

Proceedings of the Board of Revision of Assessments at meeting held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Thursday, February 24, 1910, at 11:05 o'clock a. m.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Regulating, etc., Neruid Avenue.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and placing fences in Neruid avenue, or Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from First street (or Bullard avenue) to White Plains road, and objections of Philip Freudenthaler and J. & M. Haffen, filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 18, 1910.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Regulating, etc., College Avenue.

H. & G. F. Baldwin, attorneys; Thornton Brothers Company and others, filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys; Margaret L. Zborowski as executrix, filed by John F. Lambias, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 18, 1910.

Mr. Truman H. Baldwin, attorney, and Mr. Chambers, attorney, representing Messrs A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, were heard in opposition to the assessment.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Regulating, etc., Emma Street.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying curbs, walks, in Emma street, from Flushing avenue to William street, Second Ward, with objections of Frederick Gillen and others, filed by Albert W. Linton, attorney; Valentine Oster and others, filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys; Gustav Schumacher and others, filed by George L. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 18, 1910.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Sewer in Grand Street.

Sewer in New Utrecht Avenue.

The assessment list for sewer in New Utrecht avenue, between Cropsey and Bath avenues, with objections of James Carmichael, E. Batcher, Edward H. and W. S. Finberg, in person, and communication of the Acting Borough President, of February 4, 1910, transmitting copy of report made on the subject by the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Sewers, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 11, 1910.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller also presented to the Board in connection therewith a communication received by the Board of Assessors from the Acting Borough President, dated February 14, 1910, transmitting copies of petition received, extracts from minutes of the Local Board and reports of the Chief Engineer of Highways and of the Superintendent of Sewers, relative thereto.

The hearing of the objections in the matter was postponed at meeting of February 17, 1910, for one week, upon request of counsel.

Mr. Herman A. Ruebsamen, attorney, was heard in behalf of the objectors in opposition to the assessment.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

Report of Transactions, January 31 to February 6, 1910.

Communications Received.

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Under date of February 1, 1910, Secretary transmits copy of resolutions adopted January 28, 1910, calling attention to section 1542 of the New York City Charter in regard to requests for transfers of funds. The Board suggests that all requests for such transfers, pursuant to section 237 of the Charter, shall be filed, as far as may be practicable, with the Board before the depletion of the appropriation which is to be replenished. On file with General Book-keeper and Auditor.

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Assistant Secretary transmits copy of resolution adopted January 28, 1910, in regard to compensation of per diem employees, as fixed in accompanying schedule. Receipt acknowledged. This Department is complying with schedule of per diem rates as established.

From the Judges of the Court of General Sessions—In regard to visits of lawyers and their clerks to prisoners in the City Prison, Manhattan. The Judges order that rules in regard to such visits as set forth in order of April 20, 1909, be strictly enforced, with the amendment made by striking out the words "except as an ordinary visitor."

To Warden, Deputy Warden and Head Keeper, City Prison, Manhattan: You are hereby directed to comply with the resolutions adopted by the Court of General Sessions on April 20, 1909, and as amended on January 10, 1910.

To the Clerk of Court of Special Sessions: Enclosing copy of above order.

From Civil Service Commission—Acknowledging receipt of copies of resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, in 1906, fixing grades and salaries of Keepers in the Department of Correction. The Commission asks for further information, viz.:

Are the duties of all Keepers in the Department practically the same, regardless of the salary paid?

Answer—Practically, yes.

Is it customary in your Department to advance the salaries of all Keepers when they have served the necessary length of time, provided their services have been satisfactory?

Answer—If services have been satisfactory, yes.

Above information given by Commissioner upon data furnished as to past procedure in this Department.

Civil Service Commission also states that promotion examinations will be held for Keepers who are eligible for increase of salary, as soon as possible.

Action of Department in increasing salaries of Keepers on January 17, 1910, is hereby rescinded, in accordance with ruling of Civil Service Commission. Promotions deferred until such time as Keepers shall have passed the required examinations.

Copies of letter from Civil Service Commission in regard to promotion examinations for Keepers before their salaries can be increased, sent to Heads of Institutions in this Department.

From the Comptroller—Returning proposal of James D. Browne for groceries, for substitution of sureties. Substitution approved.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—Stating that a voucher had been filed in the Department of Finance in favor of Peter A. Mallon, Warden of District Prisons, for \$18.25, for disbursements made in visits to the prisons. The Comptroller asks for

information as to location of these prisons; also as to the necessity of this expenditure. Comptroller informed as to location of the nine (9) District Prisons. The Warden is required to visit each one daily. It is considered more economical to pay car fare, rather than to have a horse and wagon.

From the Department of Public Charities—Enclosing request for the transfer of Edwin A. Malone, Clerk, from Department of Correction to that of Public Charities, Approved. Consent in duplicate, signed and returned.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, bread, milk, etc., for week ending January 29, 1910, agreed with specifications of the contracts. On file.

From Heads of Institutions—Reports, census, labor, hospital cases, punishments, etc., for week ending January 29, 1910. On file.

From City Prison, Manhattan—Report of fines received during week ending January 29, 1910; from Court of Special Sessions, \$90; from City Magistrates' Court, \$10. Total, \$100. On file.

From City Prison, Manhattan—Report of fines received during month of January, 1910; from Court of Special Sessions, \$95; from City Magistrates' Courts, \$261. Total, \$356. Delivered to City Chamberlain, \$356. On file.

From District Prisons—Report of fines received during week ending January 29, 1910; from City Magistrates' Courts, \$549. On file.

From District Prisons—Report of fines received during month of January, 1910; from City Magistrates' Courts, \$2,448.50. Delivered to City Chamberlain, \$2,445.50; Health Department Pension Fund, \$3. Total, \$2,448.50. On file.

From District Prisons—Warden of District Prisons reports that Michael McCaffrey, committed in Night Court for vagrancy, was found to be ill with diphtheria. Board of Health notified, and prisoner transferred to Willard Parker Hospital, where two Keepers have been assigned to guard him, day and night. Cell, bedding, etc., thoroughly disinfected by the Department of Health. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—List of prisoners received during week ending January 29, 1910: Men, 63; women, 7. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island (Manufacturing Bureau)—Reporting rejection of boys' lasts received from P. J. Constant, "not like sample; not right shape." Request contractor to make proper delivery at once. Send copy of Warden's letter.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—Warden reports that articles required by the Department of Bridges, Borough of The Bronx, and by Department of Parks, Brooklyn and Queens, cannot be furnished at present. Approved. Certificate transmitted.

From Workhouse, Blackwells Island—Reporting that fines paid at Workhouse during week ending January 29, 1910, amounted to \$45. On file.

From Workhouse, Blackwells Island—Death, on February 4, 1910, of Edward Carlin, aged fifty years. Friends unknown. On file.

From Harts Island—Warden reports that sterilizer, etc., which was to be put up by A. Winternitz, contractor, in new laundry building, had been received, but that new building (which is being erected by Department labor) is not ready for it. Warden thinks that the basement of Pavilion No. 1 is in every way a suitable place for this plant, and Department Inspector approves of suggestion of Warden, and states that there will be no extra cost on contract. Recommendations approved.

From Harts Island—From Mr. F. Boyle, relative to contract of M. A. Ryan, Inc., for isolation building, asking for an extension of time, owing to the very severe weather since contract was awarded. Receipt acknowledged. Mr. Boyle informed that the People's Surety Company has been notified that thirty-five of the one hundred days allowed for the completion of the contract have passed, and work has not yet been begun. The Department may have to call on the Surety Company to begin work.

From City Cemetery, Harts Island—List of interments made in City Cemetery during week ending January 29, 1910. On file.

From City Prison, Brooklyn—From Warden, stating that he had been informed that former Commissioner Barry had received a letter from the Clerk of a Brooklyn Court to the effect that he (the Warden) "has refused to receive" prisoners surrendered by persons who were on the bail bonds of such prisoners. The Warden states that he has done this when the prisoners had not been regularly committed to the prison. In the few cases which have occurred, the Warden has asked that such prisoners be regularly committed, and he has then received them. Copy of letter from Mr. Joseph L. Kerrigan, Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, and copy of Warden's letter sent to Corporation Counsel and his opinion asked in regard to receiving prisoners when surrendered on bail bonds, but for whom no commitment is presented.

From City Prison, Brooklyn—From Messrs. D'Onch & Yost, architects, stating that samples of plumbing fixtures for Raymond Street Jail Improvement, submitted by Brady & Co., contractors, and now at central office of the Department, are satisfactory. Department Inspector recommends that fixtures, as proposed by contractors, be adopted. Architects informed that fixtures are approved.

From City Prison, Brooklyn—From Martin J. Burke, in charge of Department Stables, stating that old harness turned over by the Sheriff's Office to the Department of Correction, and which has been in use for some years, is not worth repairing. On file.

From City Prison, Brooklyn—Report of fines received during week ending January 29, 1910; from Court of Special Sessions, \$25; from City Magistrates' Courts, \$16. Total, \$41. On file.

Communications Transmitted.

To the State Commissioner of Labor—Transmitting list of contracts awarded in the Department of Correction since date of last report, January 20, 1910, with amounts of such contracts, names of contractors and of the sureties thereon.

To the People's Surety Company—Stating that Contractor M. A. Ryan, Inc., has delayed beginning work on contract for Isolation Building, Harts Island. In accordance with terms of contract, work must be completed within one hundred days and thirty-five days have already passed. The Department may have to call on surety to complete the work.

To Heads of Institutions, Department of Correction—It is hereby ordered that all horses in the Department of Correction be numbered, and the stalls also numbered to correspond. Martin J. Burke, in charge of Central Stables of the Department, will do the numbering of horses at all Department stables.

To Warden of the Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—Requisitions for all supplies for manufacturing purposes, for 1910, must be prepared with a view to having all materials delivered before December 31, 1910.

Report of the President for the Year Ending December 31, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE MCANENY, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—The following is a summary of the work done by the Department of Public Works and by the Bureau of Buildings during the year 1909:

The Cashier collected \$555,631.74 for permits for various purposes. The contracts entered into numbered 200, and involved an estimated cost of \$3,878,171.38. One hundred and sixty-eight contracts were completed at an aggregate cost of \$2,445,810.59.

Twenty-five and one-half miles of new pavement were laid, the total mileage of paved streets being 439.13. More than one-half the area of new pavement laid was sheet asphalt. The average cost of sheet asphalt on a six-inch concrete foundation, with five years' guarantee of maintenance, was \$2.13. The price in 1908 was \$2.40 $\frac{1}{2}$. For restoring pavement damaged by fire burns the sum of \$16,501 was expended. The amount paid for similar repairs in 1908 was \$27,811. Thirty-one thousand eight hundred permits were issued to make openings in pavements, an increase of 4,000 over the preceding year. Property owners applied for and received 4,635 permits to repair sidewalks.

Ten hundred and thirty permits were issued for bay windows and for ornamental projections, the receipts for these permits being \$17,405.39.

To the sewerage system there were added 1.67 miles of sewers and 14 receiving basins, making the total length of the sewerage system 523.34 miles with 6,348 receiving basins.

The public baths in this Borough were patronized by male and female bathers numbering 5,271,422.

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 4,350 complaints of obstructions, made 720 seizures and removals of incumbrances; issued 4,398 permits to place building material on streets, 729 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and carts and 602 permits to erect sheds over sidewalks.

The Bureau of Buildings filed plans and specifications for the erection of 995 new buildings at an estimated cost of \$131,246,483.

Asphalt Block.

Asphalt block pavement was continued in use on grades and where same was petitioned for by the property owners, which often occurs in the northern part of the Borough.

The average price for asphalt block pavement on bids received during 1909, on six inches of concrete with a five-year guarantee, has been \$2.70 per square yard, as against \$2.83 in 1908.

The total amount of this pavement laid is 5.57 miles.

Wood Block.

Wood block has also been in considerable demand, the work which is being done having been done only on petition by the property owners. It is particularly desirable on account of its noiselessness and its principal objection is its slipperiness. It should not be laid upon grades of more than two per cent. on that account.

The average cost of this pavement on bids received during 1909 on six inches of concrete with a five-year guarantee has been \$3.34, as against \$4.27 for 1908. The reason for this decrease in price is probably due to a great extent to the change in specifications.

The specifications for 1908 called for the blocks to be treated with a mixture composed of 75 parts of creosote oil and 25 parts of resin; also for the blocks to be 3 1/2 inches deep and the period of maintenance to be ten years.

The specifications under which the bids were received this year require that the mixture should be of antiseptic and waterproofing oil of a specific gravity of 1.12; that the blocks should be four inches deep and the period of maintenance five years.

It will be noted that these two changes would cause a reduction in the cost, namely: the disuse of resin and the reduction of the maintenance period from ten to five years; and that the change from 3 1/2 to 4 inches in depth would cause an increase in price, so that it is difficult to tell just to which one this change should be attributed.

The amount of this pavement laid during the year was 2.29 miles and a number of contracts remain unfinished.

Regulating, Grading, etc.

In addition to the paving, work has been carried on upon eight contracts for regulating, grading, etc., four of which have been completed.

ASPHALT REPAIRS.

Sheet Asphalt.

The keeping in repair the asphalt pavements out of guarantee is a very important part of the work in this Bureau, and on account of its detail requires a great amount of work.

On January 1, 1909, there were out of guarantee 1,865,795 square yards of sheet asphalt. Of this there were maintained by the Park Department 19,150 square yards and by the different street railroads 98,690 square yards, leaving to be maintained by the Bureau 1,747,950 square yards.

Of the above amount there were resurfaced during the year 91,470 square yards, leaving at the end of the year 1,656,480 square yards.

During the year there expired 539,160 square yards, of which there were maintained by the various street railroads 27,630 square yards, leaving an amount to be maintained by the Bureau on January 1, 1910, of 2,168,010 square yards.

In addition there were maintained by the various street railroad companies 126,324 square yards and by the Park Department 19,150 square yards, leaving a total in the Borough out of guarantee of 2,313,489 square yards.

On account of the maintenance period expiring at different seasons of the year and as certain streets have been resurfaced as above, the total average area maintained by the Bureau during 1909 was 1,905,420 square yards.

For keeping this in repair there were paid for wear and tear \$223,595, or an average per yard of 11.7 cents. In 1908 the average cost was 17 cents.

The area actually laid in 1908 was 15 per cent. of the total area maintained, while in 1909 it was 12 per cent. of the actual area maintained; the cost for the four previous years being as follows:

The reduced cost, as shown above, is caused by a reduction in the unit price as well as the increased amount to be maintained, the judicious resurfacing of several of the worst streets and possibly each year more careful looking after the work.

Asphalt Block.

On January 1, 1909, there were out of guarantee 337,766 square yards, of which the various street railways maintain 10,482 square yards, leaving to be maintained by the Bureau 327,284 square yards.

Guarantees expired during the year on contracts amounting to 35,782 square yards, of which there were maintained by the various street railway companies 1,790 square yards and by the Bureau 33,992 square yards, making the amount to be maintained by the Bureau on January 1, 1910, 361,276 square yards and by the various street railways 12,272 square yards, or 373,548 square yards.

The average amount maintained by the City during 1909 was 343,020 square yards, and there were paid for wear and tear for this work \$37,483, or per square yard 10.9 cents, which is one-tenth of one cent more than in 1908. But it must be understood that in 1908 there were not funds sufficient to continue the repairs during the year, but in 1909 they were kept in good condition all the time and it is probable that in 1910 the cost can be reduced slightly but not to any great extent.

The cost of this same work in 1908 was \$276,271.58. It will be noticed that during 1909 the work cost \$16,000 more than in 1908, although there were about 800,000 square yards more of asphalt to be maintained.

FIRE BURNS.

Asphalt.

A large amount of pavement is destroyed every year by bonfires built by boys or other irresponsible persons upon the asphalt pavements. While the cost of the same is being reduced materially each year, still it seems that it is very much larger than it should be.

In one case serious damage was done by fires on a pavement which had not been laid more than two weeks.

The fire burns paid for in 1909, as given above, amounted to \$16,501, while in 1908 the cost was \$27,811. It must be understood, however, that the above represents the cost only of the fire burns in guaranteed streets, as the repairs to streets out of guarantee are paid for in the maintenance contract. This shows a gratifying decrease in cost, but the actual cost should be decreased each year as the amount of pavement under guarantee decreases each year.

Wood.

In 1909 there were 90 square yards of wood pavement damaged by fires, which were repaired at an expense of \$232, as against 176 square yards in 1908 repaired at an expense of \$464.48.

Abandoned Contracts.

The keeping in repair the pavement on the streets where the contracts have been abandoned has been done by letting a contract early in the season for making repairs during the year 1909. The cost of same was paid for out of the retained percentages and a fund created by the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, amounting to \$50,000, for this especial purpose.

The streets have all been kept in good condition during the season except the last few weeks, where, on some of them, the money has been exhausted and the necessary repairs could not be made.

As was stated under the different kinds of pavement, Central Park West, from Fifty-ninth street to One Hundred and Tenth street, has been repaved with asphalt, and a portion of First avenue repaved with granite on account of the excessive expense of keeping the same in repair.

Openings in Pavements.

The openings made in the different kinds of pavement by the different corporations, plumbers and the Water Department are the source of more trouble to the users of the streets and damage to the pavement than almost any other cause. It is impossible to prevent them entirely, but an endeavor has been made to keep their number to a minimum and to have them restored as soon as possible.

During the year there have been 31,800 permits issued for openings, an increase of about 4,000 over last year. This is unquestionably due to the change in the financial condition, as the number issued in 1908 was lower than usual. While probably all of these were not used, they represent practically the number of openings made in the pavements under the authority of this Bureau.

In addition to these, a large number has been made by the Water Department in making their repairs, as this Department does not obtain permits for such work. Of the above 2,203 were plumbers' permits.

In addition to such openings there were 270 building operations in carrying out which pavements were disturbed, 263 of which have been completed and which require the laying of 61,126 square yards of pavement. Seven remain incomplete, and these will require the restoration of about 550 square yards of pavement.

Sidewalks.

During the year 4,635 permits were issued to property owners to repair sidewalks, and 693 issued to builders for crossing sidewalks for excavating and filling lots; 9,232 notices were served on property owners, occupants of premises, to repair sidewalks.

In addition, three contracts were carried out for repairing sidewalks, and one for fencing vacant lots.

During the year eight resolutions were passed by the Board of Aldermen, authorizing the renumbering of streets or parts of streets, and the streets have been renumbered and the property owners notified to change the numbers with the exception of Fort Washington avenue, from One Hundred and Fifty-ninth to Elwood street. Plans are being prepared now.

Viaducts.

During the year the contracts for painting the Riverside Drive Viaduct as well as the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct were completed. In both instances, however, the original contractor threw up the contract and the same was finished by the surety companies.

The cost of the work on the Riverside Drive Viaduct was \$12,377, and on the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct, \$9,745.

Chemical Laboratory.

I quote herewith the report of the Chemist of this Bureau, and can only add that I think his work is extremely important and has been of much value to the Bureau:

Two thousand three hundred and thirty-seven (2,337) samples were collected by our own representatives either directly from the line of work or from the plants of the various contractors. These samples include both the finished product as well as the several constituents used in manufacturing these products, and are classified as follows:

"Detailed reports, giving the results of the above tests, are in your possession, as, also, reports on investigations regarding coal tar creosote oils, water gas tars, wood blocks, oil asphalt, paint oils and other subjects.

"In addition to our regular work, an investigation was carried on for the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices relating to lubricating oils, and specifications were drawn up for that Bureau for both engine and cylinder oils.

"During the year the structures of the Riverside Drive Viaduct and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct were repainted, and this necessitated analyzing numerous samples of pigments, oils and paints. It is gratifying to know that these structures, after considerable delay, have now been repainted in strict accordance with the requirements as laid down in the specifications for this work.

"The most notable feature of the past year is the marked improvement that has been made in the manufacture of the wood blocks of our wood block pavements. The blocks, as laid down to-day show a more uniform and far better penetration than formerly. Consequently the blocks possess a higher grade of resistance to water absorption, which is equivalent to a greater resistance to those influences causing decay.

"At the same time these blocks, although they contain the full amount of oil demanded by the specifications, have been impregnated with a much smaller proportion of creosote or waterproofing oil than was formerly used. This is a condition which is much to be desired, since an excess of oil results in a gradual oozing out of this excess, causing annoyance to pedestrians, and hindering traffic in general unless the surface is well sanded.

"The favorable results obtained to-day are due, in part, to the better quality of the waterproofing oil that is being used in treating the blocks; that is, although the specific gravity of the oil has remained constant, the viscosity is considerably less, permitting a better penetration.

"The chief cause, however, of these favorable results is a better process which the manufacturer follows in treating the blocks and certain investigations carried on by us in our laboratory were the direct means of enabling the manufacturer to do this.

"It is in this way, namely, through experimental work, that the laboratory is, can be and should be of the greatest value to the City. Unfortunately, the force of the laboratory to-day, consisting as it does of the Chemist and one Attendant, is so small and the routine work demands so much attention, that comparatively little time can be devoted to research and experimental work. The past year's work represents the maximum amount that can be accomplished by our force, and yet the amount of work that ought to be done is continuously increasing. Moreover, every now and then important special matters arise, requiring immediate attention, so that the routine work suffers seriously in consequence, and construction work is often well under way or finished before analyses can be completed.

"For these reasons the laboratory force ought to be increased by several laboratory Assistants. These men could be trained to carry on the routine work so that more attention could be paid to special work, to research work, to the collection of data, so that more suitable specifications could be drawn, thus permitting of wider competition and so that better results in general might be obtained.

"The additional expense of such Assistants would be negligible compared to the benefits that the City would derive, for, with several trained Assistants, not only would the work be greatly expedited, but the Chemist himself could give his attention to far more productive and important work."

Hon. GEORGE McANENY, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith the annual report showing the work performed and operations carried on by this Bureau during the year 1909.

The following is a brief statement of what has been accomplished and reference is made to accompanying schedules and tables for all details:

In connection with the above work fourteen receiving basins were constructed. It appears, therefore, from the above, that 1.67 miles of sewers and fourteen receiving basins were added to the Borough system, making a total of 523.34 miles of sewers and 6,348 receiving basins. Classified according to material of construction there were:

The estimated cost of this work is \$89,634.64.

Contracts have been awarded but not executed for sewer in Park avenue, between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, and sewer in One Hundred and Fiftieth street, between Riverside drive and Broadway, and receiving basins at the northeast and southeast corners of One Hundred and Ninety-third street and Fort George avenue (estimated cost, \$4,812.81).

There is also advertised for letting a sewer in Theatre alley, between Ann and Beckman streets (estimated cost, \$4,000).

The work mentioned in the above statement has, as in previous years, been located in widely separated parts of the City. The work in the Dyckman tract, in the north-

erly part of the Borough, is now finished, with the exception of one incomplete contract in Emerson street, with branches in Broadway. Adjoining this tract on the west is a section of undeveloped territory which has recently been mapped and the streets declared legal streets, and property owners are taking steps to have sewerage and drainage plans adopted so that the improvement of this property may be entered upon the next season.

Other works have been constructed in various parts of the City, the most southerly being at Avenue A, between Eleventh and Twelfth streets. In the lower part of the City there are a great number of single blocks which are without public sewers. Altogether this amounts to quite a large mileage. The total length of unsewered streets in all parts of the Borough is estimated at 23 miles. Although in built up portions of the City drainage is secured to nearby sewers, still from time to time new buildings are erected and new sewers are required. The immense traffic in such streets, however, causes such work to be put off until it becomes an absolute necessity.

Considerable work has been done by public and private corporations. The Public Service Commission, under an act of the Legislature, is building the largest sewers now under construction in the City in connection with the Williamsburg Loop Subway notably a large outlet in Duane street, from Centre street to the Hudson River. This Commission ignores the City authorities, claiming the right to do such work without supervision. Realty companies and private individuals have also constructed sewers under permit from this Department, and under its supervision on the ground that the process required by the Charter was too slow to meet their needs.

There is no great area in this Borough now lacking a system of sewers. There are, of course, several isolated tracts which are likely to be opened for improvement in the near future. The main work, however, is likely to be the reconstruction of worn-out and inadequate sewers, and river-front work in connection with the extension of outlets to ends of piers when the same are constructed from time to time by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

The law requires the City to be divided into sewerage districts and that a drainage plan be designed and adopted which shall be filed in the offices of the Register, Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Corporation Counsel. The sewers filed under the original plan were not all built and amendments thereto are now filed singly. It would be a saving of time and expedite public improvements if sewers for all streets now unprovided with the same were filed so that no delay would occur when these separate works are called for, and I recommend that such maps and plans be made.

The pipe sewer system laid in the years 1868-1873 should be rebuilt, being much out of repair and costing large sums to keep in order and liable to frequent stoppage, which often results in great damage to adjacent property. There are about fifty-five miles of such sewers.

Without repeating statements of my last report, I may say the conditions are similar to those described in that report in reference to work of the Public Service Commission, the work of corporations and others. The same might be said of the discharge of sewage into the waters of the Hudson, Harlem and East Rivers. Some new outlets have been constructed and are now under way, and these will be continued as fast as piers for such extensions are available.

In the contracts which have been made after public letting it will be seen that the work is now in a few hands, not more than four to six bids being received in answer to any advertisement. An examination of such bids shows that material items, such as rock excavation and timber, are bid for at 00 or one cent per unit of quantity. This is known as an unbalanced bid, it being understood that the proper prices for such items are added to other items where no variation in quantity is expected. Such bids are highly objectionable, as they often result in a change in the order of bidders on final estimate.

To correct this evil I recommend the adoption of the methods of percentage bidding. This system is coming into vogue in many places, and is used with success in the Borough of Brooklyn. The method is set forth in the following paragraph, taken from the Brooklyn contract and specification:

"The following Engineer's preliminary estimate of total cost for the completed work is to be taken as the one hundred per cent. (100%) basis for bidding. Proposals shall state a single percentage on such one hundred per cent. (100%) cost (i. e., such as 95%, 100% or 105%) for which all material and work called for in the contract and invitation to bidders is to be furnished to the City. Such percentage, as bid, shall apply to all unit items specified in the Engineer's preliminary estimate to an extent necessary to complete the work described in the contract."

This method absolutely eliminates all chance for unbalanced bids and secures reasonable prices for each item.

The maintenance of our sewer system has been directly supervised by Mr. Andrew A. Noonan, Superintendent of Maintenance, whose time is devoted to the work of cleaning sewers and receiving basins, and by Mr. William Klein, who has charge of the repair work of mechanics and who investigates and reports on the matter of complaints.

A general contract for repairs to sewers has been in force during the past year, and all work too large to be properly handled by our force of mechanics has been done under it. Certain deficiencies in the year 1908 contract were removed and the present contract has worked satisfactorily.

I recommend that a similar contract be let for the coming year. The same order could be applied with profit to cleaning sewers and basins. Nothing is of greater benefit to the City at large and more productive of good sanitary conditions than a sewer system which is clean and in good running order. A contract of this character was in force some years ago, and resulted in great efficiency and promptness in carrying on that branch of the service.

The Assistant Engineer in charge of the drafting room reports that the following work was done:

Sixteen file plans, 4 files, 4 plans each.

Nineteen contract plans, of which 15 were for sewers and 4 for receiving basins. Twenty-four inspectors' books.

Six benefit maps.

Forty-four assessment lists, consisting of 100 sheets of maps and showing 1,244 separate pieces of property.

In addition to the above the new series of large scale working maps was increased by 33 sheets, bringing the total number up to 74, of which 49 are completed and 25 in progress. The Assistant Engineer states that for this purpose actual examination of sewers, as constructed, had to be made, and of these there were required 1,047, of which 620 were made this year. Further describing this work he states that these sheets cover most of the territory between Forty-fourth and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets, from river to river. Those completed during the past year cover the territory between Fifty-ninth and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets, west of Central Park West. Their preparation involved great care in consequence to the many changes in the sewers made by the construction of the underground railway.

During the past year 853 permits for house connections were issued and 602 for repairs.

There were tested in the Cement Laboratory 280 samples of cement (three briquettes to each sample) making 840 tests altogether. Out of the total only 6 samples were rejected as not coming up to the specifications.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices,
Superintendent's Office, Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row,
New York, January 27, 1910.

Hon. GEORGE McANENY, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith a brief report of the business of this Bureau for the year 1909:

Statement "A," herewith attached, contains a schedule of the public buildings, courts, offices, baths and comfort stations under the supervision of the Bureau, and the places

where supplies are furnished, cleaning done and work performed, together with a statement of the number of employees engaged in the maintenance of public buildings and offices therein mentioned.

Statement "B," hereto attached, shows the contracts completed and in operation during the year 1909.

Statement "C," hereto attached, gives the list of architects under contract with the Bureau and performing professional services.

Statement "D," attached hereto, gives the approximate cost for care and maintenance of various public buildings and offices, baths and comfort stations, as per vouchers transmitted for the years 1908 and 1909.

Statement "E," hereto attached, shows the number of patrons of the interior and free floating public baths for the past year; also gives the number of orders and the estimated value of the work performed by the several mechanical squads employed by the Bureau.

Communications and reports upon various subjects affecting the Bureau to the number of 1,682 were prepared and transmitted.

Requisitions to the number of 1,938 were transmitted for the issuance of orders, amounting to \$131,885.17. Vouchers were prepared and transmitted to the number of 2,340, amounting to \$1,487,860.79, which consisted of claims on orders, contracts and payrolls.

The Bureau has exercised persistent efforts in the conservation of the City's interests in the purchase of supplies, and I feel that the result strive for has been, as far as possible under all the circumstances, successfully accomplished, by means of the competitive system, where the amount involved and the circumstances warranted its use. It has been my practice to request competitive bids on all supplies or repairs where the amount involved is \$100 or more, and very often when in doubt as to the reasonableness of figures submitted to ask for additional figures on amounts less than \$100. The field of operations in this regard has been considerably broadened for the past two years, so that the work of the Bureau is transacted, as near as possible, exactly the same as if a private business was concerned. A thorough system for the distribution of all charges has been in successful operation during the past year in the "cost of maintenance ledger." It is proposed to effect still further improvement in this regard by the establishment of a more perfect system of returns from the various mechanical squads employed in the Bureau. A record has been in operation during the year showing the volume of work performed by these squads. Arrangement for the proper handling of the general supply contracts has been in operation and proves of great value in the auditing of contract claims under this heading, by means of card index.

Owing to the insufficiency of the clerical help in the Bureau during the past year I was unable to establish a catalogue and price list system for the information of those engaged on the work of inspection and certification of claims. However, I believe I will be able to have this in operation early this year. This system will consist of a library of catalogues and price lists of all reputable business houses selling supplies or performing work with which this Bureau would have to deal. This will be a more businesslike mode of operation, and save considerable work and trouble that exists at present by reason of the necessity of going out into the open market and making inquiries from business houses as to the market value of supplies.

The condition of the Criminal Courts Building during the past year has been a subject of a great deal of thought and anxiety on the part of the Bureau, and the matter has been given considerable publicity in the press owing to the alarming condition of unseitement which developed for some time past, and more especially during the latter part of the year. I desire to say that the Bureau exercises constant vigilance in respect to this structure and consulted and advised with Messrs. Miller & Moran, the engineers appointed by the President of the Borough to make observations of the building and to submit reports regarding same. The building has been propped, braced and braced so as to protect life and limb, and business has been resumed by the officials occupying the same, and is now being conducted in the usual orderly manner, without any alarm or excitement.

During the year three interior public baths were opened to the public, namely, Carmine street, Oliver and Cherry streets and Rutgers place. This gives the Borough of Manhattan eleven interior public baths, all of which add not only to the health and pleasure of the patrons thereof, but in some instances enhance the architectural features of the localities in which these buildings are located. The opening of the last one of Oliver and Cherry streets was considerably delayed, after the same was certified as completed by the architects, owing to the test of the steam plant by the Bureau showing that boilers of insufficient horse-power were installed. The building was therefore not accepted and the builders and architects notified to remove the boilers referred and install new ones subject to the approval of the Bureau, which was satisfactorily performed.

In relation to the free floating public baths, which were in a suspended condition during the summer, I desire to report that an especial effort will be made during the coming season to procure additional berths to those obtained during 1909. Of the fifteen baths, the property of this Borough, the Bureau was successful in letting only twelve on account of the difficulty of obtaining the consent and approval of the Department of Docks and Ferries to certain locations requested. These baths have been safely towed from their berths and located in their winter quarters at the foot of Twenty-second street, South Brooklyn, which property is obtained on the basis of a monthly tenancy from the Union Dime Savings Bank of Brooklyn. In the acceptance of bids on the first letting for the usual repairs to these baths I recommended the rejection of the lowest estimate, which was \$13,499 on account of its being so much in excess of the approximate cost placed on same by the Foreman of Baths and on a second letting our action and judgment was verified by closing and accepting the contract for \$9,875, resulting in a saving in this single instance of \$3,624.

I would call to your careful consideration the matter of adjusting the salaries of Chief Attendants and the Assistants in charge of public baths who at present receive \$1,050 and \$900 per annum. I am of the opinion that the responsibilities involved and the intelligence and judgment necessary for the proper performance of their duties should command at least a compensation of \$1,200 per annum, especially in view of the excessive cost of living at this period which, of course, materially reduces the compensation allowed. I would also recommend that the method of control of the Chief Attendant be so arranged that he will have knowledge of the operations of both shifts in the baths and so divide his time that supervision of the same can be exercised during the entire period the same are open, thus enabling the Bureau to fix a definite responsibility on the employee in charge and not have the same divided as at present, which works materially against efficient administration.

I would also suggest that the salary of Laborers be made uniform and fixed at the sum of at least \$250 per diem.

In conclusion I desire to express my sincere appreciation of the assistance rendered by employees of the Bureau who have when necessary been willing to sacrifice for the time their personal interests to that of the City and who throughout the year have given faithful, honest and conscientious service to the work of this Department.

Hon. GEORGE McANENY, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—I respectfully submit herewith the following report of the operations of this Bureau for the year ending December 31, 1909:

During the past year about 800 more complaints of obstructions were received and attended to than during the previous year, and the number of building material permits also shows a slight increase. More than 200 special permits to cross the sidewalks with horses and carts and 186 more permits to erect temporary sheds over the sidewalks were issued than during 1908.

The receipts of the Bureau, which were derived from permits issued for temporary sheds over sidewalks, and cost \$5 each; the redemption of seized articles, and the net proceeds of the auction sale of unredeemed goods, amounted to nearly \$1,200 more than the year previous.

The appropriation Salaries and Wages as allowed in the fall of 1908 for the year 1909 was \$18,260.50, from which had to be paid the monthly salaries of the Superintendent, two Clerks, seven Inspectors, one Foreman and one Keeper, and the weekly salaries of one Foreman at \$3.50 per diem and two Laborers at \$2 per diem, which was subsequently increased to \$2.50 per diem.

The appropriation allowed for Contingencies was \$7,000 as against \$9,652.50 allowed the previous year. From this \$7,000 had to be paid the cost of the removal of obstructions to the corporation yards; the removal of dirt, stone and rubbish, etc.; the removal of fallen trees, dangerous stumps and posts; horse, wagon and driver hire for the Superintendent, and carfare expenses of the Inspectors.

As the amount allowed for Salaries and Wages would not cover the expenditures for the year, on January 15, 1909, by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the sum of \$1,460 was transferred from the appropriation Contingencies to that of Salaries and Wages, thus making that appropriation \$19,720.50 for the year and leaving but \$5,340 to expend for the items above mentioned as drawn against Contingencies.

This small amount, in view of the number of complaints received and the other items of expense to be paid therefrom, required the strictest economy in its disbursement.

On November 12, 1909, however, by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the sum of \$500 was transferred from an unexpended balance in the Bureau of Highways to this appropriation, which thus allowed us the sum of \$6,040 for the year, of which sum there is an unexpended balance of \$391.65.

3. Articles carried in stock in storeroom shall be issued only on order of this Division.

Fire Apparatus.

1. This Division shall have charge of the maintenance and repair of the fire apparatus.

2. All fire apparatus requiring repair shall be invoiced to the Chief of this Division, and upon completion of repair shall be returned in like manner.

Horses.

1. This Division shall maintain a supervision of horses, horseshoeing and veterinary services.

2. Shall maintain a complete record of all horses in the Department.

3. Commanding officers desiring horses to be shod shall notify this Bureau, which shall issue the necessary orders.

4. Shall maintain a proper inspection as to quality of forage issued to the Department.

5. Shall have charge of all unassigned horses of the Department.

6. Shall have charge of the veterinary hospital and training stables.

Buildings.

1. Shall have charge of the preparation of plans, specifications and contracts for all construction or alterations or repairs on buildings.

2. Shall be responsible for the maintenance of buildings in proper order.

3. Shall maintain a force of Department mechanics necessary to make minor repairs from time to time for the maintenance of buildings.

Stores.

Shall have charge of all property of the Department, other than apparatus, in the storerooms of the Department.

MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF CHESTER, TWENTY-THIRD DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the members of the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-third District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, in the Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, on January 28, 1910, at 8:30 p. m.

Present—All members of the Local Board.

Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as typewritten.

President Miller announced that he had caused to be sent out to all the property owners' associations in The Bronx, and to the local newspapers, a complete copy of all the calendars of the Local Boards in this Borough, informing them as to the petitions to be presented at the various meetings to be held here this evening, and

that he had also caused to be presented by the Engineering Bureaus the average cost per foot frontage of each improvement as petitioned for, and that this course would also be pursued in the future, so that property owners would know approximately the cost of the proposed work, and thus be able to tell whether they desire to have the work commenced or not. Property owners will consequently be given every opportunity to be heard for or against any improvement when presented for hearing before the Local Board, and if they are not heard, it will not be the fault of this office.

The work of defining the average cost per foot frontage of sewer improvements, President Miller explained, was a more difficult proposition than in the case of other improvements. The amount of assessment for sewer construction per foot frontage would depend entirely on the action to be taken by the Board of Assessors in reference to their decision as to the area benefited.

OPENING BROOKLYN STREETS FOR RAPID TRANSIT PURPOSES—COMMUNICATIONS TO BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT AND BOROUGH PRESIDENT

On motion, duly seconded, the Chairman was authorized to transmit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the following form of communication, and a similar communication to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

January 14, 1910

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York:

Shortly before the expiration of his term of office the former President of the Borough of Brooklyn furnished the Commission at its request with a report of the Chief Engineer of the Topographical Bureau of that Borough indicating the legal status of the streets to be used by the extensions of the Fourth Avenue rapid transit railroad which is now under construction as far as 43d Street. A copy of the report referred to is transmitted herewith together with a drawing prepared by the Commission showing graphically the situation as stated in the report.

The necessities of the situation as summed up by the Chief Engineer of the Topographical Bureau are as follows:

"Condemnation proceedings will be required in order to open the following streets:—

"I. New Utrecht Avenue from 38th street to 81st street.

"A proceeding for the opening of this street has been before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Although the City has sufficient rights for street purposes to 60 feet of this 80 foot street, it has been deemed advisable to include the entire width of the street in an opening proceeding so that the City may acquire title in fee for the entire street.

"II. 4th avenue from the junction of 5th avenue, between 94th and 95th streets, to Shore road, except the portion already opened as Stewart avenue.

"It may be advisable to include in the proceeding this exception so as to acquire title in fee for the entire width of the 100 foot street, as in the case of New Utrecht avenue. I believe it is claimed by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that this procedure does not make any perceptible addition to the cost of an opening proceeding.

"III. Stillwell avenue, from 86th street to Surf avenue, except such land that has already been acquired for railroad purposes.

"A portion of Stillwell avenue, on Coney Island, has been condemned for railroad depot purposes, which exempts such land from condemnation for street purposes without a special act of the Legislature."

On December 17, 1909, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted resolutions for the opening of New Utrecht Avenue from 38th to 81st Streets as a fee street and fixing and defining the area of assessment. The Commission understands that in this proceeding there is to be acquired not only the additional twenty feet at the side of the existing street, but also any possible existing rights in the present sixty-foot street, and that condemnation maps are now being prepared.

No steps have as yet been taken to acquire title to Fourth Avenue from the junction of Fifth Avenue to Shore Road or to the portion of Stillwell Avenue from 86th Street to Surf Avenue. The Commission desires to call these matters to your attention at the present time in order that steps may now be taken to acquire the necessary rights without delaying the construction of the balance of the Fourth Avenue line. In the opinion of the Commission it is of great importance to the city in order to avoid interruption of rapid transit railroad work that the proceeding for opening New Utrecht Avenue be prosecuted as rapidly as possible and that proceedings be instituted to acquire in fee the necessary street rights in Fourth Avenue from its intersection with Fifth Avenue to Shore Road, and in Stillwell Avenue from 86th Street to Surf Avenue, with provision in all three cases for the vesting of title in the city at the earliest practicable date.

The Chief Engineer of the Topographical Bureau also suggests that the route of the subway from 81st Street and New Utrecht Avenue to 86th Street east of Eighteenth Avenue extends diagonally across the regular street system over private lands, and that it may be advisable to lay out and acquire a street over all or a portion of the land across this portion of the route. The Commission calls this suggestion to your attention for such action as you may deem advisable.

LONG ISLAND RAILROAD COMPANY—SAFETY PRECAUTIONS AT GRANT AVENUE AND NAPIER PLACE CROSSING—OPINION—FINAL ORDER

Cargo, goods or merchandise in excess of twelve (12) tons shall not be transferred on one truck upon or over any marginal street, wharf or place except by special license or permission of the Commissioner of Docks, nor shall cargo, goods or merchandise be stored or stacked upon any marginal street, wharf or place in excess of one thousand (1,000) pounds per square foot, except by special license or permission of the Commissioner of Docks, and in such manner and method as he may direct so that the surface of pavement and cover plates of the marginal streets, wharves and places shall not be damaged.
