GENTLEMEN-A communication addressed to the Secretary of your Board from the Board of Health, transmitting a copy of preambles and resolution adopted by the Board of Health on March 30, 1910, requesting the approval of the transfer of \$2,820 from the Budget appropriation of the Department of Health for the year 1910, entitled No. 290, Division of Communicable Diseases, Contingencies, to the appropriation entitled No. 1334, Rents, for the year 1910, has been referred to me for

I would report that provision was made in the Budget for 1910 for the establishment by the Department of Health of additional clinics for the treatment of pulmonary diseases in different sections of The City of New York. The Budgetary allowance provided for supplies, equipment and the payment of salaries of employees, but not for rent of the buildings proposed to be leased for the purpose.

The Board of Health requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the Comptroller to execute leases to the City of the following premises:

No. 448 West Thirty-fourth street, Borough of Manhattan.

No. 18 Bleecker street, Borough of Brooklyn. No. 10 Union avenue, Jamaica, Borough of Queens.

Bay street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond,

The aggregate annual rental of these premises is \$3,760. It appears that the balance in the appropriation No. 1334, Rents, for 1910 is insufficient to provide for these rentals, and the Department of Health has been requested to provide for the same out of its Budget appropriation for 1910. This the Board of Health agrees to

The Commissioner of Health states that as provision was made in the Budget for the establishment of the additional clinics in 1910, there should be no greater delay than is unavoidable in opening these dispensaries for the benefit of tuberculosis patients. It is proposed that the funds necessary for rental of the premises named for 1910, beginning April 1, be taken from the appropriation made to the Department of Health for the year 1910, entitled No. 290, Division of Communicable Diseases, Contingencies, to the amount of \$2,820.

GENTLEMEN-In the Budget for 1910 \$750 was provided for Account No. 523, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Brooklyn, Forage, Shoeing and Boarding Horses. The said appropriation was to apply to payment for boarding of two horses owned by the Department and the shoeing of said horses during the year 1910. Early in the month of January, 1910, one of the horses died, and, inasmuch as this Department was allowed no moneys in the Borough of Brooklyn for account of the Bureau of Lamps and Lighting for hire of horses and wagons, it will be necessary that certain moneys be transferred for that purpose.

This Department has been informed that for the sum of \$60 per month it can hire one horse and wagon from May 1, 1910, and it will be necessary, to meet the requirements of the Department in this unexpected contingency, to transfer moneys sufficient to meet the said expense, and I would therefore request that the following transfers be made:

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN-In the matter of a request under date of April 18, 1910, from the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for transfers aggregating \$500 within the appropriations made to such Department for the year 1910, I present my report herewith as follows:

The requested transfers are all within the appropriations made for the Bureaus of Lamps and Lighting in the several Boroughs, as follows:

From Borough of Brooklyn-523. Forage, Shoeing and Boarding Horses..... From Borough of Richmond-549. Hired Teams, Horses and Carts..... to Borough of Brooklyn (No. 525), Contingencies..... 500 00

The Budget for 1910 appropriated for account No. 523 the sum of \$750 to provide for the boarding and shoeing of two horses owned by the City, but no allowance was made to the Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Brooklyn, for Hired Teams, Horses and Carts. It appears that owing to the death of one of these two horses soon after the beginning of the year it will be necessary to hire an additional horse to perform the work required during the balance of the current year.

The Commissioner states that this necessary "horse and wagon" can be hired for the sum of \$60 per month or \$480 for the remaining eight months of 1910, and requests that account No. 525, Contingencies, be increased by transferring thereto \$500, or slightly more than the sum required for such eight months' rental. Contingencies being the only appropriation made for the Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Brooklyn, in the 1910 Budget, from which a disbursement for horse and wagon hire can properly be made.

The status of the three accounts in question as reflected on the books of the Department of Finance as of April 39, 1910, was as follows:

The books of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity show a similar status in such accounts except that against account No. 523 there are outstanding liabilities of \$40, making the unencumbered balance therein \$637.55.

It therefore appears that sufficient unencumbered balances exist in accounts No. 523 and No. 549 to permit of the requested transfers therefrom.

In view of the preceding statements, I recommend the adoption of the resolution attached to this report.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on April 12, 1910 (Minutes, page 93), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of \$1,484,000 corporate stock for school buildings, respectfully reports:

That President Winthrop and Commissioner Wilsey, of the Board of Education, ogether with Superintendent of School Buildings Snyder, appeared before the Committee in support of this measure. The discrepancy in the cost of the proposed school buildings was called to their attention, and Superintendent Snyder made the statement that the Board of Education had forwarded a revised estimate of such cost to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in which the Board of Education has asked for an allowance of \$300,000 each for Schools Nos. 61, 46, 168 and 171, and \$240,000 for School No. 44, on which, by the way, they had awarded a contract on December 20.

Mr. Snyder was asked by the Committee to make a written report on this subject, and has forwarded the attached letter, in which he states that reduction may be made in the allowance for Schools 46 and 171 to \$300,000, thus saving \$28,000, but says nothing about a reduction in allowance for School 61, now placed at \$316,000.

In order to have this matter properly adjusted, the Committee recommends that this ordinance be rejected, so that it may be returned to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for such correction as further investigation may prove necessary.

Temporary expedients or intermittent efforts to advance efficiency in street cleaning operations do not prove satisfactory, and it is apparent that the time has come when comprehensive planning, based upon adequate data, must be considered if The City of New York is to show the way in sanitary matters connected with municipal cleaning. For instance, snow removal, refuse collection and final disposition require not only engineering skill, but careful preliminary studies and wise planning covering a period of years for efficient results.

It appears desirable at this time to retain in the service of The City of New York an engineer who has made a wide reputation as an expert in street cleaning matters. The problem of the final disposition of wastes for outlying parts of the City has been solved in Richmond; Queens requires engineering advice so that this Borough may likewise provide adequate means for the sanitary disposal of its wastes. The Department of Street Cleaning, I believe, likewise has many matters on which engineering advice is required,

Under the circumstances, and subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning and President of the Borough of Queens, I wish to ask that the position of "Engineer of Street Cleaning" be established at a salary of \$6,000 per annum for the entire City.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN-In the matter of the proposal of the President of the Borough of Richmond for the establishment of the position of Engineer of Street Cleaning to be attached to the engineering staff of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which matter was referred to the Select Committee on Salaries and Grades, we report as

Under the Charter arrangement the jurisdiction of the Department of Street Cleaning extends only over the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn. This function for the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond is exercised through a bureau in the offices of the Presidents of those Boroughs. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is constantly called upon to appropriate money or to approve plans with regard to street cleaning and matters germane thereto, which matters to a great extent call for engineering skill and experience in order to adequately and wisely determine better, more sanitary or more economical means of collection and disposal of city wastes and the removal of snow. The latter item is a great source of difficulty each year, more particularly in the three Boroughs in which the Department of Street Cleaning has jurisdiction, and of no small consequence in the two Boroughs in which the Presidents of the Boroughs have immediate charge.

The cleaning of streets and related matters are also of great importance, and such studies and plans will require time for their development and undoubtedly will call for the services of an engineer in charge of the work, who should not be hampered by routine duties.

The President of the Borough of Richmond has stated to your committee that an Engineer of Street Cleaning should, if possible, have experience in the details of this kind of work and should be a man technically trained and of recognized standing in this particular branch of engineering skill. He should know from experience and observation the many requisites in this branch of municipal sanitation, and particularly where the present methods may be improved upon; he should know the significance of efficiency work, cost keeping and organization details so that advanced systems may be introduced when necessary and desirable; he should know what other cities are accomplishing in municipal cleaning and should be prepared to advise as to the adoption of the best practice suitable to the condition in New York; he should be an expert in the methods of reduction or incineration of refuse, particularly incineration, as this system of final disposition is urgently needed in many parts of the City, particularly in Queens and Richmond.

The Borough of Queens needs immediate technical assistance in planning and carrying out a comprehensive scheme of refuse disposal; Richmond has a successful method of final disposition in operation and extensions are under way; in Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn systems of refuse collection and disposal need examination, study and advance planning before existing contracts expire, as the Jamaica Bay improvement will probably disturb the existing system of reduction now in use on Barren Island. The snow removal problems for the more congested Boroughs must be studied and tested as to possible improvements and economies in present methods.

It does not appear that the Department of Street Cleaning has at this time an engineer, though some of the District Superintendents and an Inspector employed by the City to supervise the work of sanitary utilization are assisting the Commissioner of Street Cleaning in various investigations. The Borough of Queens has no engineer attached to its Bureau, while the Borough of Richmond has at the head of its Bureau an Engineer.

The cleaning of streets and related work in The City of New York calls for a maintenance appropriation aggregating something over \$8,000,000 for 1910, not counting corporate stock or revenue bond issues. In Queens Borough alone it is estimated that it will cost over \$1,000,000 to construct refuse disposal works suited to the different localities.

In the event of the removal of the Barren Island reduction works, another large plant will have to be provided for.

This Committee would deem that if the refuse and disposal question throughout the City is in need of study and advance planning in order that sanitary and economical methods may be adopted, the City will in time face large expenditures for the construction of permanent plants for various street cleaning and sanitary necessities.

The work being essentially engineering in character to be wisely and consistently executed will require a great deal of preliminary work and a high degree of expert knowledge. It would seem therefore that the creation of an engineering bureau to take charge of the matter will be necessary, unless outside assistance of consulting engineers is resorted to, and experience has proven that the latter class of service has not been altogether satisfactory.

Your Committee believes that the City will economize greatly in the expenditures by taking this matter in hand, and recommends the employment of an engineer whose duty will be to plan, construct and install various structures or methods, which past experience has shown to be necessary in order that the street cleaning may be efficiently executed.

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on the Corporate Stock Budget, to which was referred, on April 29, 1910, a report of the Comptroller, bearing date April 27, 1910, on the question of erecting a municipal bathing house at Coney Island, has considered the report submitted by the Comptroller and desires to report as follows:

1. That the City should erect a municipal bathing house at Coney Island, at the corner of West Fifth street and Concourse drive.

2. That the municipal bathing house to be erected should conform to the general

plans as outlined in the Comptroller's report before mentioned.

3. That the cost of the proposed municipal bathing house should not exceed \$175,000.

4. That the construction and maintenance of the municipal bathing house at Coney Island should be placed in charge of the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

5. That there should be no attempt—certainly not in the beginning—to furnish bathing apparel, it being understood that those availing themselves of the facilities of the establishment furnish their own bathing clothes.

6. That at the proper time a plan of administration for the conduct of the

6. That at the proper time a plan of administration for the conduct of the municipal bathing house should be suggested by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

7. The Committee has also considered certain criticisms of the Comptroller's report to the effect that the plan suggested in that report does not insure sufficient privacy for men. The plan does not contemplate that more than one man shall use a dressing room at the same time. This may on very busy days occasion some delay, but no more than is usually the case in bathing houses when taxed to their capacity.

DEAR SIR—I want to make a house to house inspection in the Borough of Richmond to find out and stop leaks and wasteful use of water. A recent inspection over a limited area resulted in a decrease in the district inspected of about one million gallons daily, and it is estimated that if the inspection is extended over the whole Borough

there will be a decrease in the consumption of water sufficient to save in the cost of pumping for the balance of the year about \$17,600, while the necessary inspection will cost only about one-third of that amount.

To enable me to have such inspection made I respectfully request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transfer the sum of \$5,866.64 from the appropriation entitled and as follows: 463, Water Supply, Borough of Richmond, Collection and Storage, Salaries and Wages, to the appropriation, 483, Water Supply, Borough of Richmond, Water Registration, Permits and Revenue Collections, Salaries and Wages.

The Commissioner states that he desires to make a more thorough inspection of the Borough of Richmond in order to detect and eliminate leaks and waste of water, a recent inspection over a limited area having resulted in a decreased consumption in the inspected district of about one million gallons daily. He further states that if the inspection is extended over the whole Borough the estimated saving in water consumption will result in reducing the present cost of pumping by \$17,600 for the balance of the year, "while the necessary inspection will cost only about one-third of the

amount."

While, generally, I can not recommend the approval of transfers from appropriations for wages to appropriations for salaries, vet since in the present instance the requested modification is apparently predicated on an attempt to reduce the total cost for furnishing the water consumed in the Borough of Richmond and inspecting such

consumption, the approval of such request would appear to be proper.

The change in the amount provided for Mechanical Draftsman is required to make the schedule allowance agree with the present compensation of the incumbent, and the change from Bricklayer's Helpers to Mason's Helpers is required to provide for the present payroll condition. An examination of the amounts thus far charged against the individual line items in schedule No. 463 shows that in no instance has the expenditure up to April 30, 1910, exceeded the amount provided for such line item in the proposed schedule modification.

GENTLEMEN-In the matter of a communication from the Board of Trustees, College of The City of New York, requesting sundry modifications of schedule No. 1068, supporting the corresponding Budget appropriation for salaries and wages, office of the President, and the transfer of \$682.50 to this appropriation from the 1910 allowance for salaries of the teaching corps in order to render the proposed modifications feasible, which has been referred to me by the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, my report is as follows:

The new grades of Registrar of the College at \$2,500 per annum and Secretary to the President at \$2,300 per annum have recently been established under the provisions of section 56 of the Charter to the end that the salaries of Arvid D. Anderson and Hattie L. McCartie, the present incumbents of these positions, might be increased \$350 and \$200 per annum, respectively. In addition to these increases, it is further proposed to increase the salaries of Samuel Newman, Clerk, from \$960 to \$1,050 per annum, Joshua Golubock, Clerk, from \$600 to \$750 per annum, and Benjamin Nachman, Clerk, from \$480 to \$600 per annum.

The intent of the above resolution is to substitute a Veterinarian at \$1,200 per annum for an Inspector of Foods at the same salary. There now exists a vacancy in the latter position among those detailed to the inspection of dairies, outside of New York City, supplying New York with milk, and it is proposed to substitute in lieu thereof a Veterinarian, whose services are urgently required throughout said territory. for the prime purpose of inspecting cattle connected with dairies who propose to supply guaranteed or selected milk.

The requirements of the Sanitary Code affecting such milk necessitate, as a precedent to the issuance of a permit by this Department, an inspection of such herds by a Veterinarian of this Department in order to determine that they are free of all disease, and also to apply the tuberculin test in this connection. It is further required that such examinations and tests be held annually, as a requisite to the renewal of such permits.

There are now several applications for permits to sell guaranteed milk within The City of New York, and the services of such Veterinarian are urgently and immediately

Complaints are frequently received relating to disease existing among cattle connected with dairies supplying The City of New York with milk, and the services of such Veterinarian will be employed in investigating such complaints. The practice heretofore has been for the dairy owner to employ the services of a local practitioner, who sometimes issues a certificate without viewing the cattle, owing to friendship or other onsiderations existing between him and such owner. This practice should obviously be discontinued.

At this time there is no Veterinarian assigned to duty in the Division of Mi'k Inspection. As occasion requires, one is detailed from the Division of Contagious Diseases for short periods. It is now deemed necessary to make a permanent appointment to said Division of Milk Inspection

GENTLEMEN-Three communications presented to the Secretary of your Board from the Board of Health, transmitting copies of resolutions adopted by the Board of Health on March 23 and April 20, respectively, requesting further modifications of schedules supporting Budget appropriations for salaries for the year 1910 for the Department of Health, have been referred to me for consideration.

I would report that it is explained, regarding the request of March 23 for modification of salary schedules No. 258 and No. 272, that the Board of Health made an error in the transfer of a Telephone Switchboard Operator to a clerkship by making the change in Schedule No. 258, instead of No. 272. The salary remained the same. The granting of the modifications requested will adjust the two salary schedules. The request of April 20 is for the transfer of a Telephone Switchboard Operator, at \$900 in Schedule No. 272, to a clerkship at the same salary, the incumbent having qualified by Civil Service examination. In Schedule No. 258 it is also desired to increase the salary of Marcella McGloin, a Typewriter and Stenographer, appointed March 12, 1907. from \$750 to \$900 per annum.

In Schedule No. 266 it is proposed to increase the salary of Jennie Covle, a Typewriting Copyist, from \$600 to \$750. Miss Coyle was appointed on March 28, 1908.

In Schedule No. 303 it is desired to substitute a Veterinarian, at \$1,200 per annum,

for an Inspector of Foods, at the same salary.

The Board of Health claims that the services of a Veterinarian are urgently required in the territory outside of New York City supplying New York with milk, for the purpose of inspecting cattle in dairies which desire to supply guaranteed or selected milk; that complaints are frequently received relating to disease existing among cattle connected with the dairies supplying New York with milk, and the Veterinarian will be employed in investigating such complaints; that at this time there is no Veterinarian assigned to duty in the Division of Milk Inspection, and it is now deemed necessary to make a permanent appointment.

In Schedule No. 308 it is proposed to advance Mrs. Clara N. Allen, a Laboratory

Assistant, at \$900 per annum, to a clerkship at \$1,050.

Dr. William H. Park, in charge at the Research Laboratory, and Commissioner Lederle are especially desirous that the long service and canability of Mrs. Allen shall be recognized. She has been twelve years in the Department, and as a matter of fact has been for some time doing the clerical work of the Research Division. The funds necessary for the increase of \$150 a year in Mrs. Allen's salary will be provided for from the unassigned balance in the item "Helpers."

As the yearly rate of expenditure for salaries is not increased over that fixed in the Budget appropriations for 1910, I recommend that the requests of the Board of

Health be approved.

The Secretary further submits that:

First—As the work proposed is in buildings not owned by the City, the funds required are properly payable from revenue bond appropriations and not from corporate stock funds.

Second—There being an insufficiency of appropriation applicable to the purposes, recourse is properly had to an issue of revenue bonds, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter.

Third—The necessity for the work is best understood when it is remembered that electricity provides the best illuminant for the examination of patients affected with tuberculosis or with contagious eye diseases and for operations.

No. 426 First avenue, Manhattan, is a three-story brick building occupied as one of the additional tuberculosis clinics provided for in the Budget of 1910. Two rooms on the ground floor of a tenement house at No. 490 St. Pauls place, The Bronx, have also been leased for use as a clinic for the extension of the tuberculosis service.

At the time of the preparation of the Budget for 1910, the leasing of those two buildings had not been settled, and no provision was made in the Budget item, Repairs and Replacements by Contract or Open Order, in the Division of Communicable Diseases, which might cover the expense of installing lighting systems now proposed. The Department of Health, in its estimate of expenditures for 1910, asked for \$3,100 for repairs and replacements, but was allowed only \$800, for the reason given above.

No. 330 Throop avenue, Brooklyn, is a three-story frame building occupied as a hospital and clinic for contagious eye diseases. An allowance of \$800 was made in the Budget for 1910 for repairs and replacements in this clinic and the clinic at One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Pleasant avenue, Manhattan. The installation of a lighting system in the Brooklyn clinic was not then considered. The amount of \$800 allowed is sufficient only for purposes exclusive of the proposed lighting installation.

The Commissioner of Health states that there are no funds available for transfer to the Division of Communicable Diseases from other budgetary items, and so he is constrained to request this allowance of \$3,000 in revenue bonds.

In view of the facts above stated, I recommend that your board concur in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting the authorization of the issue of \$3,000 special revenue bonds to provide means for the installation of lighting systems in the three clinics of the Department of Health above mentioned.

Account No. 1593, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Maintenance, Salaries

and Wages-The requested modification contemplates the reduction of the amount allowed for Stationary Engineers by \$2,475 and of that allowed for a Pipe Fitter by \$1,105, as the position will be abolished after May 1. The additions requested consist of a Driver at \$750 and six Laborers at \$750. The amount allowed for the temporary employment of certain mechanics was found to be \$337.50 less than actually necessary, so this item is increased by such amount. The money necessary for these additions is provided from the unassigned balance.

Account No. 1557, Division of Substructures, Salaries and Wages-The transfer of the Automobile Engineman mentioned above from this account to the Administration of Public Buildings and Offices is provided for. The money saved is put into

balance unassigned. As there is nothing contained in these requests which in any way violates the

Budget resolutions for the year 1910, I recommend that the modification be granted and attach the necessary resolutions for such action.



Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart-

ment, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No hid shall be accepted from or contract No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who

is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids

or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, to-gether with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
