Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, May 5, 1909, at 10 a. m.

Present—President Frank L. Polk and Commissioners R. Ross Appleton and Arthur J. O'Keefe.

The President, Mr. Frank L. Polk, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from Part II. of the Labor Class the following titles:

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated May 3, in relation to the request of Mr. E. E. Scudder, a Leveler in the Board of Water Supply, that his title be changed to Transitman and Computer. The request was denied, and the Secretary was directed to state that the desired change of title could only be effected through a promotion examination.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Examiner in charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated May 3, recommending that the request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries for the following promotion examinations in his Department be granted:

Third—That the papers of Loring T. Hildreth, candidate for Deputy Assistant Corporation Counsel, receive a rating, and that due allowance be made for the fact that the candidate was compelled to rewrite a paper on account of having signed his name, while other candidates in the examination who signed their names were not compelled to do so, but allowed to erase them.

Fourth—That the request of the Tenement House Department that Francis H. McAdam and James J. Nevill be marked qualified on the list for promotion to third grade Clerk, be granted for the reason that on September 30, 1908, they lacked only one day of having served the requisite three years in the second grade, they having been appointed on October 2, 1905, for the reason that the 1st of October of that year fell on Sunday.

Fifth—That the request of Louis Greenglick, of No. 317 East Fourth street, Manhattan, that his name be restored to the list of Financial Clerk for appointment at not less than \$1,200 per annum, be denied, and that his statement that he failed to receive a notice for the examination for Accountant, fourth grade, receive no consideration, it appearing from the records of the office that a notice was mailed to the candidate on March 2, 1909, and that the same had not been returned by the Post Office authorities.

Sixth—That the request of Richard J. Costello, of No. 193 Russell street, Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the eligible list of Clerk, second grade, be denied for laches.

The recommendations were adopted.

1. Section 1 as contained in said ordinance, and amended by said contract shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The City hereby grants to the New York City Interborough Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinabove set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers, and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, in, upon and along the following named streets, avenues, walkways, highways, public places, bridges and viaducts and crossing intersecting streets and highways, all situated in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, namely:

"First—Commencing at a point on the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street viaduct, between Broadway and Eighth avenue and on a line parallel with the westerly line of the Manhattan Elevated Railway Company's station at Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; running thence easterly and along said viaduct to the Central or Manhattan Dam Bridge; thence running northerly and along said bridge to the westerly approach thereto known as the Sedgwick avenue approach, formerly called Ogden avenue approach thereto in the Borough of The Bronx; thence northerly on and along said approach to its intersection with Jerome avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Jerome avenue to its intersection with Ogden avenue; thence on and along Ogden avenue northerly in its intersection with Augustus avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Augustus avenue to Kingsbridge road; thence westerly on and along Kingsbridge road to Sedgwick avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Sedgwick avenue to Boston avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Boston avenue to Heath avenue or Fort Independence street; thence westerly on and along Heath avenue or Fort Independence street to Fort Independence street; thence northerly on and along Fort Independence street to Bailey avenue; thence northerly on and along Bailey avenue to East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street; thence northerly on and along East and West Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to Broadway.

"Second—Commencing at the Rapid Transit station at the intersection of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street with St. Nicholas avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan; thence on and along said West One Hundred and Eighty-first street in an easterly direction to Washington Bridge; thence thong and over Washington Bridge easterly to Augustus avenue, Borough of The Bronx; thence northeasterly on and along Augustus avenue to Tremont avenue; thence easterly on and along Tremont avenue as it winds and turns to the Transverse road under the Grand Boulevard and Concourse connecting said Tremont avenue; thence easterly on and along the transverse road under the Grand Boulevard and Concourse again to Tremont avenue; thence easterly on and along Tremont avenue to Webster avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Webster avenue upon the tracks of the Union Railway Company of New York City to East One Hundred and Eighty-first street; thence easterly on and along said East One Hundred and Eighty-first street in Southern boulevard to East One Hundred and Eighty-first street; thence northeasterly on and along East One Hundred and Eighty-first street to Hudson road; thence northerly on and along Hudson road to East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street; thence easterly on and along West Farms road or East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street to and across the Eastern boulevard again to East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street; thence easterly on and along East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street to and ending at Locust Point on Long Island Sound.

"Third—Commencing at West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, west of Lenox avenue, Borough of Manhattan; running thence easterly on and along said West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street to and over the One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge over the Harlem River to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Borough of The Bronx; thence in an easterly direction on and along said East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to St. Anna avenue; thence northerly on and along St. Anna avenue to East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, thence easterly on and along said East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street in its intersection with Leggett avenue or Craven street; thence northerly and easterly on and along Leggett avenue or Craven street to its intersection with Dawson street; thence northeasterly on and along Leggett avenue to its intersection with Randall avenue; thence easterly on and along Randall avenue to the Bronx River.

"Fifth—Commencing at Duncan street and Jerome avenue, Borough of The Bronx; running easterly on and along Duncan street to Southern Boulevard and Hunt's Point road; thence northeasterly on and along Hunt's Point road to Long Island Sound."

2. The fourth subdivision of section 2 of said ordinance shall be amended to read as follows:

"The New York City Interborough Railway Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay to this franchise in the City of New York the following sum of money:

"During the first period of this franchise ending on September 30, 1907, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) and shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).

"During the remainder of the original term of twenty-five years of this franchise an annual sum which shall not be less than eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500), and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500).

"In addition to the above, the Company shall pay for the use of the three bridges above described, during the first period of this franchise ending on September 30, 1907, the annual sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for each bridge.

"During the succeeding period beginning on September 30, 1907, and ending ten years from the date of this franchise, an annual sum of two thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250) for each bridge.

"During the succeeding five years of this franchise an annual sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for each bridge.

"During the succeeding five years of this franchise an annual sum of two thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,750) for each bridge.

"During the remaining five years of this franchise an annual sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for each bridge.

"Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year, after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad; provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sum as the time of the commencement of operation of any portion of the road before September 30 next preceding, shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law, as it now exists or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successors or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892."

3. Section 6 of said ordinance shall be amended to read as follows:

"The Company shall complete the construction and put in operation a railway upon the entire length of each of the routes hereinabove described on or before March 24, 1912, otherwise the franchise right and privilege to construct such railway upon the routes or portions of routes not then constructed and in full operation shall cease and determine."

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish, and does hereby abandon and relinquish to the City all its right and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway over the routes, or portions of routes, described in section 1 of said ordinance, approved by the Mayor on March 31, 1903, and amended by contract bearing date of June 25, 1907, but not described in section 1 of said ordinance as amended by this contract, and the Company shall within one year from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, comply with the provisions of law in regard to the abandonment of the routes, or portions of routes, so abandoned and relinquished, and remove therefrom any and all existing tracks of the Company, otherwise this contract shall be void and of no effect.
