conclusion, grant or contract determine whether or not it will, as the local authority having the control of such street, avenue, highway, boulevard, concourse, driveway, bridge, tunnel, park, parkway, dock, waterway, bulkhead, wharf, pier or other public ground or water which is within or belongs to the city, consent or refuse to consent to such route, determination, conclusion, plan, specification, right, franchise or contract, and shall within such sixty days transmit in writing to the said board of rapid transit railroad commissioners its said determination whether of consent or refusal. Provided, however, that the said board of estimate and apportionment and the said board of rapid transit railroad commissioners may by resolution adopted by each of them extend such period of sixty days. Hereafter no consent or approval of any such determination, conclusion, route, plan, specification, right, franchise or contract by the board of aldermen or any department or officer of the city shall be necessary.

The board of estimate and apportionment shall have also (4) power to grant its consent to any individual, joint stock association or corporation engaged in any lawful business to construct and use for its or their private use any pipes, conduits and tunnels under, railroad tracks upon, and connecting bridges over any of the streets, avenues, highways, boulevards, concourses, driveways, bridges, tunnels, parks, parkways, waterways, docks, bulkheads, wharves, piers or public grounds or waters within or belonging to the city. Such consent shall continue only during the pleasure of the board of estimate and apportionment and shall be revocable at any time, but no such consent shall be granted for a longer period than ten years, at the expiration of which period such consent shall cease and determine, unless upon a new application being made prior to such expiration, a further extension of such revocable consent shall have been made for a period of not exceeding ten years and upon such terms and conditions as the board of estimate and apportionment may then impose.

The form of such consent shall be by resolution of the board of estimate and apportionment, and shall not be operative until the same be in writing approved by the mayor separately from and after action of the board of estimate and apportionment. Such consents may contain such terms and conditions as the board of estimate and apportionment may prescribe and shall provide for adequate compensation to be paid annually to the city during the continuance of the consent. Provided no revocable consent granted under subdivision four of this section shall authorize any individual, joint stock association or corporation to carry on a business of a public service character.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Note—New matter in italic.

The following was offered:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York has succeeded to certain of the powers formerly possessed by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, and has exercised such powers in granting revocable consents for certain structures in the streets to individuals and corporations for their exclusive use, which consents in all cases have been revocable at the pleasure of the Board; and

Whereas, The Court of Appeals has recently decided that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under the provisions of section 242 of the Charter, was not possessed of such powers, and in consequence of such decision many of the structures now in the streets, erected pursuant to consents of the Board of Aldermen and of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, are held by the Corporation Counsel to be illegal structures; and

Whereas, It appears to this Board that power should be given to it to legalize such structures and to grant in the future, in its discretion, rights for the use of the streets in the same manner as heretofore; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the proposed amendment to section 242 of the Charter this day presented to the Board by its Chief Engineer, be and the same is hereby approved; and be it further

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel is requested to secure the introduction of such bill in the Legislature of the State of New York at the present session, and to direct the representative of the City at Albany to use his best efforts to secure its passage at the present session.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

FINANCIAL MATTERS.

The Comptroller presented the following report relative to the laying out, etc., of a public place in the Borough of Brooklyn, and recommending the purchase at \$250, of a triangular piece of property located at Metropolitan avenue, Scott avenue and Meadow street, Borough of Brooklyn, for this purpose:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
April 6, 1908.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—At a recent meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the matter of laying out a public place, bounded by Metropolitan avenue, Scott avenue and Meadow street, Borough of Brooklyn, was referred to me for the purpose of seeing whether the same could be acquired at private sale, the said premises being necessary in connection with sewers now under construction and authorized in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

It seems that at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held December 6, 1907, a public hearing was given on a proposed change in the map of the City by laying out as a public place this triangle. The acquisition of this triangle was to permit of a desirable modification in the line of the important Scott avenue outlet sewer, a sewer which the Engineer of the Board states is not only needed for the Borough of Brooklyn, but which will furnish an outlet for an extensive system of sewers in the Borough of Queens now under construction, and which will be useless until the Scott avenue sewer in the Borough of Brooklyn is built.

It was intended originally to acquire title to this small plot under an assessment proceeding, for the reason that it is incidental to the construction of a system of sewers which are assessed, but it was then thought that it would be little more than a widening of the street area, and would then be a local benefit.

The Chief Engineer, in his report, states that in his judgment it is very important that all obstacles to the construction of this sewer be removed as soon as possible, and he desires that immediate action be taken.

The premises desired to be acquired are approximately 21 feet 3 inches on Scott avenue, which is the base of the triangle, 53 feet 4¼ inches on a perpendicular line, the hypotenuse being 57 feet 5¼ inches. I have been informed that the owners of this property own a large tract of land adjoining, and that they are very desirous of having this sewer built; that they do not in any way wish to put any obstacle in the way of its being built; they would also desire very much to have the grades of the streets changed, for the reason that, as an engineering proposition, they will have to be changed in order to make a proper drop for the sewer. They have come forward and offered to sell the triangle to the City at private sale for the sum of \$250, and they have also transmitted to me deeds of gifts, duly executed, as follows:

From Julia L. Ellis, Antoinette L. Edwards and Gertrude C. Winthrop:

1. The parcel of land lying in a certain street laid down and designated on the map or plan of the late City of Brooklyn (formerly of the Town of Bushwick), as Meadow street, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the middle line of said Meadow street with the easterly line of Stewart avenue, and running thence southerly along said Stewart avenue thirty (30) feet to the southerly line of said Meadow street; thence easterly along the said southerly line of Meadow street eight hundred and sixty (860) feet to the westerly line of Scott avenue; thence northerly along said Scott avenue sixty (60) feet to the northerly line of Meadow street; thence westerly along the northerly line of said Meadow street one hundred (100) feet; thence southerly parallel with Scott avenue thirty (30) feet to the middle line of Meadow street and thence westerly along said middle line of Meadow street seven hundred and sixty (760) feet to the place of beginning.

2. The parcel of land lying within the lines of a certain street known and designated on said map or plan as Stag street, comprising the whole of said street lying between Stewart avenue and Scott avenue, as shown on said map.

3. The parcel of land lying within the lines of a certain street designated on said map as Scholes street, described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at the intersection of the easterly line of Stewart avenue with the northerly line of said Scholes street and running thence easterly along the northerly side of Scholes street seven hundred and forty-nine (749) feet more or less to the line of land formerly of Andrew Sauer; thence southerly along said land sixty (60) feet more or less to a point in the southerly line of said Scholes street distant two hundred and ninety-eight (298) feet easterly from the easterly line of Gardner avenue; thence westerly along the southerly line of Scholes street seven hundred and fifty-eight (758) feet to the easterly line of Stewart avenue, and thence northerly along said Stewart avenue sixty (60) feet to the place of beginning.

SIR—In a communication dated the 21st of March, 1908, addressed to you by William W. Lawrence, Assistant Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it was stated: "At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held March 20, 1908, a resolution was presented from the Board of Aldermen, requesting the issue of \$35,000 Special Revenue Bonds to meet bills of the Citizens' Water Supply Company and the Bowery Bay Improvement Company for water supplied in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, during the months of October, November and December, 1907, which was referred to you for consideration and report."

In the Budget for the calendar year 1907 an appropriation was made for supplying water for Long Island City, in the Borough of Queens, amounting to \$125,000. Owing (as stated by Frank J. Goodwin, Deputy and Acting Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in a communication to the President of the Board of Aldermen dated October 19, 1907) to an increased consumption of water due to the rapid development of the Borough of Queens as a residential district, deficiencies have been incurred for several years in the appropriations, which deficiencies have hitherto been met by transfers. As there were no available balances in 1907 from which transfers could be drawn, application was made on the part of the Department for an issue of Revenue Bonds amounting to \$35,000 to provide for the deficiency of that year. From the records of this Department it appears that, in the aggregate \$123,411.85 has been paid or is in process of payment chargeable to the said appropriation of \$125,000, leaving a balance still available of \$1,588.15. These payments include all that was due to the Bowery Bay Improvement Company at the close of the year 1907. There remain, however, the following unsatisfied claims of the Citizens' Water Supply Company of Newtown, in the Borough of Queens, under its contract with the City, dated July 9, 1907, namely: For the month of October, 1907, \$10,276.81; for the month of November, 1907, \$9,723.15, and for the month of December, 1907, \$10,742.59, a total of \$30,742.55. Claims for these amounts were filed in this Department December 7, 1907, January 11, 1908, and February 6, 1908, respectively, and actions have been instituted by the claimant company for the recovery of these different amounts.

An appropriation of \$30,000, together with the available balance of \$1,588.15 remaining out of the regular appropriation of \$125,000, would therefore be sufficient to cover all the claims for the payment of which it is proposed to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds and an appropriation of \$31,000, with the said balance of \$1,588.15, would be sufficient to cover the said claims inclusive of interest, if it should become necessary, upon an adjustment of these claims, to pay interest from the date of filing the same.

Upon an investigation into the merits of the claims of the Citizens' Water Supply Company of Newtown it was ascertained that no dispute had arisen as to the fact that the quantities of water alleged to have been supplied were so supplied and no dispute had arisen as to whether or not the amounts payable equaled the amounts claimed if the contract price were to prevail. It is to be noted that the estimated cost of the contract with the Citizens' Water Supply Company of Newtown was \$39,000, and the certificate attached to the contract bearing the signature of Deputy and Acting Comptroller N. Taylor Phillips indicated that there remained unapplied and unexpended a balance of the appropriation applicable to the contract of \$39,000. Inasmuch as payments have already been made under the contract amounting to \$29,375.89, if thereto be added \$30,742.55, the amount of the claims for October, November and December, 1907, the estimated cost and the amount limited by the said certificate will be exceeded by \$21,118.44. It would appear desirable, therefore, to obtain the opinion of the Corporation Counsel respecting the legal liability of the City for such excess payment before an adjustment be made. In the meantime, however, in view of the apparent necessity for a prompt payment of the said amount in case of such liability in order to avoid the accumulation of interest charges, it would appear advisable to provide at once for an issue of bonds sufficient to pay the amount claimed by the said company, the actual adjustment thereof being deferred until receipt of advice from the Corporation Counsel to the effect that the charges are a legal obligation on the part of the City.

SIR—Heretofore and up to the present time, it has been assumed that the streets in the following list, which come within the jurisdiction in certain respects of the Department of Parks, should be cleaned and the snow removed therefrom by said Department, and not by the Department of Street Cleaning. These streets are as follows:

West Seventy-second street parkway, west of Central Park.
Cathedral parkway (One Hundred and Tenth street), Fifth avenue to Riverside drive.

Property road (Riverside drive), Grant's Tomb to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street.

Ninety-sixth street, from West End avenue to Riverside drive.

Plazas in front of Central Park at One Hundred and Tenth street and Eighth avenue, One Hundred and Tenth street and Fifth avenue, Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue, and Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue.

Ninety-seventh street transverse road under Central Park.

Eighty-sixth street transverse road under Central Park.

Seventy-ninth street transverse road under Central Park.

Sixty-sixth street transverse road under Central Park.

I am in receipt of a communication from the Commissioner of Parks, dated February 14, in which he calls attention to the fact that, pursuant to the provisions of the Charter, which require that the Street Cleaning Department shall sweep and clean, as well as remove snow from all thoroughfares other than macadamized streets within any park or any parkway, beginning March 1 prox., the Park Department will discontinue cleaning the same, and after April 1 prox. will discontinue the removal of snow therefrom for all future time.

The question of snow removal from these streets for the present season is not important to this Department, on account of the fact that in all probability there will be no snow after April 1, but if the contention of the Park Department is upheld, provision for cleaning this additional area of streets must be made, and I therefore request an additional appropriation of \$36,046.66.

The estimated cost of the additional work is made up as follows:

The area embraced in the streets above enumerated is 119,265 square yards, and in addition to the above, Seventh avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Fifty-third street, is now being paved and will soon be turned over to this Department, comprising an area of 79,511 square yards.

To properly care for the cleaning of this area twenty-six Sweepers and six Drivers will be required for ten months, and sixteen additional

Sweepers and four Drivers for seven months, at a total cost of..... \$30,046 66

Ten additional horses and keep of same..... 6,000 00

Total..... \$36,046 66

I respectfully urge that the above provision be made to meet this new condition.

GENTLEMEN—I transmit herewith a report of the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics relative to the request of the Street Cleaning Commissioner for an appropriation of \$36,046.66 to meet the salaries of additional Sweepers and Drivers, etc., for sweeping and cleaning streets heretofore taken care of by the Department of Parks, in the Borough of Manhattan.

In view of the statements made in said report it would appear that an allowance of \$24,500 is required by the Department of Street Cleaning for this purpose in addition to appropriations made for said Department in the Budget for 1908, and that the funds of the Department of Parks are not sufficient to permit of any transfer from the same to the Department of Street Cleaning.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Regarding the application by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an additional appropriation of \$36,046.66 to meet the expense of cleaning certain streets in the Borough of Manhattan heretofore cared for by the Department of Parks, I beg to report as follows:

The immediate cause of the transfer of responsibility here referred to was the receipt some two months since by the Commissioner of Parks of a communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning informing him of complaints having been received at the Department of Street Cleaning of the dirty condition of these streets and pointing out his responsibility in the matter. This led to an inquiry by the Commissioner of Parks as to his duty in the circumstances, which resulted in the discovery that the Charter imposes the work of cleaning these streets upon the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, who thereupon assumed control on March 1.

As may be inferred from the complaints mentioned, the Park Department has made no pretence of cleaning these streets thoroughly, no appropriation for the purpose ever having been provided. The only fund available was that for general park maintenance, and out of this it is estimated some four or five thousand dollars a year was spent in the partial and occasional cleaning which was done. This sum the Commissioner of Parks estimates to be about one-fourth of the amount which would be required by his Department to do the work properly, and in a communication addressed to you under date of March 13 he presents an itemized statement of the yearly cost, amounting to \$17,314. In this is included the cost of snow removal, placed at \$2,025, leaving \$15,289 for cleaning alone.

Of the total amount requested by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, \$11,546.66 is to be used in cleaning Seventh avenue, between One Hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Fifty-third streets. This section is not included in the Park Commissioner's estimate and the sum mentioned should, therefore, in making a comparison, be deducted, leaving \$24,500 as against the \$15,289 estimate of the Park Commissioner. This latter sum, however, is to cover the entire year instead of the ten months figured on by the Street Cleaning Department, and should, therefore, be reduced one-sixth, leaving \$12,741 as the amount to be compared with the \$24,500 requested by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning.

There are several reasons for the disparity here shown. In the first place the Park Commissioner has omitted any charge for horses or trucks, the drivers only being included. To supply this omission will increase the estimate by \$1,435. Second, the yearly wage of Laborers allowed by the Park Commissioner is \$730 as against \$780 for Sweepers in the estimate of the Street Cleaning Department. This difference accounts for \$950 of the disparity, and, together with the \$1,435 already mentioned, increases the estimate of the Park Commissioner to \$15,126. The remaining difference of \$9,374 is due to the greater number of men included in the Street Cleaning Department's estimate. While the estimate of the Park Department provides for weekly truck visits for the removal of sweepings, requiring not more than three Drivers, that of the Street Cleaning Commissioner calls for six Drivers, and as against the nineteen Laborers of the Park Department, the Street Cleaning Department calls for twenty-six Sweepers.

Your Examiner is informed by a representative of the Street Cleaning Department that it is the custom in that Department to allow one Sweeper to every 5,000 square yards of pavement. Thus, for the transverse roads crossing the park, each containing 8,220 yards, 8 Sweepers are allowed, or 2 for each road, as against the Park Depart-

ment's allowance of 4 Laborers, or 1 for each road. As bearing on this point it may be mentioned that in the report of the Commission on Street Cleaning and Waste Disposal made to the Mayor on December 31, 1907, the statement occurs that one Sweeper will clean satisfactorily 8,000 square yards of pavement per day. This estimate probably refers to asphalt pavement, which is more easily cleaned than the granite or Belgian block pavement of these roads, but this difference would seem to be more than offset by the consideration that while the Commission's estimate is for daily sweeping, two, or at most three, cleanings per week would be ample for such streets as these.

On the whole, it seems to your Examiner that the number of men called for in the Street Cleaning Commissioner's estimate is in excess of actual requirements both as regards the streets now in his care and the Seventh avenue section as well, for which latter 16 Sweepers are requested, or an average of less than 5,000 square yards to each Sweeper. It is, therefore, respectfully recommended that the additional appropriation to be allowed the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for this purpose be limited to the sum of \$24,500, or substantially two-thirds of the amount requested.

Regarding the inquiry made by the President of the Board of Aldermen as to whether the money appropriated to the Department of Parks for this purpose had been transferred to the Department of Street Cleaning, I beg to report that no specific appropriation was made to the Department of Parks for this purpose, but, as has been stated, the expense of the work was included in the appropriation for general park maintenance and was defrayed therefrom to the amount of some four or five thousand dollars per annum. The proposal to transfer this amount is strongly opposed by the Commissioner of Parks on the ground that his allowance for maintenance is already insufficient, as several unexpected drafts have been or are soon to be made upon it, including a new fence around City Hall Park costing \$6,000.

(FLATBUSH AVENUE EXTENSION, NASSAU STREET TO WILLOUGHBY STREET, MANHATTAN BRIDGE, No. 1.)

THE City of New York, acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District, by this advertisement invites proposals to construct that part of the proposed Fourth Avenue Subway in the Borough of Brooklyn which begins at the northerly side of Nassau Street and runs thence under said Flatbush Avenue Extension to a point about 20 feet north of the centre line of Willoughby Street.

The general plan of construction calls for a four-track subsurface Railroad, but the Contractor will not be required under the contract proposed to provide or lay tracks, ties or ballast. A station between Tillary Street and Johnson Street will be constructed; and suitable cross-overs, turn-outs and sidings are also to be provided, all as indicated on the detailed plans of construction. The tunnels are to have a height of not less than thirteen (13) feet in the clear, and a maximum width of fifteen (15) feet for each track, except at curves, etc., where the width may be increased. The roof of the tunnels is generally to be as near the surface of the street as street conditions and grades will permit. The roof and sides of the tunnels will be of iron or steel and masonry. Entrances to the station are intended to be placed within private property, rights in which will be acquired for the purpose, or on the streets, or on the sidewalks adjacent to private property, as indicated on the plans.

The manner of construction shall be by open excavation unless otherwise provided in the contract or directed by the Commission; such portions of the street, however, where the work may not be completed and the backfill is not placed at the expiration of fifteen months from the time of executing the contract, must be substantially boarded over to permit freedom of traffic, if so ordered by the Commission.

In the detailed plans for construction, provisions for pipe galleries along the line of the tunnel are included. Bids for the construction of the railroad must be accompanied by a separate bid for the construction of the pipe galleries above referred to, as it is essential for the City to separate the cost of the railroad from the cost of the pipe galleries. The Commission reserves the right to accept a bid for construction of the railroad and at the same time to reject the accompanying bid for pipe galleries.

Bidders must visit the location of the railroad and station to be built under this contract and note the present conditions along the line of the proposed railroad. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
